TUSKEGEE, Als., Jan. 1.—R. R. lotos, principal of the Tuskages formal and Industrial Institute. which was founded by Booker T. Washington for the training of ne-gro young men and young women, has given out the following state-

The following concerning lynch-

ings for the last year is compiled by Tuskegee Institute in the de-partment of records and research. Monroe N. Work in charge: I find that there were 28 persons lynched in 1923. This is 29 less than the number, 57, for the year 1922. Thirteen of the persons lynched were taken from the hands of the law, seven from jails and six from officers of the law outside of jails. We also find that there were 46 instances in which officers of the law prevented lynchings. Four women, three white and one colered, were among those thus saved six of these preventions of lynchings were removed or the guards augmented or other precautions taken. In the nine other instances armed force was used to repel the would-be lynchers. In eight instances during the year persons charged with being connected with lynching mobs were brought to

1923, 26 were negroes and two were whites; two of the 'ormer were women. Seven, or one-fourth of those put to death, were charged with rape or attempted rape; one of the victims was burned to death, one was put to death and then the was burned. The charge agent at the one burned to death was marker.

The offenses charged against the whites were participation in strike depredations 1, being taken as a negro 1. 


