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State Capital NEWS

Austin, Tex.—"After seeing the appropriation bill—and with all the sentiment there is in favor of a teacher pay raise—I don't see how we can pay for it all without passing one of those big tax bills."

Speaking in private conversation was a legislator. He is one of an estimated 80 to 90 House members who told voters flatly last summer they wouldn't vote for a general sales tax.

But the "big tax bills" to which he refers are the Strickland-Roberts bill, Blanchard bill, Oliver bill, etc. All of these are, as someone said, "mighty like a sales tax," in that they would be collected on the basis of the sales of large numbers of items.

His predicament is shared by many Texas lawmakers this year. It is: how to finance the things the people of Texas want without voting a tax the people don't want?

Biggest Ever—House Appropriation

Committee is recommending a 1960-61 spending bill that is the granddaddy of 'em all.

Altogether, spending from all sources, including grants, would total \$2,401,276,388. It is \$240,000,000 higher than the 1959-60 budget.

Even so, it is \$7,500,000 less than recommended by Gov. Price Daniel. Committee's bill calls for general revenue spending of \$322,461,196; the governor's for \$329,952,992.

Financing the committee's recommendations will require about \$157,000,000 in new tax money for the general fund. This results from adding together (1) the expected \$65,000,000 deficit from 1958-59, (2) the \$42,000,000 increase in spending for the coming biennium over this one and (3) an expected \$50,000,000 gap between expected revenue and present spending levels.

If the proposed public school teacher pay raise and any other part of the Hale-Aikin recommendations for school improvement are adopted, the new money needs would soar to between \$200,000,000 and \$300,000,000.

Principal beneficiaries of the \$42,000,000 increase proposed by the Appropriations Committee would be higher education, up \$23,804,432; state employees, up \$3,400,000; state hospitals and special schools, up \$10,321,186; prison system, up \$6,000,000.

Tax front—Meanwhile, the House Taxation Committee, beset by the prodding of the governor on one hand and the objections of various citizens on the other, toils on in its

search for new money. Recent actions include: Showing temporary disapproval, 12-6, of the governor's plan for the state to take over abandoned property and dormant bank accounts. Hearing the pros and cons of a raft of "broad-based" taxes. These include:

1. A nine-part omnibus tax measure by Reps. Bob Strickland of San Antonio and Wesley Roberts of Lamesa which would include a gross receipts levy on retail establishments. It would raise an estimated \$200,000,000 to \$300,000,000.

2. A 1½ per cent gross receipts tax on all business activity (with certain exemptions for farm supplies, charitable institutions, professional services, etc.) by Rep. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock. It would bring in about \$300,000,000 to \$400,000,000.

3. A tax on "the first sale or use of any finished product" by Rep. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches.

4. A tax on "net profits and receipts" by Rep. Alonzo W. Jamison Jr. of Denton.

5. A "cure all" tax on manufactured goods by Rep. Jerry Sadler of Perella, to bring in about a half-billion dollars per biennium.

It all led one House member to complain of a "million dollar headache."

Plan To Tax Boats—Boat owners may be in for a shock if the "Water Safety Act" becomes law. Representatives have tacked on a few taxes.

Although designed to promote safety, the measure as it now stands calls for the purchase of a \$2 Certificate of Nuber every two years, plus payment of a fee of from \$5 to \$12.50 per boat per biennium. About the only boats exempted are canoes and "seaplanes."

The measure passed the House but still must meet Senate approval.

Economy Bill Making Headway—There's at least one fellow who believes that his type of job is useless, outmoded and unnecessary.

He is George Corse Jr. of Graham, Tex. Corse feels that school money is being wasted by keeping the job of County School Superintendent alive. He wants to disperse with the office and contends that it will save the State a minimum of \$400,000 annually.

To prove they were economy-minded too, the House passed his bill (HB No. 101 by Rep. George Wilson of Newcastle) and sent it on to the Senate with their blessings.

HB No. 101 would permit the people of a county, by petition of 10 per cent of the eligible voters, to vote on discontinuance of the office of County Superintendent of Schools.

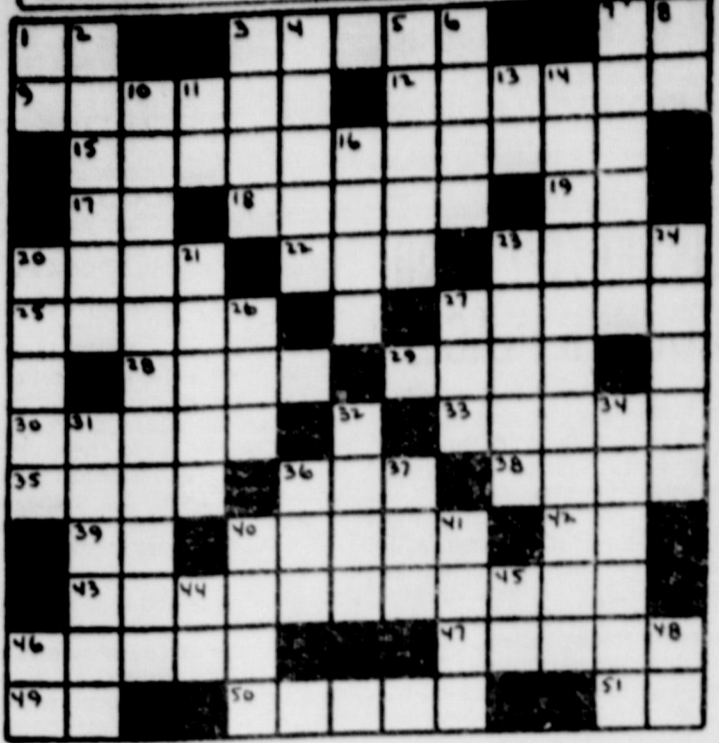
Corse is county superintendent of Young County.

Too Citified?—Texans may have a chance to vote in the next general election on a constitutional amendment to decide, in effect, whether the Legislature shall "go urban."

House passed a resolution by Rep. Will Earle of Childress to limit representation from the big city counties. As amended, it would provide one representative for each 100,000 population up to 500,000 and one for each 400,000 thereafter.

Primary target was Harris County.

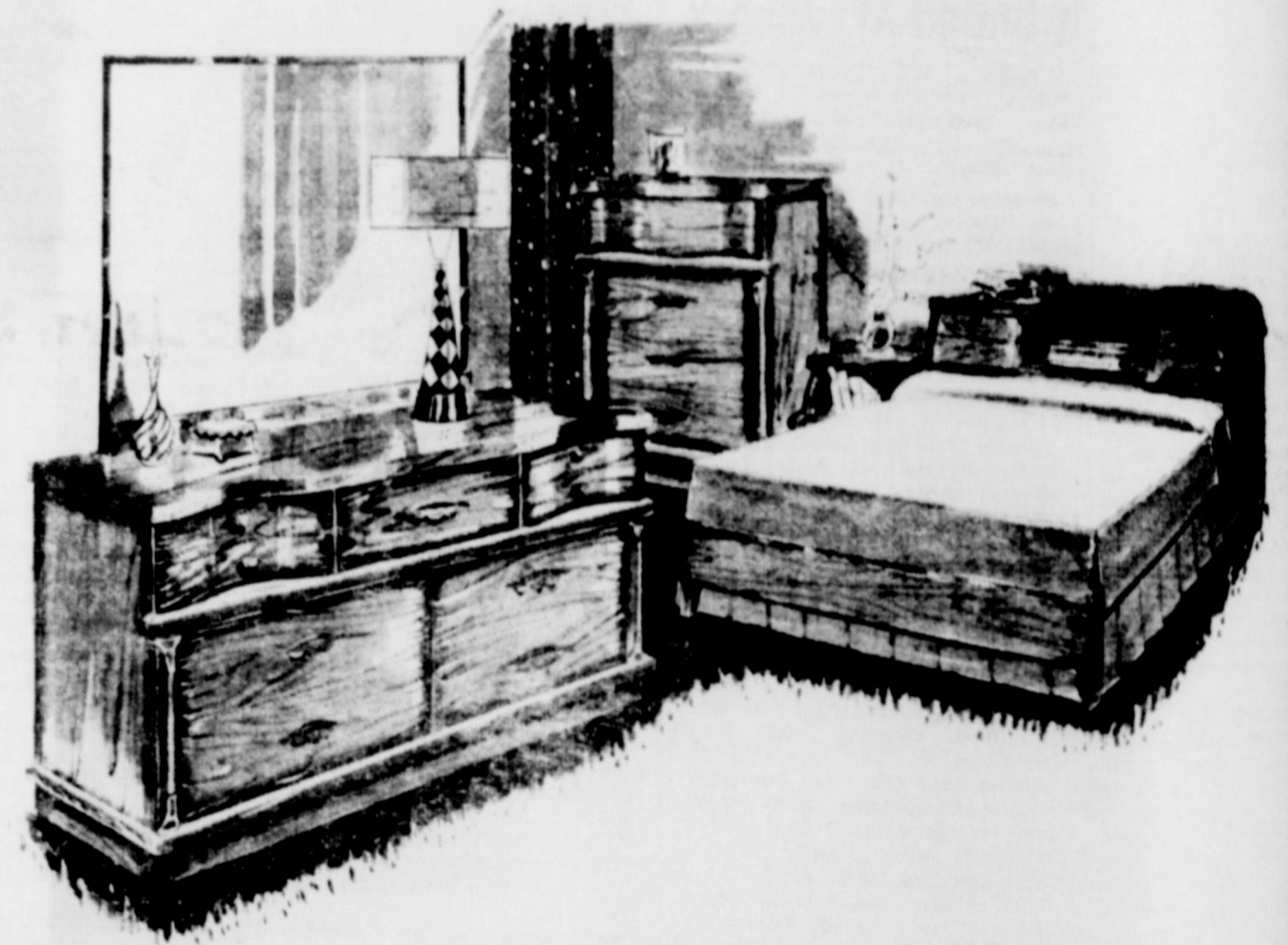

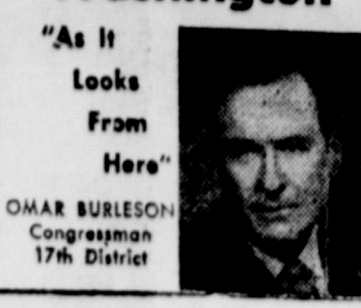

Washington, D. C.—Under the
provisions of legislation passed in
the last Congress, there will be
five experimental plants built in
the United States to convert salt
water to fresh water. A new low-
cost method has been developed
since 1957 at a plant located in
North Carolina. Experiments in a
small plant near Wichita Falls have
produced most satisfying results.

Of the five plants to be built
by the Federal Government, one
will be located on the Atlantic
Seaboard, one on the Pacific, and
one on the Gulf Coast. The other
two plants will be located inland
to convert "brackish" water to fresh
water. West Central Texas cer-
tainly has an abundance of brackish
water to convert. Efforts are be-
ing made to convince officials of
the Department of the Interior of
the feasibility of locating such a
plant in the 17th Congressional Dis-
trict. Competition with this effort
is not only provided by other areas
in the State of Texas, but by New
Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma and
many others. The first reaction by
the Department of the Interior is
that Texas will likely have a salt
water plant on the Gulf and that
another would not be located in
the State. Regardless of this dis-
couraging logic, efforts will be con-
tinued to get both plants for Tex-
as.

and other conditions seemingly is
not convincing enough.

Speaking of resources in Texas,
both human and economic, those
of us only a short distance away
forget that almost the entire world
supply of helium gas is located
within a 250-mile radius of Ama-
rillo. It is of the highest strate-
gic importance to our Nation's
Atomic Energy Program and in
outer space experiments. It is used
in welding light metals for jet
aircraft, rockets and for other pur-
poses for which there is no ade-
quate substitute. It is used for
refrigerating other gases in a high-
ly developed scientific way. From
reports, the supply produced near
Amarillo is limited and may not
last more than 20 to 30 years long-
er. There has been some indica-
tion that the Congress may be ask-
ed to institute some sort of con-
servation program for storing and
recovering about three billion cubic
feet of helium. The Interior
Department has proposed new
plants to be located on helium gas
pipe lines, in an effort to recover
that lost each year in natural gas
transmission for fuel to areas far
removed from Amarillo. It is cer-
tainly important to conserve all
natural resources, and especially
this one for which the supply is
seriously limited, as related to its
present day consumption.

Likewise, it is vitally important
that we practice the very best water
and soil conservation possible.
These resources will not be with
us for always unless we handle
them with care.

This matter of converting salt
water and brackish water to fresh
water at a cost we can afford to
pay, certainly could be a boom to
dry West Texas.

Due to the fact I expect to spend
the week following Easter in my
Congressional District, this column
will not appear next week.

You'll find white bass fishing at its finest just below Marble Falls Dam. It's at the head of Lake Travis on the Colorado River in Central Texas.

Several conditions combine to make Marble Falls the white bass capital for a large part of the angling population of Texas.

First, the fish are there in profound numbers.

Second, Marble Falls is in weekend distance of most Texans, as the spot is not far from the geographical center of the state.

Third, good fishing water is of easy access. This, thanks to the ingenuity and energy of an Austin Dentist, fisherman, and entrepreneur, Dr. C. H. Roper. He built a contraption called "The Ramp" — where you can ride a cable car up and down the steep cliff.

We'll describe The Ramp in a minute. But first, a word about why the sandies are here in such profusion.

There are many places on the Highland Lakes where you can catch strings of big white bass. But nowhere else will you find so many, in such great numbers, in so small a place, so much of the time.

It just happens that whites find the water below Marble Falls Dam exactly to their liking. When power is being generated, they crowd into the tail race to enjoy the gushing water. When the generators are not in operation they retire to the deeps or chase shad that school on the surface.

Come spawning season, the white bass head upstream, looking for shallow water and a rocky, sandy bottom for the best egg-laying conditions. Well, sir, Marble Falls is as far upstream as the fish can get in Lake Travis, a 65-mile long body of water. And here, below the dam, conditions for white bass spawning are ideal. Then too, the shad school here. And if you say "shad" to a white bass, it's like saying "steaks on" to hungry newspapermen. They come a running!

So, how do we get to this fabulous place?

Until recent months, fishermen either climbed down a dangerous cliff to get there or they pulled their boats through rocky shallows below the dam. Either way they risked their necks. So, Dr. Roper figured a way to ease the path, make the fishermen happy, and pick up a little loose change for himself.

Owning land below the dam, atop the cliff, Dr. Roper also wanted to get down there and fish without climbing over all those rocks. So, he dynamited a path along the cliffside. That made walking up and down easier. People heard about his "ramp" and came flocking to use it. He charged them 50 cents apiece. That paid for the dynamite.

But still it was a steep, hard climb. Roper thought about a "ramp jeep" but changed his plans when he heard about a resort operator who was employing some sort of cable car to reach down to the water from his high place above. That seemed like a solution.

So, Roper improvised an installation to fit his situation.

He located some abandoned railroad track, salvaged rail and ties. A railroad construction crew, temporarily laid off, put down the track. A secondhand elevator furnished the mechanism to raise and lower the "hand car." The car itself was constructed so that its front wheels were higher than the back ones. This in order to keep the floor level despite the incline.

Today everything is automatic. Just push the button and you're on your way. The car glides slowly downward, alongside the 140 foot cliff at a 35 degree incline over a course of 300 feet. Now one can eliminate the danger in clambering down the rocks, or trying to navigate the boulder-studded channel from downstream in a boat. However, those routes still are pursued by a few of the daring ones.

But let's take a trip to this place and see what's there.
First, we park our car at the top of the bluff, putting the front wheels securely against a log, so placed to prevent the machine from going over the cliff. Nearby are cabins for those who can't get enough of the white bass fishing in one day. There's a little store and tackle shop at the "take off" spot, attended by Bill Corley. From Bill we get our tickets (\$1) to ride the cable car. Tickets are good for

24 hours.

From Bill we also get minnows and whatever artificial lures we need to entice the fish.

Four at a time can ride the cable car, which is a busy little apparatus, carrying fishermen up and down all day long when the weather is decent.

When we reach the bottom, there is a choice to be made. Either we follow the bank to the dam or we fish near a string of boulders jutting out into the current.

There are fishermen all along the bank and out on the boulders. There are people out in the water, some wearing waders and some getting wet. There are a few boats, clustered just beyond the swift water
