## Parade Arranged For Old Settlers Reunion

Plans were being completed yesterday for the 25th annual reunion of Callahan County pioneers to be held in Cross Plains Aug. 9.

The silver anniversary celebration will be opened with a downtown street parade at 9 a. m. The procession will move through the business district and to the City Park on the banks of Turkey Creek, in the west edge of town.

Seven area riding clubs have been invited to participate in the parade and at least 200 horsemen are expected. Asked

to have part in the procession- al were riding clubs from: Rising Star, May, Comanche, Brownwood, Bangs, Baird and Coleman. Trophies are to be awarded the top three riding groups. Cross Plains riders will also appear but will not be in competition for awards.

Carrying out the theme of silver for the 25th anniversary reunion, old settlers winning various phases of programmed competition will be given souvenir silver dollars in addition with the usual badges of recognition.

Johnny Adair, president of Cross Plains Riding Club who will act as marshal for the parade, said that riders and other entries will assemble at the old ice house on South Main and that the procession will begin from that point.

## Early Opening Set For Schools Here

Cross Plains schools will begin the 1963-64 school term the last Thursday in this month. Date is Aug. 29.

Superintendent Paul Whitton announced yesterday that Mrs. Winfred Scott of Oplin had been elected to teach homemaking, completing the 26 teacher faculty. Miss Donita White of Albany, who had previously been chosen to replace Miss Mary

Helen Strong, who resigned after teaching here seven years, declined the place to accept a position at Big Spring.

Mrs. Scott was county home demonstration agent in Callahan County in 1947, '48 and '49. She later taught at Eula and in Abilene Christian College. She and her husband and their three children will move here within the next two weeks. One of her children is in the third grade, another in the eighth and 2

other is pre-school age. Opening of the new school term on Aug. 29 will permit dismissal May 22, 1964.

"The early opening date is necessary to allow for any possible days of dismissal for extreme weather during winter months," said Mr. Whitton.

The term will begin on Thursday and after two days will recess for the long week end, which includes Labor Day, Sept. 2.

## \$3,280 Is Paid For New Church Pews

Auditorium of the First Baptist Church here will be equipped with new pews during the latter part of September.

A committee, representing the congregation, visited a Brownwood manufacturing concern Monday and placed the \$3,280 order. The pews are to be of solid oak, with communion cups and song book racks on the back and have two-inch foam rubber cushions.

The fund to purchase the pews had been building for several weeks and it was over-subscribed Sunday morning as worshippers dropped \$1,600 in collection plates.

Representing the church in the purchase Monday morning was a committee composed of Mrs. A. J. McCuin, chairman, Mrs. Exal D. McMillan, Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Renfro, Grady Ramey and the pastor, the Rev. Don Turner, ex-officio committee member.

## Local LL Team Closes Most Glorious Season

The most successful Little League All-Star team Cross Plains ever fostered ended its season Friday night in Brownwood.

All-Stars of 1963 won the first play-off game in history for the home town, took the Area 3 crown, and met defeat only in the finals of District 23 play-offs.

A late inning rally, for which the locals were becoming famous and by which two victories were notched, fell one run short Friday night in Wendell Maves Park.

Minute All-Stars whipped Ranger 6-3 in a seven-inning thriller Thursday night, before bowing to Coleman 5-4 in finals Friday.

Cross Plains used its late rush strategy well Thursday in overcoming a 3-0 Ranger lead.

After a scoreless first two frames, Ranger took the lead with three runs on one hit, one walk and two errors.

Although the locals had base runners in every inning except the third, it was the fifth before they drew blood.

Randy Foster, lf, hit a lead-off single, was pushed to second as James McMillan was hit, and crossed the plate when catcher David Merryman smacked a 2-2 ground rule double to center.

Cross Plains tied the score in the top of the sixth. Mike Rhodes, lb, drew a walk, Rickey Jones, pitcher, singled and Robert Merrill, cf, doubled home the tying runs, forcing extra innings.

In the seventh the locals bat-

tered the third and fourth Ranger pitchers for three runs. Richard Pope, 2b; Donnie Wilson, ss; and Larry Bishop, 3b, all drew bases on balls. Jones singled one run home. Merrill walked to force in another and Foster sacrificed the final tally.

Rickey Jones, following his traditional performances in going the route, allowed Ranger three runs on two hits, struck out 11 and issued two walks.

Ranger worked Jones for a base runner in the first and second, three runs in the third, but thereafter managed just one more base runner.

Cross Plains collected six runs on seven hits, six walks and two Ranger errors.

A big five-run second inning spelled doom for Cross Plains Friday.

Coleman tallied its first two runs on a homer and scored three more on three errors and a single.

Jones, playing third base, got Cross Plains' first run with a solo round-tripper to right center, and drove in three more in the next inning.

The "never-say-quit" gang cut the deficit to 5-4 in the fifth after two outs on Jones' double scoring Pope, Wilson and Bishop who had singled, walked and singled.

Again in the final inning the locals threatened, but Foster was cut down at third on a ground out and throw out double play.

Larry Bishop did a very creditable job on the mound although he took the loss in hurling the route.

He allowed five runs on seven hits, struck out six, walked one, but there were three costly errors.

Cross Plains out-hit Coleman eight to seven, drew three free passes and there was one Coleman miscue.

District champ Coleman will take on Claude All-Stars in the three-day sectional meet in Big Lake Thursday. The Aug. 1, 3:30 p. m. game will be broadcast by KSTA, Coleman radio station.

Manager D. C. Jones and Coach Bill Strickland both expressed sincere thanks to everyone involved in the Little League organization and the general public for wholehearted support.

Sales through the first six months amounted to \$45,321. Quota for the year is \$190,000.

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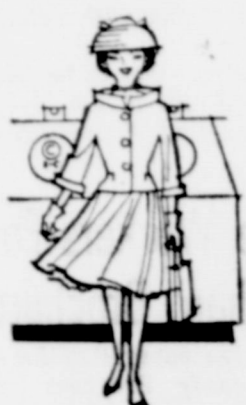

**Helpful Hints About Care of Lawns Given By Pat Garner**

In reply to inquiries from several sections of Callahan County, a brief statement is made this week regarding the care and maintenance of lawns by County agent Pat C. Garner. His helpful hints follow.

During periods of dry weather, proper watering of lawns is an important procedure. Many times improper watering results in very little benefit to the grass and a big waste of time and water.

Light frequent sprinklings produce shallow, weak root systems which encourage weevils. Shallow rootings do not allow efficient utilization of plant food or moisture in soil. Disease incidence is likely to be severe under conditions which produce shallow rootings. Light sprinklings, continued over a long period, make the maintenance of good lawn prohibitive.



### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1962.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1962."

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

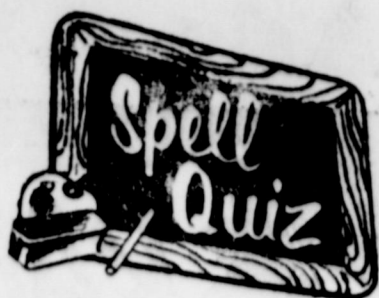

## Low - Flying Planes Practise Over Area

You may be closer to the Air Force than you think. That was the word from Dyess Air Force Base, at Abilene, to residents of Cross Plains area yesterday. Giant C-130 Hercules assault aircraft from the 516th Troop Carrier Wing at Dyess are now making frequent low-altitude practice runs that carry them over the plains of Central Texas at regular intervals.

Col. Burl W. McLaughlin, commander of the 516th, told the following facts about the new airlift operations at Dyess: The C-130, backbone of the assault airlift force for the Tactical Air Command, USAF, is frequently used to carry and drop U. S. Army paratroopers in practice exercises, and, if need be, during the limited or brush-fire wars that may crop up anywhere in the world. In dropping paratroopers in or near enemy terri-

tory, the problem of detection by the enemy's radar network makes the job especially dangerous.

Now, Tactical Air Command has developed a new method for overcoming this risk. C-130 crews fly into the battle zone at very low altitude — about 500 feet — flying under the radar scanning range. Just before the drop zone, the aircraft makes a maximum-performance climb to 1,000 feet, releases up to 65 fully-equipped men, then rapidly drops back to its low-level route.

A practice drop zone has been in operation at Dyess AFB since last March, and it is now being used to qualify 516th crews in the new technique, dubbed "Close Look" by TAC. The flight pattern for "Close Look" takes in the area up to 100 miles north, east and south of Abilene.

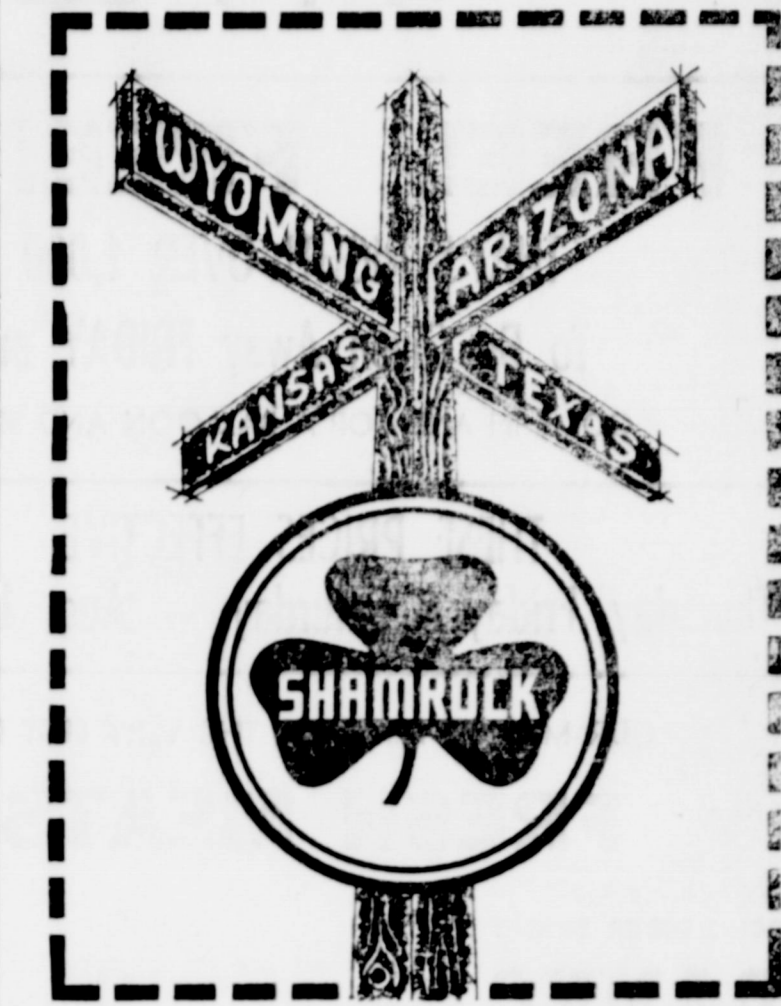

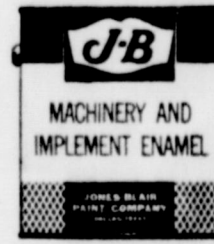
