Other scenes from our area depict Palo Duro Canyon, Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, the Hellum monument, and a wide expanse of wheat fields to the north.

It was a treat to see something of this nature so well documented. The puzzles are manufactured in Connecticut, and there is one available for every state in the union. The Texas map was almost three feet square, and took up a large part of our dining table.

One of the things which was very impressive to me regarding the bowl games was the pregame show from the Orange Bowl, in which the country's Astronauts took part.

During the playing of the National Anthem, it was a thrill to see each of the astronauts proudly saluting the flag with his hand over his heart.

We compared this to an incident in the last Olympics, in which some of our Black athletes raised clenched fists from the winner's platform during the playing of the Star Spangled Banner.

### Mercury Falls With Winter Blast

The coldest blast of the winter season had Friona residents digging out warmer clothing this week.

The norther, which blew in on Monday, also left a small amount of snow, but due to the high winds accompanying the front, the snow drifted and was of very little value from a moisture standpoint.

Monday was an especially cold day, with 25-30 mph winds adding to the discomfort of being outside. It was reported at one time Monday in Amarillo

that the chill factor there was 34 degrees below zero.

Monday night's official low temperature of four degrees was the lowest reading of the season. Ironically, on the same date exactly a year earlier, a reading of -10 had been recorded here--last season's coldest.

The front blew in on Monday morning. The high temperature that day came in the early morning hours, as the mercury continued to drop until a low of four degrees was recorded early Tuesday morning. The blowing

snow fell during the night on Monday.

The sun came out on Tuesday, but temperatures didn't climb very high--reaching only 18 at mid-afternoon.

The latest blast halted what had been unseasonably warm weather for this time of year. Friona had experienced one of the warmest Christmas seasons on record.

Much of the late crops were harvested during the two-week break from the weather, but some cotton remains.

# Tornado Picked As Year's Top Event

The tornado which slammed into Friona last June 11 was voted the top news story for the city for 1971, in a poll involving the Friona Star staff and civic leaders.

The windstorm, which did in excess of \$500,000 damage locally, was rated at the top by five of the ten taking part in the poll, and received 75 points on a rating scale, with a score of 100 being perfect.

Eged out for second place was the change in top level executives at Friona State Bank, where longtime resident Frank A. Spring retired, and Robert Neelley was named his successor. This event was placed as first on three ballots, and was second on two others, adding up 60 points.

Standing in third place among 1971's events was the winning of the world title in drag racing by Friona's Ken McLellan at the world championship races held in Amarillo. McLellan's feat tallied 59 points on the scale.

Fourth top news story was the threat of the loss of ambulance service locally, which finally was saved by mutual action involving the county, and the cities of Friona and Bovina. This event rated a score of 58.

Mrs. Dale Cunningham gave birth to a set of triplets on January 15, the second set for Farmer County Community Hospital, and this was judged as the year's fifth top story, getting 51 points on the scale.

Standing in sixth place was the opening of Friona Apartments, the largest housing development in the city's history--a big factor in alleviating the "no housing" situation. This event gained one first place vote.

The completion of Direct Distance Dialing for the area, and the shooting death of Roy Beardain tied for seventh place on the "top ten" listing, with 40 points.

Other events rated in the top

ten, with their points, were the winning of the district title by the Friona Squaws (36) and the completion of the senior Little League baseball park (32).

Barely missing the top ten list was the purchase of the swimming pool and its conversion to an outdoor facility by the City of Friona, with 31 points.

Other stories gaining points included the participation by Friona's Little Dribblers team at a special halftime show in Houston's Astrodome, and the closing of Continental Grain. Following are the top 11 stories, with their point totals. Points were awarded as 10 points for a first-place vote, nine for a second, eight for third, and so on. Numbers in first-place votes are in parenthesis.

## Year's Highlights

### JANUARY

The City of Friona purchased the Dive-In Swimming Pool on January 11 from W.H. Johnson, turning the pool into a municipal facility and guaranteeing a swimming facility for city youngsters. Following the tornadic blow which damaged the roof, the pool was converted to an open-air pool.

Triplets, two girls and a boy, were born to Mr. and Mrs. Dale Cunningham on January 15. It was the second set of triplets for Farmer County Community Hospital.

### FEBRUARY

Roy Beardain, 68, was found shot to death at his home on February 3. It was the first murder in history of city. Beardain's son, Rex, turned himself in to officers. Later in the month, he was "no-billed" by the Grand Jury.

G.B. (Pete) Buske was named Friona's top citizen at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet February 4. Heathington Lumber Company opened for business here on Monday, February 8. Ronnie Shafer is manager of the Mule-shoe-based company.

The Friona Squaws won district for the first time in six years, but dropped a 41-36 decision to Slaton in their bi-district playoff game on February 15 in Levelland.

The final figures on the 1970 census showed Friona's population to be 3,111, it was announced on February 18. This was an increase of 51.4 over the city's population of 2,048 in 1960.

Ralph W. King, 29, was killed in a car-pedestrian accident 4.6 miles southeast of Friona on February 18. King ran in front of a car driven by Chloe Ford Ferguson.

### MARCH

The city was in danger of losing its ambulance service, as J.C. Claborn of Claborn Ambulance advised the city commission that he could not continue the service on its present basis, as it was losing an average of \$720.00 per month.

The Friona Apartments, largest single housing project in the city's history, were completed, and began renting.

Farmer County Community Hospital received the \$3,000 heart monitoring machine in mid-March. The machine was bought with funds from the annual "Project Christmas Card" drive.

The City of Friona received a check for \$9,613 for the first quarter of its city sales tax collection.

### APRIL

Continuation of an ambulance service locally was assured on April 12, when the Farmer County commissioners voted to make a monthly payment of \$420 to Claborn Ambulance. The City of Friona earlier had voted to pay \$200 monthly, and Bovina \$100, in support of the service, which had been losing \$720 per month.

Neighboring Hereford was hit by a damaging tornado on April 18, causing in the neighborhood of \$2 million in damage, but miraculously killing no one.

### MAY

Dale Schueler was named valedictorian of the 1971 graduating class at Friona High School, with Debra Wylie as salutatorian.

Continental Grain Company, which had done business in Friona for 17 years, announced on May 20 that it would not renew the lease on its Friona location when it expired the end of May.

The new Senior Little League park, constructed through the efforts of the Friona Noon Lions, held dedication ceremonies on May 24.

Friona's Little Dribblers, who finished as runners-up in the national tournament, were invited and participated in an exhibition game at halftime of the ABA All-Star game at Houston's Astrodome.

### JUNE

Some 200 persons attended dedication ceremonies on June 6 of a historical marker at the old Parmerton townsite. The Friona Lions Club celebrated its 30th anniversary with a banquet June 10.

The City of Friona counted property losses in excess of \$500,000 in a tornadic blow on Friday, June 11. Largest single loss was at Missouri Beef Packers, with about \$50,000 damage to its roof. No deaths or even serious injuries were a miracle, observers thought.

### JULY

Bill Sarpallus, a graduate of Boys Ranch, was the main speaker for Friona's third annual Independence Day celebration, which also featured a fine fireworks display.

City residents learned on July 15 that both the school and city's tax rates would be increased for the first time in several years. The school's increase will be 15¢ per \$100 evaluation, and the city's will amount to ten cents.

Howard McLean was named manager of the Friona division of Missouri Beef Packers, replacing Dave LaFleur, who was elevated to company president on July 1.

Over 10,000 automobiles go through Friona each day, according to an official count released by the Texas Highway Department.

## New Base Station For Hub Exchange

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative announced this week that installation of equipment had been completed for the new mobile base station at Hub. "We will be accepting applications for this new service after January 10," stated Vernon Inmon, manager of the cooperative.

For the first time, mobile telephone service will be available to residents of the Friona area.

Inmon said that this time-saving method of mobile communications to our industrialized area is made possible by the modern equipment recently installed by Motorola, Inc.

"This service," states Inmon, "brings every telephone equipped vehicle to the most modern telephone facilities available. This installation program is another step toward bringing the best service possible to the Hub Exchange and the trade area."

The telephone cooperative is expected to release further details on the mobile facilities in the near future.

45 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 7, 1927

40 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 8, 1932

30 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 2, 1942

Friona's fourth annual Homecoming Banquet, held the night of December 28, was pronounced a success. Nelson Welch was chairman of the banquet. Miss Edith Moseley delivered the welcome address. Miss Charlene McFarland entertained with a piano solo. Pvt. Wilbur Meade spoke, and Forest Osborn played a harmonica solo. Miss Floy Goodwine was elected 1942 chairman.

20 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 3, 1952

On Tuesday, January 8, an election will be held to elect the first permanent board of directors of the High Plains Water Conservation District No. 1.

A number of postal changes went into effect January 1, most noticeable of which has been the abandonment of the 1¢ postal card. Friona postmaster Sloan H. Osborn reminds the public. Drop letters, for delivery in the local post office, will require 2¢ postage, and rural routes will require 3¢.

15 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 3, 1957

The recent completion of the "gaps" in Farm to Market Road 299, which runs north and south out of Friona, has resulted in the designation of this road as a state highway by the Texas Highway Department. This road is expected to gain more use by truckers and tourists.

Missouri Beef Packers continued in negotiations with union officials as the year ended, in an attempt to come up with a new labor contract with its employees.

## Addict Pens Twisted Version Of Psalm

U.S. Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr. of North Carolina inserted this into the Congressional Record. It's a heartbreaker.

"King Heroin is my shepherd, I shall always want. . . . These tragic words, part of a twisted rewording of the beloved 23rd Psalm, were discovered recently in Reidsville, N.C., in a closed car alongside a dead heroin addict. She was 23 years old.

"Her death was ruled a suicide. A hookup with the car's exhaust had sent carbon monoxide fumes from a running motor into the vehicle. Here's the complete 'Psalm.'

"King Heroin is my shepherd, I shall always want. He maketh me to lie down in the gutters.

"He leadeth me beside the troubled waters. He destroyeth my soul.

"He leadeth me in the paths of wickedness.

"Yea, I shall walk through the valley of poverty and will fear no evil for thou, Heroin, are with me.

"Thy Needle and Capsule comfort me. Thou strippest the table of groceries in the presence of my family. Thou robbest my head of reason.

"My cup of sorrow runneth over. Surely heroin addiction shall stalk me all the days of my life and I will dwell in the House of the Damned forever."

Also found in the car with the dead woman was this written message:

"Jail didn't cure me. Nor did hospitalization help me for long. The doctor told my family it would have been better, and indeed kinder, if the person who got me hooked on the dope had taken a gun and blown my brains out. And I wish to God he had. My God, how I wish it."

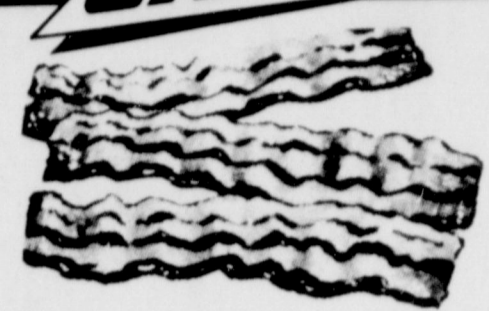
The seminar is sponsored by the United Pentecostal Church's Evangelism Commission and the Texico District Home Missions Dept. The public is invited to attend.

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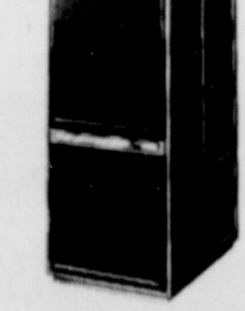

**Friona Library To Benefit From Grant**

Friona Public Library is among eight public libraries in the 25-county area surrounding Amarillo that have qualified for membership in the library system to be organized early in 1972 under the 1969 Texas Library Systems Act administered by the Texas State Library.

A grant of about \$2,200 will be made to the Amarillo-headquartered system.

The libraries are among 168 in the state that met criteria for membership. Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library, announced. Ten systems will be organized.

Amarillo Public Library will serve as the Major Resources Center and under the state legislation will have specified coordinating responsibilities for implementing the act.

Hutchinson County Library at Borger and Lovett Memorial Library at Pampa both serve populations larger than 25,000 and were designated as area libraries.

Designated as community libraries are those at Dumas, Friona, Panhandle, Perryton, and Stratford.

Lay representatives of the eight qualifying libraries will meet in Amarillo on March 3 to elect a six-member Advisory Council to determine policy for the system.

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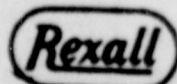

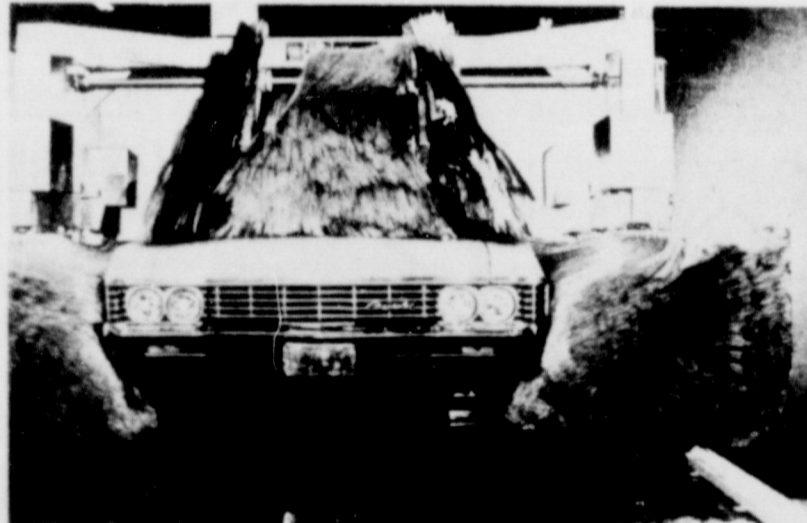

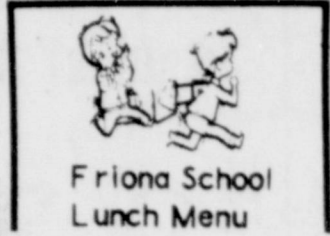
Entries are now being taken for the District Conservation Essay contest. The title of essays this year will be "Conservation-The Key to Survival."

**At Home In Parmer County**

'Tis the season of the year to conjure up a host of new year's resolutions, and among the many that seem to crop up year after year is losing weight. Make it easy on yourself this year and follow the simple steps to weight reduction.

First you must decide that you really want to lose weight. Doctors and nutritionists may report you need to trim off those extra pounds, but it is up to you—and what you eat—that counts. Or, it's what you don't eat that counts.

Check with your doctor to make sure it is safe for you to lose weight, especially if your goal is 10-20 pounds. Also ask a physician about exercising. Choose a sensible diet, that is 500-1,000 calories lower than what you normally eat. For women this level is generally around 1200 calories. Also make sure that the diet is nutritionally balanced.

**\*DID YOU KNOW** that a diet choosing lower-calorie foods from the 4 food groups supplies approximately 1,200 calories and meets the recommended daily requirements of all nutrients.

**\*DID YOU KNOW** that the popular "Weight Watchers" diet now sweeping the nation supplies approximately 1,200 calories, 3 times the protein recommended daily and meets the requirements of all other nutrients.

**\*DID YOU KNOW** that you can lose the same amount of weight (1-2 lbs. week) on both of these diets, but at much less cost using the 4 food group diet. It makes no difference when you eat certain foods (like eggs, bread, or cheese as restricted in Weight Watchers) but rather the total amount you eat.

Here is a diet that supplied all of the needed nutrients for only 1200 calories:  
Breakfast—(a very important meal)—one eight-ounce glass of skim milk, one poached egg, one piece of dry toast and one-half cup of tomato juice.

Lunch—cheese sandwich, carrot and celery sticks and one eight-ounce glass of skim milk.

Dinner—meat patty, broccoli, tossed salad with oil and vinegar, roll and ice tea or coffee.

Snack—apple or pear.

According to the Extension Service Foods & Nutrition Specialist, this diet uses lower calorie foods from the basic four food groups including milk, meat, bread and cereal, and fruit and vegetable.

A fourth step in proper dieting is to exercise daily. Remember that body weight is governed by two factors—the calories eaten in food and the calories expended in exercise. Just think how much quicker you will lose weight if you work on both diet and exercise!

Also remember to be patient, she notes. Don't try to achieve your weight goal all at once but follow a safe routine of losing one or two pounds a week. It is harder to gain back lost pounds if you lose weight slowly.

Incorporate these five keys to weight reduction in your daily habits and your new year's resolution will come true.

Just a few interesting facts on dieting:

**DID YOU KNOW** that Dr. Stillman's "Doctor's Quick Weight-Loss Diet" is a high protein, low carbohydrate diet. It can be very satisfying to the dieter because it offers meat, cheese, and eggs, and 8 glasses of water a day.


...That restricting carbohydrates may be dangerous. The National Research Council suggests that healthy persons generally need 100 grams of carbohydrates daily to avoid ketosis-excessive protein breakdown and other undesirable metabolic responses.

...That the "Air Force Diet" is also dangerously low in carbohydrates. This diet has no connection with the U.S. Air Force.

...That the "Drinking Man's Diet" was also just a gimmick in promoting that the calories in alcohol didn't count. Alcohol is quite high in calories and has very little nutritive value.

...That the "Mayo Clinic Diet" promotes grapefruit and eggs as the basic regimen. Although no such food has such properties, grapefruit was supposed to chew up and dissolve body fat. This diet has nothing to do with the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota.

...That the only successful way to lose weight is restricting calories and changing food habits. You can't live on fad diets the rest of your life. Therefore you must find a sensible way of eating fewer calories. Try the 4 food groups—it works!



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

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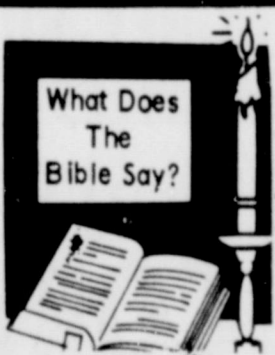
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### What Does The Bible Say?
