DECLINE IN DAILY CRUDE PRODUCTION IS 14,450 BARRELS

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States decreased 14,450 barrels for the week ending November 17 totalling 2,224,300 barrels, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The daily average production east of the Rocky mountains was 1,428,300 barrels, a decrease of 11,900. California production was 766,000 barrels, an increase of 2,500. Oklahoma showed a daily average production of 337,800 barrels, an increase of 600 barrels; Kansas, 70,000, decrease 400; north Texas, 66,000, increase 200; central Texas, 292,800, decrease 21,500; north Louisiana, 151,150, increase 1,150; Arkansas, 122,450, decrease 1,000; Louisiana, 154,950, increase 2,750. Daily average imports of petroleum at principal ports were 232,429 barrels compared with 271,429 for the previous week. There were no changes reported in crude oil prices for the major districts, midcontinent being quoted from 45 cents to \$1.25 a barrel, according to the gravity of the oil; Pennsylvania crude, Bradford district, \$2.40 and all other grades \$2.55 and gulf coast \$1 a barrel. The schedule on California prices ranged from 65 cents a barrel on 14 gravity oil to 75 cents for gravity 35 and over.

ROAD BOND ELECTION IN YOUNG DECEMBER 29

GRAHAM, Texas, Nov. 22.—Paving on the Graham public square, which is the largest in the state, is progressing nicely despite continued rains. The north side has been thrown open for traffic, while excavation is well under way at the south. The type of paving being used on the streets of Graham is concrete base, with vitrified brick topping set in asphalt. Paving will be extended to the principal streets of the city under the present contract. A road bond election has been ordered for December 29, and it is confidently believed that the proposition will go over with a big majority. One of the matters to be taken care of at this bond issue will be the "F. F. F." highway, a seven per cent federal road on which the highway department will put up two-thirds of the cost of construction and then assume maintenance of the road. Other leading roads of secondary importance will also be constructed.

Ideals, Policies and Difficulties Of Pioneer Texas Journalism Revealed By Files at University

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 21.—There are in the files of the state library, papers which reprinted extracts from the Republic, and these are principally military reports. One records that an election of trustees for a "seminary of learning" had been called and another called attention to the building of a grist and saw mill. In 1822, a venturesome American, who signed himself Aldridge, established a press at San Antonio and on April 9, 1822, announced his intention of publishing the Texas Courier, according to information obtained from historical records in the state library. His prospectus was addressed in flamboyant style to the "Advocates of Light and Reason, and deplored 'the vicious policy of Spain which for 200 years has consigned to the world the rich beneficent province of Texas, neglected education, stifled the arts, and discouraged every industry.' The records do not show how long this paper was published and no copies of it are preserved.

FRENCH ATTITUDE IS "HALF LOAF IS BETTER THAN NONE"

PARIS, Nov. 21. (AP)—The attitude of Paris newspapers toward the notes which the council of ambassadors has sent to Germany may be summed up in the old adage: "Half a loaf is better than none."

The papers agree that the notes were only feeble propositions and also that they point out that the allies preserved a united front. The first communication notifies Germany that the inter-allied control commission will resume its functions in Germany and serves notice that "should these operations meet with objections from the German authorities or German nationals, the allied governments intend to take measures which may seem to them proper and assure execution of the treaty."

The second note informs Germany that the allies will hold the reich responsible for the "consequences which may result from the fact that it allows the former crown prince to remain in Germany."

The allies take cognizance of a document executed by Frederick William on December 1, 1918, in which he formally renounces all claim to the throne and add that in communicating this renunciation to France, Germany had put herself on record as not admitting its possible reconsideration.

AGREEMENT HEARTILY WELCOMED IN LONDON

LONDON, Nov. 21. (AP)—The agreement by which London and Paris present a solid front to Germany is heartily welcomed here and not the least by the politicians who are glad to be freed, even if the relief should prove to be only temporary, from menacing trouble while the domestic electoral fight is in progress.

Some quarters credit Premier Poincaré with having taken a more complacent attitude because of a desire not to embarrass Prime Minister Baldwin during the election campaign.

INSANE MAN BEATS AND KICKS WIFE TO DEATH

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 21. (AP)—Ernest Fontaine of Warrenton was arrested at that town early today charged with beating and kicking his wife to death in the street in front of their home. It was believed that he had gone suddenly insane. Mrs. Fontaine and her husband had quarreled last evening. Four small children of the couple were in the house at the time of the killing.

Daughters Give Three Cheers for Woodrow Wilson

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. (AP)—The convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy will tribute yesterday to Woodrow Wilson. During the roll call of states some delegates from the far end of the convention room broke the routine of the roll call with the cry "three cheers for Woodrow Wilson." The cheers were given long and loud, every delegate and page rising to her feet, their voluminous cheers echoing and reaching through the large room. The old rebel yell started by a group at one side of the room was heard above every other sound.

Upon completion of the roll call of states announcement was made by Mrs. Howell Smith, chairman of the entertainment committee, that although an invitation to Mr. Wilson to be present at one of the meetings had been declined because of the condition of his health, an attempt was now being made to obtain permission for the daughters to attend in a body a pilgrimage to his residence tomorrow afternoon at which time the organization was scheduled for a night session. Following this announcement the membership, again rose to their feet and cheered lustily.

NATIONAL GRANGE FIGHTS DAYLIGHT SAVING PLAN

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 21. (AP)—The fight of the National Grange against daylight saving is to be carried into New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and New England through an organization of state masters perfected at a session of the grange here today. Allen H. Cook of Niantic, Conn., was chosen leader.

The movement is to be directed against existing laws for daylight saving and to fight state plans for the enactment of similar legislation. It also in cooperation with the national grange is to set on foot a campaign for the passage of a new "standard time law" so worded that it will be a federal statute with which the individual states can not interfere.

At the executive session last night the grange adopted a number of resolutions which were made public this morning as follows: Urging the enactment of a "truth in fabrics" act and asking legislation to prevent untruthful labeling and advertising of fertilizer, seeds and insecticides; asking the extension of the postal savings law to small communities and further legislation for the protection of natural resources, especially forests. Resolutions opposing the revival of free distribution of seeds and any weakening of the national prohibition law also were adopted.

FIND MOTHER AND HER BABY DAUGHTER IN POOL OF BLOOD

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 21. (AP)—In a pool of blood with several cuts on the throat and everything about indicating a severe struggle the body of Mrs. Agnes Mudd was found by her husband, a mechanic who returned to his home seven miles from Savannah, last night.

Beside the body of the mother he found the body of her baby daughter, who had been struck dead by a blow from a hatchet.

Woodrow Wilson May Take Part In 1924 Campaign

NEW YORK, Nov. 21. (AP)—Active participation of Woodrow Wilson in the next presidential campaign, Brooklyn Democrats believe, is fore-shadowed by a letter which the former president sent the secretary of the regular Democratic club, 17th and 5th ave. district, Kings county, acknowledging resolutions commending him for the principles enunciated in his Armistice Day radio address.

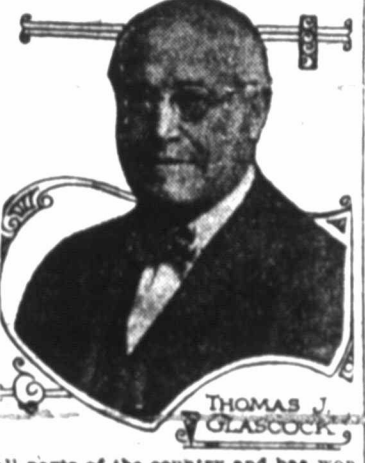

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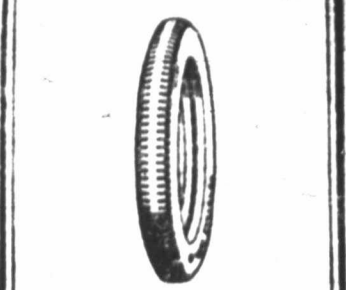

I am willing to trade any player on the New York club except Frisch, Young and Jackson, the manager recently credited to John McGraw when he asked about his plans for next season.

John McGraw has always been charged with buying his pennants instead of developing his men. In a sense that is an incorrect statement as the manager of the Giants has given many a youngster a start to the game.

The 1924 combination, as well as the 1923 championship aggregation, were developed by the McGraw process. Such souths as Matheson, Marquard, Merkle, Doyle, Herzog, Fletcher, Schaefer, Devlin, Meyers, Trahan and others were brought in from the minors by McGraw and developed into big league stars.

Of recent years, however, the competition has been so keen that McGraw has been unable to wait for the development of youths.

New York Wants Winner.

In his own words McGraw will pay for a winner. Thus he did not waste dollars in bidding to the sky for Phil Tougeles, Henrie Zimmerman, Benny Kauff, Emil Meissel, Fred Tony Heinle, Grob Dave Hancock, Art Nash, Hugh McQuillan, and others.

McGraw's team, after winning three pennants and two world series, was stopped in its attempt to win a third world title by the signing of four pennants in a row by a decided exception in the market. McGraw, in the meantime, turning the trick, has evidently decided to rebuild his club.

It is an interesting fact that the three players McGraw has developed in a trade are men McGraw has developed. Frisch came direct from Fordham College, while Young and Jackson were picked up in the minors.

Already McGraw has cut loose with the bottom ups, team captain, Stengel and Cunningham.

Last year Travis Jackson, because of his great work in filling Dinwiddie's place in the first year, won much praise. Frankie Frisch was always in the headlines. One doesn't hear nearly so much about Ross Young, yet to my way of thinking he is one of the greatest outfielders the game has ever produced.

In going over the list of individual stars in the league the names of Hornsby, Cubans, Louque, Grover, Alexander, Eddie Roush, Zack Wheat, Cyrus Williams, Harleigh Grimes, Max Carey and Digbee are listed in the prize list.

Ross Young Real Star.

Yet here is Ross Young, whom close followers of the parent organization insist is without a single weakness.

In batting, fielding, running and throwing Young ranks with the best. His name does not shine as brilliantly as many rivals. All because Young plays the game as it is written, does not argue with umpires, and is on deck day after day. He has never been fined or suspended by McGraw.

Young is another product of the Lone Star state. He was born at Shiner, Texas, April 18, 1897. Starting his professional career in the Texas circuit he was recommended to McGraw when he batted .323 with Sherman in the West Texas League in 1917. 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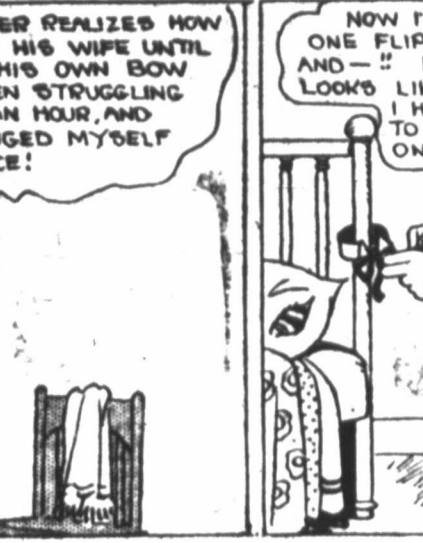
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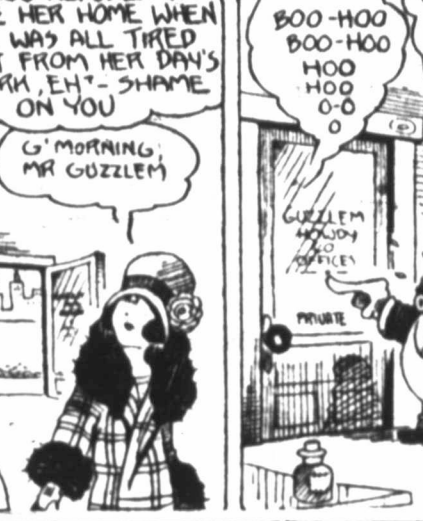

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Bronzed By Tropical Sunshine; J. G. Culbertson Returns From 15-Month Exploration Trip In South America

Home from a 15-month sojourn in South America, which culminated in a 4,500-mile exploration trip on which he visited territory hitherto unknown to white men, J. G. Culbertson of the Wichita Motors Company returned to Wichita Falls this week. Bronzed by tropical sunshine, and somewhat less stout than when he left here, Mr. Culbertson reported having had the time of his life.

Mr. Culbertson went to South America on business for the motor company, which sells more trucks in the southern continent than any other manufacturer. His business concluded, he decided to take a trip across the continent, exploring the upper reaches of the Amazon, then crossing the Andes by mule-back and returning to civilization on the western coast of Peru.

The upper reaches of the Tamba river, a Peruvian tributary of the Amazon, are in the wilds of Peru, a territory where Mr. Culbertson was the first white man ever to penetrate. Much of the remainder of the 4,500-mile journey was through country where the white man is so seldom seen as to be a curiosity.

The hazard of the trip was increased for Mr. Culbertson by reason of the immense "wealth" which he carried; that is, wealth as measured by the native of the Peruvian wilderness. An empty cartridge shell was valued as a national debt, a discarded safety razor blade was the equivalent of a small ransom; a blanket equalled a national debt. The loyalty of his native guides, his equipment for defending himself—these, plus the high standards of morality of the natives, kept him from harm, though there were probably occasions when Wichita Falls, Texas, seemed ever further away than the moon.

Three Weeks on Amazon

"We left Para, at the mouth of the Amazon, on May 23," Mr. Culbertson says. "The 1,800-mile steamer trip up the river to Iquitos, Peru, took about three weeks. We were in a large, comfortable vessel, which makes regular scheduled trips up the Amazon. Americans generally seem to have the wrong impression about the Amazon, thinking of it as an unhealthy tropical stream, which it isn't. Also, the average American hasn't anything like an adequate idea about the immensity of the Amazon. It and its tributaries drain a territory that is just about equal in size to the United States, exclusive of Alaska. It has tributaries of which you almost never hear, that outrank in size our largest American streams. The Ucayali, for instance, which flows into the Amazon 2,800 miles from its mouth, is 1,000 ft. in length and is as large a river as the Mississippi.

"At Iquitos, which is the head of regular Amazon navigation, we took a wood-burning steam launch for the next leg of the journey. There is traffic above Iquitos, but it is irregular. We traveled probably 1,500 miles by launch, passing through country inhabited almost solely by Indian tribes such as the Conibas, Cachimbo and the Amahuaca. These Indians wear no clothing whatever, and of course are quite primitive in their mode of living. They came down to the banks to see us, and viewed a white man apparently with much curiosity. It wasn't considered safe to land or to have much dealings with them, as they don't acknowledge any white rulers and have a bad reputation among the whites.

"Cases traveled on river."

"The launch took us to the mouth of the Urbamba, which we explored in canoes for a short distance, then proceeded up the Tamba river. This stream is similar to the Hudson

tigers, some tapirs, many wild hogs and thousands of monkeys.

"Much of our travel at this stage was through hardwood forests, with a fortune in mahogany for anybody who could find means of transporting it. There is much mahogany shipped from the upper reaches of the Amazon, but much more is too far from the water courses to be available.

"Carrying our own baggage, and going afoot, we made our way through the forest and late in July reached Concepcion, 10,000 feet above sea level, in the Andes. There I obtained mules for the remainder of the trip, paid off my guides with old clothing, needles and fish hooks and started on the last part of the trip across the mountains, reaching Lima on August 16. On the mountain trip we were 10,000 to 12,000 feet above sea level for much of the journey; there are no roads, but well defined trails that mules can easily negotiate.

Mr. Culbertson did not lack for reminders of his home town while in South America. There is a steady demand for a valuable commodity and in various parts of the continent Mr. Culbertson saw children clad in Belle of Wichita flannel jumpers; it was nothing unusual on the Amazon, to pass a small boat whose crew were dressed in American and on American-made goods, Mr. Culbertson found.

"Much of the distrust that was due to the difference in business methods is disappearing," Mr. Culbertson said. "However, Americans who have much success in business have learned to do business the way South Americans do, and they get along better. There is a steady demand for nearly all American manufactured articles. The use of the automobile is increasing, but is limited by the fact that there are almost no highways at all. Much building is going on, including some railroad highway buildings. There is considerable anti-American sentiment in the Argentine, Chile, Peru and Bolivia. American sentiment is pronounced for political reasons. Owing to the exchange rates, much trade that the United States might have gone to Spain and Italy and Great Britain, but American trade is rapidly increasing."

Mr. Culbertson will leave shortly for New York City, after a visit with his brother, J. W. Culbertson.
