



Our hat is off to everyone who had a part in last week's Maize Days celebration. Personally, we thought it was the best Maize Days we have had in a number of years.

One thing which helped was the better than average weather we had for the week. Then, too, we think Chamber president Dale Cary is due a pat on the back for daring to be different and recommending several changes in this year's celebration.

The changes included the later date, in order to get what turned out to be a fine carnival; also changing the parade to Saturday.

New events were added, including the Air Show, the Motorcycle races, the square dance and a sculpture display.

The chamber personally sponsored two of the new events, and is to be commended in taking an active lead in the celebration. This is as it should be, we think.

We thoroughly enjoyed Dean Kelley as master of ceremonies for the queen's contest. His "ad-lib" ability saved the day during the waiting periods, as he and the accompanists, Eva Miller and Jo Witten, kept the audience entertained.

About the only drawback to the main events was the microphone difficulty at the queen's contest, and this apparently was not completely due to faulty equipment at the school, but just one of those unfortunate accidents.

The Chieftains, coming off their most successful showing of the season, a 47-0 thumping of what had been a highly-regarded Class A Springlake team, are looking for their fourth win of the season, which would put them at the season midpoint with their best record since 1968.

Lockney is one of the three teams which was moved from

Friona's District 3-AA beginning this season, the other two being Floydada and Abernathy. The Longhorns are the only one of the three which are being met on the 1972 schedule.

The Friona school is down somewhat from the successful season it enjoyed last year (8-2), when it downed Friona, 41-21 in the season finale. That game produced some sort of offensive record, as both teams combined to advance the football a whopping and unbelievable total of 1,042 yards, including punt and kickoff returns and total net yards.

The Longhorns come into the game with a 2-2 mark, with wins over Frenship and Olton, and

losses to Post and Dimmitt. Like Friona, the injury bug has plagued Lockney. Junior halfback Dart Carthel, a cousin to the Friona Carthels, suffered a shoulder separation against Dimmitt. He was also the team's place-kicker.

The Longhorn center, Sam Fortenberry, also was injured in the Dimmitt game.

The two schools have met a total of 13 times, beginning in 1938.

Friona holds a narrow 8-5 margin in the series, which has produced some extremely close games, including 12-7, 13-12, 14-12 and 14-13 wins by Friona from 1965 through 1968.

Its Police Academy, the only school in the nation designed to turn out well trained reservation police, is the first victim of this "penny wise-pound foolish" decision.

Speaking of education: what about the Bureaucratic Bumbleheads that force bussing, leaving some valuable buildings empty and overcrowding others?

What kind of warnings are teachers strikes that cripple city after city?

The holdest step toward total surrender is seen in the "gun control bill." This is in direct violation of our Constitution and will render the law abiding citizen helpless in the event of an attack by members of the criminal world.

These warning flags should not be ignored by concerned Americans.

While the political pot is boiling so briskly in this election year is the time to call, write, or telegraph our Congressmen and Senators.

Be concerned, because those of us that are, can't raise your children. We do the best that we can when they are with us; but if you would help just a little we would have more time

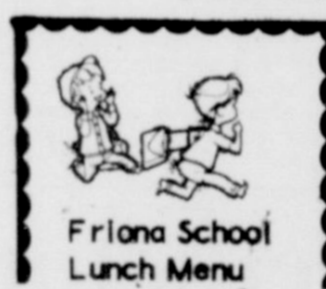
and could do an even better job.

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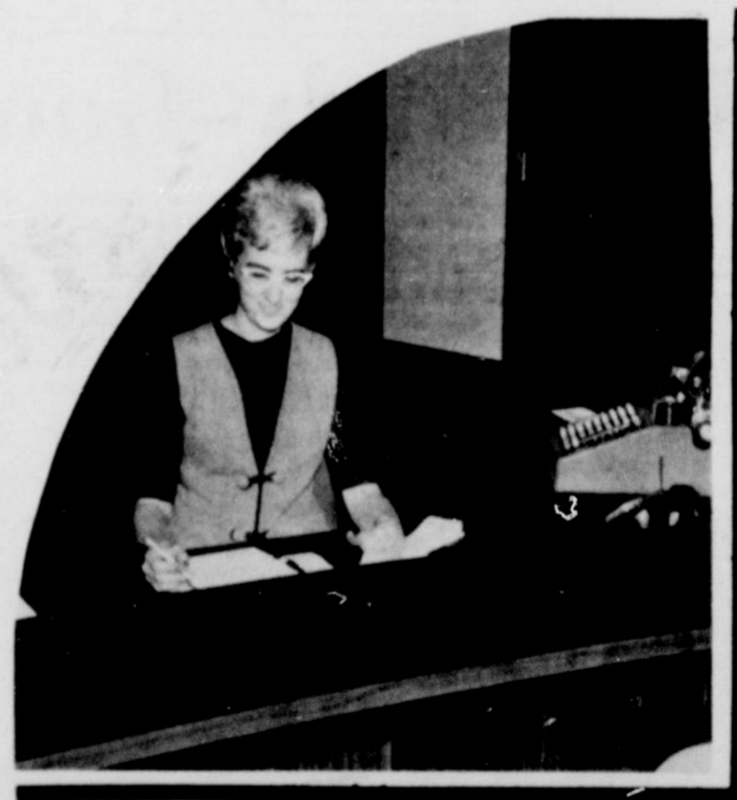

AT SPRINGLAKE

Reunion Happy As Chiefs Romp 47-0

It was a happy reunion for Friona last Friday at Springlake, but the host Wolverines probably decided before the game was over that 1972 was a bad year to get back on Friona's football schedule.

Friona surprised probably even their own most ardent fans by waxing Springlake, 47-0. It was the first official football meeting between the two schools since 1959.

Springlake, which was 2-1, including victories over Dimmitt and Morton, was completely overwhelmed by the charging Chieftain line, which caused the Wolverines to cough up the ball five times on fumbles, once on a pass interception, and blocked a punt on another occasion.

The Chieftain defense held Springlake to only 56 net yards rushing, and 47 yards passing, and a majority of this came in the final quarter against Chieftain reserves, as Springlake made its most serious bid to score, but were still held out of the end zone by the FHS subs.

The offense, meanwhile, was given the ball several times in good field position, and practically every time the break was converted into six points.

Like late in the first quarter, when Terry Thompson charged through to block a Springlake punt, giving Friona a first and goal situation at the Wolverine five. Mario Perea slanted to the one-half yard line, and then over for the TD. Kevin Wiseman's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead.

Two plays following the touchdown, a Springlake back was hit hard at the line of scrimmage, and Friona pounced on the resulting fumble. Two plays later, James Bartlett raced 31 yards up the middle for Friona's second TD, and a 13-0 lead, as Wiseman's low kick was batted down.

On the first play of the second quarter, Springlake again fumbled, and the alert Chieftains recovered at the Wolverine 41. Bartlett gave the team a first and goal at the four, on a heads-up 23-yard run that saw him bounce off the line of scrimmage after the hole had been plugged, and race around right end for a nice gain.

On second down, Clay Bandy took a pitchout and raced two yards to score. On the point after, Clay took a pitchout, then passed to Bartlett for two points, and it was Friona 21-0 after only 2:35 of the second period. Friona had scored its 21 points in the space of only four and one-half minutes of actual clock time.

Friona recovered yet another Springlake fumble in the second quarter, but with time running out, could not cash in on its passes and the halftime score was 21-0.

Early in the third quarter, though, following a short Springlake punt that was partially blocked, Johnny Bandy weaved his way 26 yards for a touchdown on the quarterback option play. Wiseman's kick was wide, but Friona led, 27-0 with only 2:34 gone in the third quarter.

On third down following the kickoff, the Springlake quarterback was hit behind the line, and Mark Walters hopped onto the fifth fumble recovery for Friona, at the Wolverine 25. It took just six plays for Fri-

ona to cash in on the break, with Perea going over from the two. Wiseman's kick again missed, but the score became 33-0 midway of the third quarter.

Reserves played the entire fourth quarter, but you couldn't tell much difference in the tempo of the game. Clay Bandy moved to quarterback, and guided the team on a 62-yard touchdown drive. He had one run of 17 yards for a first down, and climaxed the drive by dodging his way 23 yards behind some fine downfield blocking by the Chieftains. Jayson Grimsley ran for two points and the score mounted to 41-0 with 5:30 left in the game.

Nor was Friona's offensive fireworks finished for the evening. The Chiefs took over at midfield after forcing a Springlake punt. Clay Bandy ran to the Springlake 39, and then pitched out to Scott Lillard on the next play and Lillard rambled 27 yards before being forced out of bounds at the Wolverine four.

CHIEFTAIN BACKFIELD

B,B,B & P Make For Winning Combo

Bandy, Bandy, Bartlett and Perea: Sounds like a large law firm. What it is, though, is the starting backfield at Friona, and the foursome came in for a high-scoring night last week.

While Friona and Dimmitt were taking home victories, the preseason favorite for the 3-AA championship tasted defeat for the very first time this season.

Littlefield's Wildcats, who went to the playoffs last year, were ambushed in Muleshoe 42-14 last week for their first loss of the season. Morton and Olton remained winless, losing to Frenship (21-14) and Floydada (17-8), respectively.

Friona, playing Springlake-Earth for the first time in a decade, greeted the Wolverines with a stiff opening defense and the BBB&P backfield capitalized on it. A blocked punt and two fumble recoveries led to three first-half touchdowns, and the Chieftains went on to a 47-0 victory. It was Friona's largest point output in a single game in four seasons.

Fullback Mario Perea and halfback Clay Bandy scored twice each, Bartlett and quarterback Johnny Bandy once each in the runaway. Clay Bandy wound up with 83 yards rushing, Perea 81 and Bartlett 73 in the balanced runningback attack.

But the defensive plays made the difference, and coach Bob Owen admitted it. "We got the breaks early. We nearly scored on our first possession, getting down to the two. But,

we forced them to punt, Terry Thompson blocked it and Mike Martin recovered. We score, and then we get it back on a fumble recovery by Ricky Johnson. Then Kevin Wiseman got another fumble recovery and we score our third touchdown. We got five recoveries for the game."

Clay Bandy is in the lineup while regular Louis Lee is sidelined by a knee injury sustained in the Chiefs' loss to Muleshoe September 22.

Muleshoe continued its domination of District 3-AA teams, making Littlefield its fourth victim. A 21-point lead before Littlefield could score tilted the verdict in the Mules' direction.

Leneral Lewis and J.E. Johnson, on 32-yard runs, got Littlefield's touchdowns.

Friona and Littlefield now lead nonconference standings with 3-1 records, but Dimmitt evened its record at 2-2 by thumping Lockney 20-7. And that is the kind of homecoming the ex-students return to see.

Albert Ewing capitalized on two defensive plays to score and paced the decision. First TD was set up by Florencio Acevedo's interception in the second quarter. In the final period, a fumble recovery at the Lockney 36 gave the Bobcats a scoring opportunity and they converted.

NEAR HUB

PACO's Pellet Mill Cuts Pollution, Recycles

Paco Feed Yards, near Hub, is typical of the growing feeding establishments in this area--having only recently increased its pen capacity. However, with two distinct mills on its premises, the operation is somewhat distinctive from other area establishments.

PACO Feeds was established in 1967, with a pellet mill, with a revolutionary idea--making a pellet for cattle feeding from cotton burrs. The mill has continued this practice, making the burr pellets for seven months during the following cotton season, and then making "deby" pellets from alfalfa during the other five months.

By using the cotton burrs as a pellet material, PACO accomplished two things. First, it was using something that otherwise useless (sort of a recycling process), and secondly, ended the practice of burning the burrs, which stopped an air pollution practice by area gins.

PACO gets its burrs generally from a 30-mile radius of Friona. The pellet mill began operation May 19, 1967.

On January 15, 1969, PACO Feed Yards commenced operation with pen space for 2,500 cattle. This was increased as the demands grew, until a 35,000 capacity was reached. This past spring, pens for an additional 2,000 cattle were added.

In the meantime, the yard added its own feed mill, having been supplied by Hi-Pro Feed Mill at the outset. The Feed Yard and pellet mill have completely separate staffs. Bill Teel

is manager of PACO Feed Yard, having first come to Friona in 1963 with Friona Feed Yard. Gene Thompson is foreman of the pellet mill.

The pellet operation employs 14 men, including six which are required to operate the alfalfa machinery. The feed yard employs 26 men, for a total of 40 men between the two operations.

Teel, a native of Oklahoma (Tishomingo), was with the Phillips Company and Cities Service Oil Company prior to coming to Friona. He was office manager and then assistant manager at Friona Feed Yards, and was made manager of PACO Feed Yards upon its opening.

Ron Stevenson is yard foreman at PACO, Wayne Tunnell is assistant manager, and Walt Abney is office manager.

The pellet mill, which operates 24 hours a day the year around, produces pellets for cattle feed for PACO and Friona Feed Yards, exclusively. The mill turns out an average of 100 tons of pellets per day.

Teel explains the continued expansion in the feedlot industry in this area by the fact that cattle can be fed more economically and more efficiently in this part of the country than other parts. He looks for this growth to continue, as this area continues to draw from the older feeding areas, including the Midwest.

The addition of the packing plants in this area also has been a plus factor for local feeding, Teel says. "It is easier to ship dressed beef

to the Corn Belt than it is to ship live cattle up there," he explains. "PACO" is a combination of the first two letters in the words Parmer County, and it is located almost in the center of the county, southwest of Hub.

Teel also credits the work of the Texas Cattle Feeders Assn. for assisting the growth of the industry. The association has been instrumental in bringing men who control large financial institutions to the area, and this has helped the financing to be more readily available, he says.

The Feed Yard's new mill was completed in July of 1971, and as one of the newer feed mills, has some advantages of new developments over other mills built only a few years earlier.

For one thing, the mill can switch from corn to wheat to milo very easily, whereas before it was a major operation to make these switches.

Teel says he expects the beef consumption in America to continue to increase, as the public's taste for good quality grain-fed beef continues to hold sway.

He decried the action of the government in outlawing the DES growth hormone, which will cause the feed yards to lose 10 to 15 per cent efficiency on each animal. This could mean an additional two cents per pound, Teel predicts, which could have an additional effect on meat prices in 1973.

This was a blow to the feeding industry, but Teel says it should be rectified, in time.

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At Home In Parmer County Jana Pronger

Hunting seasons for dove and quail are approaching for most parts of Texas. Although dove season has opened in the northern zone, elsewhere the seasons don't begin until later. Dove and quail make tasty wild game treats when properly dressed and prepared.

Age quail and dove at a temperature just above freezing for 24 to 28 hours to remove some of the gamey flavor which might detract from eating pleasure. Dry-plucking the birds has been recommended rather than skinning them, to conserve flavor and moisture. After they are plucked, singe them over a flame to remove the down.

Next, make a cut along or across the back to split the bird apart and remove the entrails. Then remove the head, claws and feet. Wipe the body cavity clean with a damp cloth. Once dressed this way, they are ready for immediate use or for freezing.

Frying is a popular way to prepare quail and dove. First dredge the birds in flour, salt and pepper them and fry in deep fat. Brown each bird on both sides. Then lower the temperature, cover the skillet and cook slowly for about 20 minutes, turning once to brown evenly.

To freeze dressed birds for later use, place in moisture-vapor proof containers. Label these containers with the name and date, and store at zero degrees F. They may be stored at this temperature from six to twelve months.

Besides serving as a taste treat, dove and quail are nutritious. They are excellent sources of protein needed for growth and repair of body tissues.

Wild game birds can offer a refreshing and nutritious change in menu when hunting seasons arrive--and afterwards, during holidays--when cooked or frozen properly.

Cooking rice won't boil over if a small lump of butter is added to the pot.

On The Farm In Parmer County MACK HEAD County Agent

Parmer County was in the news during the week of September 18 through September 23 at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo. Several different divisions in which county residents participated in, included: County Educational Booth; Livestock shows; 4-H activities.

Each year the County Extension offices set up a booth during the fair exhibiting a sampling of the various types of crops grown in the county. The booth, along with other county booths, was judged and paid premium money. The county booth again featured the "3,76 in '76" program. This program is designed by the Extension Service Agricultural Program to increase the income from the sale of agricultural products by \$1 billion by the year 1976, through the use of educational programs, result demonstrations, research and improved technology sponsored by the State Extension Service. This goal is being obtained by a yearly increase in the total agricultural income. Parmer County's share in this amounts to over \$79 million annually.

Karene and Evelyn Hart of the Friona 4-H Club exhibited their Shorthorn Heifers in the open show on Wednesday, September 20. Evelyn placed third with her heifer and Karene placed sixth with hers. These two girls, along with their sister Holly, were among the top 10 finalists in the WheatKing Contest. This contest is open to all 4-H and FAA members in the Panhandle of Texas and is judged on the quality of the wheat samples by the youngsters entered. Several different tests are run on that sample such as protein, milling, quality, etc.

On Saturday, September 23, the top ten finalists were presented and the places were announced. Karene Hart was second, Evelyn was eighth and Holly Hart was ninth. Cheryl Whitecotton of the Bovina 4-H Club was the county winner in the Bake Show contest. Each county in the Panhandle of Texas entered their county winner in the District Bake Show. These twenty-two girls were presented during the

Rural Youth Day activities and awarded premium money for entering the contest.

Beef cow numbers have increased substantially in Texas since the first of the year, according to figures compiled by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, points out that the biggest increase in cow herds has occurred in South Texas and in parts of East Texas and along the Red River.

The Texas A&M University specialist lists improved range conditions and favorable cattle prices as the main reasons for the expansion. Grazing conditions have been average to above average in many areas of the state although parts of Northeast Texas are still suffering from lack of moisture.

Uvacek notes that the situation is in contrast to last year when cow numbers in Texas moved down six percent. The drought of last year took its toll and breeding herds were thinned to avoid over-stocking of ranges.

Cow herds were cut back in most areas of the state during 1971. Largest reductions occurred in the Gulf Coast area, South Central Texas, the Edwards Plateau and the Panhandle. The Red River area in North Texas was the only region showing an increase in cow numbers during 1971.

Cow numbers have increased at such a rapid rate during the first half of 1972 that the losses experienced during 1971 have been almost entirely overcome.
