If we had a larger place for the show, enclosed, it would make it easier for friends and relatives of the exhibitors to attend the show, and watch it in comfort.

This past year made it about nine out of ten that the weather was either cold, windy, sandy, etc., for at least one day of the show.

The way things stand at present, the show can't do much growing. It has about reached its limit until something is done.

It takes a lot of man-hours to do the "coaching" work like Scotty does, and our hats are off to him, and all these other vo-ag instructors who give of their time for the sake of our young people.

We received an invite in the mail this week from former Chamber of Commerce manager Ted Weaver to attend the 12th annual Rattlesnake Round-Up in Sweetwater March 13-15.

Now, most people who know me very well know that I'm not much of the hunter-type sportsman, so we hope that Ted won't be offended if we don't show up.





Lazbuddie Does Usual Job At Show, Only Better

Rev Foil
To Leave**

Rev. Bill Foil, who has served as pastor of Friona's First Baptist Church since 1967, has resigned his position to accept a similar post with the First Baptist Church of Canyon.

The coming Sunday will be the final one for Rev. Foil to be in the local pulpit.

Rev. Foil has participated in activities through the Friona Ministerial Alliance, and has also been active in denominational affairs. He has served the past year as moderator of the Amarillo Baptist Association.

The Fails have been especially popular with the young set of the city, with their four sons, Adrian, Jimmy, Robbie and Dan.

Rev. Foil, in his resignation to the local church, told of his regret at leaving, but expressed the challenge of working with college-age students at the Canyon church.

A native of the Fort Worth area, Rev. Foil came here from Jonesboro, Ark., where he had been assistant pastor in a large church.

It will probably come as no surprise to those who did not attend the 36th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last weekend that exhibitors from Lazbuddie had another field day.

But this year's showing was possibly the best that the young showmen from the southern part of the county have ever had and that's saying a lot.

Lazbuddie claimed the grand champion award in the barrow show for an unprecedented 10th consecutive year, won four of five trophies in the sheep show, and then surprised by taking the steer championship on Saturday.

This latter trophy, won by Gail Morris, was perhaps the "upset" of the show, as the Lazbuddie FFA chapter entered only two steers, and exhibitors from Friona and Farwell, who have won the steer championship 19 times in the past 22 years, had 54 entries.

Morris' champion an 883-pound Hereford which placed first in the medium heavy-weight division, was the only Lazbuddie steer to place among the show's top 40. His other entry, a mediumweight, failed to place.

The winning of the championship of the steer division was as rare for Lazbuddie as its win in the barrow division was "usual." It was the first time for a Lazbuddie entry to win since 1960, when Bobby Redwine took all the marbles.

The tenth straight title in the

barrow division was virtually assured when Lazbuddie youngsters won five of the six breed championships.

Randy Bush claimed the honors with his 213-pound Poland China which earlier had won the championship of its breed. Reserve champion award went to Theresa Seaton, herself a two-time former winner, with her champion crossbreed.

Counting the breed champion, steer classes and lambs, Lazbuddie showmen had 10 of the top 15 places in the 1970 show.

Reserve champion steer was exhibited by Mike Haseloff of Farwell, who had the first-place mediumweight animal.

Other class winners were Dale Schueler, Friona, heavy, and Harold Jones of Farwell, light.

Karene Hart, Friona 4-H girl, broke Lazbuddie's monopoly in the sheep show, by exhibiting the first-place medium wool lamb.

Pablo Mendoza gave Lazbuddie two wins, in both the fine wool and fine wool cross divisions. Mark Barnes won the

Southdown and Shropshire class and Mike Windham added a first place in the "other breeds" category.

Showmanship trophies were won by Bill Bailey, in the swine division, Alonzo Strickland in the sheep show and Steve Kaltwasser in the steer division.

County showmen from four communities exhibited 248 animals in the two-day show, which was run off in chilly weather at the Friona School Bus Barn.

Saturday's steer show was especially a cold affair, held outside in weather in the 30s with a biting breeze.

**Stock Auction Sale
For 1970—\$40,000**

The auction sale total for the 1970 Parmer County Junior Livestock Show came to \$40,011.95, it was reported this week. This compares to the total of \$36,000 from last year's sale.

Of the above amount, some \$31,982 was paid in premiums. The rest was made up by the buyers of the "floor" animals.

Bidding at the auction sale was good, with the average price paid for the steers coming to 65 cents per pound. Barrows sold at an average of 67 cents per pound, and the sheep brought an average of 76 cents.

"We appreciate the support of the buyers; also the fact that they get their checks in as promptly as possible, so we can pay the exhibitors," said a representative of the Stock Show Assn. this week.

**City Sets Second
Vote On Sales Tax**

The City of Friona will vote on the city sales tax proposition for the second time on April 4, at the same time the local city and school election will be held.

Voters in the city failed by a mere handful to pass the issue when it came up the first time in April of 1968. City officials say that the extra one per cent which would be collected on taxable goods would give the city the revenue it needs to help finance the expansion currently underway. Otherwise, some adjustment in the ad valorem tax may be necessary.

According to the January issue of the Texas Town and City magazine, several cities around Friona have been reaping benefits from their sales tax.

Examples which the magazine carried, for tax payments for the third quarter (July-September) included: Abert, \$6,328.29; Earth, \$3,161.67; Littlefield, \$19,008.39; Memphis, \$9,633.52; Muleshoe, \$21,943.13; Olton, \$5,038.33 and Spearman, \$14,621.66.

An idea of what the above cities receive from the sales tax would be at least four times the

figure listed, since it represented taxes collected during a relatively slow period.

At the time Friona voters turned down the tax, neighboring Hereford had just voted it down, and Amarillo had not brought

it up for a vote. Since that time, Amarillo voters have passed the issue, and a number of surrounding towns have followed suit.

Hereford and Dimmitt will vote on the issue the same week that Friona does.

Race; One For Mayor**

Three people had filed in the Friona School Board Election, and another petition was taken out, as deadline nears for placement of names on the school ballot.

Deadline for filing for either election is March 4. A joint election will be held on Saturday, April 4.

Those who have filed in the School Board election are John Blackburn (re-election), H. K. (Pudge) Kendrick and Floyd

Schueler. Another petition had been taken out on Tuesday, but had not been returned.

40 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 28, 1930

W.H. Warren has the masonry work done on his new building on Main Street, with fair prospects of completion within the next two weeks.

The building will be 26 by 60 feet, one story high, divided into three offices. One of these rooms will be an office for Dr. Wills, and another to be occupied by the Friona Star. The third is as yet unrented.

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 1, 1940

Our people received word with regret which informed them that Dan Ethridge has arranged to move from our city to Lubbock, where he and Mrs. Ethridge will make their home in the future; although they extend congratulations to Dan for the promotion he has received by his appointment as special agent for the Cravens and Dargan Insurance Brokers, of Houston.

25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 2, 1945

The Friona Squaws became champions of District 19 after beating four good ball clubs at the tournament February 23 and 24th at Claude. The Squaws downed Lazbuddie in the opening round, 25-14, and then Lakeview, 28-20. Friona downed Claude, 19-14 in the semi-finals, and then outplayed the Quail Bobwhites, 31-24 in the finals. The Squaws are eligible to attend the state tournament in Hillsboro by virtue of winning this tournament.

20 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 24, 1950

At a meeting of the directors of the Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. Tuesday night it was definitely decided to build more elevator and storage space for the wheat growers, and a contract was let to A.F. Roberts for the erection of another concrete storage elevator. The new elevator will have a capacity of 600,000 bushels of grain, and construction will begin in the near future.

15 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 25, 1955

Friona businessmen desiring direct motor freight service with Lubbock are reminded this week by Chamber of Commerce president Dillie Kelley that intensified efforts in this matter should be made by next week. A Lubbock meeting with the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Lang Transit Company has been arranged for Thursday, March 3. Several local firms have already made plans to be represented at the meeting.

10 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 25, 1960

A farmer and rancher, and a farmer's wife were named the Outstanding Man and Woman of the Year by the Friona Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture at the annual banquet held Friday night at the school cafeteria.

A.L. Black, prominent farmer and rancher and an active member of the Soil Conservation District's board of directors, was named Man of the Year, and Katy Osborn, long-time resident of the Friona area and wife of Claude Osborn of Friona was named Outstanding Woman of the Year.

5 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 25, 1965

The clock finally struck "midnight" for the Friona Chiefs, and their "Cinderella" basketball season Tuesday night at Whiteface. The Chiefs, in the basketball playoffs for the first time in 20 years, ran into a polished herd of Denver City Mustangs, and the playoff-experienced Mustangs made off with an 81-66 victory to win the right to advance to the regional semi-finals Saturday.

Friona bounced from a 4-20 record in 1963-64 to a 22-5 record and the district title this season, their first under Coach James Anglin.

Optometrist Warns Of Watching Eclipse

Dear Mr. Ellis:

With the solar eclipse due March 7, 1970, there will be scores of people across the nation who will be either partially or totally blinded trying to see this rare phenomenon. You might wish to warn your readers of some of the hazards since many people still believe that they can view an eclipse comfortably and safely with various home-made devices all the way from a smoked glass to dark photographic film sheets. This simply is a mistaken idea. The only safe way is to wait and view it on television after professionals have made pictures of the event.

The real danger comes from the invisible infra-red rays which can cause damaging burns to the eye's light-sensitive retina in a manner similar to the way a magnifying glass will focus the sun's rays on a piece of paper and burn a hole in it. The retina, not being sensitive to pain, would hardly feel a retinal burn at the time. However, all vision specialists realize retinal burns are incurable and produce a blind spot. Should the burn be in the vital

macula area (point of most central vision) the patient would most likely lose all usable central vision in that eye permanently.

Other complications of solar damage seen by eye specialists following the last partial eclipse of the sun on May 20, 1966, include bilateral central scotomata, macular hole, severe macular edema, persistent paracentral scotomata, bilateral macular lesions, macular burn, obstruction of central retinal vessels, retinal hemorrhages, etc.

I hope it is possible for the people of our area to get by without a single incident of damage. This is only possible if they fully understand the dangers. The only recommended way to view an eclipse is indirectly. This can be done by taking two pieces of white cardboard and make a pinhole in one, then with the sun at your back focus the eclipse image through the pinhole board onto the second cardboard. Better yet, wait and see it on TV!

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

Pause And Reflect

As the deadline for paying income taxes draw nearer most folks are a little touchy on the subject of Federal levies, and it was therefore an example of very poor timing on the part of United Nations brain trustees to suggest at this time, plans for a World Wide Sales Tax.

Aside from the unfortunate timing it is about the most ludicrous egg ever laid by this gaggle of International Geese. It had a very familiar ring--"soak the American working man."

The general idea is to impose an actual sales tax on the purchase of certain items--On a World Wide Basis! Can you imagine the bookkeeping set-up that this would entail?

If and when this colossus comes into being, the cost of collecting the tax, the audits to maintain any degree of honesty, and the fair disbursement of funds would require much more genius than any United Nations member has demonstrated thus far.

The taxable articles would include automobiles, private planes, pleasure boats, T.V. sets, refrigerators, washing machines and dishwashers.

And more than likely anything else they could crowd aboard once they got the idiot craft afloat.

A quick glance at the World Almanac will show that most of the taxable items are manufactured and sold in the good old U.S.A.

So who pays the most taxes? We, the great gullible American middle class--currently referred to as the silent majority.

Small wonder we are silent--with news such as this we are too shocked to speak!

This universal sales tax was first mentioned in 1966 by the representative from the little newly formed, poverty stricken country of Ghana.

His idea was an international tax on national income, personal income, airline tickets, gasoline and alcohol.

(Wonder why he left out tobacco, cosmetics and dog food?) And why did the Ghanaian advocate such a ridiculous measure?

The answer is as clear as the Panhandle sky--the collected funds would be given annually to any international development organization chosen from a list adopted by the U.N. General Assembly.

We just wanted to cast a warning concerning the turbulent sea of international politics and perhaps take a facetious poke at another ridiculously unworkable exercise in futility.

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

Miss Day, a sophomore had the best scoring average on the team, 13 points per game. She played in one less game than Miss Kelley, whose average was 12.5.

Five players on the team scored over 100 points during the season.

Miss Day also paced the members of the offensive team in field goal shooting percentage, hitting 47 per cent of her shots during the year. She was the only player on the team hitting over 40 per cent. Miss Kelley was second at 36 per cent.

Becky Neill won the free throw shooting championship, with a 62 per cent shooting mark. As a team, the Squaws hit only 52 per cent of their foul shots during the year, far below their usual pace.

Miss Kelley had the most assists, 76. Miss Day drew the most fouls, 71, with Miss Kelley right behind at 70.

Leading rebounder on the team was Rhonda Garth, who had 103.

The team broke even in its 26 games for the season, with a 13-13 mark.

Clay Bandy was the leading scorer for Friona's unbeaten seventh grade Braves basketball team, with an even 10-point average, according to a tabulation of season statistics.

Bandy scored 100 points in the team's 10 games. Dale Cleveland was second leading scorer with 81 points, and Adrian Foll was third with 76.

The team scored 338 points, an average of 33.8 per game, and allowed just 167, an average of 16.7.

Team leaders on the 1969-70 Friona Chiefs basketball team were revealed this week in season statistics released by Coach Ray DeBord.

Senior Donny Carthel scored the most points, 241, edging fellow senior Ted Procter by a basket.

However, sophomore Ronnie McPherson, who did not play as many games, had the best scoring average on the team, 10.8 points per game.





At Home In Parmer County

By Janice Miller

It's time for your home gardeners to start planning your spring gardens. The most important thing is that you have good seed and that it is the proper variety for your area. You will also need to decide your family needs and preferences when choosing the types of vegetables and quantity of each vegetable to be planted. You will need to ask yourself if it's profitable for you to plant and care for each vegetable. But, you will also want to consider your enjoyment in a garden. The pleasure you get for your time may be well worth every penny.

Do you find yourself with extra eggs, yolks, or whites? Why not freeze them?

But don't freeze whole eggs in the shell; the water inside will expand and break the shell. Break each egg and examine it carefully. Freeze only high quality eggs.

Egg whites will freeze successfully without any additional ingredients, but egg yolks become gummy and lumpy after thawing. They will not blend well with other ingredients unless you add a stabilizer.

To prevent this change in the yolks, add a small amount of salt, sugar or other edible ingredient before freezing. Also, you may add the ingredient to whole eggs you freeze. The choice of additive depends upon the use of the eggs after thawing.

For example, add salt to yolks if you'll use later for noodles. Add sugar if eggs are used later in baked goods.

Each cup of egg yolks should be blended with one tablespoon of sugar or corn syrup or one half teaspoon salt.

Freeze eggs in the amounts that you'll use at one time.

Grant was graduated from USC cum laude in 1969 as a psychology major and has completed his course work for his master's degree in industrial psychology at the University of Illinois.


