### Cancer Drive To Be Conducted Here

A common sense approach to the American Cancer Society's "check-up" slogan in its 1956 drive for \$750,000 in Cross Plains was urged today by Mrs. Anna Mae McNeel, local chairman.

That slogan, "Fight cancer with a checkup and a check," is being sounded throughout Cross Plains by ACS volunteers. The drive began on April 2.

"Checkup, I hope, will become a household word in this community as a result of our educational and fund-raising crusade," Mrs. McNeel declared. "It is highly important that we put the accent on the positive in protecting health."

"The body is like the proverbial iceberg, in that the great bulk of what constitutes potentially serious illness lies beneath the surface, invisible to the untrained eye."

"What a regular physical examination does is to give the doctor a chance to nip a possibly troublesome condition in the bud. The value of the checkup is expressed in countless old sayings: a stitch in time; and an ounce of prevention; he who hesitates, and so forth."

The ACS campaign chairman of good health as our most precious possession.

"Those who enjoy good health naturally want it to stay good," she declared. "We all will be better off if we think of our physicians as guardians of health as well as healers of the sick. The periodic health examination is a sound investment in good living."

"When you go for a checkup, you are not only taking out insurance against cancer. At the same time you are putting a richly justified premium on health."

The drive here is part of the American Cancer Society's nationwide campaign in which it seeks a total of \$26,000,000 to carry on its unceasing fight to reduce cancer deaths through programs of medical research and public and professional education.

### Help Build A Better Community By Trading At Home

W. D. Smith, owner and operator of the Goodyear Home & Auto Store here, defeated S. F. (Pos) Bond for mayor in the annual city election held here Tuesday. Smith received 163 votes and Bond tallied 99, with a total of 261 votes cast, making it one of the biggest elections held here in recent years.

### New Cotton Seed Insecticide



Insect damage is apparent in untreated plant at left; seedlings for plant at right were treated with new Thimet insecticide to assure healthy growth.

A new insecticide, which if applied to cotton seeds produce plants that kill early season insects, has been accepted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and is now being produced commercially.

This new insecticide with "built-in" protection—Thimet, developed by American Cyanamid Company—is applied to the seed before planting. It is systemic—a chemical that finds its way into the growing plant and is carried in the sap stream in large enough quantities to kill insects feeding on the plant. This is the first systemic insecticide applied to seeds which has satisfactorily controlled insects on the growing plants.

In addition to replacing early-season spraying or dusting, Thimet eliminates uncertainties about proper timing in applying insecticides. This new "built-in" insecticide can insure cotton seedlings freedom from insect damage for up to 7 weeks without a single spraying or dusting. Cyanamid is now conducting experiments to lengthen protection time and to combat damage of the boll weevil and boll worm.

Commercial distribution to seed treaters is now confined to Texas and Mississippi, but will be extended to other cotton-growing areas in the United States and abroad in time for next year's planting.

Widespread field demonstrations of the new insecticide will be held under the direction of local county agricultural agents in southern cotton areas. Tests will also be continued on Thimet treatment using both seed and direct spray methods. Promising results have been achieved with corn, peas, beans, lettuce, peanuts, potatoes, tree fruit and tobacco seedlings.

### TEXAS IN REVIEW

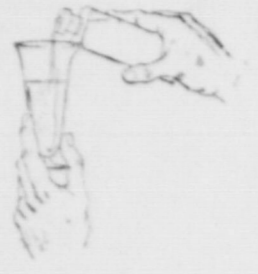
Appaloosa horses will be featured next week on The Humble Company's TV program Texas in Review. Once used for war, racing and buffalo hunting, the Appaloosa is now used for hauling stock, pleasure riding and in parades. There are only about 100 registered Appaloosa horses in Texas.

No two Appaloosa are colored alike but have a white ring around the eyes, parti-colored skin and parti-colored hoofs. Horses of this rare color scheme can be tracked back to 500 B. C. They were probably brought into this country by the Nez Perce Indians who got them from the Spanish in Mexico about 1730.

Another interesting feature will show work being done at the Graham Hoeme Plow Company at Amarillo. The Graham plow is known throughout the world and is designed to break through subsoil crust so that water will go deeper into the soil. It is known as the world's largest plow coming in widths up to 45 feet.

# INCOME TAX FACTS No. 5 Tax Benefits Ease Pain of Sickness

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.)

Nobody likes to be sick. But if there was sickness in your family during 1955, you may have some compensation tax-wise.

First there is the question of "sick pay." If you were absent from work due to injury or sickness and received payments from your employer (either sick benefits or regular pay) or his insurance company, these payments, within limits, are free of tax.

There are two limitations: First, the maximum amount is \$100 per week, plus any amounts which came from your own contributions to the plan.

Second, unless the absence was for sickness during which you were hospitalized at least one day, or for an injury, the payments are not tax free until after the first 7 calendar days of absence.

If these payments are included in the wages shown on your withholding slips, you should subtract the proper amount from your income in the place provided on the first page of the tax return (Form 1040). Attach an explanation as described in the instructions. You are entitled to exclude this amount even if you do not itemize your deductions.

Apart from sick pay, you may have received payments covering medical expenses for yourself and your dependents. Don't include these in your income, but don't deduct the medical expenses covered by these payments either.

Medical Deductions: If you itemize your deductions, you may be able to save tax money by listing medical and dental expenses you paid for yourself and your dependents.

This year you list your medical and dental expenses on a separate sheet, rather than on the form itself. Space is provided on the form for figuring the amount that is allowable as a deduction.

You are allowed a deduction for your medical expenses beyond 3% of your adjusted gross income. If you (or your husband or wife) were 65 or over at the end of the year, the 3% rule does not apply to your own medical expenses. It does apply to any medical expenses you pay for your dependents.

Your deduction is limited to a maximum amount for the year, as explained in the instructions. Medicines and drugs may be included in your medical expenses only to the extent they exceed 1% of your gross income.

Among the items to include in your list of medical expenses are fees of doctors, dentists, hospitals and nurses. List premiums for Blue Cross and other health, accident or hospitalization insurance, but remember you cannot deduct medical expenses paid or reimbursed by insurance.

Widows and Widowers: There are several provisions of special interest to widows and widowers: 1. You may file a joint return with a husband or wife who died during the tax year if no separate return is filed.

2. If you have not remarried and have in your household a dependent child or stepchild, you are entitled for the next two years to use the same tax computation (with income-splitting) as you would have been entitled to on a joint return.

3. When life insurance proceeds are taken as an annuity or in installments, widows and widowers are allowed \$1,000 per year of tax-free payments in addition to the principal.

4. You may be entitled to retirement income credit if your deceased husband or wife would have qualified.

5. You may be entitled to a deduction for child care expenses. The instructions that come with your tax forms give further information. Help is also available from the Internal Revenue Service, which urges you to consult a properly qualified advisor if you need outside assistance.

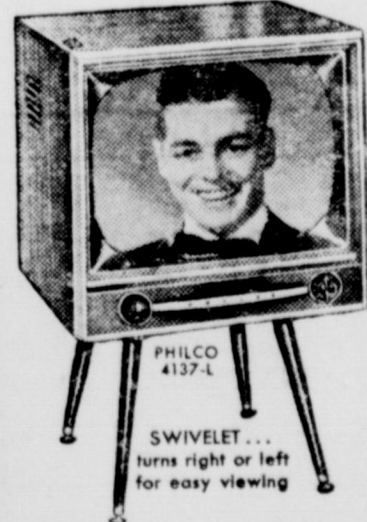

### Change in Commercial Beef Grade Announced By USDA

Effective June 1, 1956, the commercial grade of beef will be divided into two new grades designated as Standard and Commercial.

The Standard grade will be applied to beef from younger animals while the name Commercial will be retained by beef from mature animals falling in the present Commercial grade. The present grades of beef are Prime, Choice, Good, Commercial, Utility, Cutter and Canner.

According to the USDA announcement the revision was originally recommended by the Cattle and Beef Industry Committee. Comments from individuals and organizations favored the change. It was the opinion of the Committee that it is impractical to merchandise, under the same grade designation, beef from young animals which may qualify for the Commercial grade with only a small quantity of fat together with beef from much older animals which is required to have a much greater degree of fatness. Also in some parts of the country where substantial portions of the younger type of Commercial beef are produced and consumed, it is believed that some of this type of beef is not now being federally graded because of prejudice against the name "Commercial" which has come to be associated with beef from older animals.

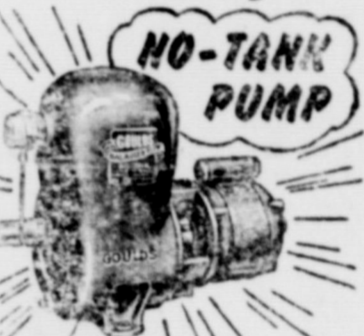
It was the Committee's opinion the change in grades would lead to a greater proportion of the younger beef being federally graded and this would result in increasing the marketing efficiency for meat of this grade and be beneficial to both producer and consumer.

### Washington

"As It Looks From Here"

Washington, D.C.—A Committee of the House of Representatives ... recently reported that the United States Government owned property around the world valued at \$206 billion. Ordinarily, we conclude that if an individual or a corporation can balance its books, it is solvent. Counting this \$206 billion in property, the Federal Government could easily balance its assets against the public debt. This, of course, is only theoretical.

Even supposing the Government could theoretically liquidate its holdings, its values are somewhat in question.

The House Administration Committee, on which I have the honor to serve as Chairman, is trying its best to reduce the tremendous printing bill which the government incurs each year. The printing bill of the United States has been running near \$250 million annually. There are 18 million different government forms in use. It has been found that literally thousands have become obsolete, and some were out of date immediately after they were printed. Every time the Congress passes a new law, or the President issues an Executive order, there follows hundreds of forms related to it.

A form for a veteran may want to know whether his wife is left-handed or right, and then it is decided the information is not sufficient and another form is produced.

In addition to all these forms which are many times harassing to businessmen and others there are thousands of publications stored in numerous places, which are as useless as anything could be. There are books and publications in storage rooms in the bowels of the Capitol that no one knows what they are or how long they have been there. Some of them are stacked so high that no one knows what is behind them, but yet the Government continues to publish more and add to the volume of useless material.

My Committee is trying to determine just what is absolutely useless and dispose of it, and more than that, we still attempt to reduce the production of these useless publications and materials to the minimum. The Government has the largest printing establishment in the world, and it likely will continue, but there is no need for it to spend \$250 million a year for the purpose. It reminds me of the story of the little boy with the magic salt machine. You remember he turned it on, but did not know how to turn it off, and hence the reason for the salt water in the oceans.

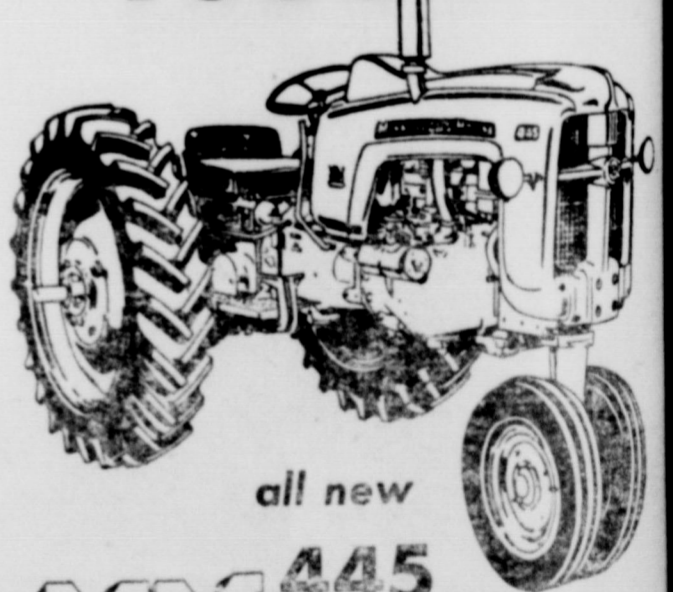

## Ralph Yarborough Announces Candacy



Ralph W. Yarborough of Austin, pledged to "build a structure of morality" in state government, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for governor of Texas.

Yarborough added: "I pledge the people of Texas the restoration of honor, integrity and dignity in their state government."

"To every one of the 683,132 Texans who voted and worked with us in the hard campaign of 1954, I extend my thanks and gratitude. I urge each of you, and all Texans who believe in the triumph of honesty and morality, to join us in this crusade for a new administration in Texas."

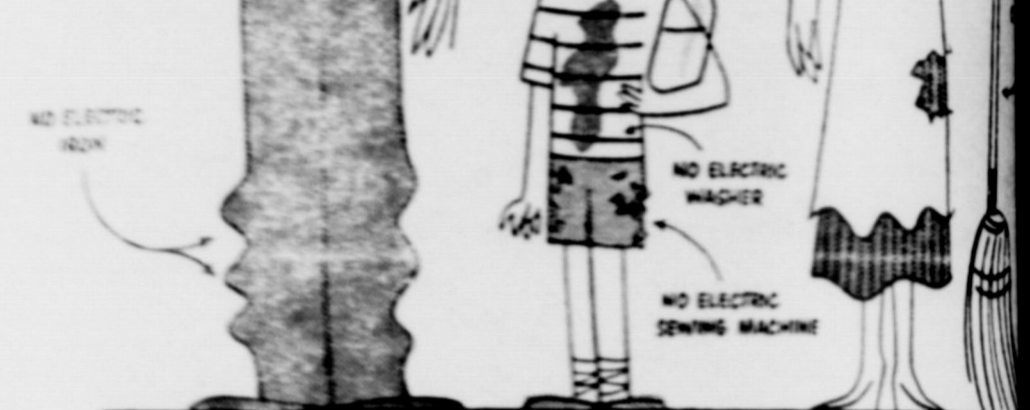

James B. Colt The Late Mrs. Jess Moore

From Abilene Reporter-News "Grandchildren of the man who actually built the Texas and Pacific Railroad through Abilene happened, 70 years later, to move back into the area he pioneered.

History began to go in circles when the late Mrs. Jess Moore moved with her husband to Cross Plains in 1850. Then, in 1954, they opened the Elmwood Pastry Co. here in Abilene. Mrs. Moore, who was killed in a wreck on Highway 36 between Abilene and Cross Plains last April, was a granddaughter of James B. Colt. Another granddaughter is Mrs. Louise Aderholt who lived in Cross Plains since 1954.

James B. Colt, a nephew of the man whose name was attached to the famous pistol, was one of the 19 contractors who actually built the T&P from Weatherford, through Abilene and on to Sierra Blanca.

Colt was a New Yorker who did his first construction work on the Erie Canal. He went to Iowa and into the sheep business during the Civil War, but a blizzard killed all his sheep and he moved, broke, to Clinton, Mo. He freighted for a while, then got into railroad construction work on early day lines that are now a part of the MK&T system.

**Four Sons** He had four sons. Morris and Will A. Colt, two of the boys, joined their father in the J. B. Colt & Sons construction firm. John, a third son, became a sheep rancher and is the father of John Widmeyer Colt, one of the editors of the Kansas City Star. Edwin, the youngest of the sons, became the father of Mrs. Moore, Mrs. Aderholt and Edwin Jr., a Wynnewood, Okla., civil engineer.

When Jay Gould started pushing the T&P tracks west from Weatherford, the Colt firm was one hired to do the work. Moore says he remembers Will Colt relating that their crew worked on the part of the line through Abilene.

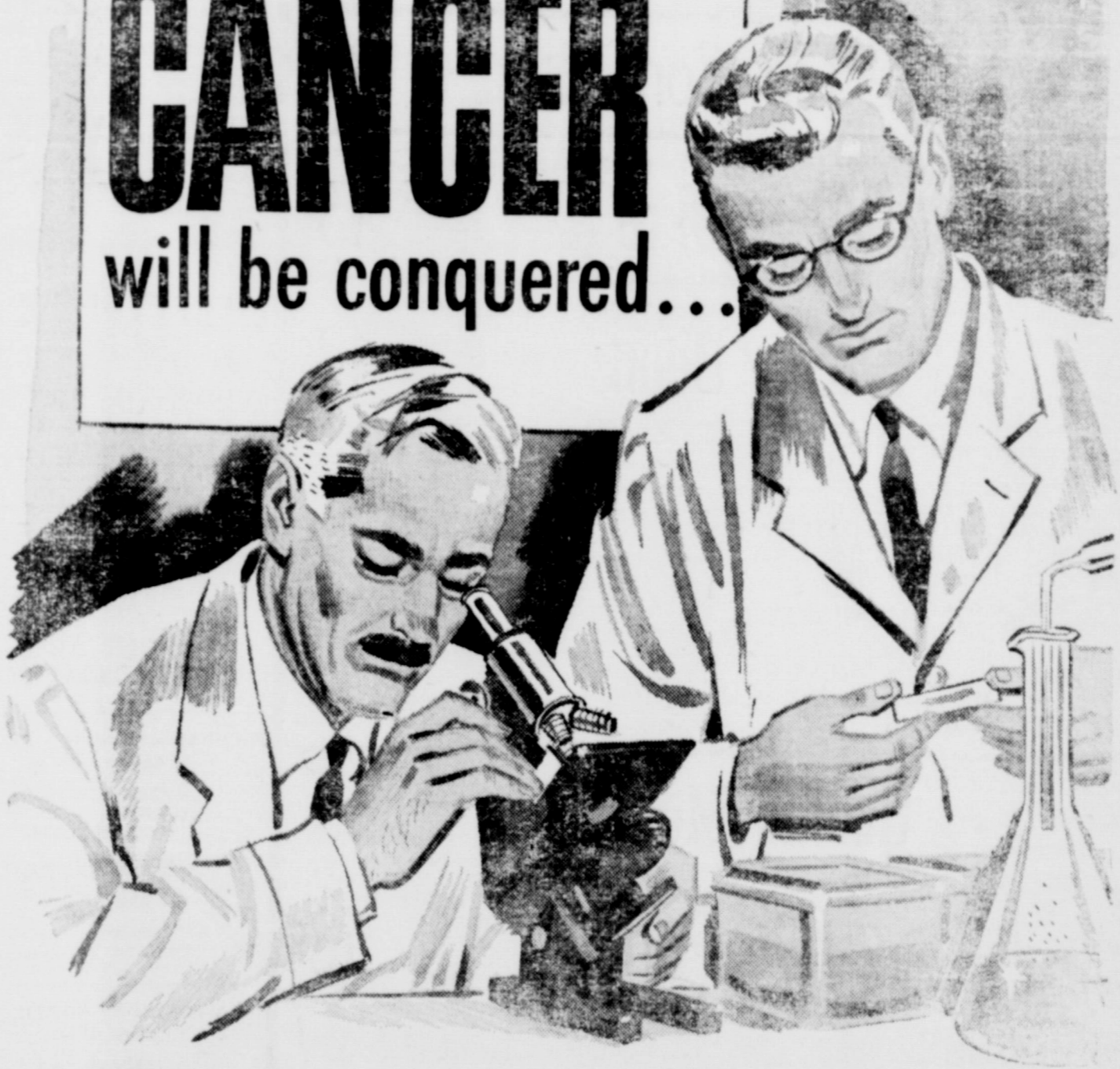
The publication "America's Builders" printed recently a detailed account of the Colt family's work in building railroads, canals and highways. Particular attention was given to the T&P chapter.

"Only cactus and mesquite flourished in the country through which they built," the publication said, "and it was thinly populated except for hostile Indian tribes, prairie dog 'towns' and coyotes. Outside of Tarrant and El Paso counties, there were only 25,758 people in the remaining 12 counties traversed. The local territory could not supply the needs of man or beast and cattle raising was the only industry. Despite all the hardships of migratory life the J. B. Colt family followed the outfit down into Southwest Texas and lived in camp. There worked at grubbing toil with horse and mule power for almost two years and on Jan. 1, 1852, their work was completed on a lonely hillside 90 miles east of El Paso at a junction town called Sierra Blanca.

W. A. Colt followed his father in construction work and became an outstanding builder. One of his jobs was Trail Ridge Road in Estes Park. Edwin was a builder, too, in Colorado until he was crippled and blinded in an accident. He moved his family back to Clinton, Mo. and later to Oklahoma City, where Moore met and married one of the Colt daughters. The wedding was in 1922.

Moore, native of Burnett County, was reared in Cross Plains. He was a pipeline contractor until he
