## Squaws Vs Slaton In Playoff Game

### SHOOTING VICTIM

## Beardain Services Conducted Friday

Funeral services for Roy D. Beardain, 66, were conducted last Friday at 6th Street Church of Christ. Burial was in Clovis.

Beardain was found shot to death at his home, 1205 Washington in Friona, last Wednesday morning after his son Rex, 34, turned himself in at the Friona Police Department and told officers of the shooting.

Officers said the younger Beardain came into the Police Department at about 8:20 a.m. and said "You need to send an ambulance over to my dad's house. He has been shot."

Deputy Garland Freeman said Beardain was carrying a .22 caliber Magnum pistol. Freeman said he jailed Beardain immediately and went to help with the investigation. Assistant Police Chief Bill Denney and municipal judge Thelma Jones were in the office at the time.

Freeman and Denney found the elder Beardain lying on his back in the living room of his apartment. He had been shot six times in the chest.

Dr. Paul Spring and Precinct Justice of the Peace Frances Euler were also summoned at the time the ambulance was sent. They pronounced Beardain dead at the scene.

Rex Beardain was transferred to Farwell around noon Wednesday, and was arraigned before Justice of the Peace J.R. Thornton, who set the bond. He was released after making bond, and has been bound over to Grand Jury action.

The murder charge is believed to be the first in Friona's history, at least in modern times.

Roy Beardain came to Friona in 1930 from Oklahoma. He was a retired farmer and owned apartments in Friona. Rex Beardain farms in the Rhea community.

## Girls Tilt Is Monday

Two teams with very similar records will meet in a girls bi-district playoff game at Levelland next Monday.

The Friona Squaws, with a 24-3 record, meet the Slaton Tigerettes, who are 25-4 for the season. One of Friona's wins was a 47-43 win over the Tigerettes at the Tullis tournament, of which the Squaws were champs.

The game will begin at 7:30 p.m. at the South Plains College "Texan Dome" Fieldhouse. Admission is \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for children.

The FHS Cheerleaders have declared Monday "Shock Slaton" Day. They hope to have a student bus make the trip to Levelland to boost the Squaws, and urge the townspeople to attend the game.

Besides their loss to Friona, the Tigerettes have lost only to District 1-AAA champion Canyon, and two games to the Wayland College Queen "Bees."

Friona is back in the playoffs in girls basketball after an absence of five years. Prior to the lapse, the Squaws had been in the playoffs in 1960, 1963, 1964 and 1965. The team went to the state tournament each of those years, and won the state title in 1964. They were runners-up in 1960 and 1965, and finished third in 1963.

The two teams have met once previously in the playoffs, in 1965 when Friona took a 55-34 win enroute to the state finals for the second straight year.

The Tigerettes, who are coached by Gay Benson, former All-American college player from Wayland, have won the district title for the third time in nine years.

The Slaton girls last won district in 1968. They competed in class AAA for two seasons, but dropped back into class AA this year.

Slaton is led by Sue Brake, a 5-8 forward who is the top inside scorer, and Marilyn Neeks, also 5-8, who is dead-endly from outside. The Tigerettes' tallest girl is Elnora Moore, at 5-10. She is the leading rebounder on the team.

The Tigerettes won the Slaton Invitational Tournament, and the West Texas Girls Invitational Tournament, a holiday event which drew 16 entries. They won District 4-AA with a perfect 12-0 mark.

Friona won the Tullis tournament after getting past Slaton in the opening round.

The Squaws' losses were to rugged Spearman in the finals of the Friona Invitational Tournament, to Claude in the finals (Continued on Page 8)

## City To Elect Four Members To Council

An ordinance was passed setting the annual city election for Saturday, April 4 by the Friona City Council Monday night.

Four aldermen will be elected to the council—three for regular two-year terms and one for a year's unexpired term. Aldermen whose terms are expiring are James Procter, Marion Fite and Leland Hutson. The other place to be filled is the seat vacated when Robert Neelley moved from the city.

March 3 is the filing deadline for the four positions.

In other business, the council passed a motion to increase the hospitalization coverage for

its employees, at an increase in premium costs to the city of roughly \$1500 per year.

The council voted not to enter

into contract to keep the time and temperature sign operating at the old bank location. This was to cost \$125 per month.

### License Booths Are Slated

Hugh Moseley, Parmer County tax assessor-collector, will be in Friona next week to sell 1971 vehicle license plates, he announced this week.

Moseley will have a special booth set up at the old city council meeting room at 8th and Main between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday of next week, February 15-19.

The following Monday and Tu-

esday, Moseley will have a booth in Bovina at City Hall, also between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., and he will go to Lubbudde at the Sherry-Anderson elevator on Wednesday, February 24, from 2-4 p.m.

Vehicle owners are requested to avail themselves of these special booths, and are asked to bring their renewal applications they recently received in the mail.

The group approved the participation of the city manager in a technical school to be held in Lubbock next month.

In other business, the mayor and council discussed asking the Chamber of Commerce to pay a portion of the utilities at the new location.

Also discussed at length was a letter from J.C. Claborn stating that he would be forced to terminate ambulance service in Friona on March 12.

The City Manager reviewed the city's policy on discontinuance of water service in the case of non-payment of bills, and secured the backing of the council in enforcing the policy.

## Buske Gets Top C-C Award

Dr. Reagan V. Brown challenged residents to improve its community image through such things as "facelifts" of downtown areas, in his speech to the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet last Thursday night.

Brown, a sociologist with the Texas Extension Service, used slides to present evidences of community improvement programs from across the state.

The annual banquet was highlighted by the presentation of the Chamber's annual outstanding citizen awards.

G.B. (Pete) Buske was named "Man of the Year." Buske, a resident of Friona since 1929 has been a farmer, rancher, cattleman and businessman.

In making the presentation, Chamber president Steve Messenger termed him "The Complete Optimist." He was cited for his civic, religious and business contributions throughout the area.

Buske is a deacon of the First Baptist Church, teaches a men's Bible Class and also is serving on the board of directors for High Plains Baptist Hospital, is on the board of develop-

ment of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and on the board for Hardin-Simmons University.

Mrs. Ethel Bengier was named "Woman of the Year." She was cited for her involvement in civic work which included helping her community win the "Community Improvement Award" in 1956.

A native of Oklahoma, Mrs. Bengier attended Panhandle A&M College and received her degree from Northwestern State Teachers College. She taught 17 years in Oklahoma, and then 20 years in Friona after moving to Parmer County in 1940.

She is currently the president of the Friona Woman's Club, is secretary of the Black Community Assn. She is past president of the American Legion Auxiliary. Mrs. Bengier works with the Future Teachers organization, and has the Friona High School chapter named in her honor.

The "Teacher of the Year" award was presented to Mrs. Baker (Margaret) Duggins, teacher in the Friona elementary school system for the past 12 years.

She is a member of the Texas State Teachers Assn., Classroom Teachers Assn., and is a past president of Progressive Study Club. Her husband is a former "Man of the Year" choice.

The "Most Courteous Employee" award went to Mrs. Frances Davis, who has been the manager of the Friona School Cafeteria for the past several years.

She also drives a school bus, and prepares, serves and helps with almost all banquets held in Friona. Mrs. Davis has been a resident of the Friona area since she was 14.

A special citation was presented to the junior class of Friona High School for building the float and transporting it to Austin for the Governor's Inaugural parade last month. Junior class president Richard Shirley accepted the award for the class.

Ralph Shirley was installed as the new Chamber president. Wendell Gresham is vice president and Ray Murphree is secretary. New directors are Gresham, Murphree, Glenn E. Reeve, Jr., Ron Davenport and H.K. Kendrick.

**Vehicle Owners Urged To Get Plates Early**

Now is the time for all good motor vehicle owners in Texas to come to their own aid by registering their vehicles early. The registration renewal season opened February 1st county tax offices and designated sub-stations. A sub-station will be operated in Friona the week of February 15-19 at the law enforcement center, 802 Main.

The "season" runs through February and March, although the wise motorist will save time and trouble by registering his vehicle early and by using the handy three-part form he received in the mail from the Texas Highway Department.

All one needs to do is to take the three-part renewal application--being careful not to separate the three parts of the form--to the county tax office or sub-station.

Using the new form, it takes the clerk only a fraction of the time that it used to process the form, collect the fee and send the motorist on the way with his 1971 license plates. For that reason, waiting time is trimmed drastically.

Human nature being what it is, however, many will wait until the last minute to secure their license plates. Texas motorists can count on longer lines toward the end of the season--even though they may be moving faster.

There is an even less painful method. If the vehicle owner desires, he may order his license plates by mail.

All that is required is to send the renewal application, the fee plus \$1 for each vehicle to be registered to the local county tax office prior to March 1. This allows 30 days for delivery of the plates in time for the April 1 deadline.

Records of the Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division reveal that 65 per cent of the registrations handled last year were speeded up by using the computerized renewal forms.

The outlook for this year is that the public will save even more time in the second year of operation under the new system. Register now and display your new plates. This will remind your neighbor it is time for him to do the same.

**Flashbacks**

...from the files of the Friona Star

40 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 13, 1931

Friona barber shops have started a price war and have reduced the price of haircuts to 40 cents and shaves to 20 cents. Monday morning the town awakened to find a placard in the window of Smokey's barber shop listing new prices. This was followed by a still larger sign in front of both the other shops announcing the same prices.

35 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 14, 1936

Friday and Saturday of last week registered probably the coldest weather we have had this season, with thermometers registering all the way from three to five degrees below zero. At this writing on Wednesday morning the wind is raging like a jungle full of roaring lions, with considerable dirt moving.

30 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 14, 1941

According to reports reaching the Star office, the Friona schools will issue another school annual this term, and several students of the High School are now quite busy collecting and arranging the materials for it. It was reported that the school's two bands were to have their pictures taken for the annual Thursday.

25 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 15, 1946

Dan Ehridge, who was formerly employed in the Friona State Bank, and later engaged in the insurance business here, was recently discharged from the Armed Service, and has bought an interest in the Frank A. Spring Insurance Agency. Mr. Ehridge has taken charge of the office business, and will be assisted by Mrs. Dallas Coldiron, Miss Mary Spring, who has tended the office since her brother became associated with the bank, will continue with her income tax business.

20 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 8, 1951

In a conference Tuesday in Hereford between officials of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. and the West Texas Rural Telephone Co-operative, agreements were reached whereby each organization will serve areas designated "economically feasible." Bell will serve an area about three miles around Hereford, with the Co-op left to serve the Dawn, Black and Summerfield areas.

15 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 10, 1956

The "fires come in threes" philosophy was proved again in Friona the past week, when within three days one man burned to death, a locker plant was destroyed, and a truck at Hub caught fire. Robert H. Pierce, 52, was burned to death in the old building in which he was living. The building had served as Parmer County's original courthouse at Parmer-ton.

10 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 9, 1961

Friona Country Club needs only 19 additional members before actual construction on the nine-hole and spacious club house begins.

The Tullis girls basketball team wrote a heart-breaking finish to the Friona Squaws domination of District 1-AA in a 53-52 win Tuesday night that had all the thrills and disappointments that will make it stick out in the memory of basketball fans for many seasons to come.

5 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 10, 1966

A teen center has opened in Friona during the past week, run by an organization with eight high school students and an adult sponsor, Mr. D.F. Milloy, owner of the building. Currently the center has two coin-operated pool tables, two ping-pong tables, a pin-ball machine, a juke box, a television set and a snack bar with tables and chairs.

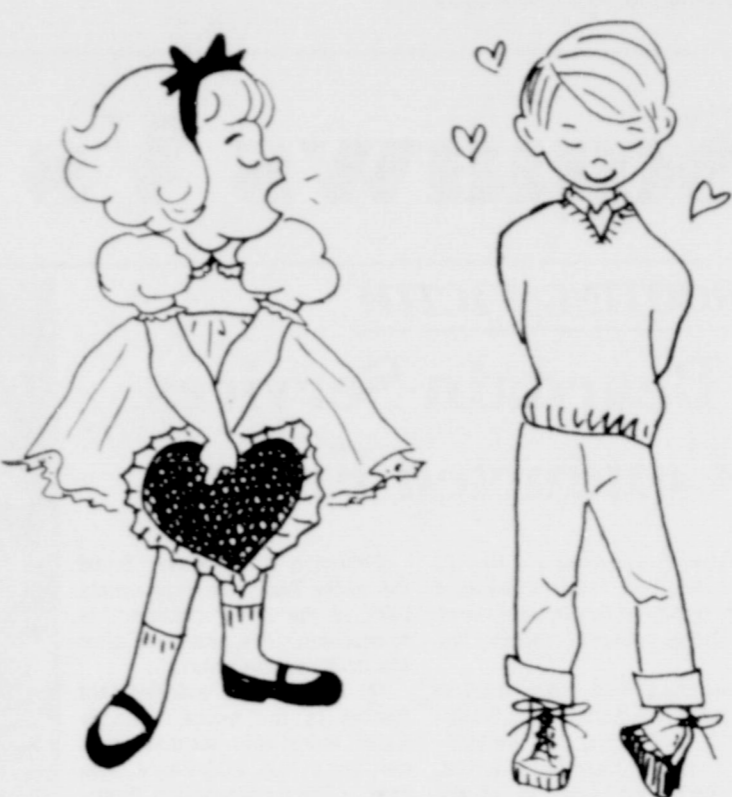

Say, did you notice that article the other day that said a survey indicated that people who practiced church attendance had a tendency to live longer?  
Man, that's something worth knowing. . . I somehow have a sneaking suspicion though, that if that is the main reason for attending church, it wouldn't help the statistic very much. It has simply always been a point of the rule in the circles of religion and God-relatedness, that when someone tries to "use" Him, for personal reasons and gain, then it just doesn't work out very well.  
And yet--I suppose, in the real sense, "personal reasons" and "gain" would be a part of our concern for "God-relatedness."  
Of course, it would be a different approach from the one I made light of, above.  
My personal reasons for dealing with God are the very things God wants me to deal with Him about. He would like nothing better in my life than to be able to get hold of my "personal" activities, thoughts, deeds, concerns--That's the name of the game. . . and believe you me, that would be some "gain" for me. . .  
No, my idea about not working on my God-relatedness except for "personal reasons" or "gain," means that often we get some ideas in our minds about what we would like and what would help us in our own way and after looking around we see the possibility of the church as providing a good basis for our contact.  
For instance!  
A guy told me once that he made it a real habit to be a part of a church in his community. He owned a Service Station and told me that the contacts he made at church sure did help his business. . . Well, now. . . I somehow have the feeling that everyone connected to that particular situation were being used. . . and yet. . . I also think that every one will get something good out of every service--well, almost everyone out of most services. . . I would think one would really have to be in a totally different world, mentally, to not receive a single thing. And I know that is possible, too.  
There is a passage about the spirits getting together. . . "It is the Spirit himself bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God." . . . now, that really does excite me. Boy/Girl, when that happens--when our spirits are contacted by God's and the two get together--all kinds of things can happen and you can believe me, it is "personal gain" in that instance.  
Now, those are the kinds of things that can happen in a church service. . . and yes, they can happen at other places, too, and often do, but the worship service of some church is geared to the possibility of its being felt and acknowledged that this can happen. . . It is a conditional environment in which we can all get together with our shared faith. It kinda reminds me of something I heard somewhere which went something like. . . "Where two or three are gathered together in my name. . ."  
Now, are you ready for the main point? Grab ahold of something because this is earth-shaking and I really mean it. . . Friend, there is no divergent difference between any two people, or between any one person and God, but what God can bridge the gap. . . Gee, I think I'll just preach on that, sometime. . .  
Now, do one thing more, please. Just look around on this page, find a church and a time for your worship and get serious. Your seriousness about the idea will determine for you if it is "personal gain" or not. . . I somehow have the feeling that God wants you about as much as you need him. . .

I think an hour and a half is long enough to sit looking at a blank sheet of paper--wondering how to begin an article. So let's forget the hundred or so adages that could apply--let's ignore journalistic techniques (we ain't got none anyway!) and get right down to the nitty-gritty soul and substance of civic pride.

This approach will cause peafowls to look at their feet, and upon observance of these scaly, black appendages, feathers will fall.

Tin Gods will become conscious of "feet of clay," and humility (the soul of democracy) will be the order of the day.

So Let's Go, Friona! Let's make Friona the prettiest, cleanest, best behaved, most progressive town in the Panhandle of Texas!

Now that's a big order isn't it? But is it impossible? Not if we all pull together! Now is a good time to remember that we will stand together or fall apart.

.....  
We obtained a major industry. What did we do to encourage its employees to live in Friona? Did we provide housing? Is the payroll spent in Friona? Ask your home town merchants. What incentives have we provided?

Let me tell you a true story. Many years ago a major highway was built on the north side of Richmond, Virginia.

Two old ladies owned a colonial mansion about a mile from this highway (US-1) and from their frontporch you could barely hear the rumble of traffic on the "new road."

They complained bitterly of this nuisance to their nephew (a newspaper friend whose writings you have read.)

He said, "Aunties, we need these Yankee tourists who spend their money in Virginia."

They replied, "Why can't they stay at home and just send their money?"

A good way to begin is to join the Chamber of Commerce.

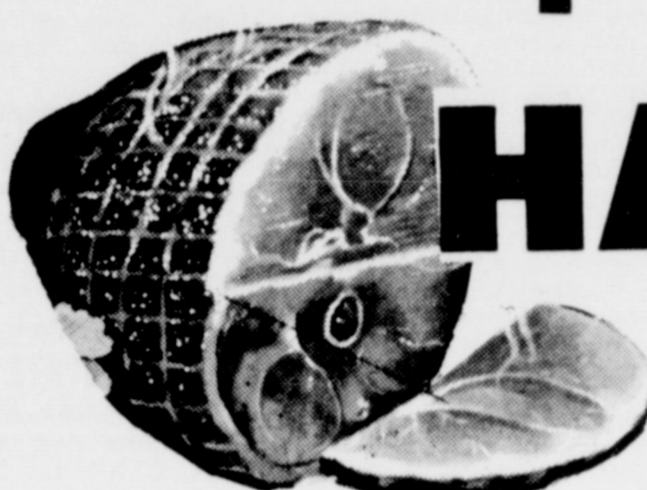

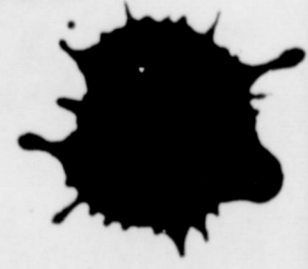

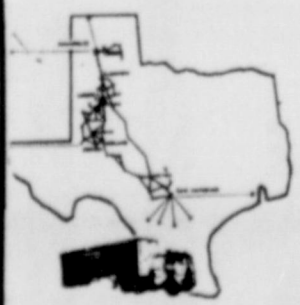

## Water District Starts New Year In Black

Ross Goodwin has reported that the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 has entered the new year operating in the black, for the first time in ten years.

Goodwin is one of the five elected Members to the Board of Directors of the Water District that governs its operations. He represents Bailey, Parmer and Castro Counties. At a recent meeting of the Directors, Goodwin was elected Vice President of the Board.

Goodwin noted that seventeen months ago the Directors employed Frank Rayner as the District's General Manager and di-

rected him to commence a program to alleviate the District's chronic and increasing indebtedness. The Manager was directed to accomplish this task in three years. However, Goodwin noted that the job was done in less than half this time, without any changes in the District's tax rate.

The District's operations are funded by a 5 cents per \$100.00 ad valorem tax on all property within the District. Taxes for the District are assessed and collected by each individual county's tax collector-assessor. In Bailey County Jean Lovelady assesses and collects taxes for the District.

Goodwin noted that the District had continued to maintain its services to the taxpayers and that the retirement of its indebtedness had been accomplished by streamlining its operations, eliminating unnecessary spending and a general "belt tightening" at the District's general office in Lubbock.

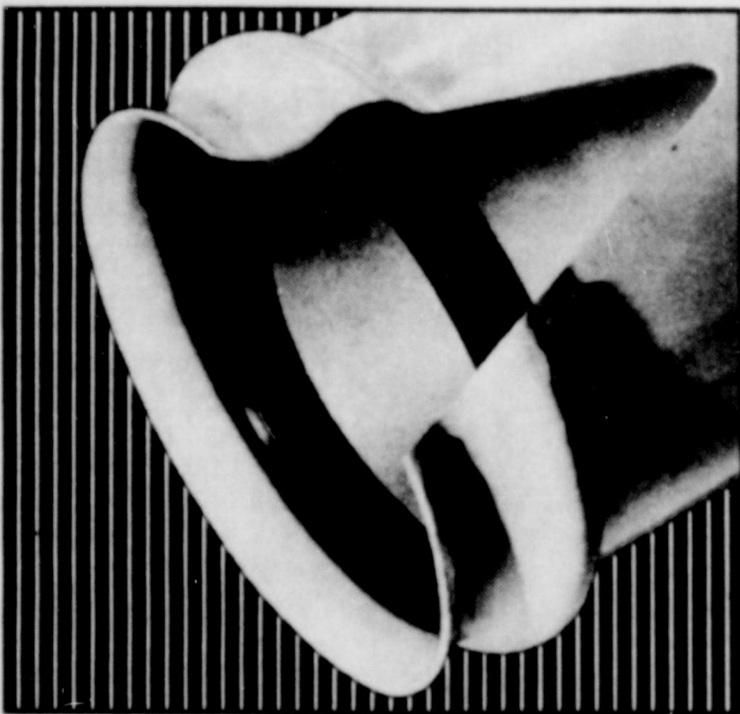
He noted that some of the economic policies the District had to adopt did not meet with the favor of some of the people affected, however, he noted, such changes were necessary if the District is to be able to continue to serve the taxpayers.

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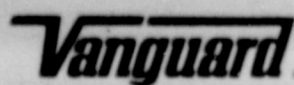

MEETINGS SLATED TO EXPLAIN WHEAT REFERENDUM

Two meetings are slated in the Panhandle for the week of February 15 to explain a wheat referendum to producers in 17 counties. These meetings are required prior to a certification by the state commissioner of agriculture for the Texas Wheat Producers Association to conduct such a referendum.

Purpose of the referendum is to raise funds with which to conduct programs of education, research, disease and insect control and marketing relating to wheat. The first meeting will be held Feb. 15 at 2 p.m. in the County Community Building in Dumas.

Another meeting is slated for February 16 at 7 p.m. in the Community Center in Hereford. This meeting will be for producers in Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Randall, Potter, Oldham and Armstrong counties.

The program at each location is designed to explain the provisions of the referendum and to give a brief report on the overall wheat industry.

Ed Garnett of Amarillo, area farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be the principal speaker at each meeting. Representatives of the Texas Wheat Producers Association will also be on hand to answer questions concerning the referendum.

I urge all wheat producers in Parmer County to attend the upcoming referendum meeting so that they will be able to make a knowledgeable choice when election time for the referendum rolls around. A two-thirds majority vote will be required.

March 1 is the deadline for farmers to file their 1970 income tax return. This date was extended from February 15 to March 1 by the 1969 income tax law.

To qualify for reporting as a farmer, two-thirds of your gross farm income must be from the sale of agricultural products. If farm income is less than two-thirds of the gross income, a taxpayer may be required to declare estimated tax and make quarterly payments.

Statutory penalties are assessed for failure to file required declarations of estimated tax.

Many taxpayers will not be required to file a return due to a new low income allowance. As an example, for 1970 returns, married persons filing a joint return would not be required to pay any tax if their incomes were less than \$2,300. However, farmers may be required to file an income tax return in order to report self employment tax if their net income exceeds \$400 for 1970.

Additional information regarding farm income tax reporting regulations can be found in the 1971 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide which is available from your county agricultural agent or the Internal Revenue Service.

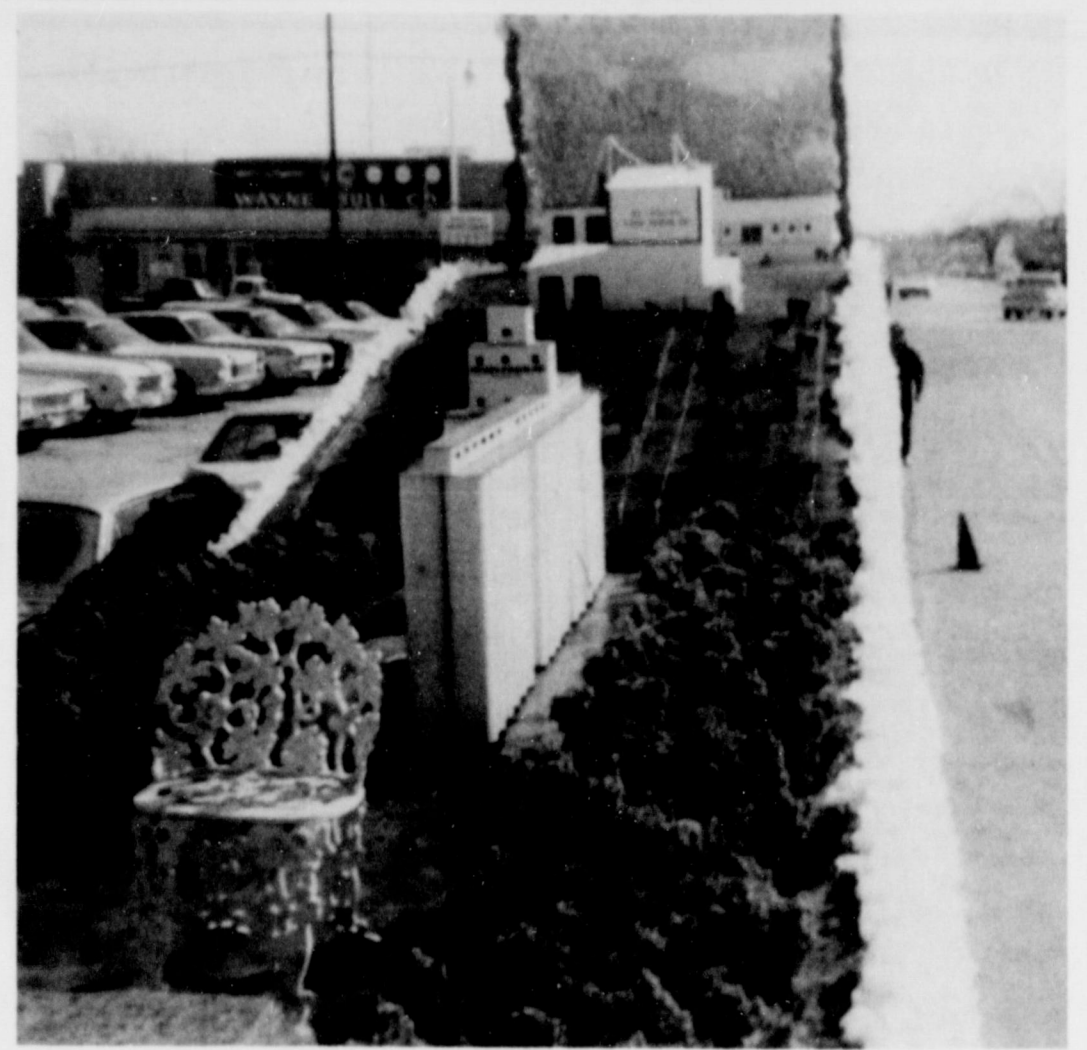

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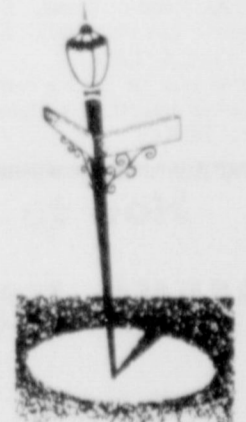
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## C-C Plans Expanded Membership Campaign

The Chamber of Commerce discussed its membership drive for 1971, and made preliminary plans to kick off the drive at its regular monthly board of directors meeting Monday.

It was brought out that the Chamber needs to pick out several new members for 1971 in order to meet the requirements of an expanded program including a full-time manager and office secretary.

The Chamber had a total of 101 paid-up members during 1970, and the directors had a list of approximately 75 additional prospects to contact for 1971.

"I believe our dues are high enough, but we need to bring in more new members," said former president Steve Messenger in regard to the budget needs.

Messenger, president Ralph Shirley and Wendell Gresham were appointed as a budget committee. An agricultural committee consisting of Ron Davenport, H.K. Kendrick and Carl Schlenker was appointed, and a municipal membership committee composed of Ray Murphree, Marc Houser and Dr. Jon M. Roden was named.

The chamber plans to kick off its 1971 membership drive within a month.

In other business, the chamber board voted to pass a resolution asking the exemption

of small towns from Senate Bill #17, which threatens to seriously hamper ambulance service to towns such as Friona.

The need for an active Retail Merchants committee of the chamber was pointed out. Such an organization functioned for several years, but has been inactive the past couple of years.

A motion was passed for the Chamber to donate \$50 to the Band Parents Assn. in appreciation for the entertainment by the high school stage band at the banquet.

It was reported that the city council had decided against using tax funds to keep the time and temperature sign at the old bank building operating, leaving the door open for the Chamber to support the cost of the sign. Chamber directors also voted to drop the matter, in light of the fact that the cost would be \$125 per month.

The board agreed to share the utility costs of their new quarters with the City of Friona, paying for their office utilities and those of the Texas Employment Commission.

Manager Billy Jones brought up the possibility of using the City Park to provide some means of diversion for young children.

Glenn E. Reeve was appointed to head a sports committee for the chamber.

## Building Activity

### Slow In January

Building activity as recorded by the City of Friona got off to a slow start during January, compared to the calendar year which ended the previous month.

Only three permits were issued, for a total of \$18,850 in construction. This is roughly one per cent of the near record total which was recorded during the calendar year 1970.

Of the total, \$18,000 was for a new residence, and two addi-

tions made up the remaining \$850.

Three hundred sixty-four second tax notices were mailed on January 13. Telephone reminder calls were made January 28, 29 and 30. A total of \$99,442.35 had been collected at the end of January, which represented 93.91 per cent of the tax roll.

Other figures released for the month of January by City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland showed that only one new water tap was made during the month, bringing the total number of active taps to 1242.

The city had received 26 calls of freeze-ups during the sub-zero weather during the first week of January. However, only four meters were damaged by breakage of the freeze plugs.

A total of 12,376,300 gallons of water were pumped during January, an average of 399,225 gallons per day and a good increase from the previous month.

Two new sewer taps were made, bringing this figure to 1207 at the end of January.

Fire Department records indicated eight alarms during the month. Two of the fires were within the city limits, for an estimated damage of \$150 and six were outside the city. The biggest loss among these was at the Bermea Brothers farm south of Hwy. for an estimated damage of \$3,000 on January 15.

Police Department records showed 29 arrests. Eleven of these were for traffic violations, and 14 involved alcohol. Ten automobile accidents were investigated, with four resultant injuries.
