A HIGHER TARIFF ON WHEAT.

President Coolidge is said to be preparing to recommend an increase in the tariff on wheat as a means of bringing better prices to western farmers. The Houston Post declares there ought to be no objection to a higher duty on wheat for the reason that such a duty will serve to show what an un-

blushing fraud the protective tariff is. But the trouble with permitting higher tariff on anything is that tariff making is largely a matter of swap and trade between interested industries. In such a trade the farmer is likely to swap, for a worthless thing in return, a tariff on some commodity that he must buy and which will add to the cost he must

A tariff for the farmer is largely a confidence game in which the farmer is the sucker.

Discussing the effects of the tariff on wheat aleady in effect the Post says:

"The emergency tariff enacted last year was boasted as a measure of great benefit to the wheat grower, but his crop came along and wheat declined in price until it was well below the post of production. the tariff to the contrary notwithstanding.


