

The fire department's need for additional space has long been apparent. The department's current building will not begin to house the equipment, which includes some of the best equipment available for firefighting.

In other business, the council approved payment of \$3,608 to Frank and Petra Martinez, for right-of-way on the Highway 214 project. The purchase was the first of six parcels needed to complete the overpass.

The council also discussed a possible paving program for 1972, centered around Walnut Street between 11th and 14th Streets. Property owners along this street are to be contacted and urged to take part in paving the street,

Southwestern Public Service Company reports 1388 electric meters as of the first of the year, an increase of 52 over their total of 1336 a year ago, states H.L. Outland, local manager.

Pioneer Natural Gas Company currently has 1245 meters, and Ralph Shirley, manager, says this is up 60 from the same time a year ago.

City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland reports a total of 1241 active water meters at the beginning of the year, an increase of 36 from the same date a year earlier.


Continued growth of Frions come in the number of telephones in use. Jerry Kehoe, manager of the Littlefield district office, said that the company installed 140 additional telephones in Frions during 1971, including 56 new "main stations" (new numbers).

"Frione continues to be the leader in growth among all cities in our district," Kehoe stated. The number of telephones installed in Friona topped the totals for both Littlefield and Muleshoe, both larger than Friona in population, although Littlefield has seven more new main stations than did Frione.

Utility connections have long been considered a good indicator of a city's growth. Apparently. Frions continues to experience good, steady growth.

London, January 4 .- From your Foreign Correspondent Purpose: A Raise Reason: If I'm going to play like this -- I need more to play

with ---I really don't know where to begin this little report but I thought it might do some good to at least let you know I made it here.

The experience has been great -- from the first lift-off at Amarillo, the day in Houston, the night flight to Paris, the loss of 7 hours (you think it is rough with Texas losing just one hour, you should try 7 sometime), being in England though I am presently 6 hours ahead of you, at the moment of this writing it is 12 midnight, meaning that it is just 6 p.m. for you, now my late hour is due to several things, none of which I will share with you

But do let me share this with you-flying over to Paris-the Stewardess would make her announcements three times-once in French-once in Spanish and then in English-I don't know why, it sounded like everyone was speaking Dutch, German or No wegian, as are most people here, it may just be the part of town we are in.

We took the wrong Tube (Subway) today over to see the Tower of London and the Tower Bridge. We asked the lady at the window, where we could get off and find one, how to correct our mistake, we listened in utter disbelief, not a single one of us could understand her directions or what she was trying to say. Now, another incident, and you can be sure there will be several you will never know about ---

We were trying to use the Telly (Telephone) and we were given these instructions by our Hotel Receptionist -- "When you hear the pip squeak, drop in your two pence."

Now, I have heard of pip-squeak all my life and now I know the origin.

I'm not making fun or belittling anything or anybody--let me make that clear -- over here I'm the foreigner and that "do

make a difference." But let me close with something I think might be worth your

time. People talk and correspond in different ways. We have to tune ourselves to the wave-length to see what it all means. Sometimes, as with unknown foreign tongues, we are unable

to understand the attempted correspondence or communications.

And to me, Dear Friend, that is God speaking out of that truthful statement.

Sometimes we are not tuned in to his wave length and his message to us goes unheeded.

Sometimes, we are so busy trying to figure out what a "two pence" is that we fail to hear the "pip-squeak."

But never-never-does God speak so that we are not able to understand his message to us-the purpose of his Son was so you and I could hear. Isn't that great?

Along that line the following news release from Austin is offered.

Everyone knows the Texas Highway Department provides important transportation links between modern cities and towns. Not so well known is the Department's role in providing links to the past, too.

Texas Highway Department crews have been responsible for finding more than 800 archaeological sites since the Department was organized in 1917.

They combine with the more than 4,500 sites currently cataloged at the University of Texas Archaeological Research Laboratories in Austin to give archaeologists a more complete picture of the State's colorful history.

Discoveries made by Highway Department crews include the remains of an Indian burial mound now on display in the Witt Memorial Museum in San Antonio, Inner Space Caverns on Interstate Highway 35 near Georgetown, and an 80-millionyear-old fish fossil in West Texas,

Earlier, discoveries were made more or less by accident, Construction was stopped while the site was excavated. Today pinpointing archaeological sites and locating and restoring artifacts is an important part of highway building.

The Department has its own special archaeological section to find and explore archaeological sites before construction begins,

It was established in July, 1970, shortly after the Texas legislature passed the Antiquities Code in 1969. The code establishes strict rules for control of all historical and archaeological treasures in the State and makes it unlawful for the Department to build or improve a roadway at an archaeological site.

"We want to find all the sites, excavate them before a new highway is built and, at the same time, recover artifacts under existing highways," said Frank Weir.

Weir, who organized the Department's archaeological operations, and a small staff of trained archaeologists assisted by several Department employees have surveyed more than 400 miles of right of way and excavated nine sites since the section was formed.

Recent discoveries include an Indian campsite near a highway being constructed around Austin, Indian campsites and burial sites in West Texas and a Civil War powder mill near Marshall,

Probably the most significant discovery has been the original architectural plans and specifications for the temporary Capitol which burned in 1899.

The plans, considered lost, were found by Weir while doing research in the archives branch of the Texas State Library. "Through archaeology we are able to learn of achievements

and failures of those who lived in this land before us," Weil said.

"Knowledge of the past is essential to understanding the present and interpreting the future," he said. "Our findings give us a deeper understanding of how we came to be what we are today and what the possibilities are for tomorrow." Department employees across the State have provided sub-

stantial support for the program.

"They are familiar with their area and well-versed on its history," said Weir, "There hasn't been a week pass yet that someone didn't write or call with new information about a suspected archaeological site,"

Artifacts recovered from archaeological sites are studied by State archaeologists and often donated to a museum near the area where they were found.


Wedding music was presented by Roy Thornton, who also accompanied Mrs. Pat Hill, vocalist.
