Residents Irked At Calley Trial

Local opinion this week in Friona was running high over the conviction and sentencing of Lt. William Calley, Jr. who has been sentenced to life imprisonment for the premeditated murder of civilians at My Lai.

Several groups and individuals sent letters to congressmen and to President Nixon last week following the jury decision. A petition in the form of a telegram to the president was drafted by local attorney Richard Collard and received 200 names before being sent off.

In a man-on-the-street type interview local citizens had this to say about the events of last week:

Ralph Shirley: "The jury just made the wrong decision."

Dan Ethridge: "The court's decision was unfair and I think Calley will eventually be released."

Gib Boatman: "It was foolish for this to have ever come to trial in the first place."

Ralph Roden: "The silent majority has finally spoken up. Lt. Calley should be restored to full military status and pay."

Ralph Taylor: "These things have to happen in war. If there was military censorship on the press this thing wouldn't be in the mess it's in now."

Frank Trullitt: "I don't think he should be made a hero, but it is wrong to place the blame for an entire system on one individual."

Mayor R.L. Fleming: "Life means nothing to those people; they have been in wars all their lives. The women and children Calley shot were setting land mines and booby traps and he was told to clean them out. He should not be prosecuted for carrying out an order. This buck-passing is typical of the military."

Mrs. Glenn Reeve, Sr.: "I don't agree with all this killing. Our boys just shouldn't even be over there. They'll be court martialed if they carry out orders to kill, and court martialed if they don't carry out their orders."

City Manager Jake Outland: "We are playing right in the hands of the communists who want to take over this country. It is a communistic tactic to divide the people and stir up feelings over cases such as this."

Vietnam war veteran Tom Shelton: "From the time I entered boot training until I was sent overseas I was being taught to kill. Convicting Lt. Calley is utterly ridiculous. When you are in Vietnam you don't know who the enemy is. Some buddies of mine were killed by a five-year-old kid. The women who work for us as maids or in the PX by day will get a gun and try to shoot you at night. In combat, each situation is completely different. You can't fight by any set pattern. We are trying to cram our Western Civilization down the throat of

these people. They just want to be left alone. They hate all outsider intervention including the U.S. and the Chinese."

Mrs. Sam Williams: "This is a commie scheme all the way. It's an injustice to teach these boys to fight and then not stand behind them. The minute our boys decide they've had enough of such injustice and lay down their arms and refuse to fight then the communists are ready to take over. Richard Hammer, who wrote the book 'One Morning in My Lai' and caused all this furor should be tried and convicted of treason for his criticism of the military."

Vietnam war veteran Duane Reed: "As soon as they prosecute everyone who has ever dropped a bomb then they can convict Calley."

Santa Fe Agent J.C. Beck: "Statements made by this man since the trial prove that he is mentally unbalanced. He was found guilty in a military court on a military matter by a group of professionals who could have been in the same situation. A person who would kill unarmed women and children is a mad dog killer and should be incarcerated."

Haywood Vaughn: "I served in Korea when the enemy sent 10 year old kids into our troops with live bombs in their hands. Calley was justified in killing them all as he was sent to do. His conviction is a matter of political pull."

Court Will Discuss Ambulance Situation

Next Monday, April 12, is the date the county commissioners are to vote on participating in the continuance of an ambulance service for the county.

That day is also the day that Claborn Ambulance's lease is up on their ambulance, and they have indicated a need for a decision on the question.

This week, the Friona city council officially went on record as willing to subsidize the ambulance service \$200 per month if the remainder of the \$720 can be pledged.

Bovina mayor Charles Flynn indicated he thought his city council would approve a "per capita" participation. The city of Farwell apparently will not participate, as it has recently purchased an ambulance of its own.

By winning first place in six events, second place in five events and third place in six events, local high school students won the sweepstakes trophy in University Interscholastic League contests at Dimmitt Saturday.

Local students amassed a total of 154 points to win the trophy.

Students and events, which won firsts were: Sheila Struve, and Diane Rodgers, girls debate; Bryan Elliott and John Bingham, boys debate; Sally Kendrick, girls persuasive speaking; Troy White, boys poetry interpretation; Steve Stone, boys prose reading; and Beverly Bailey, spelling and plain writing.

Those placing second and their events were Davey Hill, boys persuasive speaking; Vicki Beck, girls informative speaking; Carolyn Martin, spelling; and plain writing; Larry Johnston, slide rule and Larry Johnston, ready writing.

Third place winners and events were Carl Evans, boys informative speaking; Trip Horton, boys oral reading; Ann Hurst, girls prose reading; Gayla Self, girls oral reading; Carolyn Gore, spelling and plain writing; and Holley Stephenson, science.

Those qualifying for regional competition are Sheila Struve, and Diane Rodgers; Bryan Elliott and John Bingham; Sally Kendrick, Troy White, Steve Stone, Beverly Bailey, Carolyn Martin and Larry Johnston, who will be competing in two events.

Davey Hill, Vicki Beck, Carolyn Gore and Holley Stephenson qualified for alternates.

Spelling and plain writing was the only event which Friona students won first, second and third place. Regional competition will be held in Lubbock April 24.

Close Vote Decides City Council Spots

Friona voters elected four members to the Friona City Council and two to the Friona School Board in the annual combined city and school election last Saturday.

In a light turnout of voters, the third and fourth spots on the city council race were decided by a difference of only three votes.

Gary Brown, unopposed for the one-year unexpired term on the city council, was elected with 156 votes.

For the regular two-year terms, Dr. Robert Alexander led the voting with 153 votes. Troy Young had 114 votes, and Nelson Lewis 113, to also be elected. Barely missing the spot on the council was Walter Cunningham, the fourth candidate, with 111 votes. Glenn E. Reeve, Jr. received two write-in votes.

A total of 170 votes were cast in the city election.

The four winning candidates join mayor R.L. Fleming and councilman Bill Ellis on the city council. Members going off the board were Leland Hutson, James Procter and Marion Fite.

In the school board race, David Grimsley, with 183 votes, and Leroy Johnson, with 179, were elected to the board. The third candidate, Joe Fallwell, received 43 votes. J.L. Shafer, unopposed, was elected to the at-large spot on the county school board with 153 votes.

A total of 210 votes were cast in the school election.

Holdover members of the school board are John Blackburn, Steve Messenger, Floyd Schueler, Richard Collard and W.D. Buske.

Those going off the board are Dr. Paul Spring and Louis Welch.

Council Installs New Members Monday

Four new members of the Friona City Council were sworn in to highlight the monthly meeting of the council Monday night.

Gary Brown, Dr. Robert Alexander, Troy Young and Nelson Lewis were sworn in as council members by Mayor R.L. Fleming. Earlier in the meeting, the results of last Saturday's election had been certified.

In other business, the council officially went on record pledging \$200 per month to Claborn Ambulance Service, provided that other cities and/or Farmer County will likewise contribute in order to insure continued ambulance service locally.

Claborn had told the council that he was losing \$720 per month on the service, and wished to discontinue it. However, he has agreed to continue the service if county governments come up with a subsidy arrangement.

Other action by the council included the proclaiming of the week of April 19-24 as "Spring Clean-Up Week," and the appointment of alderman Bill Ellis as mayor pro-tem. Ellis replaces James Procter in that office. Procter was one of the three councilmen who went off the council after Monday night.

In miscellaneous business, a request was heard to locate a trailer house adjacent to a local dwelling. However, after Mayor Fleming explained the city's policy against such sitings, the request was withdrawn.

City Manager Jake Outland discussed the council-manager type of city government for the benefit of the new council members.

Outland explained that the scheduled annexation of the Carson Addition to the city had been delayed for the current month.

If you haven't driven down by the new Little League baseball park, which is under construction at Third and Prospect, you're going to be in for a pleasant surprise.

The Friona Noon Lions, who are ram-rodding the project, are putting in a baseball field that will be second to none. The park is to be used primarily by the Senior Little League, which begins play next month.

Members of both of the city's Lions clubs, along with other individuals, have donated time, equipment and materials to assist the project. The city of Friona donated water for the grass, which apparently will have a full, lush cover.

Some \$6,000 to \$7,500 will be spent by the Lions by the time the park is finished. And, much of the expenses were trimmed by suppliers to assist in the park's construction.

Thus, if you considered all of the volunteer labor which has gone into the construction of the park, you could say that the city will have a new \$15,000 baseball park for use this summer, and you'd probably be conservative if anything.

It will be a facility of which to be proud, and our hat is off to the Friona Noon Lions for pushing the project toward completion.

Apparently, business in Friona during the last quarter of 1970 was pretty good. If the city sales tax return is any indication, over \$10,000 was sent to Austin by city merchants, and this represented over \$1,000,000 in sales during the three-month period.

You're aware of the fact that many purchases, such as food and other necessities, are not included in the totals. Also, a few businesses on the outside of the city limits do not have their totals included in the return.

Thus, the million-dollar figure would be revised upward considerably to get the actual dollar figure for sales in Friona. Our totals compared to a sales tax return of \$15,000 in Dimmitt, and \$51,000 in Hereford.

Friona's totals compare very favorably, since our population comparison with the two cities mentioned approximates the sales tax percentage.

From time to time we always make a plug for shopping at home, and supporting the local merchants. Apparently this problem of shoppers occasionally going out of town for some of the things they need is not a new one.

Recently we told of an official Rockwell Bros. Lumber Company in Llano finding a jar sealed in the cornerpost of the building there, containing several items from the year 1925—some 46 years ago.

One of the things found was a company newsletter, "The Builder," and one of its items went as follows:

"Suppose we sent to Canada for our wheat, to New York City to borrow money, to Kansas City for our groceries and to Chicago for our clothing. How would our local farmers, bankers, grocers and clothiers feel toward us? The fair thing to do is to buy from our local merchants. Their taxes support this community."

Another 1925-type humor story: First wife—"My husband really got mad at me this morning." Second wife—"For what reason?" First wife—"I poured him a bowl of Lux instead of corn flakes." Second wife—"And he was really mad, huh?" First wife—"Why, he was so mad, the last time I saw him he was foaming at the mouth."

"How many men work down at your factory?" "Oh, about one out of every ten."

Pause and Reflect

There has been so much said and written about the Lt. William Calley, Jr. affair that any comment from this corner would be superfluous if not absolutely true.

Amid all the discussion one particular feature has not been mentioned and it may well be the only real benefit to be derived from the entire case.

We refer to the Voice of "We the People" when and if it is broadcast in the right direction.

The Silent Majority has learned that it can be heard, and if the ordeal of Lt. Calley serves no other purpose than demonstrating this fact to his fellow Americans then he will not have suffered in vain.

The power of the press, the sheer force of public opinion must never again be ignored nor taken for granted by the general public.

We had a good example of what an aroused populace can do in our letters to Hanol a few weeks ago.

Perhaps this experience and the Calley trial will establish a practice that is part and parcel of true Democracy.

There is not a single phase of our government that can fail to be influenced by an avalanche of letters, telegrams and phone calls from the constituents.

We have seen in recent years how the loud-mouthed rebels captured the headlines to advance their cause; perhaps now is the time to follow suit and demand a more just system of income tax and a greater voice in how the tax money is to be spent.

Would it not work also in the area of Health, Education and Welfare?

What about too lenient judges and parole boards that say, "go your way to sin again and again."

How many other problems can you think of that We the People might help solve?

I have told this story before but I'll tell it again because it is so timely:--

At the end of the series of meetings during which our Constitution was formed a lady met Mr. Ben Franklin on the street and asked, "Mr. Franklin what have you done?" He replied, "We have given you a Democracy--if you can hold onto it!"

We have been through a period of revival in the workings of that system.

May we never again need so strongly a reminder as that furnished by Lt. Calley.

President of the World Bank Robert S. McNamara said, "The poor in America are like the poor everywhere. Statistically their economic condition is improving, but the progress is so slow in relation to the more advantaged groups in society that they are actually growing poorer relative to the rich. The point is illustrative of a phenomenon common throughout the world. Though men have inhabited the same planet for more than a million years, they coexist today in communities that range in the extremes from Stone Age simplicity to Space Age sophistication."

I heard a story that I think would be well to relate to you at this time.

Harry Emerson Fosdick, a well known, popular minister of this age, had an island he visited and this was reported to have happened to him.

He stood on the shore one day allowing the gentle ocean waves lap over his barefeet and gazing out across the waters, retorted, "I have not seen the Ganges River of India nor the Angle Falls of Venezuela, I have not dipped in the Mediterranean Sea nor the English Channel, yet I can feel their wave-beats on my feet."

The story then sought to relate that our knowledge of God does not have to come in a physical expression (yet in some instances I think it does through other people, but back to my idea) Fosdick said, "I don't know God afar off, but I can feel his washover my feet."

This is God's revelation of care and concern for you and me. . . that he cared enough that he gave his only son--now that really took some doing--but that's the way he is and the sooner we become acquainted with that reality for our life, then, Easter will take on the proper significance that it should maintain.

We need not go home in the dark, he does provide a place where we can tie to, and we can feel his presence as near as the "sand" on our feet. . .

Telegram Mailed To President Nixon

(Editor's note: Following is the body of a telegram sent last week to President Nixon and signed by some 200 local citizens:)

"We the undersigned protest the guilty verdict and the sentence against Lt. William L. Calley Jr. and request that you intervene in his behalf at once. We all believe in this country, have always been proud of its armed forces and have had the feeling that they need all of our support at all times, but more especially in the time of war. We consider the Vietnam fighting war, the verdict and sentence against Lt. William L. Calley Jr. is the most blatant kind of non support of this country's armed forces, in that it was perpetrated by the very organization by whom he was trained to fight and by whom he was ordered to use that training in Vietnam, as a fighting soldier. Please do what is necessary and what is well within your power and authority to do, to at once pardon Lt. William Calley Jr. and restore him to his status just prior to the verdict, and in so doing justice to Lt. Calley and restore to all of us our faith in the leaders of our armed forces; and to all of the men in our armed forces the sure knowledge that they will not be prosecuted for fighting in wars and conflicts in which this country finds itself involved.

Excerpts from a letter sent to President Nixon by the local American Legion, Post No. 206 states, "Have we abandoned the Rules of Reason to follow a rule in the Calley case that within itself creates contradictions and is impossible of application under the circumstances and conditions of war? We respectfully request that you make full use of the mighty powers of your office to set right this travesty and blot upon our Army, Navy, Marines and Air Force people and our nation."







March Building Hits \$81,000 In Friona

Five building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the month of March. All of the permits were for new residences, amounting to a total of \$81,000 in estimated new construction. This brought the total construction started during the ca-

lendar year in Friona to \$183,150. This compares to a figure of \$1,228,275 for the first quarter of 1970.

The 1970 figures included both the Friona State Bank building and 60-unit apartment building figures, which combined for more than a million dollars.

new water taps were also made during the month, to bring the total number of active taps to 1,249 as of March 31.

Records showed that 16,795, 500 gallons of water were used by city residents during the month, an average of 559,850 gallons per day. This is up 30 per cent over the previous month's total. Only .04 inch of moisture was recorded during the month.

Five new sewer taps installed brought to 1,213 the number of active services in the city.

A total of 885 feet of water and sewer mains were laid as extension to the Buske Addition on the eastern edge of the city.

Fire Department records showed four alarms during the month, with the greatest loss being an estimated \$300 to a storage shed at the Baker Dug-

gins residence. Greatest loss outside the city was a similar amount at the Wells Feedlots.

Police department records revealed 27 arrests. Ten of the arrests were for traffic violations; and seven involved alcohol. Sixteen complaints were investigated, ranging from obscene telephone calls, prowlers, window peeping and theft.



Delmer L. Dement, tire sealman for Friona Consumers, attended a TBA course last week at Farmland Industries School in Kansas City, Missouri.

Farmland Industries School is the center of training for employees of local cooperatives from throughout Mid-America. Students are selected by local managers and sent to the center, where they are trained to better serve the members of the local cooperatives that own Farmland Industries.

The school is a modern facility situated on a 24-acre wooded campus about ten miles north of downtown Kansas City. Forty different subjects are taught at the school, involving nearly 2,000 students per year. Instructors for the classes are specialists in feed, fertilizer, petroleum, farm supplies and other product areas from Farmland's headquarters office in Kansas City.

Bond Sales Are Released

Series E and H United States Savings Bond sales in Farmer County during February totaled \$7,621 according to County Bond Chairman Frank A. Spring. Sales for the first two months were \$11,658--12 per cent of the 1971 sales goal of \$100,000.

Treasury figures show that Texans purchased \$17,302,962 in Savings Bonds during February compared to 1970 sales for the same period totaling \$16,678,196--an increase of \$624,766 or 3.7 per cent. Sales for the two-month period were \$34,678,727 for 19 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.9 million.

Nationally, sales of E and H Savings Bonds were \$431 million--an 11-year peak for February. Sales for the first two months totaled \$861 million--12.8 per cent above 1970. Redemptions were 22 per cent below 1970 for the lowest February in five years.

Training Program Set For Auto Paint-Repair

Announcement was made this week of a training project for automobile painters and body repairmen through the Manpower Development Training Act.

The 39-week course will be held at Hereford, and trainees will be paid \$41.00 per week, plus \$5.00 per week for each dependent up to six. Travel allowances are also available for those who commute to the training classes.

Those interested, who are able to read, write, speak and understand English and have an eighth grade or equivalent education may apply at the Texas Employment Commission office in Friona at 103 West Sixth, between now and May 21.

Trainees will be required to attend classes eight hours daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Training will be conducted Monday through Friday each week, except on holidays.

Training will be given in


skills and knowledge that will enable trainees to enter the occupation of automobile paint

**At Home In
Parmer County**

FOR CENTURIES, FAMILIES THROUGHOUT THE WORLD HAVE DABBLED IN THE ancient art of decorating Easter eggs.

But you as today's designer of Easter eggs may have some new tricks up your sleeves.

Easter eggs taste and look best when hard cooked instead of hard boiled. Cooking below the boiling temperature means more tender egg whites, less dark coloring around the yolk and less cracking of shells during cooking.

To hard cook eggs, cover a pan of water and bring it to a boil. Remove from heat, and carefully lower eggs into the boiling water. Let stand for about 20 minutes in the hot water. Immerse cooked eggs immediately in cold water.

Another way to hard cook eggs is to place the eggs in a dish of lukewarm water to prevent shells from cracking. Bring water in a pan to a rapid boil using enough water to come above the eggs one inch. Carefully transfer the eggs to the boiling water; reduce the heat to keep the water at a simmering temperature. Cover and leave the eggs in the water for about 18 minutes. Immerse them immediately in cold water. To prevent dye from staining the egg whites, use eggs that have no cracks, and keep the dye water warmer than the eggs. If a warm egg is left in cool water, the dye may seep through the pores of the shell.

When selecting eggs for coloring, check appearance and shell color. Brown shelled eggs color just as well as white shelled ones. Brown shells yield bright, vivid colors; white shells are best for pastels.

Before dyeing, wipe shells thoroughly with a moist cloth, then allow to dry. Eggs that have limy shells will dye with tiny white spots.

hot water dyes are fastest. Prepare dye according to the manufacturer's instructions. Immerse eggs until they become the shade desired. Let eggs dry, then use your imagination.

Hard cooked dyed eggs may be eaten, but within a day or so. A way to prevent the problem of hard-cooked eggs being hard to peel is by using older eggs or by aging them before cooking.

To age eggs simply leave them out of the refrigerator at room temperature for 24 hours. Cracked the shell and peel from the large end. A further aid is to place the egg under cold running water to ease off the shell.

**Hog Cholera Restricts
State Swine Movements**

Dr. H.Q. Sibley, Acting Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission today ordered a restriction on swine movements in Texas in order to bring the present hog cholera situation under control. This restriction is imposed to implement a quarantine order signed by Mr. Joe B. Finley, Jr., Chairman of the Texas Animal Health Commission on March 22, 1971.

Effective March 29, 1971, the movement of all feeder and breeder swine within Texas will be allowed only by permit issued after inspection of the herd from which they originate.

Under the restriction, slaughter swine may be consigned directly to livestock markets for sale to slaughter or directly to slaughtering establishments.

Texas regulatory officials have enlisted the cooperation of accredited practicing veterinarians, vocational agriculture teachers, and county extension agents to assist in on-farm inspection prior to show or sale of feeder pigs and breeder stock.

Special permission from the Texas Animal Health Commission must be obtained for exhibitions, shows and special feeder and breeder sales. Restrictive sanitation requirements at such points of swine concentration should minimize exposure to hog cholera.

Prior inspection and permit for movement is required for any farm to farm movement of swine. Permits for movement may be obtained by contacting a representative of the Texas

Animal Health Commission or a County Agricultural Extension Agent.

The restriction on swine movements will be in effect for 60 days and will allow the Texas Animal Health Commission in cooperation with the Animal Health Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture to bring the current outbreak under control. The action has the support of the Texas swine industry and is being taken in the best interests of swine producers.

Bagworms are destructive pests on many evergreens and deciduous shrubs and trees, and sometimes on neglected fruit trees. Late March and early April is the time to control them.

First, remove the bags from infested plants and destroy them. Then when temperatures stay above 60 degrees for 6 to 10 hours during the day, start applying control measures. The pesticide applications should be continued at 7 to 10-day intervals until the infestation is eliminated.

Sevin, chlordane, lead arsenate or toxaphene will effectively control the bagworm. Directions for mixing and applying the materials are given on the label container and should be carefully followed.

The bagworm moth deposits from 500 to 1,000 eggs in a brown, tapered bag attached to a branch of the plant in September. The eggs hatch in March and the small worms immediately begin to feed on the plant's foliage and bark.

The young worms or caterpillars construct a small tapered bag of silk-like material and attach to it pieces of bark and foliage. The bag turns a brown in color.

The bagworm protrudes its head and front feet from the bag as it moves about the plant feeding but will withdraw into the bag when disturbed. In late summer the bag is attached to a branch and the mature cater-

pillar pupates within the bag. The feeding worms, when infestation is heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in the death of the plant or heavily damaged parts.

The worms are easier to control when they are young and control measures should be applied as soon as an infestation is discovered.

HOG CHOLERA--A 60-day restriction on movement of swine in Texas was ordered on Tuesday by the Texas Animal Health Commission in an effort to control hog cholera. The order becomes effective on March 29 and the movement of all feeder and breeder swine within the state will be allowed only by a permit issued after inspection of the herd from which they originate.


