

Bond Totals Are Released

Frank A. Spring, County Bond Chairman, announced today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Parmer County during May were \$10,498. Sales for the first five months totaled \$34,667 for 35 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$100,000.

During the month Texans purchased \$16,476,145 in Savings Bonds compared to \$14,528,581 (includes Freedom Shares) during May 1970. Year-to-date sales totaled \$86,134,682--47 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million.

Nationwide, new purchases of Series E and H Savings Bonds during May amounted to \$462 million, 25.9 per cent above 1970. Sales the first five months of 1971 were \$2,229 million --19.6 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$105 million were reported for the five-month period of 1971, compared to \$101 million exchanged during 1970.

It used to be that whenever you bought a suit, or a shirt, or a skirt, you frequently had to buy them oversize in order to take care of shrinkage. Long ago industry came up with the technical means to prevent shrinking in fabrics, so that now you can buy clothing that fits and it stays that way.

But thus far the government-which has ultimate control over the value of the dollar-has failed to find a way to prevent shrinkage of our hard earned money.

The executive head of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Arch N. Booth, recently noted that a 1942 dollar has shrunk in value to only 42 cents today. Inflation, caused largely by Federal deficit spending, has eaten away 58 cents of every dollar earned

Mr. Booth then asked himself; what would happen if the same rate of inflation continues for the next 28 years? What would the average worker have to earn, or pay, in 28 years, to equal our 42¢ dollar we have today?

There are some of the answers he came up with; if inflation

The value of our dollar will drop to 18 cents.

- A \$3,000 car will cost \$7,000.
- A \$25,000 home will cost \$58,000.
- A \$4,000 college tuition will cost \$9,400.
- A \$275 tv set will cost \$640.
- A \$125 suit of clothes will cost \$290.

A \$25 pair of shoes will cost \$58. In order to make ends meet, a worker will have to earn \$16,800 to have the same standard of living he now enjoys with

\$7,200 in wages.

40 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 26, 1931 According to grain dealers and implement men familiar with the situation, indications are that Parmer County rail points will handle not less than 2,000,000 bushels of wheat this year, with Friona getting 1,000,000 bushels of the total. Aided by almost ideal weather conditions and the fact that the county has a larger wheat acreage this year, the prediction should come true.

35 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 26, 1936

The Friona Cardinals were again victorious in the game with the Clovis team last Sunday at Clovis, by a score of 7 to 5. Charley Bainum, who for several years past has been identifled with the C.H. Fallwell Garageon Main Street, has severed his connections with that business and has opened a garage on his own account in the Hicks Building south of the railroad.

30 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 27, 1941 The twenty charter members of the Frions Lions Club celebrated their Charter Night last Tuesday night in the Friona Woman's Club house, with a large attendance of Lions from clubs around the territory.

The Friona territory is still being afflicted with a little too much rain all at one time, although there were a few days last week on which it did not rain during either day or night.

25 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 21, 1946

In the election held here last Tuesday, to determine whether or not the people of Friona are infavor of bonding the city in a sufficient amount to give the city an ample and adequate sewer system, the bond issue carried by a good margin. Out of 121 votes cast, 113 were in favor, only four against, and four ballots were mutilated

20 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 21, 1951

That's right, it was an earth tremor! Residents of the Friona area experienced a definite earthquake Wednesday at 12:36 o'clock noon, when the vibrations were sufficient during their five-second duration to attract the attention of most everyone. Evidentally, persons sitting at the time were more acutely aware of the disturbance, as some reported violent rocking of their chairs. A mild rumble preceded the quaking.

15 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 21, 1956

Friona Wheat Growers has received a check in the amount of \$290,944,55 from Commodity Credit Corporation, representing payment on storage and handling 90 million pounds of milo in the Cooperative's elevator last year, It was the biggest check in the firm's history.

10 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 22, 1961

"It was just what we had ordered," was the way one farmer described last week's rain, which was the first general moisture the area had received in about three months. Coming on the eve of what is expected to be a great wheat harvest, the slow, steady rain measured 3.5 Inches and lasted throughout the night last Wednesday.

5 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 23, 1966

The State Highway Department has lifted the "Farm to Market' status from Highway 214, thereby making it eligible for state planning and assistance on improvements for

VIET NAM WAR ENDS SUDDENLY

President Nixon, yielding to demands from Peaceniks, Leftists, Superliberals, and other critics of his gradual withdrawal policies, today declared that all American troops be immediately withdrawn from all foreign lands.

This sweeping mandate includes not only Southeast Asia but all of Europe, England, Africa and Central and South America,

on the Nationalist Chinese stronghold of Taiwan. General Chiang Kai-Shek fears an atomic raidonhis island fortress. He told newsmen that his build-up of a half million

man army and the world's best trained air force was "now as futile as the shadow of smoke upon a wall." Chiang's dream of re-capturing his homeland has been thwarted by United States policies in the Far East.

What about Black Panthers?



On The Farm In Parmer County MACK HEALD County Agent

Alfalfa has the highest plant nutrient requirement of all forage crops. An eight-ton yield removes 360 pounds of nitrogen, 80 pounds of phosphorus, and 360 pounds of potassium. If inoculated, nitrogen will not be needed. If the crop is not growing off properly and has not been fertilized this year, 80 to 120 pounds of phosphorus should be broadcast after the first cutting, just ahead of water. In sandier areas, have a soil test made to evaluate possible potassium deficiency.

The Swine Outlook is Brightening. Recent statistical figures on swine numbers by the USDA indicate decreasing numbers by mid-summer. This should result in a corresponding rise in hog prices at the same time and continuing on into early 1972. Swine producers in the 10 corn belt states report their farrowing intentions during March, April, and May, 1971 to be seven percent less than during the same period in 1970. In the June, July, and August, 1971 period, they are expected to cut farrowings by 15 percent. If these intentions are realized, there will be less hogs for market starting in August or slightly earlier. So, a price rise for market hogs can be expected by mid-summer.

The USDA report also indicates that there would be about 22 percent more hogs to be marketed during this May than a year ago. So, don't expect much improvement in hog prices before the end of May or mid-summer.

Record Keeping is important, even at planting time. Although farmers are busy with field work, now is the time to think about record keeping and the kinds of analyses that will be desired at the end of the crop year. Memories often fail six months hence when the exact fertilizer and herbicide rates or hours of irrigation time are needed to generate enterprise analyses. Each producer should keep a diary handy and should note all pertinent information while it is fresh on his mind. These data can then be transferred to a permanent record at a more

convenient time Ornamental Insect Pests are beginning to increase in numbers throughout the area. Now is the time for homeowners to control bagworms, euonymus scale, and elm leaf beetles.

The euonymus scale is a difficult insect to control unless insecticide applications are timed properly. The newly hatched scales are presently in the mobile or crawler stage and are susceptible to insecticides. However, after the insects form the protective scale covering, control becomes difficult. Malathion, diazinon, or dimethoate (Cygon) provide good control of crawler scales. Make two or three applications at weekly intervals for best control results.

Tiny bagworm larvae can now be found feeding on the foliage of cedars and many other trees. Infested trees should be sprayed with malathion, toxaphene, carbaryl (Sevin), and diazinon for good bagworm control.

Malathion, Sevin and toxaphene also give good control of elm leaf beetles. Additional applications of these insecticides in July and August are usually required. Due to the size of most elm trees, high pressure sprayers are usually required for good spray coverage. Disulfoton (Di-Syston) granules (15 percent) at the rate of two and one-half ounces per inch of tree trunk diameter give excellent elm leaf beetle protection. However, this material is required for use only by commercial growers or professional applicators.

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

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420-million bushels is the estimated harvest now getting under way in the southwest and midwest wheat belt. This harvest has to be moved from growing areas to elevators and mills, also to ports for export.

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At the start of the year we ordered 800 giant 100-ton covered hopper cars which are ideal for moving wheat, potash and bulk commodities as they can be loaded in twelve minutes and unloaded in about three minutes. During April we added 500 more to increase the order to 1300 cars, so we could have almost 10,000 giant hoppers ready by harvest. We also use box cars and other types of equipment to keep the wheat rolling.

And there are other ways we are ready for this big job. Last year we expanded and automated our Argentine Yard at Kansas City, which is a busy wheat terminal. Our data center at Topeka is prepared to keep constant check on cars to gain the best possible utilization of equipment. Diesel units have been added to our locomotive fleet and older units updated to move the wheat trains.

Now the harvest is starting and Santa Fe people, with their experience and dedication, are ready to handle this big transportation job. All together we are making our strongest effort to move this year's wheat harvest while at the same time keeping all other freight moving across our railway.
