40 YEARS AGO -- OCTOBER 3, 1930

J.C. Wilkison this week sold the Wilkison Chevrolet Company to J.W. Magness, owner of the Chevrolet agency at Farwell. It is reported that Mr. Magness has leased the Parr Building recently vacated by the Friona Motor Company, and will move the business into it. Mr. Wilkison will continue his business as representative of the Magnolia Petroleum Company here.

35 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 4, 1935

25 YEARS AGO-SEPTEMBER 28, 1945

On Monday the Friona Locker Company opened its doors for business and in the afternoon at least four hogs were slaughtered and placed in the cooling room, preparatory to processing and conversion into bacon, cured hams and sausage, etc. The operative work of the company is in charge of Wilmet Crow, one of the proprietors of the business, and he is ably assisted by A.L. Talley and T.B. Whitfield.

20 YEARS AGO-SEPTEMBER 28, 1950

Friona city commissioners and mayor met Tuesday and unanimously framed ordinances setting the city tax rate at \$1.25 representing a twenty-five cent increase over the previous levy. This action followed on the heels of increased agitation for a paving program for Friona, heretofore blocked by lack of sufficient credit earned by the city under its old tax structure. Mayor Bainum pointed that even with the tax increase, the city's tax rate is still considerably under the average for towns the size of Friona across the state.

15 YEARS AGO-SEPTEMBER 30, 1955



The formal opening services will be held at 3 p.m. There will be three guest speakers, Stanley Lockhart, minister of the Church of Christ at Levelland, and former pastor of the local church; Doyle Chapin, minister of the Vega Church of Christ, and Bob Wear, minister of the Canyon Church of Christ.

10 YEARS AGO-SEPTEMBER 29, 1960

The Friona City Council, meeting in a special session Monday afternoon at the City Hall, spent about three hours discussing a budget under which the city of Friona will operate during the tax year, October 1, 1960 to September 30, 1961. This is the first year that the city has operated under a budget set up on a tax year; as previous budgets were based on calendar years. The budget just ended was based on a ninemonth period.

5 YEARS AGO-SEPTEMBER 30, 1965

The enrollment in Friona Public Schools is up almost nine per cent over last year, it was revealed this week by Superintendent Alton Farr. Current enrollment was listed the past week at 1367, which was an increase of 111 students over the 1256 total at the end of the 1964-65 school year.



ELK POINT, S. D., LEADER-COURIER: "We exchange papers with many of the papers in the surrounding area. Longhorn Stampede

The Lazbuddie Longhorns minutes later. gave the Bovina Mustangs a taste of "Longhorn Power" Friday night in a football game played at Lazbuddie.

The Mustangs trotted onto the field with an air of confidence about them left that same field about two and a half hours later wondering what went wrong.

Lazbuddie who thoroughly remembered last year's 32-26 heartbreaking defeat gave the Mustangs a thrashing to remember as they rang up 54 points to 0 for Bovina.

The first quarter was scoreless but in the next period of play Arthur Graves punted to Bovina's Jim Harris. Harris fielded the ball just in front of the goal line and then took a step backward and kneeled down into the end zone for what he thought was a touchback,



Japan Is First Billion-Dollar **Offshore Customer For Farmers**

well aware that U.S.-Japanese -- a good 'horseback' measure production. This has brought trade is extensive, Louis Welch, Chairman of the Parmer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, commented recently.

"Almost everyone recognizes that Americans are important customers of Japanese goods. I wonder how many of us realize that the Japanese are major customers for American goods, especially for American farm commodities.

"In fact, Japan imports more U.S. agricultural products than any other country in the world -- a record \$1.1 billion worth during the 1970 fiscal year, " Welch said.

He pointed out that (feed grains, soybeans, wheat, cotton) are important farm crops in Parmer County and that exports of these farm products to Japan have gone up dramatically in recent years.

More than six million tons of feed grains were shipped to Japan last fiscal year -- just about one-third of U.S. Feed Grain exports. Sovbean exports to Japan had a 251 million dollar value, and wheat exports \$136 million. Japan is our best cotton customer, taking onefourth of its cotton from the U.S. and Japan bought \$50 million worth of tobacco from the

U.S. during the last fiscal year. The ASC Committee Chairman reported that Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford M. Hardin recently took note of the American-Japanese trade story, calling it unprecedented.

Secretary Hardin also said: "The Japanese economy has paralleled that nation's growth in trade. In the years between 1960 and 1965, Japanese shipments in world trade more than doubled. By 1969, they had almost doubled again, reaching \$16 billion. Shipments to the United States increased in those nine years by more than four times -- \$4.9 billion.

"The Japanese householder's disposable income has more than tripled since 1960. His de-

"He is diversifying his eating habits as his income goes up. For example, per person consumption of wheat flour in this traditionally rice-eating society has increased by 30 per cent in a decade-and-a-half.

"Ten years ago, Japan's agricultural imports from the U.S. were \$440 million. In the fiscal year just past, they were more than twice as great -nearly \$1.1 billion.





84 PA BABARA One of those very wonderful and exciting opportunities came along this past week-end and due to the plans that were made and the assistance of some very fine people, I was see on T.V., the events of the day. priviledged to accompany the "Friona Jeep Club" to Red River, N.M., for their special week-end 'color watching' trip--boy, it was

We didn't feel that the colors were as vivid and striking as in times past but all in all -- the fellowship, the sharing, the time in the mountains and all -- it was one fine week-end.

I suppose that a 'week-end' could be our topic for this time what with riding the 'jeeps' up to Goose Lake (someone wondered' how the 'goose ever found it' and on several other trails we took, but the real value of such a trip is the fellowship of it all. . . .

There were the ever-to-be-remembered snow-ball fights (yea, already) being rolled in the snow and the wonderful setting that was chosen for our Sunday morning worship

This was an outstanding time in my personal experience and I must admit I probably preached just a little harder, especially after being threatened with a ducking in the river if it wasn't a good one -- but God knew what he was doing with the creation of the altar we used for our worship service. (After the trip they took to get to the location, I wasn't particularly concerned about anyone getting up and leaving-and another thing, I don't remember the time when I saw the front row--yes, the FRONT ROW. fill up first. Someone suggested that it was 'because a person's 'person' was more exposed to the sun by being on the front row --but I choose to believe they were just excited about the preaching. . . .)

How very, very difficult it is to be in such a setting and to think of the situation of the world at this present time. Almost all that we were experiencing in that brief time (we had to leave) was in direct opposition to what we read about in the news and

Our experience was one of care and concern, of fellowship, of a sense of accepting each other for who we were and as a brother and sister in God's family -- it was the opening of one's self to the lovliness of God's created world and the experience of breathing and seeing and feeling that world with a friend. Can you think of a better exper-

But--however we might have desired to be like Peter who, you remember, on the mountain of Transfiguration, wanted to just stop right there and build an altar and stay -we needed to come back to our responsibilities and carry on with them -- but I dare say, we will approach them with a clearer understanding and a brighter degree of acceptance, than we ever did before. A trip

like that can clear out alot of cob-webs. Now before I get in dutch with my preacher friends who may read this as a "come-on" for leaving for the week-ends, and making weekly trips to the mountains, let me hasten to assure you all that occasional trips are great, but continued menus of the same dish would soon become dull -- and I will even say this -- attack the concerns of your church, whatever it may be, and we have room for all of them, with the freshness and clearity that is characteristic of the mountains, and I dare say it will be a new experience and a new 'happening.'

Jesus came down from the mountains of Transfiguration and got about the business of his Father's work and concern--which becomes a good recipe for all of us.

I'll just bet -- er -- wager -- (I wish they had another word for that) I'll just know you'll be a better churchman for it all and you can't get that close to God without coming away with a little more of him with you. . . .


