THE CHRISTMAS STOCKING.

There are between 800 and 1,000 children in Wichita Falls who are not only ragged and poor but who, except for the kindness of charitable organizations, will not have one single penny's worth of "Christmas" this year. This does not include the other 1,000 who are just poor, without being actually toes-on-the-street.

The budget money does not provide this. If every dollar of the whole \$40,000 of the budget money were to be invested in the 2,000 poor children of Wichita Falls alone, through the Salvation Army, it would not buy a whole single season's outfit around -shoes and clothing and overcoats for the winter.

But the Salvation Army, which is the special organization to look out, as best they can with a cent or two each on every \$5 worth of grievous need, for the poor, and the children at Christmas, receives something less than one-fifth of the budget money, and has its organization to pay for as well as an additional thousand or so grown-ups beside the children. That makes the prospect nice for the children at Christmas.

For this reason, because the Christmas kettle dimes furnish the sole fund that may be used by the Army to provide Christmas-which is nothing more than a decent dinner in the main-The Times instituted the Christmas Stocking fund. With this extra fund, added to the kettle contribution, the regular Christmas dinners for the poor and the Childrens' Christmas tree, with fruit and a single toy apiece for the 800 or more children who will attend it, will be provided for. Without it, one or the other will have to go begging.

When you gave to the budget, you gave to provide the lowest minimum of relief and maintenance for the local social service organizations. It wasn't your figures-it was the Welfare Committee's calculation—but if the figures had been any larger the budget wouldn't have been raised.

This explanation is just to keep the record straight on the budget money and the possible Christmas

Aside from all those sordid figures, here is our immediate proposition: Help us right now to provide a little shred of the beautiful tapestry of Christmas happiness for the 800 little ragged, poor, hungry-most of the time children that the Army will have at its tree for the night before Christmas. The \$600 we are trying to raise will assure this, added to the kettle money: Christmas dinners for 250 of the poor-(worth somewhere between ten and twenty-five cents) for each of the 800 children. People rush their eating, gulp their meals. They may move deliberately, but in the main they are ever on the lookout for shortcuts of methods and mechanism that will hurry their work. They even rush their entertainment-start leaving the theater before the final curtain, as if getting to the exit ahead of their neighbors were a life-and-death mat-

All this worried rush, of course, is an indication of diseased nerves rather than impulsive industriousness or desire to accomplish.

Occasionally we are reminded, by a catastrophe like the Twentieth Century wreck or an auto crash, that speed has its price. The real and greater price is shattered nerves and existence made unneces sarily wretched and disagreeable by hurry without motive.
