ARREST S. E. J. COX ON CHARGE OF USING MAILS TO DEFRAUD

HELD BY NEW YORK OFFICERS ON A WARRANT FROM TEXAS.

COMPLAINT CHARGES PUBLIC DEFRAUDED

Recently Came Into Notoriety Through Activities in Airplane Centers.

HOUSTON, March 14.—The federal grand jury reconvening today after a week's recess was investigating the affairs of S. E. J. Cox, a former member of the committee since his entry into Texas and who is under arrest in New York City on a federal complaint, filed in Houston, charging use of mail to defraud.

NEW YORK, March 14.—Seymour E. J. Cox, promoter of Houston, Texas, charged with defrauding investors out of \$1,000,000 in worthless stocks, waived examination and removal proceedings when arraigned in federal court today. He stated that his affairs in Texas were all right and that he was anxious to go back there and answer any complaints against him.

NEW YORK, March 14.—Alleged to have used the mails to defraud investors out of \$1,000,000 by the sale of worthless stocks, Secretary Mour J. Cox, promoter, was arrested last night in the Broadway theatrical district.

The warrant for Cox's arrest was issued by United States Commissioner Douglas of Houston, Texas, where the promoter operated as head of the Cox Realization corporation—a concern capitalized at \$20,000,000.

Postoffice Inspector Weidow, who accompanied police in search for Cox, said he had been sought since February 28, the trail leading first to Michigan, then through several states and finally to New York.

Cox was festively attired and wore a pair of leather puttees, which he said "all prominent business men of Houston affected." Inspector Weidow said the government had evidence that Cox had reaped a harvest of "between a million and a million and a half" by sending word through the mails glowing but false literature describing his investment opportunities.

Cox, who gave his full name as Seymour E. J. Cox, declined to discuss with police the charges on which he was arrested. He was locked in Tombs prison pending arraignment before a United States commissioner on proceedings for his removal to Houston.

Spending much of his time in New York in recent years, Cox had obtained considerable newspaper publicity through his air plane stunts. He had been married to Mrs. Cox and their son in a plane from Houston to New York to enter the lad in a private school. He also entered a plane in the Pulitzer and James Gordon Bennett races.

Last October Cox's methods of advertising the Cox realization corporation which dealt in potash and oil securities, were denounced by the Associated Advertising Club of the West.

The report quoted government reports to prove Cox's claims that he had discovered rich potash beds in Texas were grossly exaggerated and that he had outpromised investors in the glowing promises his literature held out to prospective investors. Government records also declared, offered as much as 2,000 per cent to investors in his potash lands.

When the admission the police were able to get from Cox, Lieutenant Gogan said, was that his company had taken in approximately \$1,500,000 in the sale of stock and other items.

Lieutenant Gogan said available records showed Cox had been in difficulties with the federal trade commission in 1919 on charges of fraudulent advertising.

His wife and several officials of the company, which included the General Oil company and Prudential Trust and Securities company, were prosecuted with him. Lieutenant Gogan said he could not say what the outcome of the case was.

FEDERAL GRAND JURY TO INVESTIGATE CASE HOUSTON, March 14.—Warrant for the arrest of S. E. J. Cox was issued by United States Commissioner Winston McMahon last Friday.

H. H. Black, postal inspector, stated Monday night Cox is alleged to have used the mails to send out circulars, photographs and statements which were fraudulent in connection with the production of the General Oil company, Cox realization company and the S. E. J. Cox company.

Cox and the General Oil company, which he promoted, had numerous court litigations. The center of numerous court litigations was the case of the Bennett trophy, the General Oil company was put into the hands of a receiver by Judge J. C. Hutchinson, who found that the company was "not insolvent" and for a time against the Cox company progressed under the receiver.

Recently Walter E. Monteth denied a petition of certain Chicago creditors asking that the property of the General Oil company be sold at auction. Judge Monteth held it would not be fair to the stockholders of the company.

HALF OF STUDENTS DOING IT, UNITED STATES FINDS; TRIP TO YALE SHOWS HOW

By NEA Service. NEW HAVEN, CONN.—Young men, do you want to go to college? Say Yale or Harvard or Columbia or Cornell or Northwestern or any of the big American colleges?

"Yes," you say, "that would be fine. But I haven't the money." You don't need the money! Make the money you go along. Half the college students in America are earning their way through college, at least in part, government experts have found.

A trip to Yale shows you how they do it. A questionnaire was sent out by the bureau of appointments of Yale to determine how many students were paying their own way through college.

President Angell of Yale says that half of the students of the college answered, and of these 42 per cent were working their way through college.

One of them is Antonio Freneda. He is a Cuban, and he started under a great handicap.

Freneda is now in his junior year. He says it is a cinch for a young man to work his way through college.

"I worked for a year in a factory, and I saved up enough to pay for books and clothes."

"I pay \$3 a week for my room. My board costs me \$4 a week, tuition \$25, books and papers \$2, clothing \$4, laundry \$1.50, incidentals \$3. This totals \$33 and I find no difficulty in earning it."

"The experience has been valuable to me. It has taught me that if I believe in a thing, I can do it."

Yale is not an exclusive school for the sons of rich men. It counts its self-supporting students by the hundreds.

However, exceptional qualities are demanded of the student who works his way through. The leisure time is spent from classes and studies, that more fortunate students spend in seeking pleasure, the self-supporting man must spend in earning his way.

A bureau of appointments whose chief aim is the aid of needy students is maintained.

The bureau works in two ways: By granting beneficiary college scholarships and acting as a clearing house for work.

Where the bureau, after careful investigation of the applicant, deems that a youth's character and secondary school record justify the award, it promises an allowance of \$120 the first term may be made. The allowance is for the entire day, the rest of the first term may be made.

For the first two years these allowances are made with the understanding that no obligation of repayment is incurred.

SMILING SUN WITH NORTH WIND COMES AFTER RAIN STORM

With the skies cleared after the rain storm of Monday, a radiant sun burst forth upon Wichita Falls Tuesday morning. The warmth of the sun more than counterbalanced the sting that north wind carries with it.

North winds were reported from all parts on the railroad lines leading into this city. The minimum temperature locally for the night was 54 degrees.

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MORE CONSTRUCTION BY RAILROADS THAN FOR SEVERAL YEARS

STATISTICS ARE PRESENTED BY RAILWAY PUBLICATION.

PLANS ALSO MADE FOR 500 MILES NEW LINES

Attributed to Shortage in Facilities and Improvement in Net Earnings.

CHICAGO, March 14.—More construction work is actually underway or projected by the railroads of the country for 1922 than for several years, according to statistics presented by the Railway Age. This was attributed to the shortage of railway facilities and the improvement in railroads net earnings within recent months.

"It is significant," the magazine stated, "that public announcement has already been made to construct over 500 miles new lines this year and contracts have already been let for at least half. Among the projects authorized are an extension of the Chicago and North Western to Santa Fe from Santa Fe, Kansas, east, and a line 40 miles long from Pawhuska, Okla., to Owen, which are understood to be the first of several projects which this road has had in contemplation."

The Dallas and Terrell, a Texas road, has awarded a contract for the construction of 34 miles of line. The Kansas and Oklahoma Southern has been authorized by the interstate commerce commission to build 21 miles and the new Holland Higginsport and Mount Vernon has received permission from the same source to build 24 miles of line.

With reference to second track, the Santa Fe has announced that it will reduce grade and provide in additional track between Yampal, Arizona and Griffith, 75 miles; the Great Northern will build 47 miles of second track in Washington and elsewhere; the Chicago and Alton has started work on 10 miles north of Altos, Illinois, which is estimated to cost \$32,000, and the Illinois Central has appropriated \$2,000,000 for the construction of a third track, the reduction of grades and other improvements between Matteson, Illinois, and Kankakee.

"In so far as terminal facilities are concerned, the Missouri, Kansas and Texas has awarded contracts for the construction of a new gravelly classification yard and shops at Denison, Texas, at an estimated cost of \$2,000,000. The Santa Fe has undertaken the construction of additions to its shops at San Bernardino, estimated to cost \$24,000, the Frisco has awarded a contract for a large pier on the Hudson river at Weehawken, N. J., and the Canadian Pacific has announced its intention of proceeding with the construction of a large ocean terminal on Burrard Inlet, in Vancouver.

"In this summary not attempt has been made to present a complete list of the large projects which have been authorized or contemplated but no specific announcement has yet been made or to include the many smaller projects such as stations and yard extensions. The list enumerated is, however, sufficient to demonstrate conclusively that the railroads are planning to increase their facilities for the coming year.

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MRS. MARY F. BARCUS DIES AT THE HOME OF A DAUGHTER IN WACO

WACO, TEXAS, March 14.—Mrs. Mary F. Barcus, age 90 years, died here early this morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. W. Stanford. She was the widow of Rev. E. R. Barcus who died in 1898. She had been a member of the Methodist church eighty years and was the mother of thirteen children, grandmother of fifty-two, and great-grandmother of twenty-eight. Four of her sons are Methodist ministers and two of them are now preaching elders.

The sons in the ministry are J. M. Barcus, presiding elder of the Georgetown district; T. S. Barcus, presiding elder of the Brownwood district; Sam Barcus of Denton, and E. R. Barcus of Austin. Eleven of the children are living and nine of them were present when she died. Her eldest child is 42 years old. Burial will be Wednesday at Stanford chapel, six miles west of the city, her first Texas home of 40 years ago. Her seven sons will be the pallbearers.

Cafe Owners Have Devised Difficulty For 'Dry Officers'

NEWARK, N.J., March 14.—Local cafe owners have devised a new difficulty for enforcement officers. Deputy Police Chief McNeil said today. Here's the scheme: A thirsty one enters. The man behind the apron appraises him and decides he needs what he wants. The thirsty one is told to stand close to the bar, hold his hands at his sides, throw back his head and open his mouth. Then the desired liquid is poured down the waiting throat.

"Now there's no way for a policeman to take the evidence out with him," complained McNeil.

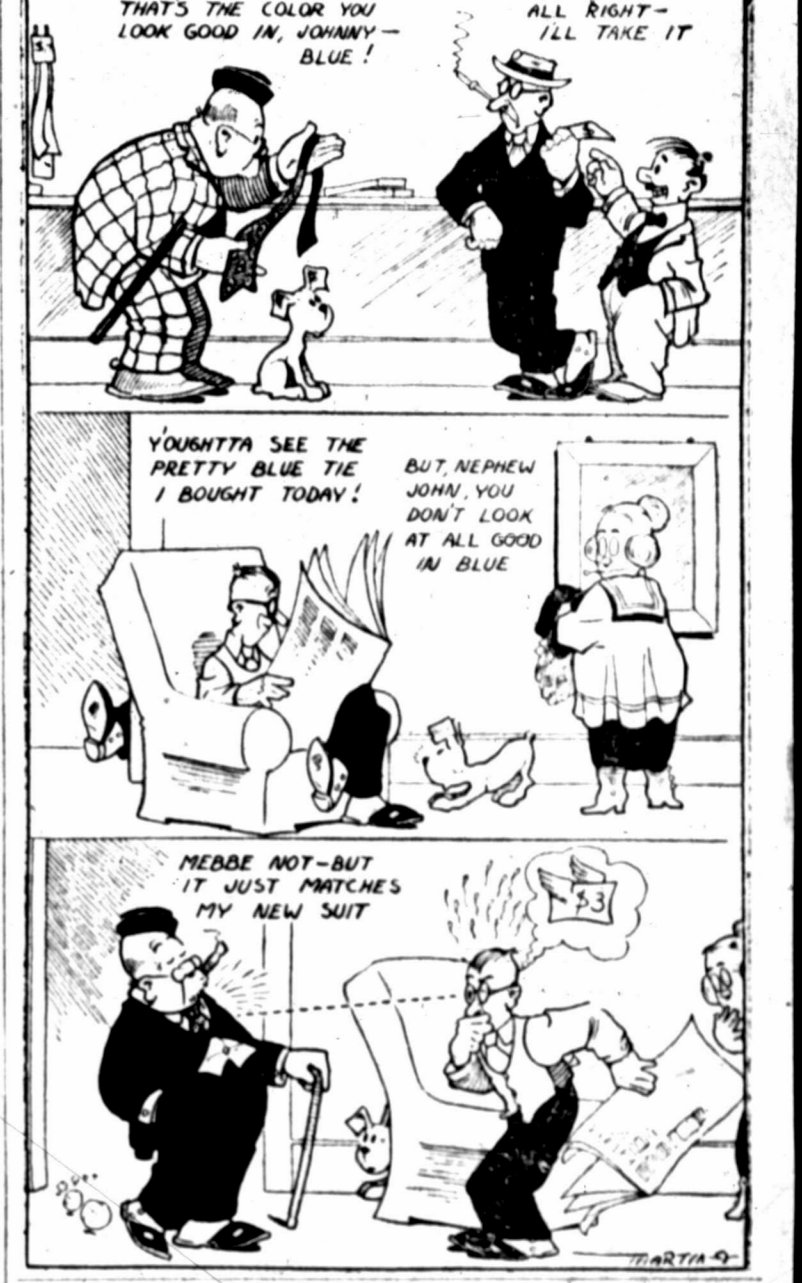
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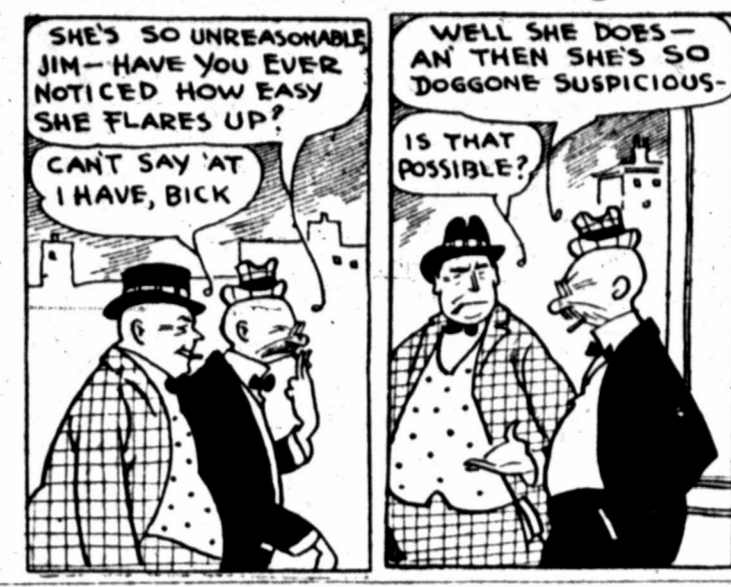

OUR LARGEST UNIVERSITY.
The enrollment of students at Columbia University reached 32,420 the other day. This was proclaimed as the largest number enrolled in any university in the United States but when the University of California was heard from Columbia went to second place. The enrollment in the University of California was 43,366.

Everywhere the number of students in colleges and universities has increased. Hard times appear to have had the effect of driving young men and women into higher education. Prosperity, with the demands of commerce and industry, appears to have the tendency of taking young men and women away from higher education. The number enrolled in the universities and colleges is now much greater than ever before in the history of the country. The time was when the college graduate was a rarity. Now there are numbers of them in almost every community. There is not much distinction any more in having a college degree.

Not every one who is attending college or who has a college degree can be considered an educated man or woman. A good many young people go to college because they think it is the thing to do and because of social advantages. Prof. E. G. Siller, the oldest instructor at New York University and one of the foremost classical scholars in America, believes that the American college idea is wrong. He says that just because the college student becomes socially independent and autonomous, it doesn't follow that he is also educationally and intellectually self-determining.

Prof. Siller don't believe that students ought to be permitted to select their own courses for this puts a premium on indolence. The student, he says, is too apt to select, not the work that will do them the most good, but that which is easiest. Instead of coming out developed, he says, students are graduated with weaker characters. They have spent their four years beating their professors and their courses.

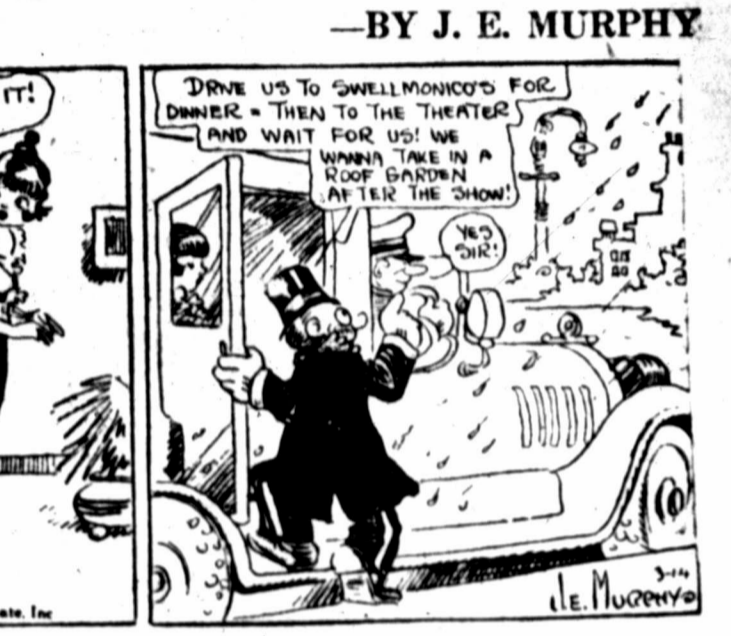
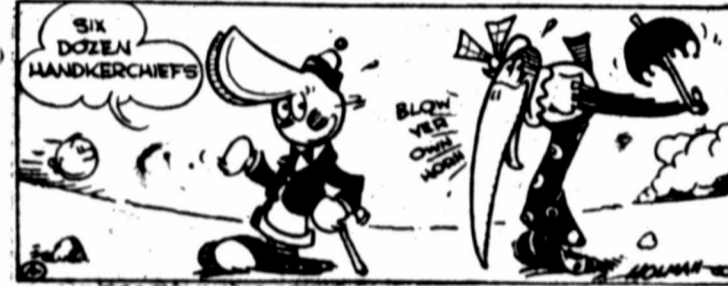
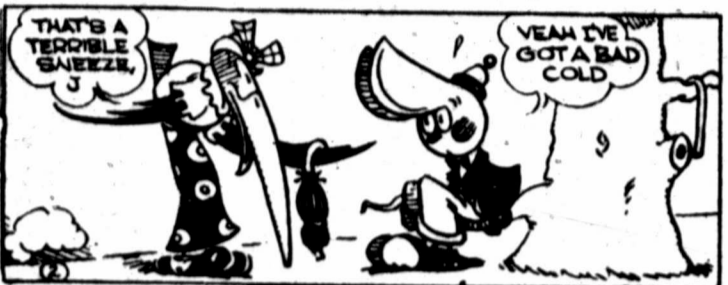

PRESIDENT HEYDLER TALKS ON HOLDOUTS

National League Head Says There Are None in Either Major League.

BY BOB DORMAN. NEW YORK, March 14.—There are no holdouts in either league at present," says John Heydler, head of the National League.

Rather a strange statement, yet President Heydler means every word of it.

"Not until the bell rings, and a player has failed to report can he be classed as a holdout," continued President Heydler.

"Too much is made of the so-called holdout.

"Many players who are dubbed holdouts are merely lax in answering their correspondence.

"Other players are away from home, hunting for fishing, and fail to get the contract promptly.

"As for the fellow who asks for a change in the contract submitted to him for his signature, why should so much ado be made about it?"

"Ball players are no different from anyone else. They have their services for sale, the same as a lawyer.

"They have the same right to a value on their work and to bargain with their employers in order to obtain that price.

"In any business the man whose salary demands the unreasonable will soon find himself out of a job. That goes for football. Some players have an exaggerated idea of the profits made in baseball.

"Any club owner will tell you that the profits of the last two years, which have been the banner years of baseball, have not wiped out the deficits incurred from 1913 to 1919.

"As for admission prices, a little thought will convince anyone that they are eminently fair, as compared with that of other amusement enterprises.

"Regarding the outlook for the present season I am through making predictions. I am an amusement man and I would have to issue a favorable statement no matter what I thought.

"I am hoping that baseball will not suffer as a result of business conditions as they now exist.

"It seems to me that all amusement places have felt the pinch. Baseball is peculiar, however; it seems to weather a financial crisis better than any other amusement enterprise.

"Baseball is played under ideal weather conditions most of the season. That is one of its advantages in weathering a tight money market.

"Everyone likes to get out in the open. A ball game affords such an opportunity. Incidentally one gets the thrills that are furnished by the great national pastime.

"For that reason, no matter how low one's finances are, they manage to dig up enough to enable them to gain admission to a ball game.

"Picking a winner in the national league is beyond me. Perhaps I have a pretty definite opinion, but I am not going to express it. That wouldn't be diplomatic.

"I might say, however, that the New York Giants won the pennant last year and that the Pittsburgh Pirates are certainly no weaker than the Giants at third gives the team additional power.

"There are seven other clubs in the National League, however, and I am not merely handing out flattery when I say that I believe each and every one is stronger than it was last season.

"St. Louis has a great team. It is going better than any club in the league at the close of the 1931 campaign. Gibson is sure to have the Pittsburgh team up there.

"I look for keen competition and a great race.

FEAR OLYMPICS MAY NOT BE IN FRANCE

Financial Condition of Country Responsible—Paris Fails to Raise Money.

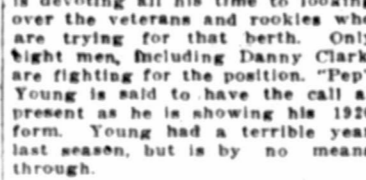
PARIS, March 14.—The Olympic games for 1934 have again become a subject of controversy and many friends of athletics fear they may not be held in France owing to the city of Paris voting only one million francs, instead of the promised ten millions, and the municipal council's insistence that the games be held in Pershing Stadium, to which the Olympic committee absolutely refuses to consent on the ground that it is inadequate field for such sports. The French Olympic committee favored the Palais des Princes, near the Bois de Boulogne.

Before the council's vote, M. Aufrant, prefect of the department of Seine, read a letter from Court Clary declared he would follow out Olympic executive committee, stating explicitly that the Palais des Princes site were permitted, the committee would withdraw entirely, leaving the 10 million francs in the hands of the international Olympic committee. After the meeting Court Clary declared he would follow out the declaration in his letter. Homer Summa, leading outfielder of the International league last season, was purchased Tuesday from Pittsburgh by Manager Walter Salm of the Spudgers. Summa was with the Rochester club last year and Birmingham in the Southern in 1920 and is rated as one of the fastest outfielders in minor league baseball. Pittsburgh sent him to Birmingham two years ago, as owing to an abundance of good outfield material the Pirates could not use him. He hit around the .350 mark last season. The Spudder boss stated that he paid more money for Summa than he ever paid for a ball player in his life.

This purchase is taken to mean that Bob Bescher will be among the missing at Athletic park this season. His physical condition does not warrant the Spudder boss meeting his demand and he would be little short of crazy to sign him knowing that he could hardly last the season out. Bob's ailment is a torn ligament in his leg. There is no telling when it may pull apart after it has once healed. It has been bothering him for more than one year and though he has no need when in the best of condition, Walter needs a man who is in there every day.

Bescher likes baseball too well to stay out of the game even during the spring training season. If he did not feel that it was not for himself, he would have reported long before now. Walter received plenty of inside information as to Bob's condition when he attended the Buffalo meeting. Men who worked with him in the American association know how his leg acts and know that if it were not for this handicap he would still be with the Columbus club. His injury was the sole reason that caused Kid Easley to turn him loose from Little Rock. Walter grasped his last year, feeling that he would keep the club in the race. There is no doubt but that he fulfilled Walter's hopes until his leg went bad again, and

what the club did when he was forced to retire is now history.

Spudder Boss Talkative

Walter was in a rather talkative mood Tuesday morning as he sat in the club house watching his charges toss and bunt the ball around. The infield was a bit too soggy to permit any hitting or fielding practice and the boys simply lobbed the ball back and forth and wound up with a couple of turns around the park.

In discussing the merits and faults of his rookies he declared that Steve Moran and Schmidt had made the most favorable impression to date, but he did not mean by that that they had clinched their berths. However, coming from a man who says so little about his charges, this means a lot. It can be taken to mean this much—they will be among the last to be cut loose if they are cut loose. "Slim" Stropy also has given the boss something to think about. The big chap was laid up with a severe cold Tuesday, but is expected to be out in uniform in a couple of days.

"I wish I knew what to make of this bird White," said Salm, as the conversation turned to the infield possibilities. "I wired him his trip report a week ago and he should have been here last Friday. He told me that he had signed his contract and was making it but I haven't even received the contract yet. He's the one ball player I'm after. Several of the Cleveland boys who were here last week, and who I know quite well, told me that he was one of the best shortstops in the minor league and that he could play any position in the infield except first base. As soon as he shows up I'll be satisfied."

Kitchens continues to keep his employer informed as to the condition of his pitchers and never writes a letter without telling how much better Babe Ruth looks every day. Walter has more faith than ever in his fellow townsmen and claims that he should be one of the sensations of the Texas league this year.

NEW GAS RECORD IS BEING SET UP BY GULF CARSON WELL

The Gulf Production company's No. 1 well in section 118 of the Burnett tract in Carson county announced a new gas record of 2,450 feet, making 2,985,000 cubic feet of gas and 600,000 cubic feet of oil. The well is the biggest gas well in the world, with a known production of 340,000,000 feet. The Gulf well now surpasses the Amalillo Oil company's No. 4 on the Masterson ranch, which has shut in the present time 187,000,000 cubic feet from the 1,476-foot stratum.

This new gas was found around 2,450 feet, the first gas strike being made at 2,410 feet, at which time 75,000 cubic feet was encountered, and 40,000,000 more was drilled into at 2,450 feet. The gas is being muddied off and the well will be drilled down to the oil sand found in Gulf No. 2.

H. T. McGee and associates No. 1 on the Smith-Capers tract resumed drilling after installing some new machinery, and at 1,770 encountered a considerable flow of gas. The well is located about six miles northeast of the Gulf well, south of the Silk-Stone No. 1 Burnett, south of the Gulf well, has succeeded in straightening out the hole and have resumed drilling around 1,500 feet.

The Humble company's No. 3 Burnett is rapidly getting down to the gas sand in the vicinity of 2,100 feet. The Texas company has recovered three joints of casing which dropped in the hole and are expecting to get the remaining obstruction out by the end of the week when drilling will be resumed. The well is down 1,700 feet.

The Watchorn Oil company's test in Hall county was completed at the depth of 3,800 feet as dry. The test showed slight traces of oil and gas at various depths, but not enough to cause any undue hope from the parties interested.

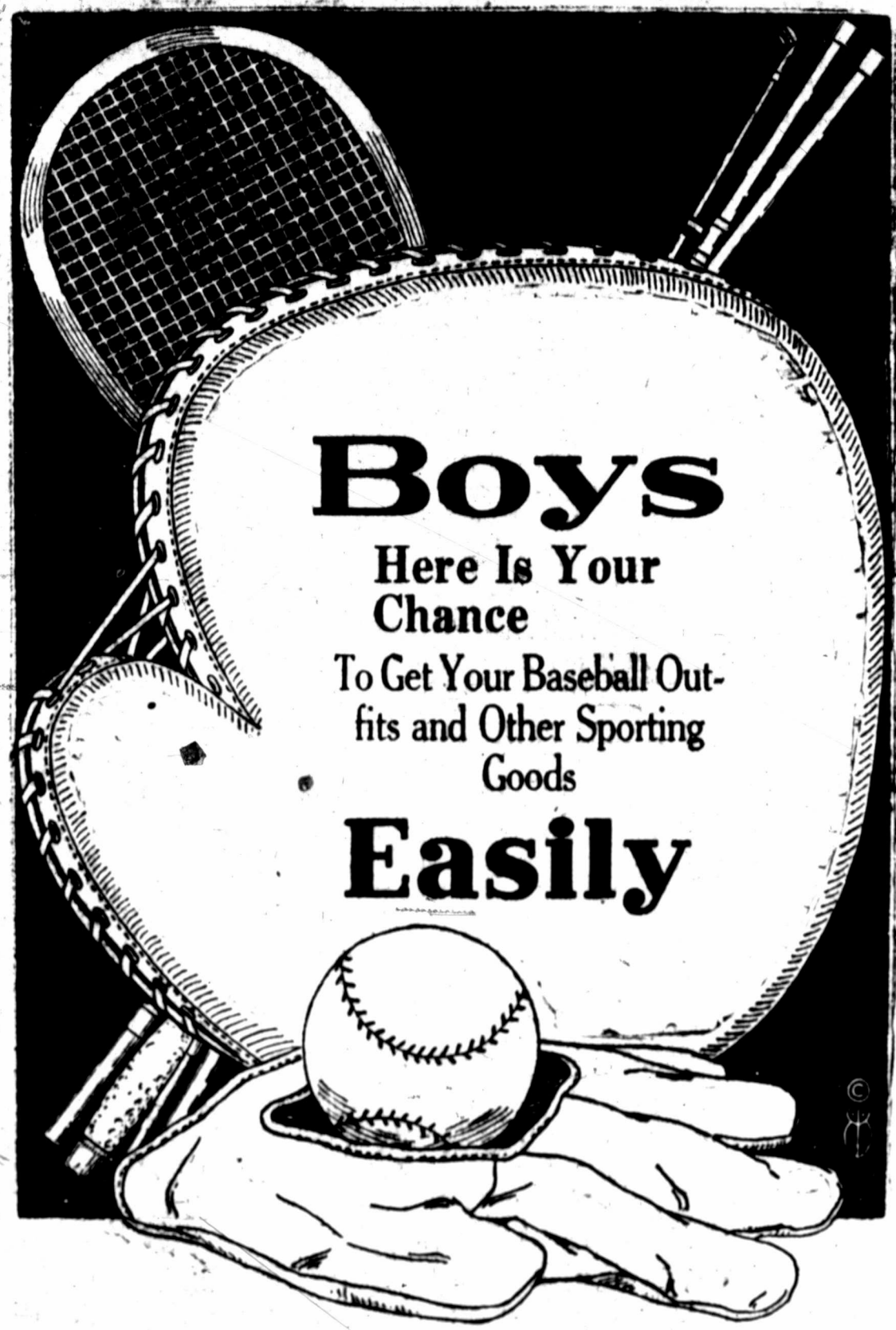

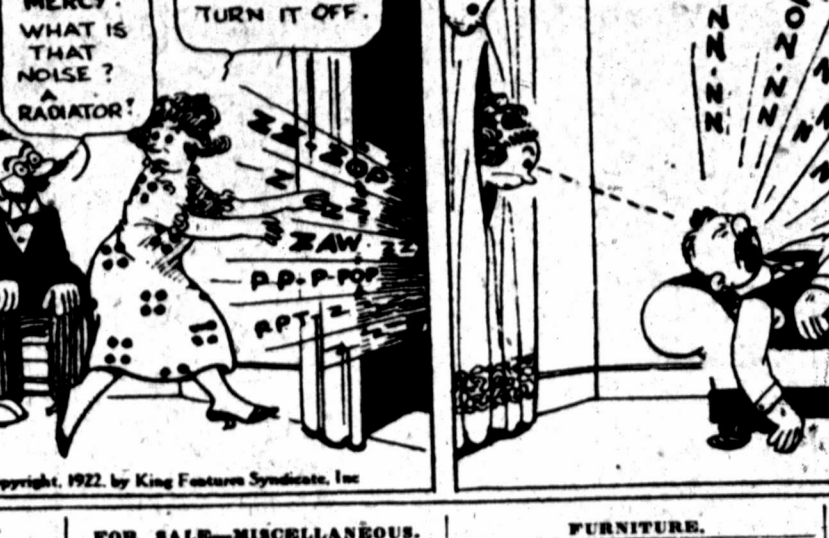

FALLS FROM PORCH WHILE ASLEEP AND IS FATALLY INJURED

JAMES SHIGH, AGED 70, DIES AS RESULT OF ACCIDENT MONDAY NIGHT.

FOUND BY MOTORMAN EARLY TUESDAY MORNING

Fall is Thought to Have Been Due to Waking in Sleep Some-time in Night.

Stepping from a second floor porch, apparently while walking in his sleep, and falling to the ground below, James Shigh, aged about 70, sustained injuries sometime Monday night which caused his death at 10:00 o'clock this morning.

The accident took place at the C. D. Shamburger home, 2301 Ninth street. Mr. Shigh was an uncle of Mr. Shamburger and had been spending much of his time with the family in this city of late.

Just what time the aged man fell from the porch is not known. He was found shortly after 9:00 o'clock by a street car motorman making his first run of the morning and members of the family notified. Medical aid was summoned and Mr. Shigh given attention throughout the morning but the shock of the fall, combined with the advanced age of the patient, made recovery impossible.

Mr. Shigh had been in poor health for some time, according to reports.

JEWISH PURIM FESTIVAL IS BEING OBSERVED BY MEMBERS OF THAT FAITH

The ancient Jewish festival of Purim is being observed Tuesday by members of that faith in keeping with traditional practices.

The feast is one of the minor occasions in the Jewish calendar, but is usually celebrated religiously.

In the Biblical account the Jews of Persia were fated to be destroyed. The date set for this terrible execution of the building of the temple, was the 13th day of the 12th month, according to the Jewish calendar. Through the miraculous intervention of Esther, queen of Persia, the Jews, selected by Ashauerus as his wife, and Mordecai, her uncle, the Jewish people were spared this murderous destruction.

In this triumph the Jewish people read an answer to their own afflictions. They felt that the triumph was their own and they would vindicate them and remove the bonds of oppression.

The ritual of the Purim feast consists in reading the book of scroll of Esther, either in the original or in translation. In ancient days the reading of the narrative was accompanied by unrestricted comments of the congregation, gathered primarily for the purpose of hearing the fascinating story read from the scroll. The mention of Queen Esther and Mordecai was an occasion for applause and the trickeries of Haman were ridiculed and revised by any noisy instrument.

This semi-miraculous treatment of the Biblical story, retold in triumph of truth and righteousness over tyranny and vice oppression. The joyous celebration of this feast of Esther was never modified even in the darkest period of Israel's career. The bitter experiences they had to endure gave them greater reason to observe this festival in the spirit of merriment in order to counteract the sadness of their own lot and revive their lagging faith in God who shielded them against the attacks of the foe.

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RESIGNATION FILED BY MONTGOMERY; RUGELEY IS NAMED

Acceptance of the resignation of Julian Montgomery as city engineer and the election of F. M. Rugeley as his successor featured the meeting of the city council Monday night. Mr. Montgomery retired from office after two years, to establish an engineering office of his own; he has been on a part time basis for several months, and will now devote his entire time to his private work.

F. M. Rugeley, new city engineer, has been connected with the department for some time and is familiar with all of the city's problems. He will assume his duties as city engineer March 22, on which date Mr. Montgomery's resignation takes effect.

In the absence of a building code, the council decided that it could not take action on a recommendation by Street Commissioner Curles that a board of contractors be named to inspect down town buildings suspected of being unsafe. Members of the council expressed the opinion, however, that any building owner who has any reason to doubt the absolute safety of his property should at once take steps to satisfy himself.

The council passed finally the ordinance authorizing the working of city prisoners on the streets, and also passed finally the irrigating district's electric power line right of way ordinance.

City Engineer Montgomery, during his two years in office, has had supervision over an extensive program of municipal improvements, which included expenditure of approximately \$1,000,000 for paving, fire stations, parks and other betterments. He came to Wichita Falls from Rockwall, where he was county engineer.
