Hold Poll Tax Money - Lovell

No poll tax payments will be issued in Callahan County until outcome is known of a statewide election to be held Nov. 9, which may abolish the levy as a requirement for voting.

Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell urged yesterday that persons paying property taxes prior to Nov. 9 omit payment of poll taxes until after the referendum. There is no provision in law for rebating, and if the poll tax is not continued as a voting requirement few people are expected to pay the assessment.

If the Nov. 9 amendment is favored by voters, a 25 cent registration fee will become the voting requirement instead of poll tax receipts. Issuance of such receipts would begin in Callahan County Dec. 1.

Lovell also reminded that property taxes paid during October, November and December are subject to a discount on the state's portion of the levy. The discount is three per cent during October, two per cent in November and one per cent in December. The discount con-

cerns only state taxes. County, precinct, school and special local levies are not affected.

Total assessed valuations in Callahan County this year amount to \$13,429,062.14 as compared with \$11,906,876.93 for 1962. This represents a gain of \$1,522,185.21, or more than 12 per cent over the previous year.

Ex - Police Chief At Ranger Chosen To Fill City Marshal Post Here; Starts Wednesday

Robert Patterson, former Ranger Police Chief, was named City Marshal here Monday night at a special meeting of the City Council. He was selected from nine applicants.

Patterson was to begin duties

here Wednesday afternoon, after being sworn in by Mayor Ted Souder.

Patterson is unmarried, 41 years of age and served 23 months as head of the police department at Ranger. Prior to going there he was with Pinkerton's Detective Agency, an in-

ternational organization, three years.

The new marshal will replace E. B. Hindman, who has been serving temporarily since the recent resignation of Bart Thomas.

The marshal's job in Cross

Plains pays \$275 monthly with water, gas and sewer service furnished. He receives an additional \$1 fee on fines in corporation court. The officer is required, however, to provide his own automobile and assume the expenses of operation and maintenance.

Nov. 15 Target Date At Rest Home

Barring work stoppages caused by bad weather, the rest home now being built here is expected to be ready for occupancy shortly after Nov. 15.

Bill J. Gregg of this city, who recently purchased the property with Raymond Lee of Baird, said yesterday that furniture and equipment were bought

Tuesday and that facilities are being arranged to accommodate 30 persons.

"We cannot yet announce a definite date for opening," he said, "however, we have every reason to believe it will be before Thanksgiving."

Target date for completion of construction is Nov. 15.

An open house event, to display the rest home to people of this area, will be set on a Sunday near formal opening date.

Details of this and the names of staff members will be announced in the near future.

Nine workmen were employed on the building project Tuesday afternoon. All walls are

up, the flooring is laid and the roof is going on.

Gregg and Lee are now making arrangements for personnel to staff the rest home. Eight or more persons, some on a part-time basis, are expected to be required. Persons interested in employment are advised to apply at the City Hall Oct. 19.

1963 School Taxes Up To \$60,419.65

Total taxable renditions to Cross Plains Independent School District are \$3,792 greater this year than last.

Assessor-Collector A. J. McCuin said yesterday that valuations this year aggregate \$4,027,977 as compared with \$4,024,005 for 1962. With 100 per cent collections 1962 taxes will bring in \$69,419.65.

Breakdown on 1963 tax renditions is: real estate \$2,095,512, personal property \$619,538, oil and utilities \$1,326,927.

McCuin reported tax payments coming in at a slightly faster than normal pace. "We took in a little over \$3,000 the first two days of the present tax paying period", he said.

New Pest Imperils Peanuts As Boll Weevil Did Cotton

An insect, new to this area, threatens peanut crops much as the boll weevil did cotton 50 years ago. The invaders are cornworm bores.

First evidence of the pest was found in a field on the Cowan Hutton farm, north of Pioneer. Since then, however, several Sabanno area fields, including that of W. B. Holcomb, have been hit.

Damage done by the bores is said to resemble ordinary root-rot.

Hutton, who has 125 acres in peanuts — 60 irrigated and 65 dry land — says the pests hit during the first 20 days of July and are gone before their destruction is realized.

"Unless an entomologist is brought here to educate us about the cornworm bore and ways of combatting him, this country can wave good-bye to peanut farming," Hutton said Monday night.

Hutton harvested 20 acres of irrigated peanuts, averaging 70 bushels to the acre, which sold for \$4,120. This crop was not hit by the bore. A later crop, watered in the same manner and fertilized similarly, was invaded by the pests and the yield suffered more than 50 per cent. Dry land crops at the Hutton place were damaged in about the same proportions.

Texas Voters Will Decide Fate Of Poll Tax In Election Next Month

Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of four explanatory articles dealing with proposed changes to the Texas Constitution to be voted on in a statewide election Nov. 9. This discussion is intended to be unbiased.

Proposition number 1 on the ballot is a proposed amendment to the Constitution to repeal provisions of Section 2 of Article VI, which requires payment of a poll tax to vote. It would give the Legislature authority to provide for the registration of voters by amendment of Section 4 of the same Article.

A system of registering voters in advance of election — how such a system can be assured and maintained — is the basic issue involved. The proposed amendment would not repeal the poll tax, it would simply do

away with making it a requirement for voting. The tax would continue to be levied.

The poll tax when first adopted in Texas in 1845, had nothing to do with voting. It was not a prerequisite to voting until 1902.

First appearance of the poll tax in Texas law was in the general revenue measure passed in 1845. It provided: "there shall be levied and collected a poll tax on every white male of the Republic, between 21 and 50 years of age. The Constitution of 1876 provided that a poll tax of \$1 be levied on every inhabitant of the state, between 21 and 60. The money was earmarked for public schools.

During Reconstruction Days a type of so-called registration of voters created widespread resentment. Agents of the Government, acting as registrars under little restraint of law, were ac-

cused of fraud and intimidation. The system was used to assure that followers of carpet bag rule voted while persons who supported secession were barred from the polls. When the Constitution of 1876 was adopted after authority was recovered from occupation forces, resentment was so strong that the new document provided "no law shall ever be enacted requiring a registration of voters of this state". It was soon found that some method was needed to keep the ballot pure.

Several remedies were tried but in 1902 a constitutional amendment was adopted making the poll tax requirement for voting for persons between the ages of 21 and 60. This is the same provision the Nov. 9 election proposes to repeal.

A proposal to eliminate the poll tax as a prerequisite for

voting in Texas elections was submitted as a constitutional amendment in 1949. It was defeated by a vote of 171,284 to 133,550. Referendums taken last last year by both major parties indicated strong sentiment for repeal but wording of the questions left some doubt as to whether people understood them clearly. Apparently many overlooked the referendums or were not interested since the vote on this subject ran considerably behind that for candidates.

The proposed amendment does not repeal the payment of a poll tax. Section 1 of Article VIII of the Constitution gives the Legislature authority to levy a poll tax and Section 3 of Article VII provides, as previously mentioned, that a poll tax of \$1 on every inhabitant of the state between 21 and 60 years shall be set

apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools. Neither of these two sections would be changed.

As a practical matter collection of the poll tax would become difficult and doubtful. The money for schools, which the poll tax now provides, about \$2,000,000 per year, would probably have to be made up from some other source.

This proposal should not be confused with a proposed amendment to the federal constitution which has been submitted to a vote of the states. If the federal amendment is adopted, it will prohibit requirement by the states of poll tax payment in order to vote for federal offices. This amendment would also relate only to the vote and would not affect legally the right to levy the tax.

The amendment provides that

the Legislature may enact a registration law in anticipation of its adoption and the Legislature passed Senate Bill 132 which will apply to all elections in Texas as if the amendment is approved. It provides for registration of voters before Feb. 1 each year, with a fee set at 25c. It would, of course, be subject to revision or repeal by a future session.

Payment of the poll tax has become entangled in racial issues, and for that reason both sides of the question are stoutly argued.

Proponents of the amendment argue that the poll tax has received so much bad publicity over the nation that a change is needed. Opponents contend just as fervently that elimination of the poll tax will bring about cries of fraud and corruption of years gone by.

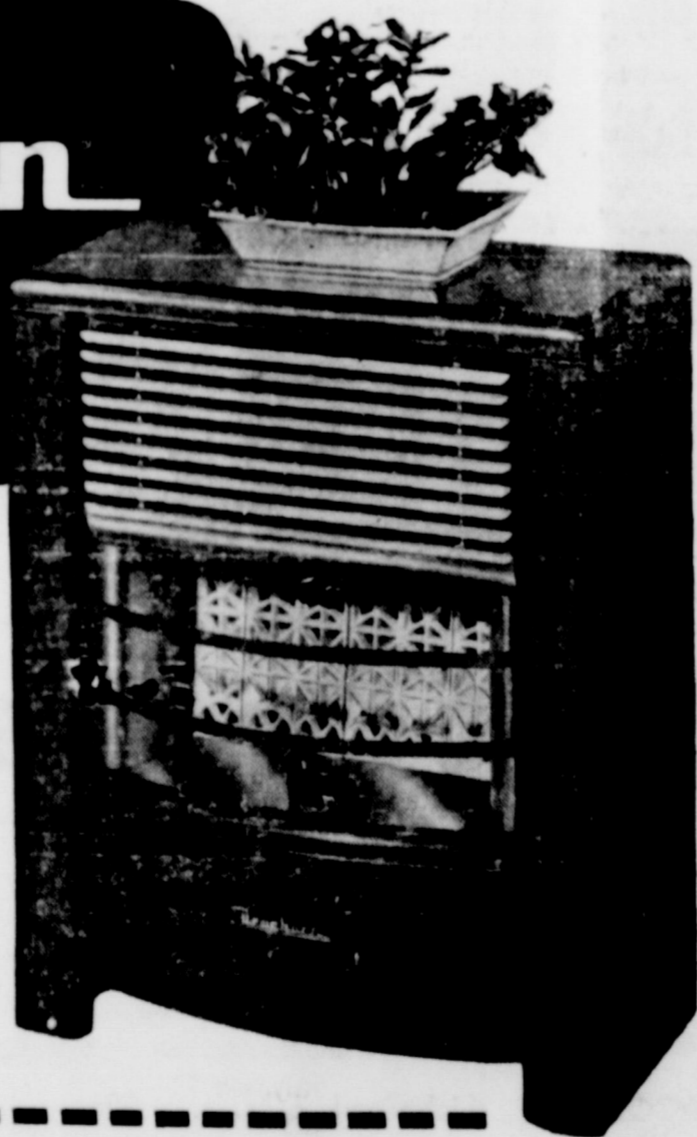

FFA Youths Help Screwworm Fight

"An increase in screwworms this fall could hamper early completion of the program to eradicate the insect," said O. B. Edmondson, Cross Plains High School vocational agriculture instructor.

Opportunity to eliminate the screwworm from the Southwest needs assistance from farmers and ranchers, Edmondson continued.

In cooperation with the eradication program, local FFA youths are conducting a weekly survey of livestock owners to determine whether or not screwworm cases are being found and reported.

According to Edmondson, the survey works like this: (1) Each student is assigned four livestockmen to contact each week end, (2) The student will ask the producer if he found any screwworm cases during the past seven days and if he collected samples and reported the case, (3) Reports from all students are compiled Monday and a single report is sent to headquarters at Mission, Texas.

These reports are used by eradication workers in determining where and how many sterile screwworm flies should be released. Screwworm reports received from vocational agriculture teachers last spring may have prevented serious screwworm outbreaks in many parts of Texas, officials said.

Local livestock producers can help the program by examining their livestock frequently, treating wounds with smears and collecting 10 or more worms from infested wounds and delivering the sample to the vocational agriculture teacher, county agent or livestock inspector.

Edmondson urged farmers and ranchers not being contacted, who find a worm-infested wound, to contact him at once.

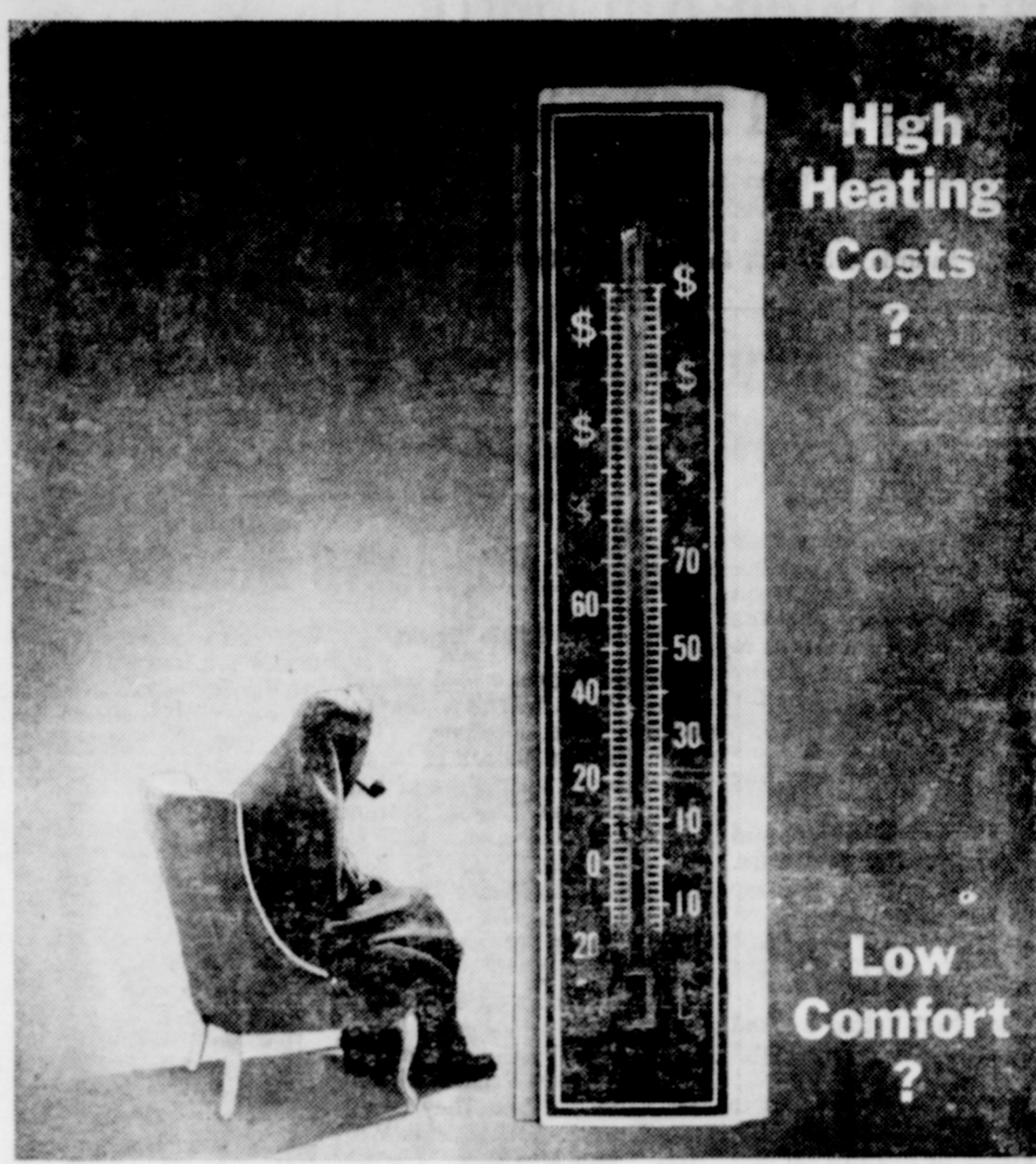

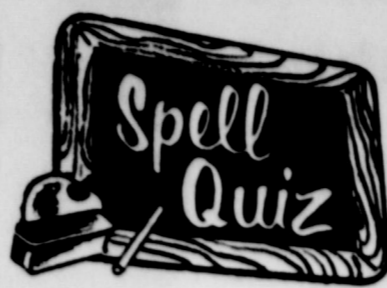
