The test is the W. G. Hastings, et al, of Coleman No. 1 W. T. Wilson and is located 330 feet from the south and west lines of Subdivision 61, Comal County School Land Survey 181.

According to the operator the pay was reached at a depth of 1,509 feet and total depth is about 1,561 feet with approximately 43 feet of good saturated pay sand. Bottom hole pressure is strong and the test is expected to flow upon completion.

MOONLIGHT EVERY NIGHT IN AUSTIN

Austin has the unique distinction of being the only city in the world lighted by "artificial moonlight." Visitors to the city gaze in wonder at the tall towers that dot the city and cast a soft, blue "moonlight" everywhere. Work was begun on these lights in 1894, and the lights were turned on May 6, 1895. The triangular framework is 150 feet high resting on a 15 foot pedestal, making a total of 165 feet above the ground. The original contract specified that each tower must illuminate a circle with a diameter of 3000 feet, with the tower in the center, so that the time could be read on a watch on the darkest night.







Austin - "Hypervitaminosis is a long word meaning too many vitamins," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer. The diseased condition probably was derived from the tendency of some persons to think that if a little bit does a lot of good a lot will do better. This is not the case in taking vitamins or medicines whether prescribed by a physician or taken on one's own initiative.

Millions of dollars are spent yearly in synthetic vitamin preparations by persons who mistakenly believe they will counteract careless eating habits or cure numerous ailments. Unless prescribed by a physician for a specific need, synthetic vitamin purchases are usually a waste

of money. Nutritionists have long urged that, except when prescribed by a physician, vitamins be secured from the grocery store in the form of green, leafy, and yellow vegetables and dairy products. This is the more beneficial and economical way of assuring an adequate intake of these necessary substances.

It has been established that Vitamin A and D taken in excessive amounts are harmful. Other excessive uses of vitamins have resulted in cases of vitamin toxicity. Excessive intake may be as dangerous as deficient intake. Take vitamins only when prescribed by a physician and only in the amount ordered by



Soil Conservation News-

Esker Crawford of the Denton community planted ten acres of Blue Panic Grass in June, 1953.

Mr. Crawford planted the seed at rate of 1 pound per acre. One of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District grass drills was used. An excellent stand was obtained. Crawford planted the Blue Panic

seed in forty-inch rows. This ten acres of mixed land had been planted to vetch and rye each year for five years. Crawford said. He used 200 pounds of superphosphate fertilizer every other year while raising vetch and rye. The last crop of vetch and rye was plowed up before it matured. The seed bed was prepared by going over the land with a 2 row cultivator.

Eighty pounds of seed were harvested off a small area in the fall of 1953, Crawford related. Seed were harvested with a combine.

He likes Blue Panic grass better than Sudan grass because Blue Panic can be grazed earlier, Crawford remarked. It does not have to be seeded each year as does Sudan

Blue Panic grass is a perennial grass, introduced from Australia. This grass grows extremely well in this area and is easily established. One or two cultivations each year is necessary for best results.
