## County Ranks 3rd In Ag Production

Parmer County is in the top ten counties in Texas agricultural production for 1972, according to recently published statistics, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

Parmer County farmers placed seventh in cash receipts of \$27,030,000 for crops and third in total crops and livestock with \$81,368,000. Including government payments, Parmer ranked third in the state. Farmers and ranchers received a total of \$95,317,000. Cash receipts from livestock also placed Parmer as the third highest in the state with \$81,368,000.

The figures have just been published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, a joint effort of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the USDA, Commissioner White said.

"Even with freezes, rains, and a fluctuating market, Parmer County should enjoy another productive year in 1973. Cash receipts for the first seven months of 1973 show increases over last year," Commissioner White said.

## Second-Half Rally Nets 33-18 Victory

Olton won its half, 12-6.

However, Friona won its half, 27-6, and it all added up to a 33-18 Friona win in a wild District 3-AA opener for the two teams Friday night at Olton.

Ted King sparked a second half rally with three TDs to go with his first-half score, as Friona roared back from the brink of disaster to win the game going away.

The first half was "give-away night" AS THE Chieftains gave Olton the ball five times on fumbles.

Olton took advantage for a quick 12-0 lead that could have been a lot larger except for a couple of breaks for Friona.

Friona recovered the first fumble, and King raced to the Olton 10. However, Dale

Parsons fumbled on the next play, and this set the tone of the first half for Friona.

Recovering an FHS fumble at the Friona 23, Olton took the lead with 13 seconds left in the opening period, 6-0 as Joe Alcorta ran 15 yards.

An errant pitchout on Friona's next offensive play gave the ball right back, and Olton scored in three plays to make it 12-0. The dazed Chieftains proceeded to lose their fourth and fifth fumbles, and only a miracle kept the score from mounting against them.

One of the miracles was a 15-yard penalty against the Mustangs, which called back an apparent third Alcorta TD run, and Ted King intercepted a pass a moment later to start

things in the right direction for Friona.

On the second play, King scampered 72 yards to paydirt with only 40 seconds left in the half, and Friona had trimmed the lead in half, 12-6. Officials called Davy Carthel's point kick wide.

The Chieftains came out the second half determined to do better—and they did.

For a change, Friona got a fumble, at the Olton nine. Clay Bandy punched it across on third down from the one, to tie the score. A low snap on the PAT kick hampered this try.

But Friona wasn't through with its form-reversal plans.

Dee King intercepted an Olton pass at midfield, and was finally forced out of bounds at the Olton 22. Four plays later, brother Ted circled right end for 14 yards and a touchdown. This time the kick was true, and Friona had a 19-12 lead and more important, the momentum.

Olton blocked a Friona punt toward the end of the quarter, but the determined Chieftain defense stopped a first and goal drive and turned the ball over.

Friona got into the punt-blocking business, and Dee

King grabbed the ball and headed goalward.

Dee was stopped at the 10, but the fired-up Chieftains punched it across in two plays. Ted King ran nine yards and then slammed across, and Carthel's kick gave Friona a 26-12 lead.

Olton had one last fling, as one of their passes clicked for a change. A screen pass gained to the Friona 10, and the Mustangs got across on third down to narrow the lead to 26-18. Olton's third try for two points failed.

The Mustangs tried inside kicks every time they kicked off, but could never get the ball.

Friona took their last one, and turned Carthel loose through the line for four good gains, the last going to Olton's 13.

Although hampered by leg cramps (who wouldn't be after gaining 180 yards rushing), King held up for one more score. Carthel added the frosting for the final margin of 33-18.

The win gave Friona a 4-3 season mark, but more important, 1-0 in district.

## Bank Announces Xmas Promotion

Friona State Bank is offering to the first 100 young people who request it, a free kit that will let them design their own Christmas plate.

President Robert Neelley stated that after all plates are manufactured and returned to the bank that they will be displayed in the lobby and judged by local art teachers with ribbons being awarded in four age categories, plus a Sweepstakes award for the best overall plate design.

There will be a first, second and third place ribbon for those entering in the age groups of seven years and under, eight through ten, eleven through fourteen and fifteen years and up.

The Sweepstakes award will be a trophy plus a fifty dollar savings account. After the plates are displayed and prizes awarded they will be returned to the person who designed them.

## Salvation Army Gets Money From U. Fund

[Editor's note—The Friona Area United Fund Drive kicked off on Tuesday of this week. Following is the third in a series of articles dealing with the agencies which benefit from the fund drive.]

Most of the funds distributed by the Friona Salvation Army Service Unit are spent on children and young people, according to Jake Outland, chairman of the Service Unit Committee.

"Many people retain the mistaken image of The Salvation Army as a free-meal-stop for alcoholics and drifters. And the Army does, in fact, help any human being in need. But the real thrust of our services is directed toward families and particularly the children in these families," Outland said.

"When the head of a family comes to us—and she's often the mother raising a family alone—it is the welfare of the children that most concerns us. The kids may need shoes, school supplies, clothes, or there may be some minor medical bills that we were asked to help pay."

The Friona Service Unit Committee, a charter member agency of the United Fund is composed of volunteers who conduct The Salvation Army

welfare program in the absence of full-time uniformed officers. One pet project of Service Unit committees is the sponsoring of a week-long outing for boys at The Salvation Army's Camp Hohlitzelle, near Dallas. Over 850 boys from Service Unit communities enjoyed the camp this summer, two of them from Friona.

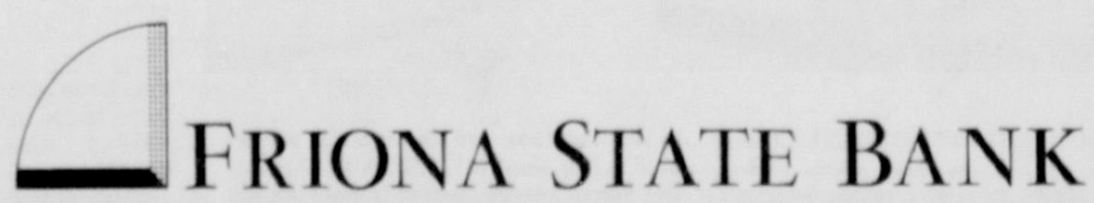

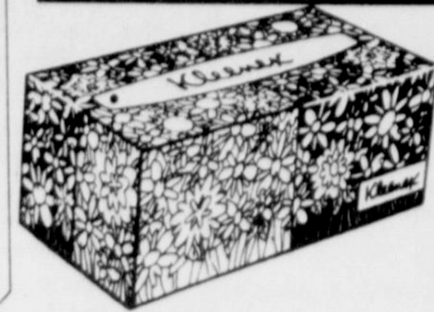

**Amendment Voting Is Underway**

Absentee balloting for nine proposed constitutional amendments got underway Wednesday in the Parmer County Clerk's office at Farwell, according to Bonnie Warren, county clerk.

Mrs. Warren said persons wishing to vote absentee may pick up a ballot in person during office hours 8:30-5 p.m. or the ballots can be mailed out, if necessary.

Final date to vote absentee will be Friday, November 2 and the election date is set for Tuesday, November 6.

I HAPPENED TO BE in a meeting the other day when the speaker made a rather disturbing statement.

What really disturbed me, I think, was the date of the year that he called the dividing line.

It seems that everyone born before that date had the tendency to see things a little different from those born the year after.

My concern came with the fact that the dividing year was the year I was born...I didn't know which way to fall.

That just might be the reason that I am so often frustrated with how I feel about something or how I relate to things...I was born on the dividing line.

Now the speaker did assure us that a year really couldn't be picked like that and that everyone before would think one way and those after, another. He just said the tendency was that it would be that way and a year did have to be given, so he gave one.

An interesting example he gave was this--A man in a cafe ordered a cup of coffee and two donuts. When he reached the second donut he decided he didn't want it, so he turned around and addressed the several people in the cafe with this question--"I have a donut here that I've already paid for and I don't want it and I wonder if anyone here would like to have it?" No one took him up on the offer. He stated, "Well, I hate to let it waste," so he wrapped it in a napkin and took it with him.

Now the question was, on which side of the dividing line was he born and how those who were present in the cafe?

Those born before 1928 would probably have taken him up on the offer. He was born prior to 1928 to have even thought of making such an offer. Those born after that year probably would have acted as the group in the cafe, who probably were born after that date...Ver-r-y in-ter-est-ing!

He went on to say that thought concerning ideals about family life, raising children, economics, life styles, etc., all to some degree, are approached by each of us according to our age or date of birth...before or after that dividing line...v-e-r-r-y in-ter-est-ing...

Again, he hastened to say this is not always true. We have a lot of older people who are young at heart--we have a lot of young people who are old in their way of thinking...and there is certainly nothing to this idea presented above as to its being okay or not to accept the donut. That is just the way it is.

In a community where we have all age groups it can be understood why there are differences of opinions and how different problems should be settled or what path to follow...

It might be well for each of us to really review our approach to life--I just don't see any other way around it--do the best you can with what you have.

In our social life, clubs, community life, local politics and on up, the church, any place that we might be a part of with different age groups, we should certainly be conscious of the difference and seek to settle the concerns with understanding and concern for the other person.

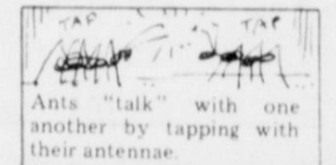
You see! You never know but what something worthwhile will be said in this article...maybe some day it will.

## 20 Accidents

### In Parmer Co.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 20 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of September, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1973 shows a total of 104 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 51 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1973 shows a total of 601 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 364 persons injured as compared to September, 1972 with 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 335 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, three more fatalities, and 29 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Five each in Hardeman and Montague Counties; two each in Palo Pinto, and Gray Counties; and one each in Cochran, Floyd, Hale, Knox, Parker, Wise, Armstrong, Hansford, Ochiltree and Potter Counties.

# Tough Wildcats Visit "Reservation" Friday

## Chili Feed Set Friday

The Junior class of Friona High School will host a chili and stew supper Friday, October 26, prior to the Friona-Littlefield football game. Serving will be from 5 p.m. until 7 p.m. at Friona High School Cafeteria. The menu will consist of chili, stew, pie, coffee and tea. Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children under 12. Pie and coffee will also be served after the game.

Undoubtedly the toughest game of the year looms for Friona's Chieftains on Friday, when the Littlefield Wildcats visit Chieftain Field.

Game time for the first home conference game is 7:30 p.m., the new starting time for the remainder of the 1973 games.

The state-ranked Wildcats will be favored, based on their 5-2 season record, their size and the returning experience boosted by the 1973 Littlefield team.

Littlefield has seven offensive and five defensive starters back from the team that edged Friona, 21-14 in last year's big "shootout."

If comparative scores mean anything, the Wildcats should

be big favorites. Littlefield walloped Muleshoe, 53-13 the week after Muleshoe downed Friona, 27-6.

The Wildcats opened their season with a 62-0 romp over Silverton. In their second game, Littlefield lost a 34-28 verdict to rival Levelland, but then bounced back for a 53-14 win over Slaton.

After disposing of Muleshoe in a lopsided game, Littlefield lost in its fifth outing, 7-6 to Floydada, in a controversial game in which Littlefield was

The 'Cats topped Dimmitt in a slugfest Friday, 18-15. The two were pre-season picks to battle for the loop title.

## Fuel, Fertilizer May Be Short In 1974

Farmers may find it just as difficult to obtain fertilizers and fuel during the coming year, according to Dr. Michael Sprott, economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The tight supply-demand balance of certain nitrogen and phosphate fertilizers is the result of several factors. First is the release of 62 million acres that were set-aside in 1972.

Another important influence is the strong foreign demand for fertilizer, making export prices much higher than domestic ceiling prices.

Devaluation of the dollar has further aggravated the situation, continues Sprott. Like other items in world trade, fertilizer prices currently may be discounted by as much as 20 percent where the price is quoted in dollars but payment

is made in currencies whose values have risen in relation to the dollar.

The shortage of phosphate fertilizers should soon be eased by expansion of phosphoric acid production, but the outlook of nitrogen fertilizers is far less promising. The supply of ammonia, the source of most nitrogen fertilizers, depends on the availability of natural gas, its feedstock. With each natural gas curtailment faced by the ammonia producers meaning reduced production, the supply of nitrogen fertilizers could fall one million tons short of world demand in 1973-74, says the Texas A&M University System economist.

Farmers experienced a tight fuel situation during spring planting this year and expect a similar situation this fall. Although the diesel supply for fall appears adequate, gasoline stocks are low, notes Sprott.

For next spring, the gasoline and diesel situations appear mildly optimistic. Although farmers will be permitted to plant more acres, more fuel is being imported and allocated to distributors servicing farm accounts.

The big fuel concern is over the short supply of LP gas, says Sprott. A cold, wet fall and a harsh, early winter could keep farmers from obtaining enough propane for crop drying.

The Economic Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, aided by energy staffs in many states, is emphasizing farmers' fuel needs to the Department of Interior, where the nation's petroleum fuel policies are made. The policy makers understand the peculiar seasonal needs of farmers and are committed to providing them with sufficient fuel in a timely manner to prevent crop losses, notes Sprott.

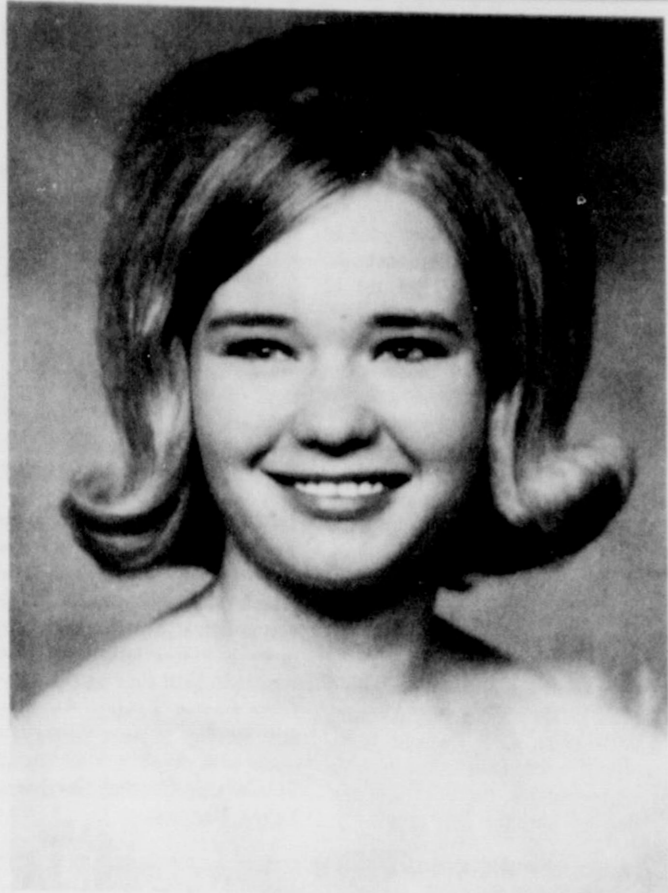

Johanna Gast Anderton, noted author of reference books on dolls and acknowledged authority on antique and modern dolls, will be at the fair to autograph her books.

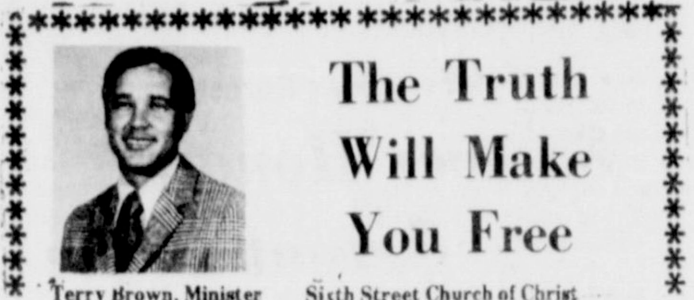
Mrs. Anderton is combining her visit to the fair with a photographing trip and is seeking interesting and rare dolls for upcoming books.

When Paul describes the church in several places in the New Testament, he compares it to a human body. One indispensable part of any body is its head.

The church that Paul describes has a head--Jesus Christ. "He has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all." [Eph. 1:22-23]. "He is the head of the body, the church" [Col. 1:18]. "Holding fast to the Head, from whom the whole body, nourished and knit together through its joints and ligaments, grows with a growth that is from God" [Col. 2:19].

As the head of the church, Jesus is the sole authority for the church. Jesus told his disciples just before his ascension, that all authority in heaven and on earth had been given to him [Matt. 28:18-20]. His disciples were to teach to the world what he had taught them. 


# City Leaders Busy With Varied Items On Agenda

New city ordinances were main items of discussion Monday night when the Friona City Council met at the city hall.

Ordinance No. 479 was approved to allow Pioneer Natural Gas to give monthly adjustments of gas rates. However, in order to not leave the ordinance open ended, a portion of the ordinance as read and approved, would have the ordinance to be in effect until September 30, 1978, at which time the ordinance will revert to Ordinance No. 447 as temporarily replaced by No. 479.

was also read and approved on emergency measures following brief discussion.

City Manager A.L. Outland told council members of hazards created by persons trying to get on and off the highway in new business areas opened during the past four

months on West Highway 60.

The State Highway Department conducted a survey and agreed to lower speed limits on Highway 60 through Friona and speeds have been reduced from the Parmer House Restaurant to the east city limits in five to ten mile degrees according to

critical traffic areas.

New speed limit signs will be posted and fines from \$10 to \$100 will be charged for violations once the signs are posted.

Another ordinance read was Ordinance No. 481 which would limit the Friona Volunteer Fire Department to fires within the city limits of Friona and a one-half mile radius around the city. Full details of the proposed ordinance are in a separate story elsewhere on this page.

Ordinance No. 481 will not be finally passed until it has been read three times and published in all three county newspapers.

In other reports, a brief discussion was held on the possible sanitary landfill site for the city, with no final decision being reached as tentative plans to purchase 40 acres east of the water treatment plant have reached a stalemate with the present owners. Richard Collard, city attorney, said negotiations are being conducted at this time with the two out of town owners of the property.

City Manager Outland reported a continued and

increasing problem collecting water bills each month and a decision was made to automatically disconnect all water connections where there is an unpaid bill on the 15th of the month following billing.

Chief of Police H.R. Denney said there is an upswing of disturbance calls in Friona, and added, "they are mostly domestic and seemed to be caused from a little bit too much booze."

He was questioned by Mayor R.L. Fleming as to the status of parking problems at the elementary school and said his department is working on the problem. The Mayor said he was tired of getting telephone calls from persons who say their driveways are blocked or they cannot move down the streets in the afternoon. No immediate solution was proposed.

Reports were also given on the progress of the paving project on several city streets, and an update on revenue sharing proceeds was given by the city manager.

He also said the City Police Department had gone over the budget, but Chief Denney

explained that about the time the fiscal year began, he had a complete turnover of personnel, with new patrolmen starting at \$500 per month.

Chief Denney also explained the cemetery damage, as reported in the Star last week, had not been reported to him and said "I didn't know anything about it until I read it

in the paper."

Councilman Alexander added, "As a hunter, I object that hunters may have shot out the pictures in the headstones at the cemetery."

Fire Chief Ralph Shirley said the roof at the new fire department still leaked in two places during the Thursday and Friday rain, with wet ceilings

being noted in the locker room and the fire truck garage.

The city manager also told council members about the annual Fall Meeting of the Texas Municipal League scheduled to be held in San Antonio for Mayors and Aldermen. Following a discussion, Outland was designated to represent the city at the meeting.

## Dan Smith Chosen District Director

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District held an election last Tuesday. This year's election was for a director from zone 5, which is the Lazbuddie School District. All land owners and wives were eligible to vote. The election was at the Lazbuddie elevator at 9 o'clock.

Dan Smith was elected as district director from this zone.

He will serve a 5 year term. He will become active in his support of the Running Water Draw Watershed. He will see the dam at Bovina built and all probability he will see the Lazbuddie dam constructed.

He will become involved in the conservation activities of

Parmer County.

Dan's first meeting with the board of directors will be November 6th.

## Census Bureau Surveys Area School Attendance

A sample of households in this area will take part in the Federal Government's annual survey of school enrollment to be taken the week of October 15-19 by the Bureau of the Census, part of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Dallas, said that interviewers will visit homes to obtain information about household members attending school, from nursery school through college, including those taking vocational, technical, or business courses.

Results of the October 1972 survey showed that 60.1 million persons 3 to 34 years old were

in school. Elementary school enrollment (kindergarten through eighth grade) had declined by about 1.4 million since the fall of 1971 because of a decline in the number of births during the 1960's. Although college enrollment had increased considerably in the years since 1962, a lower proportion of college-age men were in college than during the late 1960's, while the college enrollment rate for women has remained about the same since the late 1960's.

School enrollment questions will be in addition to the ones asked regularly in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted nationwide by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor.

The survey provides a continuing measure of conditions in the labor force. The August survey found the Nation's employment situation little changed from July. The unemployment rate, at 4.8 percent, was essentially the same as in June and July but was substantially below the 5.6 percent of a year earlier. After elimination of seasonal fluctuations, total employment in August remained at 84.4 million, about the same as in the preceding two months.

About 50,000 households across the country, scientifically selected to represent a cross section of American households, take part in this monthly survey. All information provided the Bureau is confidential by law and can be published only as statistical totals in which no individual or household can be identified.

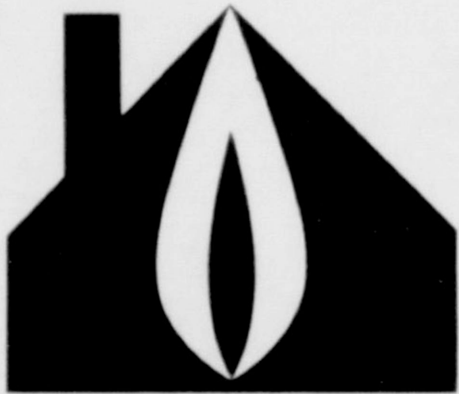
