A junior at Cross Plains High School, Miss Sharlla Payne, walked off with top twirling honors Friday as the annual McMurry College Summer Band and Twirling School staged its final concert program in Abilene.

Miss Payne, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hadden Payne of Route 1, Cross Plains, was named Miss McMurry Twirler for 1962. She was chosen by the twirling faculty as outstanding baton artist in this year's school.

Sharlla is first chair clarinet player in the Cross Plains band. This was her third year as a student in the McMurry Band and Twirling School. She had already won 10 medals and two trophies in twirling and Saturday entered the National Baton Twirlers Association competition in Brownwood.

Sharlla, 15, began twirling in the first grade. Another Cross Plains baton

artist, Sue Edington, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. (Hick) Edington, was chosen as an Outstanding Twirler of the McMurry school both weeks. Sharlla was given the same honor the first week of the school.

Rainfall Still Sub-Normal After 2-Day Drizzle Yields 3.10 Inches

Rainfall late last week made July the second wettest month of 1962. Three and one-tenth inches were recorded. Only June, when 6.22 inches fell, has been wetter.

Last week's precipitations came under what farmers and ranchers described as ideal conditions. It fell gently, beginning shortly before midnight Wednesday and continuing almost uninterruptedly through Thursday. Most all streams in the area ran, however, none bank-

full. Total rainfall received in Cross Plains thus far this year has been 11.05, about three inches below normal for the first seven months.

2 Retention Lakes Catch First Water

Two recently-completed retention dams, built near here as a soil conservation practice, caught their first water over the week end.

The lake on the Damon D. Jones place, southwest of Cottonwood, and that on Oliver D. Worthy land, just north of Cross Plains, each caught about 10 per cent of capacity.

While these two sites were completed and ready to receive rainfall, four other retention dams in the process of building

were not. Work was slowed at two of those sites when the water had to be pumped away.

Both the finished projects were built by Vilbig Construction Company of Dallas.

At sites two and three, west of Cottonwood, on the Coats and Dean places, Denison Construction Company has been pumping out water caught over the week end in order that work could move ahead. These two jobs are said to be about one-half finished.

Some water was caught at site 12 on the C. B. Edington place and at site 10 on the Annie Davis acreage, south of town, however, work was moving uninterruptedly Tuesday.

These projects, being built by Brown Construction Company, are one-third completed. They will be among the largest of 12 local lakes planned by the Soil Conservation Service.

Legal work is ready on four more dams and contracts are expected to be let on them next month.

The Soil Conservation Service's plan calls for still two more dams to be built in this area, however, these projects have been slowed by easement needs and may be delayed.

Final Rites Wednesday For Burkett Woman, 95

Mrs. W. C. Henderson of Burkett, 95, widow of a prominent early-day rancher in this section of Texas, died Monday night in the Overall-Morris Hospital at Coleman. She had been ill several months.

Born Effie Jane Kellar April 16, 1867, in Missouri, she came to Texas with her parents when nine years of age, settling near Waco. The family migrated further west in 1879 and established a log cabin home just south of the present town of Burkett. She was married to W. C. (Uncle Billy) Henderson, well-known cattleman and land owner, Sept. 25, 1882 in Burkett.

At the time of her 94th birthday Mrs. Henderson told a Review writer: "Death is not something to be feared, one should live in preparedness. I'm ready for the happy reunions over there."

She was a loyal member of Burkett Church of Christ and attended services regularly as long as her health permitted.

Funeral service was held from a Coleman chapel Wednesday afternoon with burial in Burkett's picturesque little cemetery.

This Precinct Now One Of State's Few With No Tax

There are 1,016 commissioner precincts in Texas and less than 90 are said to levy no tax. Commissioners precinct four, comprising Cross Plains, Cottonwood, Atwell and adjacent areas, joined that favored group Monday morning. No tax will be levied for this precinct on the

current roll. The rate to be paid by property owners of precinct four will be less than that in any of the other three Callahan County precincts.

The Callahan County tax rate, which property owners of all precincts must pay, is now 80 cents on the \$100 valuation. The new state rate is 42 cents, making the over-all levy for state and county taxes to be paid by local people \$1.22. To this same amount property owners of other areas will add their respective precinct rates.

Operating funds of precinct four are likewise largest in the county, as is revealed in a recent quarterly financial statement prepared by Miss Hazel Reynolds, treasurer.

"Since first taking office, I have hoped to one day see this precinct a tax free governmental subdivision," said Claude Foster yesterday.

The commissioners court removed the former levy of 30 cents for precinct four at a meeting Monday morning. The action was taken on Commissioner Foster's recommendation, after all bonds levied against the precinct were paid.

State Picks Review To Publish Proposed Amendments

On the classified ad page of today's issue of the Review there appears full text of seven of the 14 proposed amendments to the state constitution to be balloted on by voters at the general election Nov. 6.

A brief digest of the 14 proposed changes to the state constitution follows:

No. 1 on the ballot (HJR 25): Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of all political subdivisions.

No. 2 on the ballot (SJR 9): Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist the needy aged, needy blind and needy children from \$47,000,000 to \$52,000,000.

No. 3 on the ballot (SJR 22):

Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

No. 4 on the ballot (HJR 46): Provides for a state program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

No. 5 on the ballot (HJR 51): Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

No. 6 on the ballot (HJR 36): Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointed officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for 12 years or more.

No. 7 on the ballot (SJR 13): Insures continuity of state and

local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the legislature.

No. 8 on the ballot (SJR 7): Establishes a ceiling of \$2,500,000 per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

No. 9 on the ballot (HJR 70): Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits

the legislature to authorize the creation of two hospital districts in Brazoria County.

No. 10 on the ballot (SJR 12): Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a public school board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

No. 11 on the ballot (SJR 25): Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having first been offered for resale to veterans.

No. 12 on the ballot (SJR 19): Delegates limited zoning powers

to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

No. 13 on the ballot (SJR 6): Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

No. 14 on the ballot (HJR 32): Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from action, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.

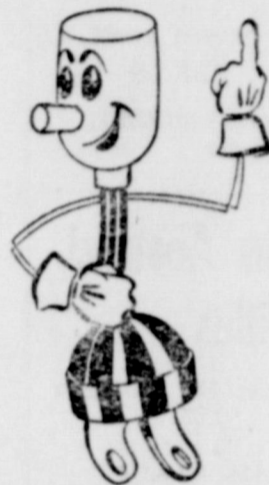

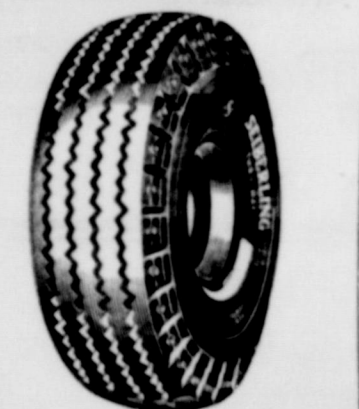

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, providing for the proclamation and publication of the proposed amendment by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:

"Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of

the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not in any manner, affected, amended, impaired, suspended, repealed or superseded hereby.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

The accounting officers of this state shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, salary or compensation as agent, officer or employee of the state at the same time as any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this state or any other state, or as a consultant or as a member of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement of expenses, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency or the governing board of the institution in which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interest."

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Auction Re-Set For Saturday Afternoon

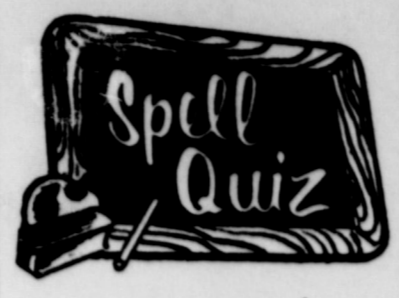
An auction previously advertised, then canceled, has been reinstated and will be held on schedule Saturday afternoon.
