

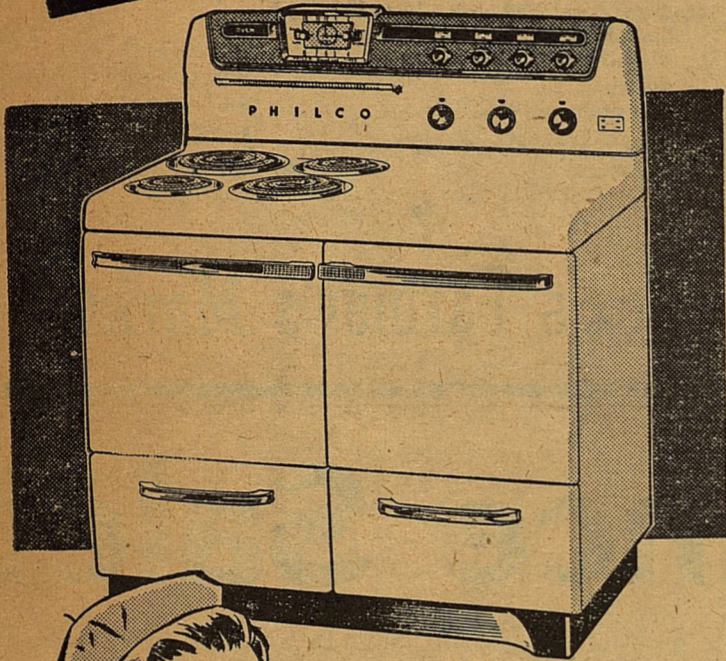

Dr. T. H. Taylor Is First To Get Over \$100 Per Month Pension Benefit

Dr. Thomas H. Taylor of Brownwood, retired president of Howard Payne College, received his first social security retirement check on September 10, in the amount of \$103.50. He thus became the first person in the Abilene district to receive more than \$100 per month as a result of the 1954 changes in the law which permit up to \$4200 per year to be credited on an individual's social security record. Prior to this, the highest retirement benefit possible was \$98.50 per month. In 1956, it will be possible to reach \$108.50 as a retirement benefit.

All social security records are confidential, but Dr. Taylor gave written permission to R. R. Tuley, district manager, for his case to be publicized as an illustration of higher benefits possible under the new law.

As his wife is also past the age of 65, her benefit check of \$51.80 is a new high for amounts payable a wife.

Before 1955, no more than \$3600 could be credited to a social security account in any one year, with a \$300 average monthly wage being the highest figure that could be used in the calculation of benefits. Starting with 1955, a total of \$4200 per year is creditable, either as wages, or self-employment, or a combination of wages and self-employment income. Too, a drop-out provision in the new law permits use of the best two years since 1950 in determining a person's average monthly wages for benefit calculation. As Dr. Taylor had \$36 for each of the years 1961-1954, and \$4200 for 1955 prior to his retirement, use of one \$3600 year and the \$4200 year resulted in an average monthly wage of \$325, bringing the \$103.50 retirement amount.

Howard Payne College elected coverage for its employees as of January 1, 1951, the earliest possible date that such institutions were permitted to participate in this Federal family insurance program called Social Security.

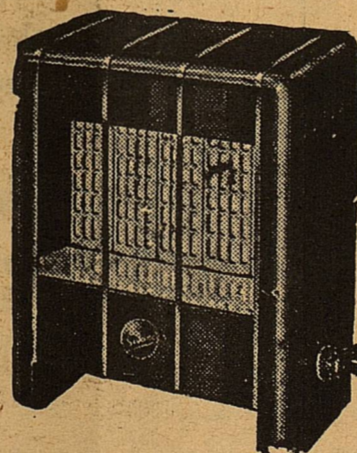

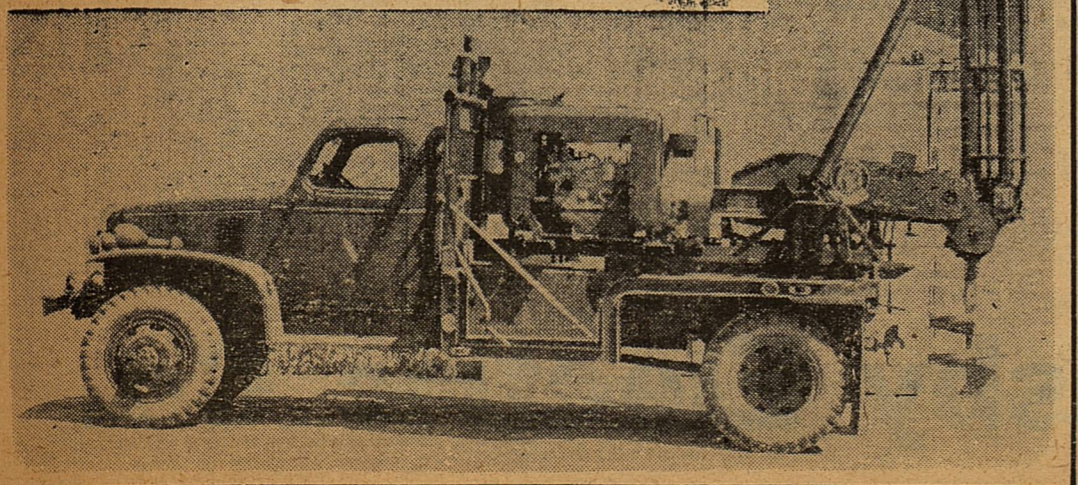

VA GIVES HINTS TO VETS STARTING GI TRAINING

Veterans Administration today gave three helpful tips to the thousands of veterans planning to start training this fall under the Korean GI Bill.

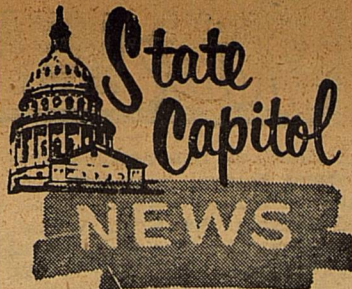
First, VA said, GI application forms should be filled out fully and completely. An incomplete application can only cause delay, because VA will have to write to the veteran for the missing information.

Second, veterans should be sure they enclose a photostate or certified copy of their service separation paper, along with their completed application form. Without this paper, VA will be unable to act promptly on the application.

Third, applications should be sent to the veteran's nearest VA Regional office, and not to VA headquarters in Washington, D. C. Any applications received in Washington merely will have to be referred to the appropriate regional office—a time-consuming process.

VA said it expects two-thirds of a million veterans to be in training this fall under the Korean GI Bill.

AUSTIN—Almost everyone is talking about prices.

In Austin before a meeting of 200 Texas Farm Bureau officials, the Indiana Bureau's president predicted a "depression that will make the 'thirties look like a picnic" if present farm policies continue.

At his Gillespie County ranch, U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson said the Republican sliding scale of parity lets "prices slide down and mortgages slide."

In Houston Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson retorted in a speech before Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers, Democrats, he said, left him a "neat package of carefully fused bombs" falling prices and accumulating surpluses.

Substantial progress has been made, nevertheless, Benson said. Major strategy to help low-income farmers, he promised, is in the offing.

Drought Aid Announced
Farmers in 22 South Texas counties are eligible to buy surplus feed grain at lower prices. President Eisenhower designated the counties as drought disaster areas at the request of Gov. Allen Shivers.

Applications for relief grain will be taken through Oct. 15. Distribution through supervised retail outlets will continue until No. 15.

Insurance Overcharges Hit
A Texas Insurance Commission report claiming "millions of dollars" in excess charges collected by a New York automobile insurance company may touch off a nationwide investigation.

Commr. J. Byron Saunders reported Texas' findings at a zone meeting of insurance commissioners from six states. All indicated they would start inquiries.

Service Fire Insurance Company of New York overcharged, Saunders said, by putting policy holders in a higher rate bracket than necessary. He reported that so far the company had refunded \$89,000 on the policies checked by the commission.

Attorneys for the company said that if they were excess insurance charges, they were offset by an undercharge on financing.

Service Fire Insurance Company handles policies for Universal C. I. T., finance company with which it is affiliated.

Vaccine Priority Changed
Texas children under five have been added to the priority group for Salk polio vaccine. In other states only five to nine-year-olds are eligible.

State Health department officials obtained special approval from federal authorities, as some 44 per cent of paralytic polio in Texas hits tots under five.

School Inquiries Set
Legislative subcommittee reports on school squabbles at Houston and Irving are due Oct. 21. Investigations are being made by two-members of the house general investigating committee. Rep. Wade F. Spilman, Jr. of McAllen is chairman. Suspension of a school admin-

trator was the origin of difficulties in each town.

No Federal Interference
Federal authorities do not intend to interfere with Texas policing of racial problems. Such assurance was sent by an assistant U. S. attorney general to Texas' Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

A Houston Negro organization had requested U. S. Attorney General Herbert Brownell to investigate the Texas Citizens Council. Shepperd sent a telegram advising that Texas enforcement agencies are able to take care of any Texas situation.

Water Problems Studied
Inform the people about Texas' water problem and money to solve it will be forthcoming. Max Starcke, manager of the Lower Colorado River Authority, so advised more than 100 experts at a Water for Texas Conference at College Station.

It will be a lengthy, costly proposition, he said.

Land Buyers Cleared
Honest deals sought under the veterans land program are gradually being cleared. A suspense order, invoking when investigations began, has been moved from 111 accounts. They were "made in good faith", according to Land Commr. J. Earl Rudder.

Another 1,400 accounts, representing a \$3 million investment, still are being checked.

Plaque for Early Newspaper
National Newspaper Week in Texas will open Oct. 1 with a ceremony in Houston commemorating the role of the Telegraph and Texas Register in the Texas Revolution.

Russell W. Bryant, Italy News-Herald, president of the Texas Press Association, will present a bronze plaque to be used as a permanent historic marker.

Recipient of the plaque will be Mac Roy Razor of Austin, president of the State Association of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity. The plaque will be placed in the museum to be erected at Washington on the Brazos.

SHORT SNORTS: A. C. Turner, director of rehabilitation for the Texas Prison System, has resigned to become a member of the State Board of Pardons and Paroles. He will serve out the six-year term of the late Lyle C. Harris . . . Burton

Government Needs Engineering Draftsman

Federal employment for a General Engineering Draftsman with three years drafting experience or equivalent education exists per year, with annual increases.

Those interested should submit Standard Form 57, obtainable at the Post Office, together with an ink original sample of drafting work to Civilian Personnel Officer, Abilene Air Force Base, Abilene, Texas.

Stenographers are also needed at Abilene Air Force Base. Beginning salary is \$3175 per year. Interested applicants for stenographic positions must successfully pass a U. S. Civil Service examination, usually scheduled at Draughon's Business College, Abilene, Texas. Application to take this test may be made on an official card form obtainable at the Post Office or by letter addressed to Civilian Personnel Officer, Abilene Air Force Base, Abilene, Texas, stating when it would be convenient to take the examination.

Stenographic appointments will be U. S. Civil Service Career-Conditional and will carry employee rights and privileges such as 40-hour week with time and a half for overtime, annual and sick leave, holidays, life insurance and retirement provisions.

C. Hackney of Brownfield will succeed Hubert T. Johnson of Waco on the State Board of Public Welfare . . . Charles A. Rowe of Houston is the new member of the Texas Aeronautics Commission . . . A new law prohibiting drinking or possession of liquor at "public school" athletic events. That includes the University of Texas football games in the opinion of Austin Law enforcement heads . . . A five state drive for funds to extend the Boy Scout program in the Southwest opens Oct. 25. H. H. Coffield of Rockdale is chief planner for the county-by-county campaign . . . Texas' oil allowance for October will be 3,148,459 barrels per day, up 64,772 over September. . . Two critical issues, segregation and school district organization, will be scrutinized when the Texas Association of School Boards meets in Austin on Oct. 7-8.

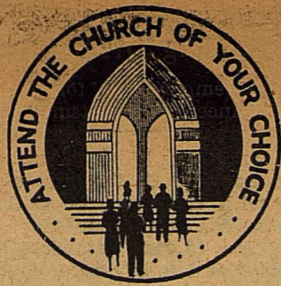

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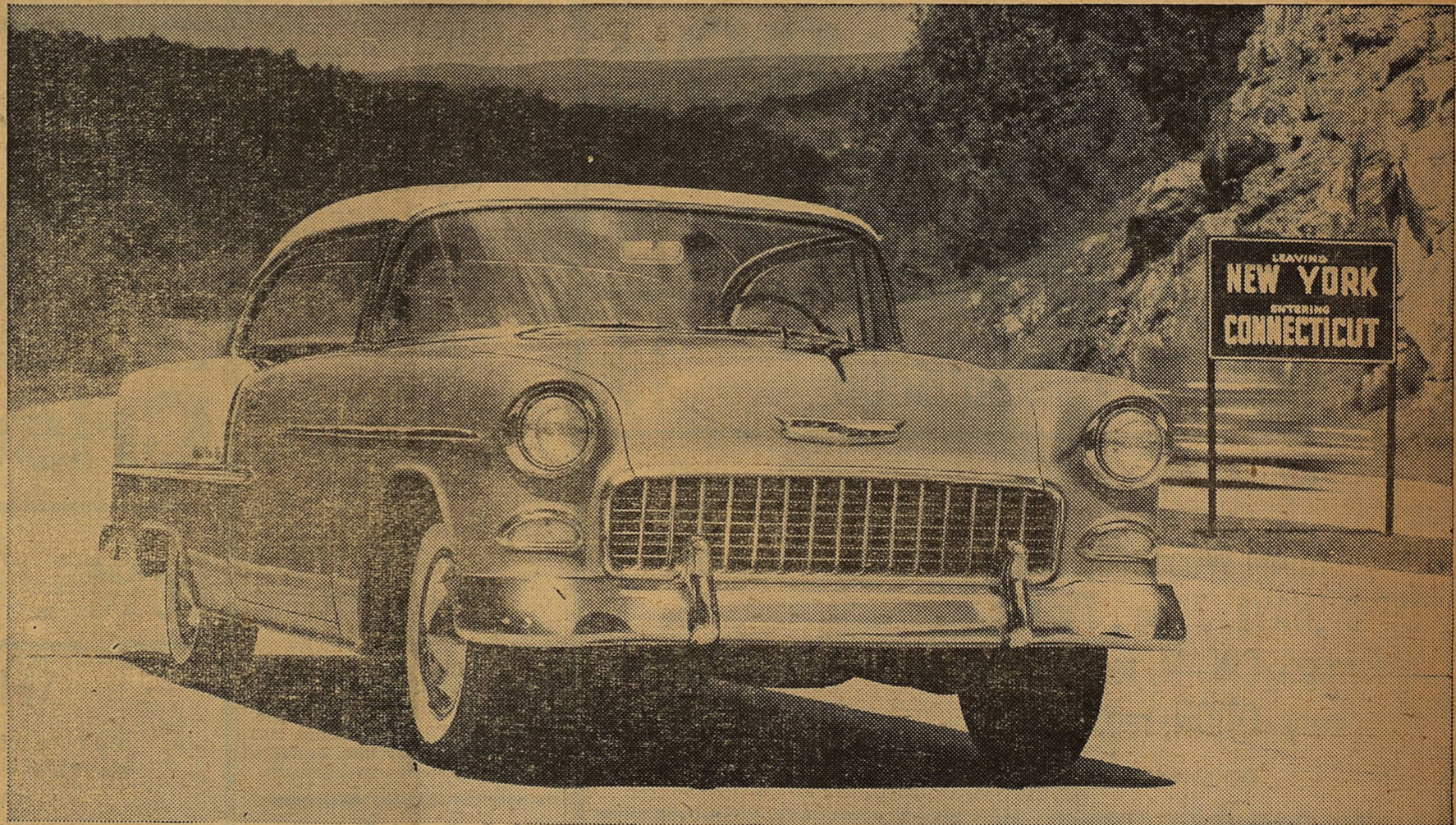
