



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Pause and Reflect

Sunday, June 14, is Flag Day.

Never in the history of our beloved Nation have we the people been faced with the degree of division that exists

Our chances of victory on the fronts is very slender indeed and without national pride and unity the task is impossible. There follows a brief history of our Flag, it is presented with the hope that it may inspire a feeling of patriotism, self

respect, and pride in citizenship. Grand Union: Before the American Revolution and at the time of independence the British ensign was flown in the Colonies. Subsequently this was modified--the red cross of St. George and the white cross of St. Andrew were shifted to the canton, with the field consisting of 7 red and 6 white

stripes representing the Colonies. Gadsden Flag: The Colonies resented the British ensign more and more. Most of them flew their own banners, with crisp symbolic design. One of the most popular was the socalled Gadsden flag, with a coiled rattlesnake on a yellow field, over the words, "Don't Tread on Me." Others included "Liberty or Death" slogans.

Bunker Hill Flag: In New England, the pine tree was the popular flag emblem. It appeared on the Colonial banner hoisted over the redoubts at Bunker Hill. This showed a red background, another was the old British blue ensign with the pine tree in the canton. The pine tree was also minted

First "Stars and Stripes": After Congress passed the flag resolution June 14, 1777, the battle of Bennington (August 1777) is believed to mark the first display of a flag with 13 stars and 13 stripes. It consisted of 11 stars in semicircle, and one in each corner of the canton. The figure 76 honors the year of Independence.

The "Cowpens" Flag: The 3rd Maryland Regiment fought at Cowpens, South Carolina (January 1781); it carried the first starred and striped flag that fulfilled the 1777 flag resolution. It consisted of 12 white stars in a circle and one in the center of the blue field, with 7 red and 6 white stripes.

Betsy Ross Flag: Betsy Ross, an expert needlewoman of Philadelphia was, according to legend, asked in 1776 to design a national flag suggested by General Wshington. The actual facts are obscure; the legend only came to light in 1870. Betsy is credited with making the stars 5-pointed. She ar-

ranged them in a circle. Flag of 1795: This flag had 15 stripes and 15 stars. It flew for 23 years; under it 5 presidents served-Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison and Monroe. Five new states were admitted during these five years but no change was made in the flag. This was the first official flag to fly over the Capitol in Washington.

Flags of the Confederacy: of its four legs, the battle flag was the Civil War flag and is best known. It consisted of a blue cross stretched diagonally across a red field; on the cross were 13 white stars. Although the South had seceded, Lincoln refused to alter the Stars and Stripes with its 34 stars.

1912: This was the twenty-fifth design of the flag with the addition of two stars for the states of Arizona and New Mexico. The Stars were arranged in six rows of 8 stars each. This flag was unchanged for 47 years and eight presidents served

under it. The Flag of Today: With admission to the Union of Alaska and Hawaii, the flag gained two more stars, making a field of 50 stars. They are arranged in 5 rows of 6 stars each and 4 rows of 5 stars each. This flag was officially unfurled July 4, 1960. It is your flag! Long may it wave!

These reports and the names of researchers have been catalogued by ICASALS Special Report No. 34 entitled, "Grain Sorghum Research" by the colleges of Agricultural Sciences

Forty-three investigators and Home Economics-available

Most reports are available in reprint form to persons interested in the crop research. The publication reports the 1969 grain sorghum output in Texas was approximately 310 million bushels, with more than half of it being produced in the High Plains of Texas.

The local supply "has been a prime factor in the tremendous growth" of cattle feeding, and the rapid development of the swine industry in West Texas'' is also largely attributable to the region's production of sorghum grain," it says.

A 1966-67 survey showed grain sorghum represented 83% of all concentrates fed in Texas

"As the dynamic billion dollar High Plains Livestock feeding industry expands," the bulletin says, "the grain sorghum industry must continue its growth at an acceleratedrate,"

Grain sorghum is expected to become more important year-by-year as a source of food for human consumption.

It can provide "inexpensive, palatable and nutritionally complete food for humans when properly supplemented," the report says. "Several types of satisfactory food products have

Preliminaries to Trial in Corporation Court,-Upon receiving a request for trial, made pursuant to Section or Section 4. hereof, the Judge of the Corporation Court shall set a date and a time for such trial on the Court Docket. The Judge of the Corporation Court shall notify the City Attorney of the date and time of such hearing. The City Attorney shall cause to be prepared, filed, and served on the defendant, a written complaint charging that the owner occupant of the premises, as the case may be, has violated this Article. After service, such complaint shall be on file with the Clerk of the Corporation Court not less than ter (10) days prior to the date of trial.

Section 6. Trial in Corporation Court -- The Judge of the the defendant is in fact, in violation of this ordinance. Upon a finding that said defendant is in violation of this ordinance, said defendant shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine in accordance with the penalty provision hereinafter set forth. The Judge of said Court shall further order such defendant to remove and abate said nuisance within ten (10) days, the same being a reasonable time. If the defendant shall fail and refuse, within said ten (10) days, to abate or remove the nuisance, the Judge of the Corporation Court may issue an order directing the Chief of Police to have the same removed, and the Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent shall take possession of said junked motor vehicle and remove it from the premises. The Chief of Police of his duly authorized agent shall thereafter dispose of said junked motor vehicle in such manner as the City Council

Section 7. Removal with Permission of Owner or Occupant .-- If, within ten (10) days after receipt of notice from the Chief of Police, or his duly authorized agent, to abate the nuisance, as herein provided, the owner or occupant of the premises shall give his written permission to the Chief of Police, or his duly authorized agent for removal of the junked motor vehicle from the premises, the giving of such permission shall be considered compliance with the provisions

Section 8, Removal from Unoccupied Premises by Order of CorporationCourt .-- If there is a junked motor vehicle, as herein defined, on premises that are unoccupied, and neither the owner of the premises nor the owner of said vehicle can be found and notified to remove same, then, upon a showing of such facts to the Judge of the Corporation Court, the Court may issue an order directing the Chief of Police to have the same removed, and the Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent shall take possession of said junked motor vehicle and remove it from the premises. The Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent shall thereafter dispose of said junked motor vehicle in such manner as the City Council may provide.

Evidence of Abandonment, -- If a junked motor vehicle, as defined in this Article, has been situated on the private property of another, without such person's permission, for a period of sixty (60) days or longer, this fact shall he prima facte evidence that the owner of said evidence has

Section 10. Penalty, -- Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. and upon conviction shall be subject to a fine of not more than Each transaction in violation of any of the pro-

Section II. New City Ordinances Outlawing Junk Automobiles Defining nuisance personal property: Directing removal and impounding of same when found in public places: Providing a lien thereon and sale to satisfy lien and redemption before and after sale; Providing for notice of sale, posting and advertising thereof and notice by registered mail to owners of motor vehicles; Prescribing procedure for aucby the owner of the impounded property. tion sale, Disposition of proceeds; Vesting title in auction Defining junk; Directing its sale and disposal of proceeds thereof; Keeping records and prescribing fees; Providing for a cumulative provisions; and providing a se-

verability clause. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Friona: Any vehicle or other property or obstruction, placed, left standing, parked, erected or lying in violation of any ordinance of the City of Friona, or left unattended for more than forty-eight (48) continuous hours in or on any public street, alley, sidewalk, park, or other public place of said City is declared to be a nuisance, and any such property when so found shall be removed summarily by any police officer of the City of Friona and taken to the police

Section 2. The City of Friona shall have a lien on such impounded personal property for all costs incurred in impounding, storing, and advertising such property and such lien shall be prior and superior to all other liens of every kind, save and except liens for ad valorem taxes, and the city may retain possession thereof until all costs are paid

and may sell the same as herein provided. Section 3. The owner or any person legally entitled to possession of such impounded personal property may redeem

the same as follows:

(a) Before sale -- By paying to the Chief of Police the impounding fee and any other actual expenses incurred by the City in impounding and keeping the impounded property, as determined by the Chief of (b) After sale -- By paying to the buyer at the auction

sale double the amount paid by him for such person al property and any reasonable expenses incurred by him for keeping same: providing that the said property must be redeemed from the auction buyer within thirty (30) days after the date of the auction sale, excluding the date of sale: otherwise, title to said property shall become absolute in the auction

Section 4. When any personal property, other than motor vehicles, is not redeemed within sixty (60) days after being impounded, and when any motor vehicle is not redeemed after compliance by the Chief of Police with the provisions of Section 6 hereof, the Chief of Police shall sell the same at public auction to satisfy the lien of the City. Section 5. Before selling such personal property, other

than motor vehicles, the Chief of Police shall post two notices thereof, one at the Courthouse door of Parmer County Texas, and one at the City Hall in Friona, Texas, and shall cause a copy thereof to be published in a newspaper published in Parmer County, Texas, one time, the date of such publication to be at least fourteen (14) days prior to the day of the auction sale. The notice of sale shall describe the impounded property, state that the same is unredeemed, state that the same will be sold at public auction, designate the place of sale, and state a time and date of sale which shall not be less than fourteen (14) days from the date of posting such notices as herein required.
Section 6. When any motor vehicle has not been rede-

emed within thirty (30) days from the date of its impounding it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to submit to the Texas Highway Department and similar agency of the proper state when the vehicle is from another state, all information in his possession concerning said vehicle and to request that said department supply to him all information the records of the Department contain on said vehicle, Immediately on receipt of such information from said Department the Chief of Police shall notify the owner and lienholders as shown by the records of said department by registered mail with return receipt requested that said vehicle has been impounded and of the provisions of this Odinance in regard to redemption and sale of impounded property.

In the event a motor vehicle has not been redeemed within (15) days from receipt of the return receipt or notice of non-delivery of said registered mail, the Chief of Police shall prepare a notice of sale of such vehicle, in the manner described in the preceding section, shall send a copy of said notice to owner and lienholders, as shown by the records of said Highway Department, by registered mail, and shall post and advertise said notices in the manner required in the preceding section. Notice by registered mail to the address shown on the records of said highway department shall constitute notice of the pending sale of such owner

After deducting the impounding fee and all other actual expenses incurred by the City in impounding, storing and selling of said property, as determined by the Chief of Police, not to exceed a reasonable amount for each impounded article, he shall pay the balance of the proceeds of such sale, if any, to the owner of the property. If the owner fails to call for such proceeds they shall be paid into the city treasury. Within six (6) months after such auction sale, the owner may apply in writing to the Chief of Police, and upon satisfactory proof of ownership, shall be entitled to receive the amount of the proceeds delivered to the City

at public auction in accordance with the procedure herein prescribed and upon which no person bids, shall thereafter be sold or otherwise disposed of as junk. Money received

for tunk property shall be disposed of in the same manner as proceeds from an auction sale under this Ordinance. Section 10. (a) The Chief of Police shall keep a record book which shall contain; A description of all property impounded, the date and time of such impounding, the date notices of sale were posted and advertised and mailed to owners and Henholders, the return of receipts of registered notices, the date of the sale at auction, the amount realized for each article at such sale, the name and ad-

dress of the owner and lienholders if known, the name and address of the auction buyer, and any such other information as he may deem necessary. The following fees shall be charged under this Or-dinance and shall be paid into the City Treasury.

(1) For taking and impounding any personal property --Three dollars (\$3.00).

(2) For preparing advertisements of sale for each article--Fifty cents (\$.50), (3) For selling each article -- Fifty cents (\$,50). (4) For posting notices of sale relating to any one ar-

ticle--Fifty cents (\$.50). Section 11. That the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed cumulative of the provisions contained in the ordinances of the City of Friona, Texas, save and except that where the provisions of this ordinance are in conflict with the provisions elsewhere in said City Ordinances, then




