The Local Chamber of Commerce probably didn't think in terms of finding over 100 people in one bunch who were not counted in Friona's census, but that's about what happened.

We discussed last week about the two areas, Friona Mobile Estates, and the Jones Addition, which were not counted in the city's totals, but were considered rural areas.

Investigation revealed that Friona Mobile Estates was annexed on May 6, 1968, and the Jones Addition, on March 9 of this year. Hence, it would have been hard for the latter addition to have been on the census map as inside the city.

After many long-distance telephone calls, private conversations, and the preparation of a map showing the two areas and their dates of annexation, it appears that there is a good chance that these totals can be switched, and added to the city figures, where they actually belong.

The Regional Director of the Census, Percy Millard of Dallas, says that although all of the information for Friona had been forwarded to the Census Bureau's national office in Jefferson, Indiana, that it seemed reasonable that the switch could be made.

The areas were clearly defined, and only one enumerator worked both of the additions involved.

In the meantime, the Chamber's "Were You Counted?" drive has come up with 15 people who for all appearances were not counted. Of these, nine live in the city and six live outside.

This week will pretty well wind up this last-minute hunt for "missing persons," and their names and forms will be forwarded to the Census Bureau.

If you have reason to think you were missed, by all means contact the Friona Chamber of Commerce, at 247-3491, in the next couple of days. Do this whether you are a resident in the city limits or not.

Walter E. Haws Dies In Missouri

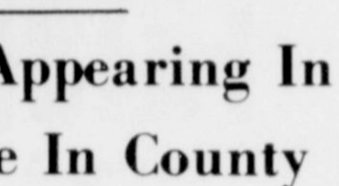
Walter Earl Haws, who was born November 12, 1934, at Friona, was dead upon arrival at McCune-Brooks Hospital, Carthage, Missouri, at 3:00 a.m. Saturday, May 16. His death was apparently from a heart attack.

Haws, who grew up here, attended local schools and was graduated from Friona High School with the class of 1953, was married to Nell Montgomery of Canyon, who survives. He was a farmer and stockman and moved from Friona to Clovis a few years ago then from Clovis to Carthage about 13 months ago. He was a member of First Baptist Church there and worked with ball teams and 4-H Clubs.

Other survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Haws, also of Carthage; four sons, William Grover, Wade Montgomery, Ward Robin and Warren Daniel, all of the home and one sister, Mrs. Ronald G. Kinsey, Vega.

Also a grandmother, Mrs. Esther Haws, and a grandfather, W.F. Cogdill, both of Friona.

Funeral services were conducted from First Baptist Church, Carthage, at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday with Rev. Merle A. Mitchell, Th. D., officiating. Burial was in Park Cemetery there.



GROWERS CAUTIONED

Greenbugs Appearing In Young Maize In County

Greenbugs have been found on small sorghum plants in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties, according to Jack King, Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board research director.

Heaviest infestation, he reports, at present is located in Deaf Smith county and some spraying has already been done. This is the earliest that greenbugs have been found on sorghum in the Plains since they first became a threat to the crop in 1968.

Ethyl parathion is the cheapest insecticide and will give good control, King says. Morris Daniel, Texas A&M entomologist, cautioned producers to be sure that they have greenbugs before starting to spray, and that control should start when greenbug population approaches 40 bugs per plant at this young stage.

A research grant of \$5,000 to supplement existing studies on greenbug control was approved at a meeting of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers board last Tuesday in Brownfield.

King said that the major objective will be the development of "practical means to determine when and how to spray for effective greenbug control."

The grant will be used by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Unit at Bushland and the work will be scattered across the 29-county area served by the board.

This is the first research grant approved by the TGSPB, which administers a checkoff fund of five cents per ton approved by growers in a referendum last fall. K.B. Parish of Springlake is president of the board.

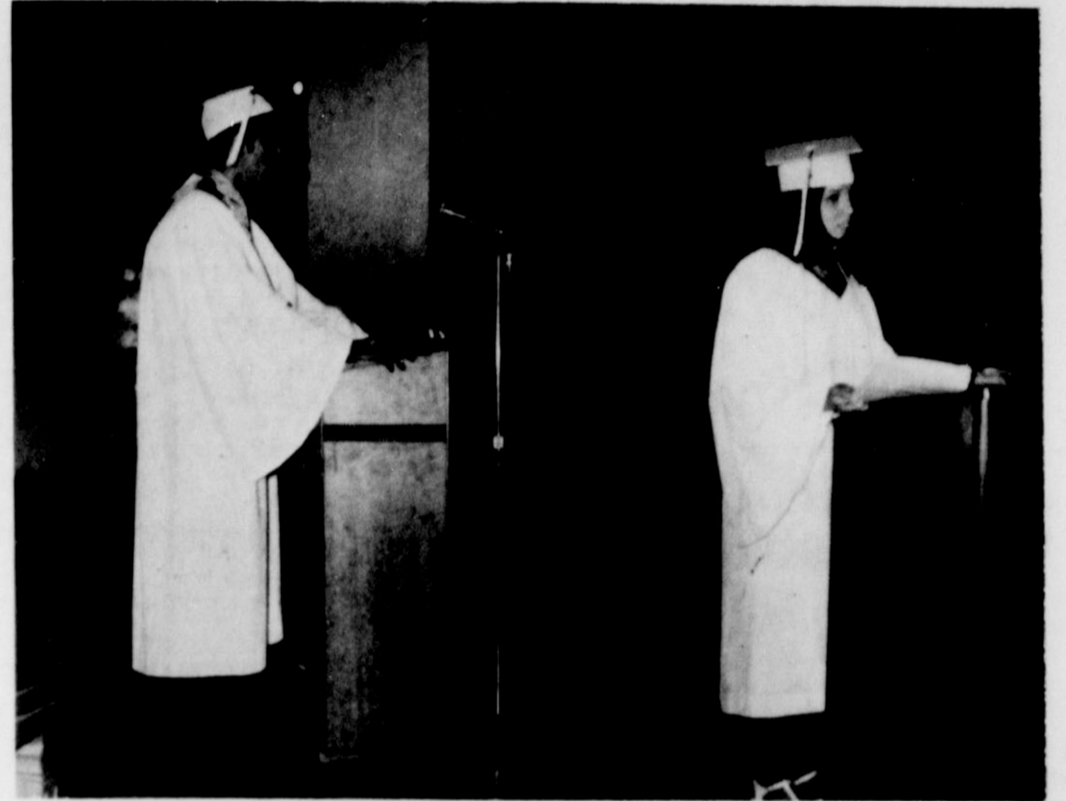

Local Program Set On Memorial Day

Friona's annual Memorial Day program will be held at 8 a.m. Saturday, May 30, in the City Park.

Rev. R.C. Hester, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church, will bring the Memorial Day message. Other participants will include Bill Gipson, minister of the Sixth Street Church of Christ; Rev. Memorial Day Origin Is Traced By Article

Memorial Day is one of the most beautiful and significant of the so-called national holidays observed in this country. It was observed originally in connection with veterans of the Civil War. Now it has grown to a day of solemn commemoration for the dead of all wars.

The origin of Decoration Day, as it was first designated, has been a subject of controversy. Several claim the honor for first decorating graves of the soldier dead.

In 1867 General John B. Murray inaugurated the practice of placing flowers on soldier graves at his home in Waterloo, New York. In the spring that year women of Columbus, Mississippi scattered flowers upon graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers. This gesture on the part of these women inspired the familiar poem: "The Blue and The Gray."

It was not until May 1868, however, that General John A. Logan, Commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, conceived the idea of setting apart the 30th day of May as a day of commemoration. As Commander-in-chief, he issued an order that this day should be marked by appropriate exercises and the decorating of graves of fallen comrades of the G.A.R. Compliance was made with the order and on June 3, 1868, General Logan, then serving as a member of Congress, introduced in the House a resolution which gave official recognition to Memorial Day.

The idea spread rapidly. Legislature after legislature enacted it into law, until Memorial Day is now a legal holiday in nearly all states.

Dear Mr. Ellis:

A few weeks ago, there was a piece in your paper asking why Friona didn't attract more people, and reminding people to "shop at home." I think it's high time that people of Friona took a long look at themselves, and with your help in the Letters to the Editor column, I will help them.

What kind of housing projects were started when Friona's largest industry, Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., had their ground breaking three years ago? NONE. MBP has an annual payroll of approximately 2.5 million, and it is leaving Friona in three directions daily.

Did you know that out of all the employees at MBP, only one in six live in Friona? Why? One reason is because of the inadequate housing, both rental, and property for sale.

The real estate that is for sale, is priced so outrageously high, that a working class of people can't afford it. Let us use a \$20,000 house that is for sale in Friona for an example. The same type house in Clovis, or Hereford, is priced from \$3,000 to \$5,000 cheaper!

A group of townspeople hired a lawyer to help them fight the government housing program that was started here. They were defeated, and the housing program was started, they still grumble and gripe. Did you also know that only three or four department foremen from MBP live in Friona? All of the company officials from Plant Superintendent up to Plant Manager, Cattle Buyers, and others live in outlying towns.

Food prices in outlying towns are from 10 to 20% cheaper than in Friona. Examples: a name brand of salad dressing that is priced from 63 to 69¢ in Friona, is everyday priced at 48 to 52¢ in Clovis and Hereford. Coffee, in the 1 lb. can in Friona is 89 to 95¢. In Clovis, it is priced at 69¢ every day. A 2 lb. box of instant COCOA Mix is priced at \$1.09 in Friona, but in Clovis and Hereford it's only 89¢.

Let it be known that not one department store in our town carries maternity clothes. Expectant mothers HAVE to shop in other towns for these items. They have no other choice!

Our local bank refused to cash a Government payroll check for a resident, simply because he didn't have an account there. After he told the cashier that he was renting from a prominent farmer and land owner, she accepted the check. Is this policy?

A lady that lives a few doors down the street from me was having trouble with a major appliance that was still under warranty. She called the local dealer, and when he found out that it had been purchased out of town, he told her that he couldn't help her, and she would have to take it back to where it was purchased. Is this policy?

I went into a local grocery store to buy some soft drinks. I was a regular customer, and was known by the owner. I had more bottles to return than I usually did and he asked me if I bought all of soft drinks in that store. I told him no, I had purchased some in Clovis not too long ago. He got angry and told me that from then on I could take my extra bottles BACK to Clovis. Needless to say, I nor some of my friends have been back in his store. Some of the merchants in this town act as if they are doing the consumer a favor by letting

them shop in their store! Is this policy?

There are MANY incidents that I can recall, but will not state them because they would be directed to individuals, as they are the only ones in that type of business in town. IE, About nine months ago, a man that had lived in Friona about a year was killed in a one-car accident about three miles west of town. For two weeks, not one word about the tragedy was printed. Not until a fellow employee called the Star and asked why nothing had been printed was there anything written. But on the other hand, a man with a 1970 auto, crashed it into the rear of another car, gets a write-up with pictures, because the car had only 25 miles on it. Is this policy?

I have met more people that are former residents of this town, than the total population to date. What a thriving little city this would have been if they had just made an effort to keep them here.

If you print my letter, you will more than likely get many letters in return from people fighting back, because this is a town that likes to fight progress. It doesn't invite people, it repels them!

For obvious reasons, please withhold my name and address. Just sign me as a man that thinks Friona is a small town, with small people, who intend to stay that way.

Your time and consideration is truly appreciated.

An important feature of this plan is the training in budgeting money and learning to put first things first.

This is not a Government or Federal gimmick, it is our chance to help our students.

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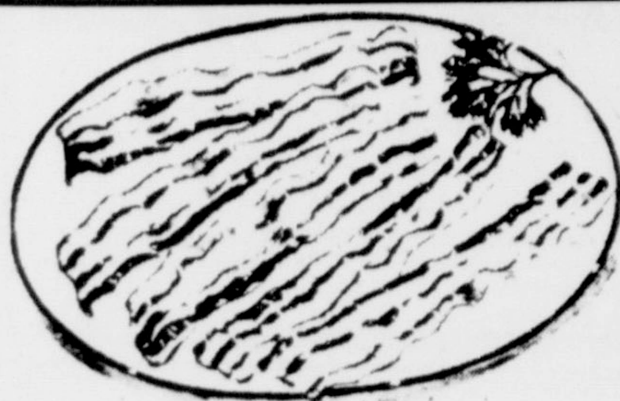

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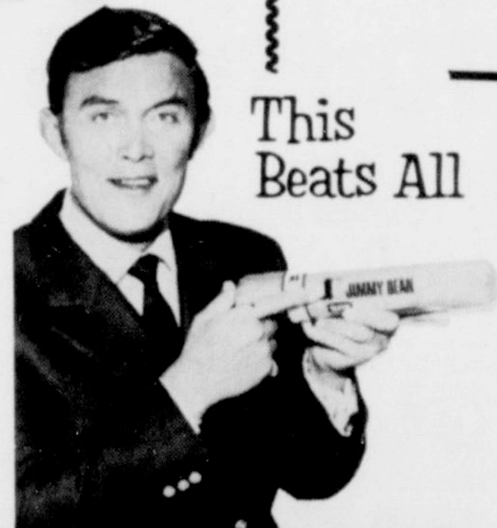

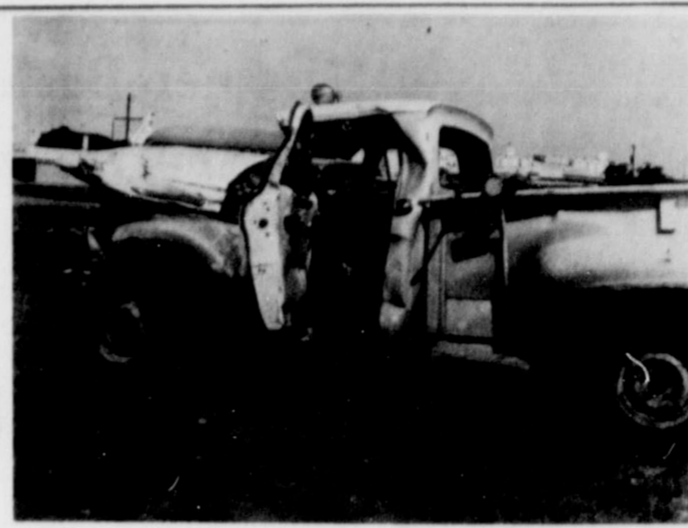

Mrs. Graham's Father Dies

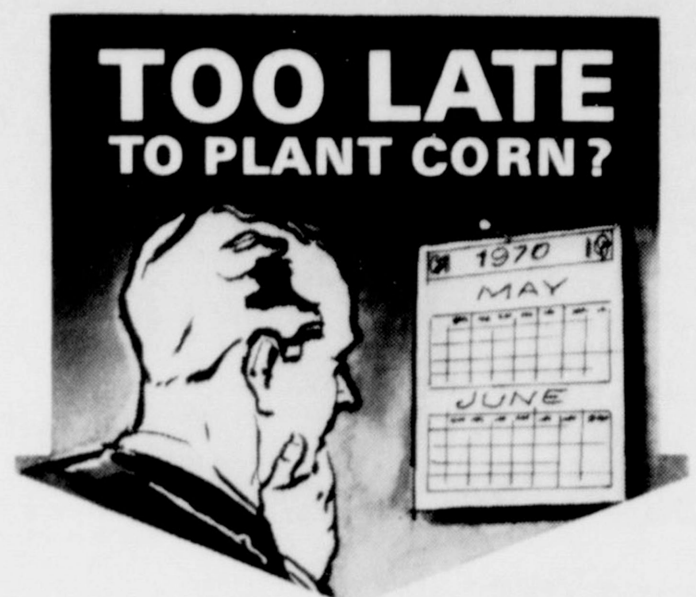
