Back in 1916 when all food was in short supply and high-priced because of World War I in Europe, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Fred W. Davis ordered his staff to study the feasibility of commercializing jackrabbits.

The rabbit was regarded as a pest because it would insist on eating the farmer's grain. It looked like a chance to decimate the rabbits and fight the high costs of beef at the same time.

A banquet was given by Commissioner Davis at the Driskill Hotel in Austin on December 6 and duly reported by the "Austin American" as a "success." The rabbit was served in soup, fried in country style, broiled in fricassee and served in a salad.

All praised the rabbits which they had eaten and endorsed rabbit meat as an offset to the high cost of living. What was said about the jackrabbit and "his little cousin, the cotton tail, would have made them blush with pleasure, if they had not been in the stew," the "American" reported.

"It didn't work," White commented. "They didn't get rid of the jackrabbits, and people found Texas steaks were better than ever. But if I know housewives, the Easter bunny better watch out."

If this holds true, Friona has 5 more days of snow, as officially, there has been logged 26 days of snow during this winter, including both measurable snows and traces. From this 26 days of snow, officially 36.5 inches of snow has been measured. Year total now at

The latest tally adds 3 more inches of snow, with drifts averaging around three feet, with some noted to six feet and .30 in moisture from the blizzard Saturday, April 7.

To date in April, the official measurement, most of it being from late snows, is 1.67.

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





A COTTON PRODUCTION meeting will be held in Earth, Texas on April 16, 1973. It will be held at the Halsall Foundation Building, Highway 70 from 8 p.m.-10 p.m. The theme of the meeting is "Growing Cotton on the North End." The program will be brought by Mr. Lavon Ray and Mr. Bob

These Extension Service Specialists will discuss production practices and new spending methods for short micronaire cotton. This meeting will be slanted toward production techniques for this area. Again, the time and place is April 16, 8 p.m.-10 p.m. at the Halsall Foundation Building in Earth.

PRESIDENT NIXON'S DECISION to freeze the retail prices of beef, pork and lamb may have long-reaching effects on future production of farmers and ranchers.

Production costs of farmers and ranchers are continuing to increase. Since there is no freeze on these inputs and the producer knows now that he will not receive any higher prices for his animals, he may just become 'fed up' with the whole situation. This could mean a pullback in resources and less expansion. And that's certainly not what is needed at this time.

Just at a time when producers should be expanding their herds to meet the increased consumer demand for red meat, they are caught in a situation that may "choke" some of them out of production or at least cause them to slow down on their expansion

Possibly this ceiling may stymie many farm and ranch efforts directed to herd expansion. Producers will feel like they're in a dark room, afraid to move. Still others may even react with a get even' attitude and hold back cattle and calves.

Right now farmers and ranchers need to be entired to continue to increase production. Higher prices have done this. Unfortunately, expansion takes time. You just don't produce more beef or more pork or lamb overnight.


Some analysts already project a shortage of beef in the second half of this year. This shortage could become more critical in the wake of the ceiling on meat prices.

Consumers will probably see less meat in the grocery case of the future and will be paying more for it, unless livestock producers are given some incentives for profitable production.
