### MRS. J. TRAVIS FOSTER TO TEACH AT COLEMAN

Mrs. Travis Foster of Cross Plains, who has taught English in the San Angelo public school system the past two years, has accepted a similar position at Coleman for the 1961-62 school term.

Have you ever wondered what goes on at a public school plant during Summer months when classes are not in session?

A Review writer took a long look at the situation one day last week and came up with the following answer.

Two maintenance men — E. H. Oliver and I. V. Tension — have been going in a gallop since school closed May 22, getting buildings and equipment ready for hard use by 540 students and 42 school employees when a new term begins Aug 28.

They have repainted and painted 173 windows, inspected and repaired 704 desks and tables, refinished all floors in the high school and ward school buildings, spread 1,200 pounds of fertilizer on lawns and the football field, and kept mowed. Four days are required to mow the grass

Four brothers were fined a total of \$215.20 in County Court at Baird last week on charges of disturbing the peace in Cross Plains.

They are brothers of the late J. D. Windham, Jr., whose grave in the Tecumseh Cemetery was reportedly desecrated on the day of his recent burial.

Also involved in the incident here were Laura Levadelle and Wayne Williams, local residents. They were absolved of blame in connection with the peace disturbance.

Mrs. Williams, 48, and Glenn Moody, 43, also of Cross Plains, are charged in Callahan County Court with desecration of the fresh grave of J. D. Windham, 15, at Tecumseh June 22.

Friday, County Judge Lester Farmer postponed a jury trial for Moody and Mrs. Williams from July 19 to Aug 3.

Hal, Tommv, Robert, and Billy Ray Windham pleaded guilty to disturbing the peace and were each assessed fines and court costs of \$53.80. Mrs. Williams and Wayne Williams were freed on bond on the disturbing the peace charge.

Witnesses report the four Windham brothers accosted Mrs. Williams and her husband, perhaps desiring to talk to them, and that Mrs. Williams fired a shot into the air.

Mrs. Williams and Moody have denied disturbing young Windham's grave, they said, however, they were upset about an Arizona cypress tree which Moody had planted and which they allege had been removed to make way for the grave.

Young Windham was fatally injured in a car crash June 18. He died June 19 and was buried June 21.

On the evening of June 21, flowers were jerked from the grave, a marker knocked down and the grave allegedly "stomped."

The encounter in which the shot was fired into the air took place in the northwest portion of Cross Plains reportedly near the Williams' home.

## County Voters Okay Bond Issues By Slight Margins

### Atwell Baptists Open Revival On Sunday

Final tabulation of votes canvassed at Baird Monday afternoon revealed that Callahan County voters favored a \$50,000 bond issue to be used to finance extensive repairs to the courthouse and jail building in Baird.

Voters balloted on two issues. The first proposal, issuance of \$35,000 in bonds for repairs to the courthouse, carried by a

vote of 262 for and 181 against, according to an announcement made Tuesday morning by County Judge Lester Farmer. Second proposal, issuance of \$15,000 in bonds for renovation of the old county jail, also carried but by a narrow nine-vote margin — 226 for and 217 against.

A light vote, totalling 443 was cast in the county voting boxes, as follows:

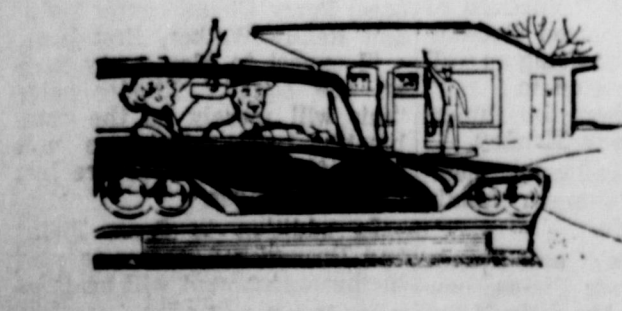

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou discusses the future of the family-size farm this week, without doing anything about his.

Dear editor:

The future of the so-called family farm has been discussed thoroughly back and forth in recent years, especially by big city newspapers and magazines trying to get their minds off the uncertain future of cities, and they all conclude that there's no point in trying to artificially prop up the family-type farm if it can't stand alone, without of course interfering with the urban renewal plans designed to prop up cities that can't stand alone.

It was therefore with a certain amount of puzzlement that I read an article by a columnist in a paper I found out here on this Johnson grass farm yesterday reporting that he had found out that the House Agricultural Committee in Washington had voted that family farms should not be preserved.

The reason I'm puzzled is that I had no notion the future of this farm was in the hands of a committee in Washington. The power of vote is tremendous, but I don't believe they've made the ballot yet that's strong enough to determine the future of this farm. As best I can tell it's future is in my hands, and right now I ain't predicting which way it'll go. Actually, I don't know what the future of the family-size farm is, but I doubt if it's any gloomier than the future of the world-size nation. There's room for worry, any direction you want to look, and always has been.

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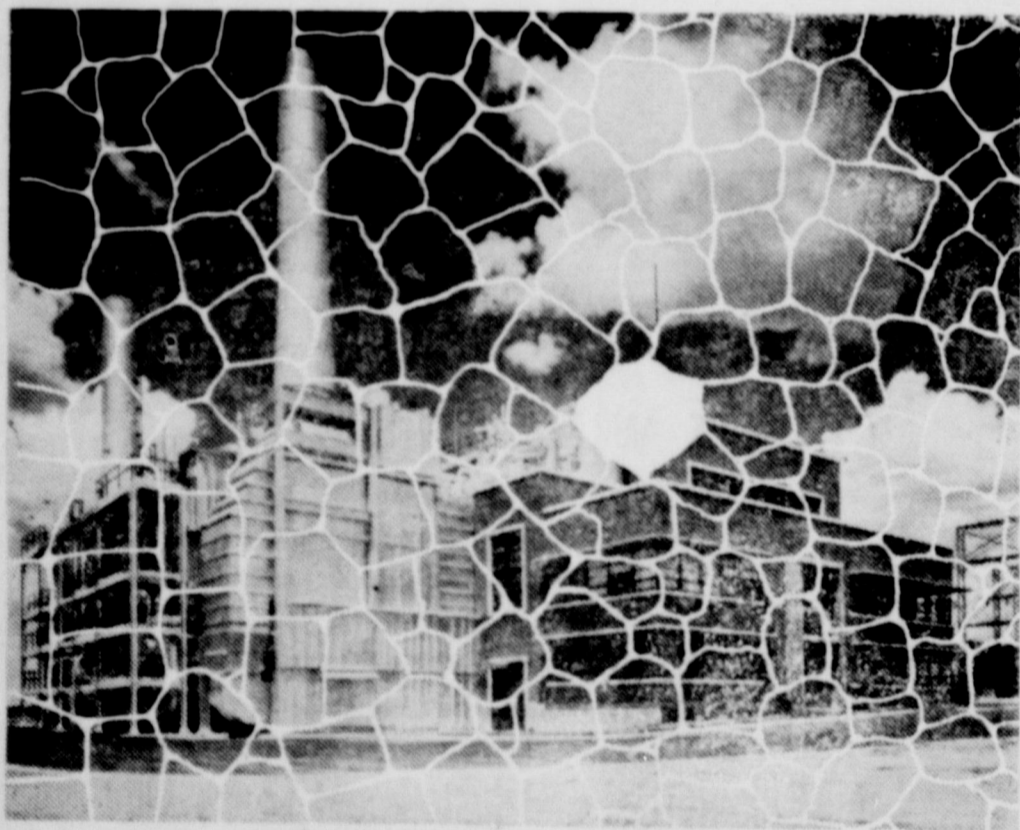


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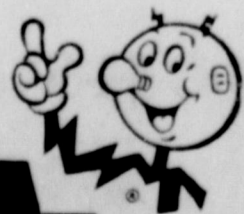

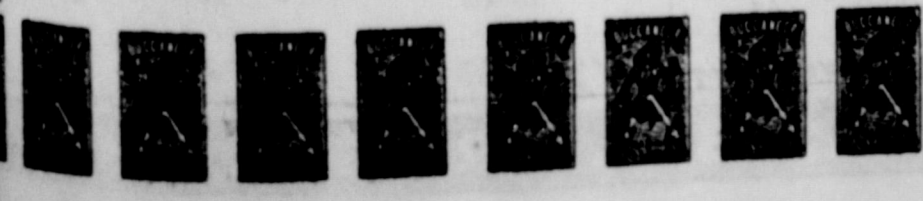

## Clyde School Trustees Let Building Contract

Ferrell Newton, Superintendent of Schools at Clyde, announced the past week that the board of trustees there let a contract for construction of an eight-classroom building, an 800-seat auditorium and an addition to the high school.  
Ross Construction Company's bid of \$186,550 was the lowest of 10 bids.

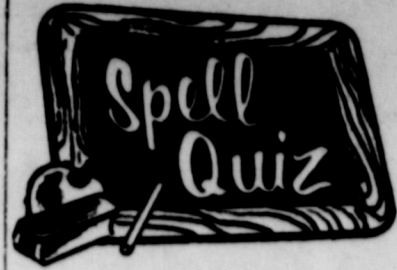
