

## Encounter '72 Begins Here Sunday

### OUTDOORS

#### Area-Wide Crusade Runs Eight Days

It appears that Maize Days for 1972 will have an almost completely "New Look," after actions during the past few days by the Chamber of Commerce.

First, if negotiations are successful this evening with Lionel Strait of Hutchinson, Kansas, we will have a completely new carnival this year.

Dale Cary says the carnival rides are bigger, newer, and that the owners run a nice, clean operation. Youngsters who enjoy the carnival rides apparently will have more to choose from this year.

Secondly, the dates for Maize Days will be later, due to the carnival, coming on the week of September 25-30. In some respects, the later week may prove more desirable. One official remarked that "Maybe we can miss that first cold spell, which has hurt the last couple of celebrations."

Thirdly, the parade day has been changed to Saturday. This may be one of the best moves in recent years. We have had some nice parades, in spite of the longtime Friday schedule. However, we think that outside participation, from high school bands, riding clubs, organizations such as the Khiva Clowns and Motorcyclists, will pick up enough to make it a wise move.

Members of the Clowns, for instance, are working men for the most part, and their main excuse when they have not been able to make the parade, is that they can only miss so much time from work. It makes sense.

And, although the local school has dismissed for the Friday parades, this does not help neighboring bands, who it is assumed, miss enough school time with their regular activities. Maybe we can pull more of them now.

Next week could appropriately be termed "Religious Emphasis Week" in Friona.

For the first time in several years, several churches in Friona, along with churches in Bovina, Lazbuddie and Summerfield, are banding together to sponsor a special evangelistic crusade.

The crusade is to be led by Bo and Dick Baker, a dynamic duo who have become known nationally and internationally because of their evangelistic work.

"The Baker Brothers," as they are better known, will appear in the outdoor crusade, to be held at Chieftain Field beginning Sunday evening at 8:30, and every evening through the following Sunday at the same time.

The Bakers come to Friona from Albany, Georgia, where they participated in an evangelistic crusade.

"I believe we are in for a real blessing in Friona next week," says G.B. (Pete) Buske, who is general chairman of Encounter '72. "I hate for anyone in Friona to miss any of the services, because if they do, they will be missing out on something," Buske adds.

Bo and Dick Baker are well-

known in addition to their evangelistic work for their gospel music compositions. Dick Baker has had over 100 pieces published, and also has done record albums. Bo Baker writes the words to many of his brother's songs. They each play musical instruments, and Dick is an outstanding tenor soloist.

Their most popular number, "Longing For Jesus," has been translated into many foreign languages. The brothers have carried evangelistic crusades into many foreign countries, and as a result, much of their music is known far and wide.

Appearing with the Baker Brothers will be a trio, the Shiloh, made up of two young men and a young woman. One of the youngsters, Dave Baker, is the 22-year-old son of the evangelist.

People attending Encounter '72 are asked to use the regular stadium parking lot, and enter the field by way of the west gate. A speaker's platform will be set up facing the west stands, about midway, or "along the 50-yard line."

Everyone in the community, regardless of race, creed, or religious affiliation, is invited to attend and take part in the services.

### MAIZE DAYS

#### Celebration Dates Changed For Rides

The Chamber of Commerce board of directors, in a special called meeting Monday morning, voted to change the date of Maize Days to September 25-30, with the chance of securing a carnival for that week.

Chamber president Dale Cary said he believed that a working agreement could be made with Lionel Strait, a carnival owner who operated in Tullia last week and Dimmitt this week.

The directors voted to change the date, provided a working agreement could be worked out. Strait is to come to Friona Thursday evening for a meeting with local officials.

The chamber had been searching for a carnival since learning several weeks ago that the company which has operated the carnival here for the past several years, owned by Jack Hoggard, had sold its rides to Mackenzie Park in Lubbock.

Cary and Chamber director Floyd Reeve went to Tullia last Wednesday for a meeting with Strait. Cary reported that Strait's rides are more modern, and there are more of them, than

the carnival that has been here recently.

Cary also reported that the proposed carnival owner would be more than happy to have the local clubs and organizations operate concession stands. Some of the carnivals contacted previously had insisted on having all of the concession business.

In other business involving Maize Days, the board voted to move the annual parade to Saturday, in an effort to draw better participation from bands, riding clubs and other organizations from the area. One of the big drawbacks for outside participation in the parade has always been that it was held on Friday, a school day for students and a workday for workers.

The board also passed a motion regarding the queen's contest, limiting the number of entries to 25 girls. Last year there were 30 entries in the contest, and those in charge of the contest complained that it crowded them to finish the preliminaries with that many in the

#### Weekend Outing Ends Tragically

Durward Looper, sixteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jackie Looper, is a patient in the intensive care unit of Northwest Texas Hospital, Amarillo, where his condition is reported to be extremely critical.

Looper received head and shoulder injuries in a boating accident at Ute Lake near Logan, New Mexico, late Sunday. He was taken to Trigg Memorial Hospital, Tucumcari, then transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital, where he underwent brain surgery.

At the time of the accident James Ray Stevick was driving a 14 foot speed boat which had been towing Looper while he was water skiing. New Mexico State Parks Patrol officials came upon the accident almost immediately and reported that the boat had turned to pick Looper up and ran over him.

### LIGHT IN CITY

#### Some Good Rain Received In Area

Some nice rainfall has fallen in the Friona area during the past week, with scattered reports of crop damage, but mostly just good moisture.

To the west and south of town, as much as two inches was received Monday night. The official measurement in the City of Friona that night was .39 inch, but it was much heavier as you went outside town, especially to the south and west.

The moisture was lighter to the north and east, apparently. As of press time Wednesday, a light sprinkle was falling, but only .05 inch had been measured by 8 a.m. Wednesday. It still looked like more rain was possible.

Last Wednesday afternoon, a thunderstorm with hail raked the northern and western part of the county in a strip from Rhea toward the Harrison Highway. Considerable damage was reported to crops on the Jim Dixon and Billy Wayne Sisson farms, with Dixon's cotton

bearing the brunt of the damage at his place.

#### Clovis Chamber Survey Might Lead To Plant

One of the nation's three largest garment manufacturers is considering establishing a man-

ufacturing plant in Clovis, with the final decision resting partially on the results of a labor survey in the Clovis area.

Parmer County is included in the area in which the labor survey will be conducted. Questionnaires will be available in this newspaper and from employment commission offices in Muleshoe, Bovina and Clovis survey area.

After the questionnaires are filled out, they should be mailed to the Clovis Chamber of Commerce, Drawer C, Clovis, N.M. 88101. Chamber officials emphasize the need for immediate response. The survey will end July 23.

The plant proposed for Clovis will initially employ approximately 300 people, with 90 per cent of that number being women. The vast majority will work as sewing machine operators.

Virtually all the workers employed by the plant will be hired from the area in a 30 to 40 mile radius around Clovis.

Past experience for this type of work is not necessary. The manufacturing company will have complete training facilities for the work force at the Clovis plant.

The Clovis Chamber and the chamber's industrial commission are directing the labor survey.

#### Three Teachers Hired; Friona Staff Complete

Approval of contracts of three classroom teachers at the Friday evening meeting of the board of trustees of Friona Independent School District completed the slate of teachers for the 1972-73 school term.

Edward Corn of Bovina will be teaching industrial arts. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Corn of Bovina and is a graduate of Bovina High School and West Texas State University, Canyon.

Paul Ross will be teaching in the high school science department.

Mrs. James V. Edelman, who has been living in Friona several years but has not been teaching, has been employed to replace Mrs. Tex Barnes as a first grade teacher. Mrs. Barnes recently moved to Missouri.

Two new librarians have also been employed. Mrs. Bob Owen will be the high school librarian and Mrs. Jim Johnston will serve in the same capacity in the elementary and junior high schools.

The 1972-73 budget was tentatively approved in the amount of \$1,147,771. This is about \$35,000 over the 1971-72 budget, which was \$1,113,636. Most of the increase is reflected in increase in salaries of teachers.

One of the two buses, which were ordered earlier, has been delivered. It has a carrying capacity of 60 passengers. The other, a 66 passenger, is expected to arrive in the near future.

A contract was awarded to Sain Fence Company of Clovis for installation of a chain link retainer fence from Euclid to Cleveland on the north side of the junior high building.

The gate in the southeast corner of the football field, which is directly north of the school will

be permanently closed and a new gate will be installed in the center of the block. The retainer fence will be centered with a gate and the school crossing will be moved from Euclid Avenue to the middle of the block.

The board of trustees voted officially to give title to Block (Continued on page 14)

# Capital Punishment Ruled Out; Law Has Almost Abolished Sin

The Supreme Court has ruled out the death penalty. After 200 years, it was discovered to be "cruel and unusual punishment" forbidden by the Eighth Amendment. Next, we will be closing our jails for it is cruel to confine a man in prison. It takes away his liberty.

We have become wiser than God. He has inflicted death, sometimes by cruel and unusual means, upon countless violators. He even commanded that one man be stoned for gathering firewood on the Sabbath. Many died of plagues. The earth swallowed some.

God's law defined numerous cases where capital punishment should be administered. As a process of law, violators were to be avenged eye for eye, tooth for tooth, and life for life. This was the same law that placed love of neighbor as one's self as the second greatest commandment.

God sent Israel's armies into battle. Great men like Moses, Joshua, David, and Elisha served in carrying out punishments by death. Paul tells us that the civil government bears not the sword in vain. But now these holy men are branded as immoral by our Supreme Court!

Though he delighted in cruel and unusual execution of innocent people, not even Charles Manson can be executed. This ruling makes the land less safe for the upright citizen by giving protection to the guilty. Protection gives license.

This is just one more evidence of disdain for authority. Without penalty, law becomes void.

Such a deceptive humanitarian concept has extended into the spiritual realm. Few persons are admitted to be sinners any more. And what if they are: God is too good to punish them. There is no death penalty. Hell is abolished.

Man has become "too good" for Christianity with its concept of law, authority, sin, and punishment. — But can man change God's truth? — (Cecil Hook)

Dr. Rex F. Johnston, former Friona teacher, has been elected as president of San Angelo Junior College, it has been reported.

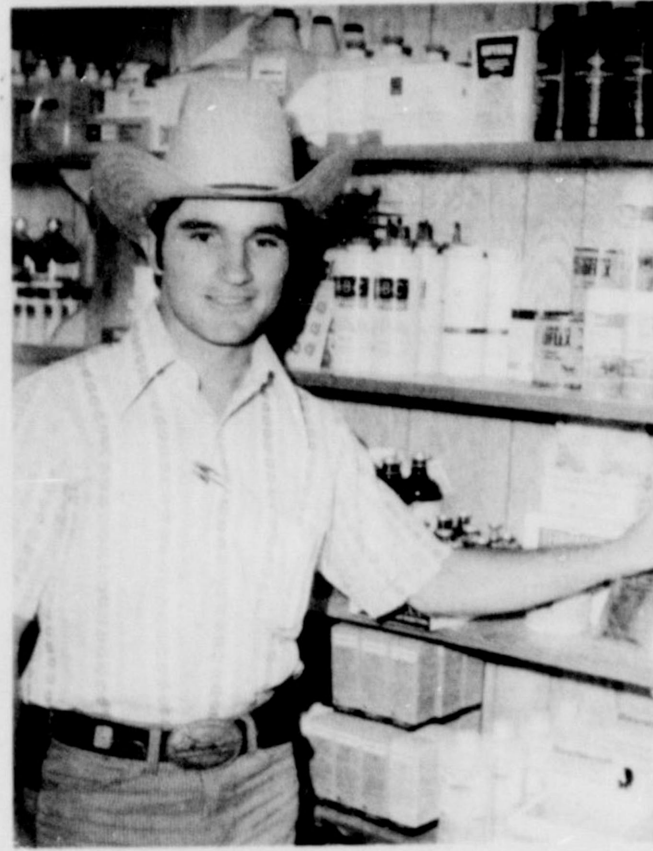
10 YEARS AGO—JULY 19, 1962

"The Laws of Life" on the

 Preview Of Concept-Therapy in  
 the Friona State Bank Commu-  
 nity Room on Wednesday even-  
 ing, July 26 at 8:00 p.m.

The program will be present-  
 ed by Dr. and Mrs. Herbert  
 Dill, teachers and representa-  
 tives of the Concept-Therapy  
 Institute of San Antonio, which  
 is a non-profit educational in-  
 stitution. This will be a return  
 engagement for the Dills, who  
 have twice given lectures in  
 Friona.

Dr. Dill, who has been with  
 the institute since 1955, has lec-  
 tured all over the United States  
 and in New Zealand. Mrs. Dill,  
 who holds a master's education  
 degree from the State Univer-  
 sity of New York, has been as-  
 sisting Dr. Dill since 1958. They  
 will be coming to Friona from  
 a teaching tour in Puerto Rico.

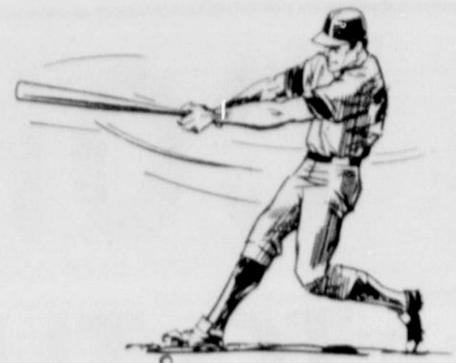

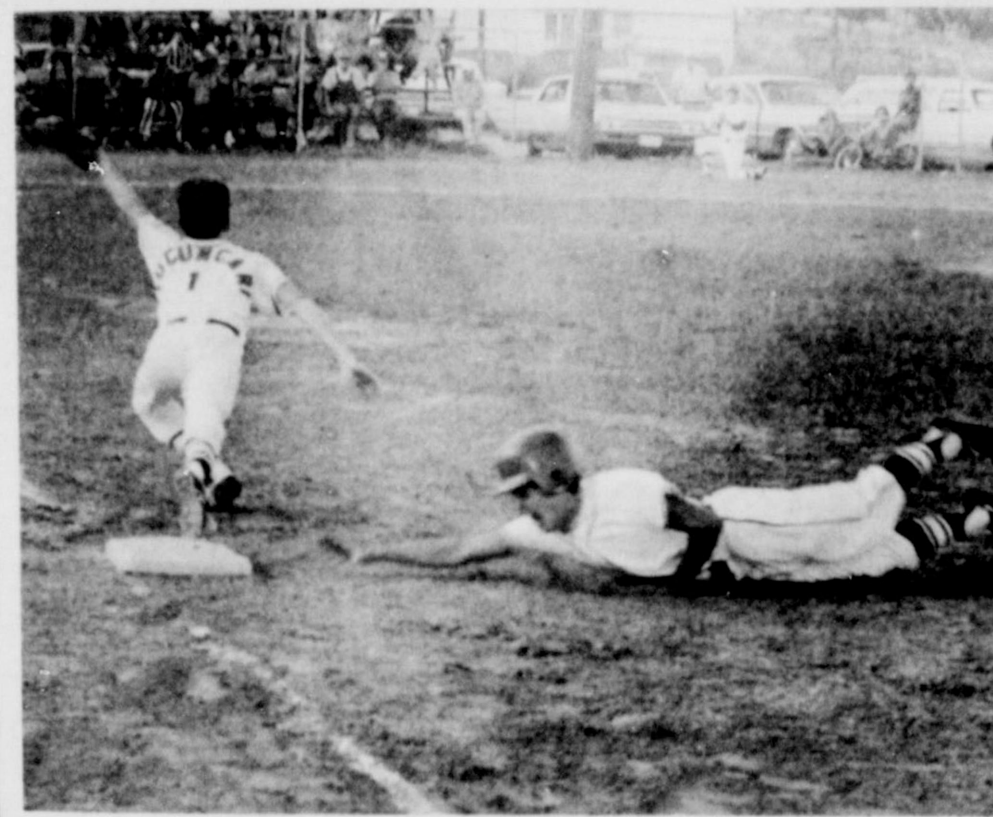

The keeper of the household budget probably has never been more conscious of prices than at the present time. There are such things as "Consumerism," "Price Controls," and "Wage Controls," and numerous bureaucrats who remind us to keep a firm hand on the reins so that we can save money. . . . to put in those nice savings and loan companies who give away lovely presents for starting a savings account. None of them, however, tell us exactly how to save money on some of the most common home practices.

For instance, did anyone ever tell you it's less expensive to carry dishes from your kitchen to the back yard or to a picnic and wash them in an automatic dishwasher than it is to buy paper plates? And while the plates may be recyclable, how about those plastic forks and spoons? Also, how about the nuisance of getting rid of all of them?

The facts of the matter are simple mathematics. To buy enough paper plates, paper cups, plastic spoons and forks for six people will cost you an estimated average of \$1.56. If you take your kitchen dishes, cups, forks and spoons, along with your casserole dishes and bowls, you can serve the same six people for \$1.49 to \$1.51 less. In other words, your dishwasher will wash all those dishes for the small cost of 5¢ to 7¢. An added plus, you won't have to find someplace to dispose of them.

Now add up all those evenings you eat outdoors and those weekends you go on picnics. How many pieces of school clothing will it buy at the end of summer? How much will it pay on next month's food bill? Amazing how it adds up, isn't it?

Now that you have decided to take your everyday kitchenware outdoors, whether it's ironstone that's chipped or melamine, what do you do after the picnic? The one disposable item you probably will not do without is a

roll of paper towels or some paper napkins. Wipe the plates and flatware with them before tucking them back into the basket. As soon as you arrive home, and before the remaining soil dries anymore, load them into the dishwasher, fill the detergent cups with your favorite dishwasher detergent for easy and thorough cleaning, and let the dishwasher do the work while you take a well deserved rest. After all, you had to prepare all the food, didn't you?

The past few weeks in Parmer County has seen many acres of cotton being damaged by 2-4-D drift. This is nothing new, as it happens every summer, especially on the west side of the county.

However, it seems that much of the spray has drifted on the plants when the wind was highest, causing more cotton to show the effects. The Texas Department of Agriculture can make an estimate of the crop damage if the producer so desires. If a lawsuit should develop over damages to the cotton, this damage estimate can be used as evidence. Mr. Newt Goodwin in Plainview, (806) 296-6525, works on these matters. If he cannot be reached, Mr. Varner McWilliams in Lubbock, (806) 747-1656, can help out with the problem.

Changing the subject to a different type of damage, the screwworm situation is still big in Texas. From now through the middle of September will be the most critical time for this area. Everyone with livestock should be on the lookout for these pests. If a suspect case is found, send a sample of them to Screwworm

## "Farm Safety Week" Is Proclaimed By Nixon

President Nixon has proclaimed the week of July 25-31, 1972, as National Farm Safety Week, according to Leon Grissom, Chairman of Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. Grissom encourages everyone in Parmer County to use this period to look for and correct hazardous conditions. He went on to say that this year special emphasis is being placed on the correct use of protective equipment. Every year someone is injured because protective equipment was not used. This measure of safety is cheap when compared with the alternative.

Accidental injuries hurt-cost you time and money. But you can help prevent injuries on your place. How?

Safety goggles or face shields protect your face and eyes from flying particles in the shop and chemicals in the field.

Cartridge respirators or gas masks protect your lungs and health when applying pesticides.

Metal toed shoes save feet when working with heavy material, handling livestock, or even mowing the lawn. This is only a few of the many possibilities. Each person must evaluate his own needs for his situation.

These protective devices may not be as comfortable as going without them, but your wife and children would like to have you around whole.

## Farmers Home Adm. Gives Loan Totals

Loans totaling \$2,055,800 were made by the Farmers Home Administration during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1972, reports Billy R. Boling, FHA's County Supervisor.

The bulk of the loans made this past year were for operating purchases, such as the purchase of seed, fertilizer, pesticides, livestock, machinery and equipment. Emergency and operating loans to meet these purposes totaled \$1,277,500.

Farm Ownership loans during the year totaled \$538,000. These loans were made as "piggy back" loans. The Federal Land Bank Association or private lender would loan part of the money to purchase land and Farmers Home Administration would take second lien and loan the difference.

There were \$216,000 loaned under the Rural Housing program to construct houses and purchase homes.

### Nine Accidents Reported For County During June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of June, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and ten persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1972 shows a total of 69 accidents resulting in one person killed, and 43 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of

the Department of Public Safety Region 5 for June, 1972 shows a total of 527 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 347 persons injured as compared to June, 1971 with 524 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 308 persons injured.

The 20 traffic deaths for the month of June, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Dallam and Lubbock, three each; Archer, Armstrong, Bailey, Childress, Floyd, Hale, Jack, Montague, Parker, Terry, Wichita, Wilbarger, Wise and Young, one each.

Experience is a wonderful thing, for it enables you to recognize a mistake when you make it again.

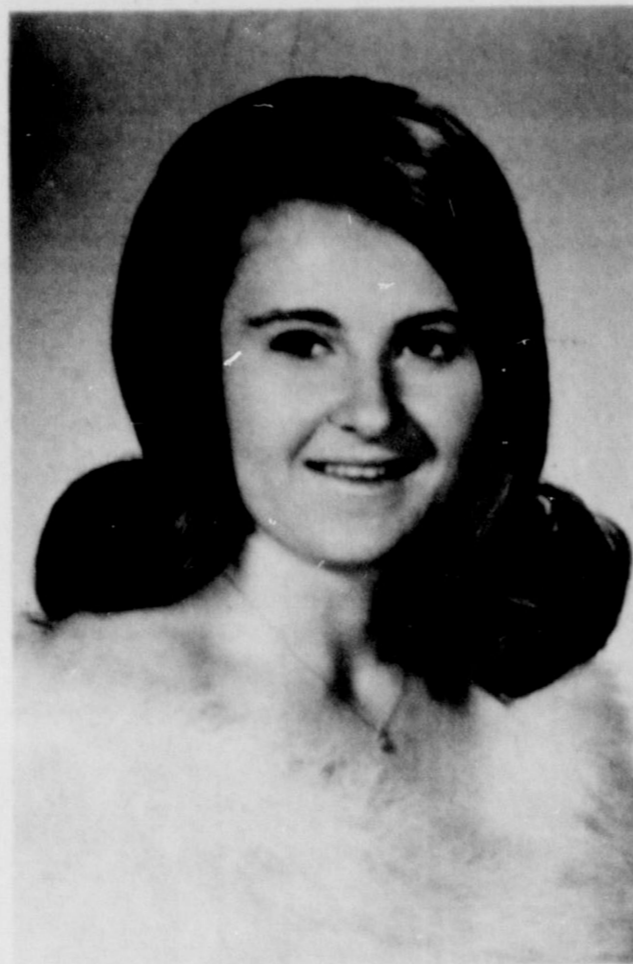
