Old Settlers Reunion Here Last Week Called 'One Of Best Ever'

What old-timers classed as one of the most enjoyable reunions they'd ever held, closed in Cross Plains Friday night, ringing down the curtain on the 23rd annual gathering of pioneer citizens of Callahan County. An estimated 2,500 people were in attendance.

The celebration was opened at 9 o'clock Friday morning with a street parade through the downtown district. The parade was led by Mr. and Mrs. Ed Richardson of Cross Plains, who recently celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. Arranged by Hugh McDermott, who later in the day won the distinction of

being the oldest cowboy present at the reunion, the parade contained 62 horsemen, floats and decorated vehicles. Rising Star Riding Club was a feature of the event.

Formal program was opened at 10 a.m. at the City Park with group singing, led by Dorothy Boydston Harper of Abilene. An inspiring welcome address by S. F. Bond, retiring president of the Pioneer Association; a silent tribute to deceased old-timers, and a rousing speech by Associate Justice of the Texas Supreme Court Meade F. Griffin, a native of Cottonwood, rounded out the morning program.

Justice Griffin, a combat veteran of two World Wars, stirred the large audience with a reiteration of American heritage proclaiming: "It is an honor for a young man to fight for the preservation of freedoms this country offers, and if it ever becomes necessary for my sons to shoulder arms in support of these ideals, I expect them to do it with enthusiasm and valor."

Griffin's speech concluded the morning program and basket luncheon was spread beneath the boughs of towering Oaks in the City Park.

During the afternoon special recognition was given old settlers in 13 separate categories. They included:

Earliest cowboy, Hugh McDermott, who arrived in 1887.

Earliest pioneer man, Tom Dawkins of San Antonio, who came to Callahan County in 1876.

Earliest pioneer woman, Mrs. H. N. Ebert of Baird, who came here in 1882.

Earliest pioneer man with continuous residence in the county, H. L. Harris of Cross Plains, who also was the oldest native-born man in the county, born in 1879, and the oldest native-born man with continuous residence here.

Earliest pioneer woman with continuous residence, Mrs. J. E. Morrison of Baird.

Oldest native-born woman with continuous residence, Mrs. Mary Renfro of Cross Plains, born in 1885.

Man coming the greatest distance to the reunion, W. S. Norton of Portland, Ore., 3,000 miles.

United Fund Moving To Reality In Cross Plains

Representatives of six civic organizations met last week and completed plans for a United Fund organization in Cross Plains to handle all local charities.

A constitution and by-laws were adopted and date set for the first annual financial drive. It will be made during October.

Organizations and their representatives working in the movement were: Eastern Star, Mrs. Russell Calhoun; Parent-Teacher Association, J. H. Cox and Mrs. Nathan Foster; Lions Club, Rev. John Harper and Ted Souder; Sew and So Club, Mrs. Edwin Neeb; Garden Club, Mrs. Fonia Worthy, and Chamber of

Commerce, Rev. Harold G. Wise.

The group declared itself a temporary board of directors and elected the Rev. Mr. Wise president of the directorate. Constitution and by-laws, approved by the group, is published elsewhere in today's issue of the Review.

A meeting will be held in the basement of the First Methodist Church Aug. 28 to set up a permanent organization. All persons who plan to support the United Fund are being urged to attend and participate in that session. It is also pointed out that units which expect to receive financial support from United Fund are expected to

have two representatives in attendance, prepared to outline the amount of money needed and the reason why.

"We will need, for instance, representatives from the Red Cross to present their requests for the ensuing year", say members of the temporary directorate, "and the same is true of committees which plan to raise money for fight on cancer, heart disease, polio, etc; such organizations as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and the like must also make their needs known".

It is pointed out that since only one financial drive will be made in the Cross Plains area next year, it will be imperative that all publicly-supported organizations present their needs and be included in the United Fund budget.

A nominating committee, composed of Mrs. Calhoun, Mrs. Neeb, Souder, Jack McCarty, Howard McGowen and the Rev. Mr. Wise, ex-officio member, will suggest names of 12 directors to replace the temporary board at the Aug. 28 meeting.

The constitution and by-laws provide for a committee of directors to recommend which agencies will receive help from the fund and how much, however, final decisions will be vested in the full board.

Realizing Cross Plains has long needed a more systematic manner in handling its charities, local business and professional men fostered formation of the United Fund here. The organization is now handling all charities in most cities throughout the nation.

"Our old plan of giving grease only to the squeaking wheel left many worthy causes without support and those who have labored so well in perfecting a more systematic procedure deserve the praise and admiration of everyone," said F. V. Tunnell in expressing what appeared to be the consensus of the community in this matter.

First meeting of the United Fund organizers was opened and closed with prayer. Future meetings will be similarly constituted.

Core Drilling On Flood Control Dams To Start

Core drilling is scheduled to begin on Floodwater Retarding Structure sites on Turkey Creek by early September, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service in Brownwood.

Field survey crews with the SCS Construction Office in Brownwood started detail surveys for core drilling and design on Site 2 last week. Others on the immediate schedule for surveys are sites 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9,

10 and 12. This preliminary work will be completed by early November, Hughes states.

Construction is scheduled to begin on the Turkey Creek Floodwater Retarding Structures soon after the first invitations for bids are issued on or about Dec. 12 of this year. Ralph W. White, Project Construction Engineer from the Brownwood Office, will supervise construction of the work on Turkey Creek.

Presbyterian Church Here Chartered As Corporation

First Presbyterian Church here is a corporation.

The church's charter was renewed this week by Texas Secretary of State, licensing it to operate as a corporation until April 20, 2011.

Although the local congregation was first organized at Cottonwood Aug. 9, 1896, and moved to Cross Plains Dec. 8, 1899, it did not become a corporation under Texas law until April 20, 1911. First pastor was the Rev. W. E. Green.

All signers of the original corporate charter, who were listed as trustees, are now deceased. They were: J. H. Williamson, Henry Harpole, J. C.

Garrett, E. J. Barr, S. C. Barr and W. V. Orr. Present trustees of the corporation are: Jim Barr, Jim Settle, Collis Eager, Joe Fleming, Dr. Carl J. Sohns and Harold Garrett.

Correct name of the church according to its charter is Cross Plains Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Charter members were: J. W. Gage, M. J. Gage, H. B. Sparks, W. V. Orr, Belle Orr, S. S. Ramsey, A. C. Ramsey, S. R. Harris, M. E. Harris, S. B. Harris, Bertie Harris, H. Harpole, N. E. Harpole, W. R. Brown, Mollie Brown, Caroline Sullivan, Elias Norton, R. S. Tipton and Ida T. Tipton.

Sheep And Goat Raisers Must Help Pay Government Trapper

Callahan County sheep and goat raisers met in the courthouse at Baird Monday morning and laid plans for keeping a government trapper at work in this county.

Hugh Norman, who lives at Baird, has been trapping predatory animals the past year and ranchers report coyote, bobcat and fox populations have been noticeably thinned. Flocks of sheep and goats no longer suffer such drastic casualties, they say.

"It was agreed at the meeting Monday morning that another

year's work would mean the saving of thousands of dollars to local ranchers", said Douglas Fry of Putnam, secretary of Callahan County Predator Control Association.

To help finance the federal trapper, local sheep and goat men are being asked to contribute five cents per head of these animals owned. It is pointed out that this pays only \$100 per month of the trapper's salary, the remainder of the expense being borne by the county, state and federal government.

"Without the \$100 monthly

from livestockmen themselves, the program cannot be continued," Fry said.

Assessments may be mailed to Fry at Route 1, Cisco, or sent to the First National Bank in Baird, which serves as depository for the Association.

Norman's salary is \$250 monthly with an expense account of \$146.

Sideline Slants On Old Settlers Annual Round-Up Here

Many interesting reminiscences were heard here last Friday as 2,500 old settlers of Callahan County gathered on the banks of Turkey Creek in City Park here for their 23rd annual reunion.

Mrs. J. A. Coffey of Route 1 Clyde recalled experiences at Cottonwood before the turn of the century. Among much-discussed events which she remembered was the drowning of her father in Turkey Creek 55 years before. The tragic accident occurred Aug. 10, 1906, while the man was fording the stream in a buggy and was caught in a flash rise. Mrs. Coffey—her husband was a brother of the late J. F. Coffey, pioneer Cottonwood merchant—moved to Admiral in 1923 and then to Clyde in 1947. "We've had a wonderful time in your town today", she said,

"this is such a beautiful spot for a public gathering".

Other short sketches gathered by a Review writer during the day-long celebration, concerning old timers in this area are briefly related hereunder:

Gray Powell, early-day banker in Cross Plains, and his wife, Willie Gay, former local music teacher, now make their home in Dallas. Despite advanced years, both are reported enjoying good health.

Joe Pierce, former Callahan County Sheriff, was shaking hands with old friends at the reunion Friday and looking much improved after suffering ill health about two years ago. He now lives in Abilene.

Allen Teston of Rising Star, a former resident of Cross Cut, enjoyed meeting many old acquaintances. Among them was

Associate Justice of the Supreme Court Meade F. Griffin of Austin. The two were friends at Plainview.

Arvin Peavy of Clyde, who lived in Cross Plains until about 1928, had an old timer's badge and appeared to be enjoying the day.

Everybody knows Hugh McDermott. He was shaking hands on all sides throughout most of the reunion.

Miss Eunice Hembree of Scranton, a former long-time resident of Cottonwood, was kissed by an old admirer and didn't blush a bit.

One of the oldest men on the grounds was J. W. (Pappy) Cox, 92, of Cross Plains. Master of Ceremonies B. H. Freeland had several nice words to say about "Pappy" but he was so busy visiting with an old friend that

he missed the tribute.

Judge Meade Griffin's speech was said by many to be one of the finest ever heard at an old settlers reunion. He praised the principles for which America stands and stressed that it is an honor for any young man to fight for the preservation of freedom if such becomes necessary. The judge is a combat veteran of both World Wars.

B. C. Chrisman, whom many people describe as the finest all-around school teacher they ever had, appeared as sharp and alert as ever. He shook a lot of hands Friday and knew the name of most every person he met. "Clay", as most friends call him, served as County School Superintendent longer than any other person in Texas. He is now writing a history of Callahan County.

Bob Norrell, well-known Baird banker, was on hand, reminiscing of days of his boyhood in the Cottonwood locality. "Come in and see our new bank building", he was frequently heard to say.

Mrs. J. F. Boren of Abilene, who taught school 28 years, most of it at Baird, greeted old friends and many former pupils. She looked swell.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Stevens, who left here in the mid-1930's now live at 708 Harris in Cisco. He was employed in the oil field here and lived just south of town. They were among old timers renewing acquaintances at the old settlers reunion.

Mrs. Sam Carson, who moved from Cross Plains shortly before 1930, now resides in Dallas. She has married again and her

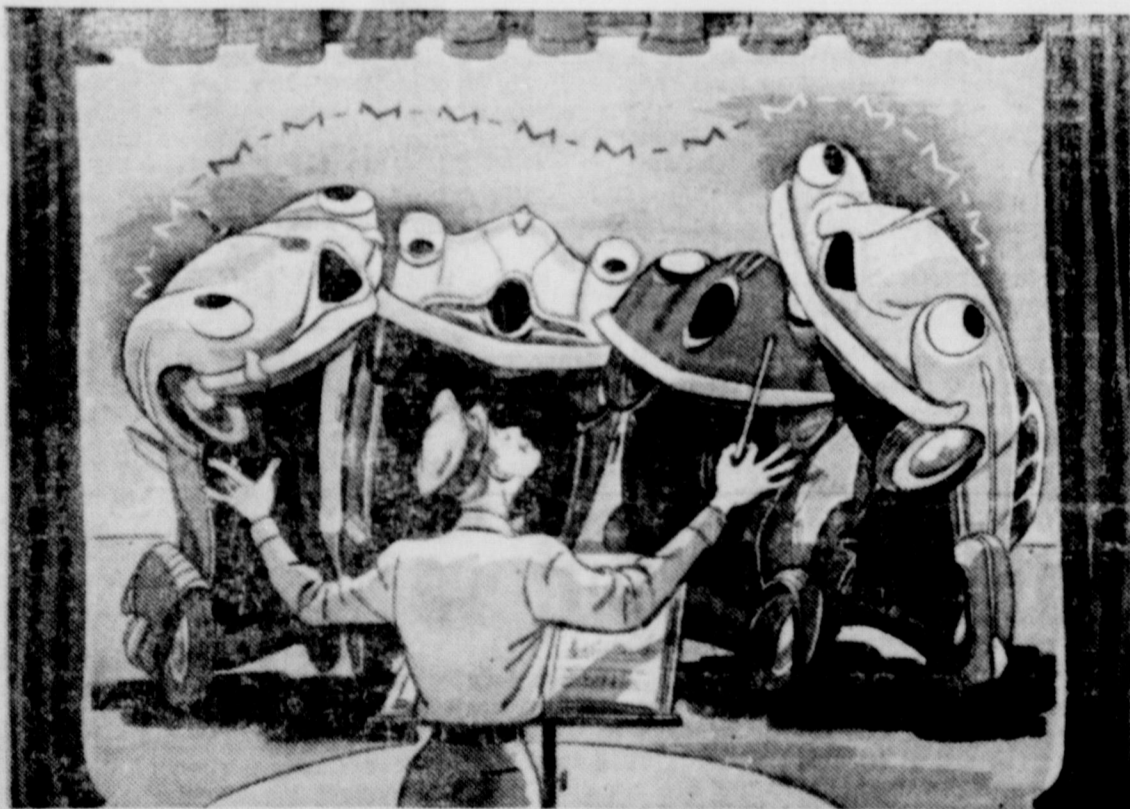

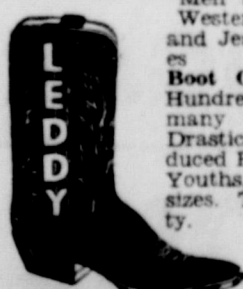

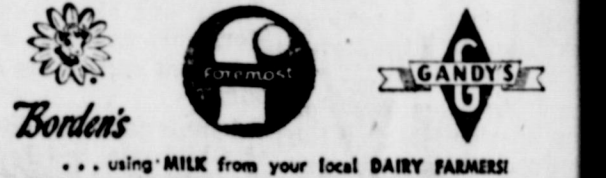
