The Parmer County SWCD met in their regular meeting Tuesday, April 3, at the Parmer House, Friona. Leroy Johnson was in charge of the meeting.

The conservation essay winners for the district were present to receive their awards. First place winner was Rhonda Rhodes, second place Larry Wiseman, third place Christie Trimble, and fourth place Evanna Johnston. All winners were from Bovina High School and were accompanied to the meeting by Margaret Durben, a teacher in the Bovina High School.

Following the awards presentation the regular business meeting was conducted. The SCS accomplishment report was made by Herb Evans, District Conservationist, a conservation plan was approved, Great Plains Conservation Program applications were approved, and the Running Water Draw Watershed status was reviewed.

Good Bond Sales Noted

According to Frank A. Spring, Chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bonds Committee, February sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds totaled \$15,874 while sales for the two-month period were \$21,584 for 21 per cent of the 1973 sales goal.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$21,221,162 compared to \$19,273,003 during February 1972-an increase of 10 per cent. Sales for the first two months totaled \$45,148,051 for 21 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$216.6 million.

Thus, Parmer County's bond sales for the first two months of 1973 were running on the same average as that of the state as a whole.

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
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Mysterious Cat Eludes Captors

Shades of the 'Old West!!! Cougar hunts and on the South Plains and in this area, at that.

The big question in Parmer County at this time is—is there is, or is there not, a cougar running loose somewhere between Bovina and Farwell?

Persons who have seen the mysterious chain-dragging cat insist it is, in fact, a cougar that wears a collar and has a chain that drags along as he bounds away from potential captors.

According to police officials in Friona, at least one highway patrolman from Farwell participated in the unsuccessful hunt for the elusive animal that was first reported some four miles north of Bovina on Monday, Texas Department of Public Safety Officer Glenn Fant was as unsuccessful as the pack of seasoned 'lion dogs' which were brought in from New Mexico to pursue the animal.

It was first reported officially by Randy Buchenaw, who called the sheriff's office in Farwell for assistance after he

and a neighbor, Jerry Ford chased the mysterious animal into a stubble field where it promptly disappeared.

DOGS USED

A call was sent out for a game warden, but it seems the closest animal warden is Gary Rickman, with the New Mexico Game and Fish Department, stationed at Floyd, N.M., near Portales. Rickman, in turn, called a friend, Curtis Washburn of Floyd, who owns the hunting dogs.

Despite numerous tracks and a mystified coyote jumped by the special trained dogs, no mysterious cat-type animal was found. In an all day search by law enforcement officers, dogs and a number of private citizens, the animal continued to elude his would-be captors.

By night, no one seemed to be in any frame of mind to discuss the incident, although a number of people, who preferred not to be identified or quoted had said they had seen

the cat. Most of them described it as a cougar or mountain lion.

It was reported by a service station attendant that a pickup truck with a mountain lion chained in the back and two small cubs had stopped at his service station about two or three weeks ago. Speculation now is that possibly the lion broke the chain and escaped to mystify and plague farmers in the county. No loss of livestock is attributed to the animal, although it has been reported that Buchenaw's dog arrived home sometime Monday looking as though "he had been slapped around a little bit."

If the hunt for the cat is continuing, it is continuing quietly and without comment by the hunters.

made loans to Texas farmers and ranchers totaling more than \$1.3 billion.

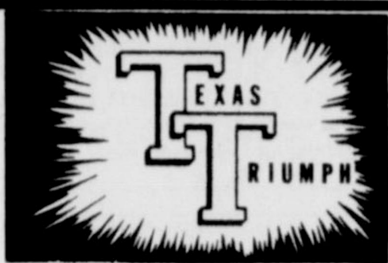

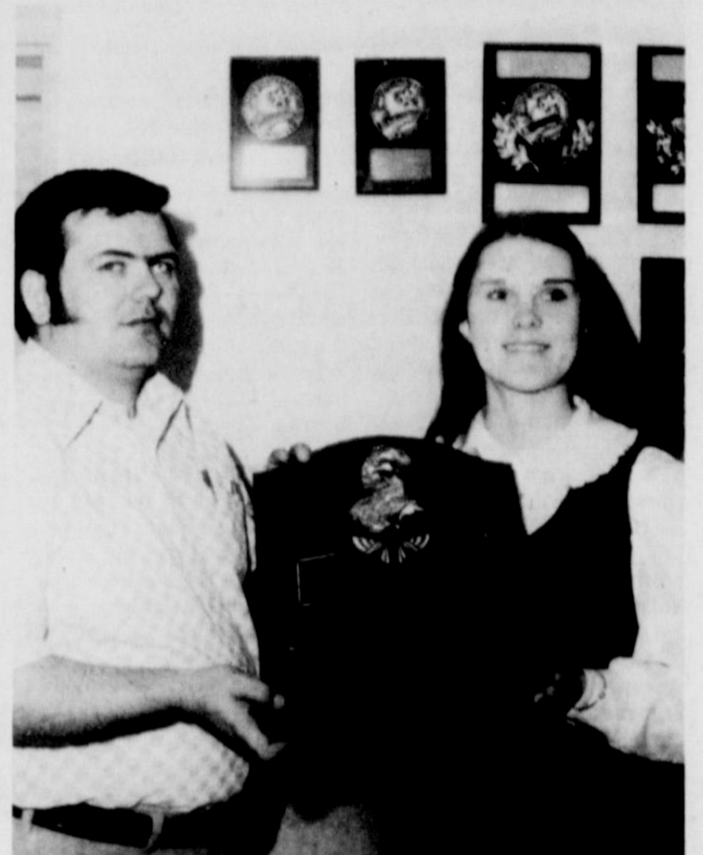
Carol Reeve Garners FHS J. P. Sousa Award

Winning consolation was the Super Squad with the Chicanos drawing a bye.

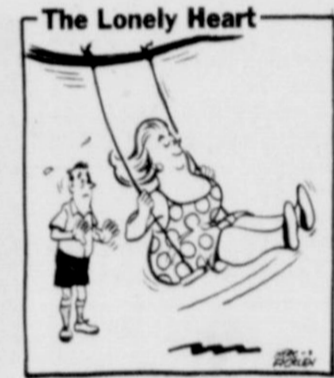

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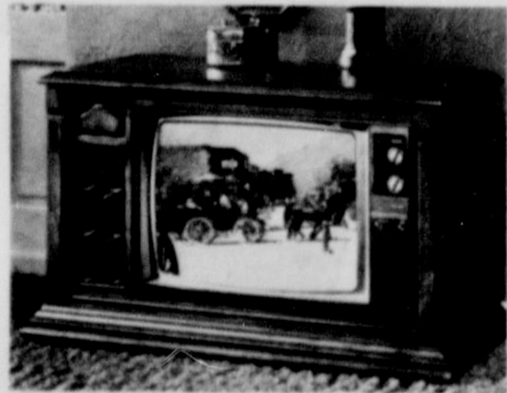
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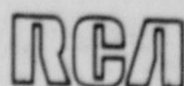
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Jury Summoned For Six Criminal Cases

**FIRST PLACE
RHONDA RHODES**
The United Nations estimated that by the end of 1972 the population of the world stood at 3.74 billion. This is a staggering figure, but still it does represent the human race. If predictions are true this figure is likely to climb higher and higher. This means man will need more water, air, soil, forests, minerals, and wildlife. Conservation means guarding these resources so they may be used wisely by the greatest number of people.

The German philosopher Goethe once said, "There is no trifling with nature; it is always true, grave, and severe; it is always in the right, and the faults and errors fall to our share. It defies incompetency, but reveals its secrets to the competent, the truthful, and the pure." We would like to think of our planet as being large enough to feed and supply every person adequately with the natural resources necessary

for life, but unfortunately it is not. Water covers about seven-tenths of the earth's surface making limited the land area for growing crops and finding more of our already depleting natural resources.

Conservation steps have already been taken but not enough to accomplish what was set out to do. There have been plans to clean air and water but they are still polluted. **THIRD PLACE

All that man can do is wisely using nonrenewable resources is to avoid wasting them and share them fairly. "Once exhausted they are gone forever." Since these are

extractive resources, found in mines, the government controls the rate of use. Are the nonrenewable resources meeting the needs of People? 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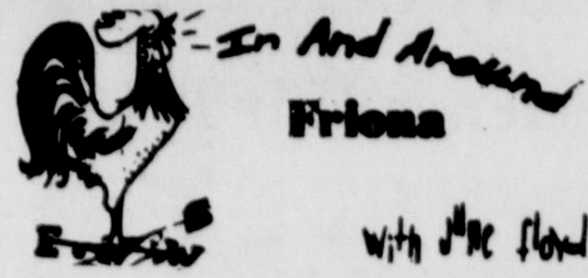

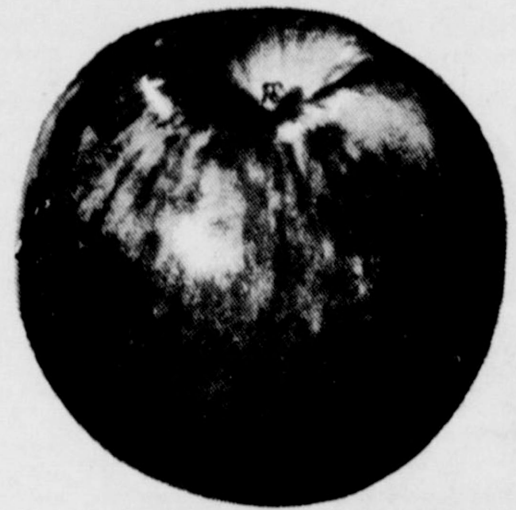

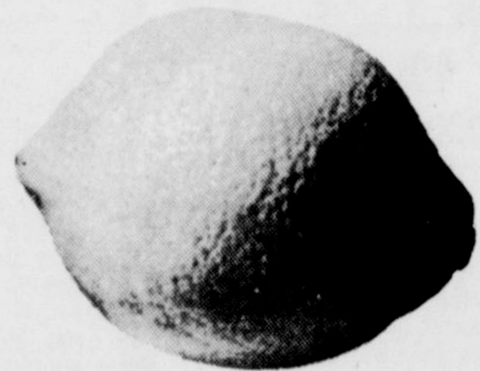
