> All in all, committee report showed some \$50,000 in ICT funds went to persons who were in public office when they received the money. It said "propriety of some of these payments was highly questionable.

Also sent to the grand jury was a "new major development" by the House bribery investigating group. Nature of the development was a closely guarded secret.

Only information disclosed was that "new evidence" had been obtained from a witness who had been under Department of Public Safety questioning. Witness was not a state official or employee, said the district attorney.

New Laws, Studies.-Besides proiding grand jury evidence, House ICT Committee had three other recommendations.

They were: (1) that a law be passed giving the Insurance Commission authority to regulate management contracts, such as one Ben Jack Cage had with ICT, (2) that the Texas Research League be requested to study Commission operation and (3) that further investigation be made into the tangled history of ICT's financial "deals."

New Senator.—Ralph Yarborough will take office as junior U. S. Senator from Texas on or sometime after April 19.

Yarborough was defeated in four previous races-three for governor, one for attorney general. His victory meant that for the first time wing of the Democratic party will go into a major Texas office.

Republican hopes for a two-party Texas plummeted. In the highman-wins race Yarborough got approximately 37 per cent of the vote; Conservative Democrat Martin Dies, 30 per cent and Republican Thad Hutcheson, 23.8.

Money Bill Passed. - Legislative blueprint for state spending during the next two years has reached the conference stage.

An economy-minded Senate passed the general appropriations bill at a figure some \$2,000,000 less than the House-approved version. Sponsors managed to scotch all efforts to tack on amendments for additional spending. Among the items sought were raises for county agents and home demonstration agents and

increases in judges' salaries. Total of the Senate appropriation bill is \$2,084,349,515. Both House and Senate recommendations are some 25 to 27 million dollars less than the comptroller's estimate of

Insurance Bills .- A bill to allow flexible rates" for casualty insurance is given little chance of pas-

Senate Insurance Committee refused to vote out the measure which would abolish Texas' system of state vide uniform rates. The proposed bill would set a rate based on each individual's accident record.

A House committee weighed the possibility of Insurance Commission eorganization from the viewpoint of present Chairman John Osorio. Governor Daniel had appeared carier urging passage of the bill.

Osorio said board reorganization already is under way. He said he elt it could be successfully carried out under present laws.

Real difficulty of the commission, ne said, is not top level organizaion, but need for more examiners. He recommended a 150-man staff, rather than the present 39, and

Securities Department.—Creation of a new state agency to regulate both insurance securities and other ypes has Senate committee approv-





The newcomer learns in A.A. that "once an alcoholic, always an alcoholic" is more than a catch phrase. Like the diabetic who can live a normal, productive life so long as he respects his need for insulin, the alcoholic can live with his "health" problem only by staying away from alcohol. A.A. becomes, in effect, the "insulin" that can keep the alcoholic healthy. Over the years the concept of alcoholism as an illness has been accepted by a growing number of doctors who today cooperate enthusiastically in 'the A.A. approach.'

Few members of A.A. are morbid bout facing the fact that they have an illness that can never be cured, but which may be arrested. The typical A.A. member has been charged so often with lack of will power, or with other moral deficiencies, that he is likely to be relieved to learn that he is sick, not necessarily deprayed

A further distinguishing feature of the A.A. program is that it makes absolutely no demands upon the person who turns to it for help. "There are no musts in A.A." is a phrase heard repeatedly wherever members gather. In A.A., there are no pledge to sign, no formal organization rules and no demands of any kind upon the members.

Since this is a far cry from the pleadings of friends and relatives, the earnest counselling of doctors or clerymen, the impression on the newcomer is likely to be deep and lasting. He is given to understand that drinking will not solve any of his problems and will probably aggravate those he already has. He also is impressed with the fact that he has a definite choice between drinking and not drinking and that no one but he can make






