Election Returns To Be Posted Here

Returns from both Democrat and Republican primaries will be received in Cross Plains Saturday night and posted on a lighted board in front of the Review building.

Aiding the newspaper staff in compiling and tabulating returns will be Claude Foster,

former public official and close observer of the local political scene.

First returns are expected to be available shortly after the polls close at 7 p.m.

Alton Hornsby, who will hold the Democratic election here, said that incomplete results would be announced at closing

time. Periodic reports will be released thereafter until the counting chore is completed.

Returns from other Callahan County voting boxes will be received by telephone and election judges are being asked to telephone the newspaper — 725-3571 — as soon as counts are finished.

Predict 850 Local Votes

With interest keen and both major parties holding elections, usually well-informed sources expect a near-record vote for Callahan County in the first primary Saturday.

Possibly 850 votes may be tallied in Cross Plains. Alton E. Hornsby, Democratic chairman, predicts 800 will ballot in the City Hall. Seven hundred and eighty-seven votes were polled there two years ago. Jack W. Tunnell, Republican county chairman, refused to guess the GOP vote but said it could be heavy. Thirty-five Republican votes were counted here in 1962. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

For the first time in history, Clyde is expected to roll up the largest vote in the county. Poll tax payments there totaled 658, as compared with 582 at Baird and 491 in Cross Plains. Since all county officials for the ensuing two years will be chosen from Democrat ranks, the re-

turns from Clyde are expected to be of more than usual significance.

Persons voting in the Democrat primary in Cross Plains are being asked by Hornsby to bring their poll tax receipts. "We will stamp them with the party label," he said.

Hornsby's helpers are to be: Fred Stacy, Mrs. W. F. Kilgore, Mrs. Chester Glover, Mrs. Elvis Scott, Mrs. Jimmielee Payne, Franzel Odom, Mrs. Forrest Walker and Mrs. L. D. Koenig.

Presiding judge at the Republican primary to be held in the high school study hall will be Mrs. Johnny Adair. Her slate of helpers has not been announced. Republican judge at Baird will be Paul Washburn and George Westfall will be in charge at Clyde.

Both parties will hold precinct conventions Saturday. The Democrat meeting will be at 2 p.m. and the Republican at 7:30 p.m.

Annual Rodeo Begins With Parade Thursday

The old west will live again this week end as Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo opens at Baird Thursday afternoon at five o'clock with a colorful parade through the downtown district or the county seat town.

Rodeo performances will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights in the newly-modernized arena, one mile east of Baird on Interstate 20. Starting time is 8 p.m.

Top Cowpokes

Contestants at this year's show will include a number of world champions, titlists recognized by the Rodeo Cowboys Association of America. Top riders and ropers will pit skill against what is said to be the wildest string of bucking stock ever brought to Callahan County. The show will be produced by Ralph Collier of Austin.

Thursday afternoon's street parade promises to outdo last year's procession which had 621 horsemen mounted and participating. Fifteen riding clubs, including Cross Plains' colorful contingent, will be on hand. In addition there will be area bands and marching groups. Cross Plains High

School Band will make one of its last public performances before leaving next month for Indianapolis, where the local group will be featured in the International 500 Speedway Classic.

\$70,000 Plant

More than \$5,000 worth of work — all volunteer — has recently been completed at the Sheriff's Posse rodeo arena, according to Ira Akers, association president. All wooden pens and bucking chutes have been replaced with steel construction. A new steel announcer's stand has also been built. The plant and facilities are now valued at \$70,000.

A number of speciality acts have been contracted for the three night performances and will be seen in the Thursday afternoon street parade. One of the headliners will be a sheep dog and monkey act of Earl Whorton of San Saba. His daughter, Faye, will put on a performance of trick roping.

With favorable weather the Callahan County show is expected to set a new attendance record this week end. Akers predicts 10,000 will be on hand the three nights.

Man, 43, Tries Suicide Near Putnam Thursday

A 43-year-old man failed in a suicide attempt near Putnam last Thursday at noon.

He was Domineck Anthony Caristi, who was found slumped over the steering wheel of his automobile, parked alongside Interstate 20. All windows of the car were up and the inside was said to be filled with car-

bon monoxide fumes.

Caristi became unconscious and fell over the horn, causing it to sound. The noise stopped a motorist who called an ambulance and the man was taken to Callahan County Hospital. He was carried to a veterans hospital in Waco Friday by Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr. and B. D. Montgomery.

The wedding date has been set for June 6 at First Covenant Church in Dallas.

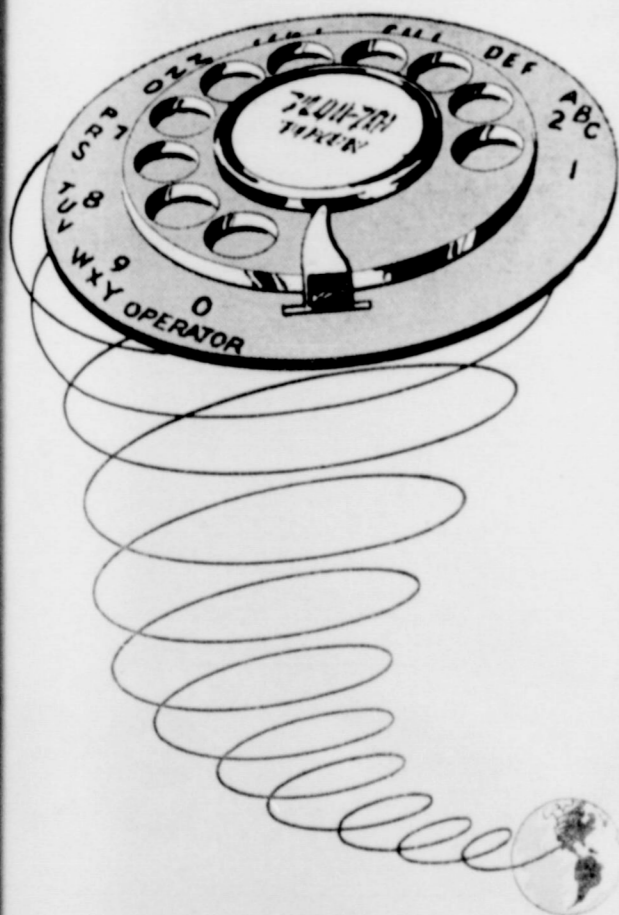

Walker of Odessa and Gene of Perryton; seven daughters, Mrs. Beulah Simpson, Mrs. Murlee Keck, and Miss Ena Mae Walker, all of Cisco, Mrs. Alma Ziehr of Elkins, Ark., Mrs. Blanche Weise of Rising Star, Mrs. Lois Ward of Odessa, and Miss Violet Gaye Walker of Mexia; two sisters, Mrs. E. I. Vestal of Cross Plains and Mrs. Cordula Marshall of Big Spring; three brothers, Herbert of Hermleigh, Finis of Abilene and Walter of Spur; and 13 grandchildren.

FORMER LOCAL WOMAN IN LUBBOCK HOSPITAL

Word has been received here that Mrs. E. G. Pierce, former long-time resident of the Cross Plains area, is recovering from a severe attack of pneumonia in a Lubbock hospital. She now makes her home with her daughter and family, Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Steele.

F. R. Anderson Retires As Postmaster May 1

Thursday is the last day of a long career for F. R. Anderson, who is rounding out nearly 25 years as Cross Plains postmaster.

It was Aug. 1, 1939, that he left a local automobile dealership to succeed Willis J. Brown as head-man of the post office.

The postmaster's salary 25 years ago was \$1,900 a year. Today it is more than four times that amount, \$8,200 annually. Changes equally as great have occurred in the handling and distribution of mail.

Total allowance for clerk hire at the Cross Plains office was \$80 per month when Anderson began. Today an average clerk earns \$466 monthly.

"It would be difficult to single out any one day or incident as the most unusual during my tenure at the post office," Anderson says, "however, I vividly recall the saddest event was that of seeing one of the town's fine citizens killed in a traffic accident just outside the post office door. That was in January, 1946.

He recalls the most enjoyable function at the local post office was that of being able to serve patrons during the years of World War II, when the receipt of mail was often the most important thing on earth to many people. Those four years saw the volume of mail at the Cross Plains office soar to an all-time record. Never before nor since has as much mail passed through the Cross Plains office.

"Perhaps the most unexpected thing to happen during my tenure," Anderson says, "was that of being permitted to remain in office through a Republican administration. Many persons did not think this would be possible, however, the Civil Service appointment did away with the old 'to the victor belong the spoils' practice.

The sweeping changes which Anderson experienced in the postal service are said to have resulted from recommendations of the Hoover Commission. It is no longer necessary for local post offices to handle all business through the main office at Washington, D. C. Delegation of authority to regional offices speeds decisions and keeps schedules and business abreast of current condi-

tions. This was not always possible under the old arrangement, Anderson said.

A total of 24 persons, three of whom are retired and reside here, worked under Anderson during his 24 years and nine months as postmaster.

"They were all dedicated people and enjoyable to work with," he says.

When queried as to which he had liked more, his work in the postal service or that in public business, the retiring postmaster opined that the former had been more pleasant.

Asked if he had any parting word for the man who will take his place, yet to be named, Anderson commented: "I would advise running the office according to postal laws and regulations. My wish to my successor is that he will be favored with the cooperation and friendships which were lavished upon me."

For "Phil," as he is widely known, the only mail he need now worry about is that which comes to his individual box.

"I have no plans for the immediate future, other than taking a long-needed rest."

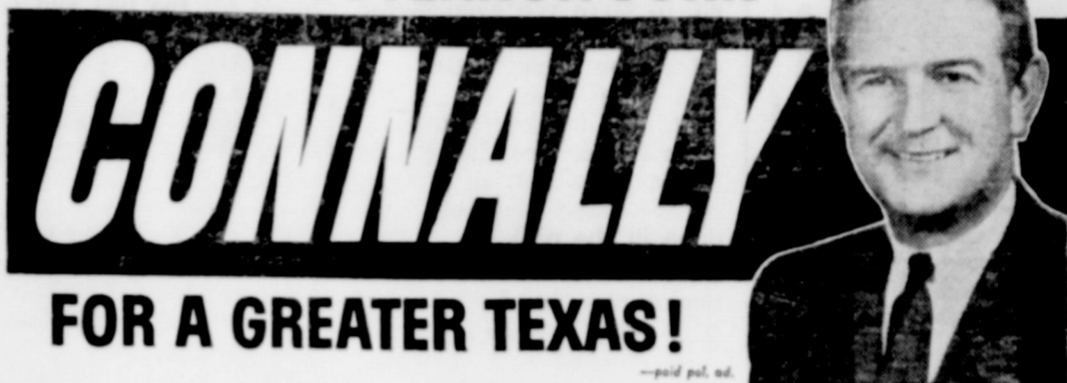
