Small Cities Told Schools Leaving

Superintendent of Schools Wayne Ford and two members of the local board of trustees, Nathan Foster and Roy Neil Tatom, attended a meeting in Abilene last Thursday night where provisions of a report by the Governors Committee on Education were discussed.

Although the controversial conditions of the report are yet to be approved by Texas Legislature, school administrators and trustees were told Thursday night that broad changes are coming. It was implied that most towns the size of Cross Plains, Baird, Clyde and Rising Star will lose their school systems, being replaced by large

consolidated districts, some encompassing entire counties.

Also present at the session in Abilene were R. W. Reynolds, representing Putnam schools; B. M. Coppinger and members of his school board from Eula, L. C. Cash and Jon Tate of Baird, and Ferrell Newton and members of the Clyde school board.

Ford and several members of the Cross Plains school board plan to attend a school administrators conference in Austin Monday, where additional information is to be supplied concerning the trend in secondary education.

Peanut Fields Hold \$ Half Million Crop

A peanut crop expected to exceed 2,500 tons and worth in excess of a half million dollars is now maturing in fields of the Cross Plains area.

Although a few patches have already been dug, buyers and driers predict that harvesting will not get in full swing for another 10 days.

First maturing peanuts to reach Cross Plains came from Clyde, however, several local producers threshed small patches last week. Early gatherers were: R. C. Brown, Damon Jones and Seth and Harold Holden.

Government price support for this year's crop averages about \$13 per ton over last year's subsidy. Average price locally is approximately \$240.25. Three local handlers, buyers

and driers — James Lawrence, Glenn Winfrey and R. D. Boland — were generally agreed Monday afternoon that prospects for this year's crop are better than in 1967, which was an exceptionally good year. It was their consensus, though, that the total yield might be slightly below that of 1966, believed to be the best year for

peanut production in history for this section of Texas.

Many farmers contacted by the Review opined that a good rain within the next few days would add much weight to presently-maturing nuts. Some were of the opinion that as much as 25 per cent additional tonnage might result from an immediate general rain.

Buffaloes Seek Second Victory At Wylie Friday

Stopping a high-geared offense will be the task facing Cross Plains Buffaloes as they take to the road against the Wylie Bulldogs Friday at 8 p.m.

Friday's hosts have romped to two consecutive wins racking up 102 points while giving up only 14. Buffaloes, in search of a second straight non-conference victory, have scored only 18 points while allowing 57 in posting a 1-1 mark.

Veteran Backfield

Bulldogs boast a powerful, experienced quarter of backs. Quarterback Wayne Clark, 160, and David Hobbs, 150, are returning starters from last year's 7-3 squad. Joining that pair are lettermen Doc Sublett, 165, and Richard Dodson, 160. In two games Wylie ball carriers have racked up 617 yards on the ground with another 184 yards through the air for 801 yards total offense.

A big, tough forward wall is spiced with starters on the 1967 unit. Heading the returning list is Bill Green, 220-pound tackle, and Jimmy Leverett, 195-pound guard. Steve Lindley, scaling 205, is the other tackle, and 170-pounder Greg King is the pivot. Lightest lineman is guard Larry Reeves at 160. Experienced Tommy Ward and Gary Graham at ends round out the veteran offensive line.

Buff Defense Better

Buffalo defense looked much better last week against Rising Star, and in fact it was the first time that an opponent had not crossed the Herd's goal line in 30 games. Last time Bi-

sons blanked a foe was second game of the 1965 campaign, 20-0 over Santa Anna.

Barring practice injuries, the Herd should have all but possibly one or two players ready Friday. Fullback Jesse Moon is still sidelined with an ankle injury, and tackle David Merryman suffered an apparent slight concussion Friday. J. S. Archer, tackle, is to be back in pads, and Vern Webb, guard who sustained a bruised shoulder, should be ready according to Head Coach Les Cowan.

2 Proposed Changes To State Constitution Impartially Explained

Editor's Note: Here are the sixth and seventh of 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which will be explained in the order in which they will appear on the official ballot to be voted Nov. 5. These analyses are intended to be unbiased.

Number six of the proposed amendments which you will vote FOR or AGAINST, reads as follows:

"A constitutional amendment giving the legislature permissive authority to exempt from ad valorem taxation devices in

stalled to eliminate or abate harmful effects of air emissions or water effluents on air and water quality of the state."

Proponents say that health and welfare of the people of Texas and progress of the state are dependent in large measure on the purity of the air we breathe and the abundance of fresh, clean water. They point out that installation of anti-pollution devices requires costly capital outlays by individuals and corporations affected by recently enacted legislation, and those complying with statutes at great expense should not be further penalized by higher ad valorem taxes.

Opponents contend that the ad valorem tax exemption which the proposed amendment permits the legislature to authorize would be contrary to "equal and uniform" standards for taxation that Texans and Americans hold as a fundamental right. They say that granting this exemption on the premise that the health and welfare of Texans are served thereby could be applicable with equal logic to capital expenditures for safety devices designed to reduce occupational hazards. Increased value of property resulting from capital improvements should be taxed accordingly, no matter the purpose of the improvements, they say.

Proposed amendment No. 7 reads as follows: "Providing for continuously reducing state ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all state ad valorem property taxes after Dec. 31, 1976, with the exception of the tax levied for certain institutions of higher learning." Those favoring this amendment point out that state ad valorem tax has long been the subject of attack on the basis that it is poorly and inequitably administered. They say that under-evaluation, evasion and lack of uniformity in assessment rates from county to county, among different kinds of property within the same county, and among

individual owners of the same kind of property in the same county exists in many instances. Proponents say adoption of the proposed amendment would overcome these inequities in keeping with the constitutional mandate that taxation be "equal and uniform." They contend that complete abolition of the state ad valorem tax by gradual reductions over a period of years as proposed by this amendment would not create undue pressure on the state fiscal structure and would benefit counties and local subdivisions now finding it ever harder to meet growing government needs with present revenue sources, by making ad

valorem taxes exclusively available to them. Opponents contend that phasing out ad valorem taxes at a time when it is increasingly difficult to obtain funds needed for state government, as proposed by this amendment would necessitate an increase in other taxes, possibly the sales tax, to provide compensating revenues. Tax experts are already predicting an increase in the present sales tax, they say. The ad valorem tax, though it may sometimes be inequitably assessed is drawn from those most able to pay, and abolition of it would inevitably benefit the "haves" at the expense of the "have nots."

Throng Pays Farewell Respects To Beloved Citizen

Cross Plains paid final respects to one of its most-beloved citizens last Thursday morning. All business houses closed during funeral services for Fred Tunnell, 69, who died unexpectedly two days before in Cody, Wyo., where he and Mrs. Tunnell were on a vacation trip with Mr. and Mrs. Tom

Beene of Comanche. Death was attributed to heart attack. Higginbotham Funeral Home's elaborate new chapel was crowded far beyond capacity and hundreds stood outside with bared heads for the memorial service, conducted by the Rev. Lloyd Coker, of Palo Pinto, and the Rev. W. C. (Bill) Craw-

ford, local Methodist pastor. District Superintendent Floyd Johnson of Cisco, with whom Mr. Tunnell had often worked in matters concerning the Methodist Church, assisted.

News of Mr. Tunnell's passing cast a pall of gloom upon this community. The deep affection in which he was held by the people of this and surrounding communities was attested by the throngs at the funeral and interment services, by the floral tributes and memorial remembrances made to his church and charities which he had so often supported, and in countless other ways that one friend mourns the passing of another.

Born Dec. 21, 1898, in Comanche, Mr. Tunnell was reared at Rising Star and began his financial career with the old First National Bank in 1917. After two years with that institution he moved to the Continental State Bank and continued with that organization and its successors until coming to Cross Plains, to head the Citizens State Bank, on August 14, 1937.

At the time he took over management of the local institution deposits were around \$149,000. Today they are more than 25 times that amount. Other phases of the bank's services have grown in direct proportion, and it now serves more than 2,000 regular customers.

Since first establishing residence here Mr. Tunnell had been a leader in civic and religious affairs. He served the city as mayor from 1944 until 1946, had been president of the Chamber of Commerce and at intervals had headed the cemetery association, Red Cross and United Fund. He was at the time of his death a member of the board of directors for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and numerous civic bodies. His church affiliation was Methodist, and he had been a member of the local congregation's official board almost continuously since coming here 31 years ago. He was exceptionally regular in attend-

ance and served as head usher. He married Hazel Butler April 24, 1958.

As the funeral procession moved down West 8th Street and into the cemetery grounds on newly-laid pavement, friends remembered that it was largely through the efforts of this man that the \$2,660 street surfacing project had been completed by public subscription. Numerous other improvements are scattered through the community and stand in lasting tribute to the civic leadership of the beloved banker.

Burial was beside his first wife who died Oct. 5, 1955.

Mr. Tunnell is survived by his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Cecil (Mary Beth) Barton of Melville; two sons, Fred J. Tunnell of Dallas and Jack W. Tunnell of Cross Plains; three stepsons, Roy Butler of Ardmore, Okla., Ray Butler of Alice and Keith Butler of Corpus Christi; one brother, Joe Tunnell of Levelland; three sisters, Mrs. Charley Smith of Rising Star, Mrs. Mabel Woods of Snyder in Scurry County, Mrs. Irma Carter of Las Cruces, N. M.; six grandchildren and four step-grandchildren.

Long Pass Gives Buffaloes 6-0 Victory Over Wildcats

Cross Plains Buffaloes used air-borne shock troops in dying seconds of the grid home opener Friday night to rate a 6-0 verdict over long-standing rival Rising Star Wildcats.

The troops were Quarterback Ricky Jones hurling alternate strikes to Left End James McMillan and Right End Leslie Cowan.

Clincher was a 32-yard missile from Jones to McMillan who gathered in the flying pigskin, despite abundant interference from a Rising Star defender, at the far left end zone flag. One minute and 11 seconds showed on the stadium clock.

114-Yard Drive

The attack covered 114 yards in seven plays, although record books will show it as an 82-yard march. Buffaloes gained possession of the oval after defense, which began to show similarity to 1967 toughness in clinches, held for downs at the 18. Tailback Steve Fortune gouged out four yards, and Jones began his air barrage. He hit Cowan with a 27-yarder to the Buff 49 for a first, but a 15-yard penalty moved the ball back to the Herd's 34. The quarterback then alternated to McMillan in the left flat for 18, and Fortune got an additional eight.

A clipping infraction once again pushed the Buffs back into own territory. Jones quickly remedied the situation with a 25-yarder to Cowan in the right flat for a first at the Wildcat 30. A two-yard rushing loss set the stage for the Jones-McMillan heroics on the next play.

Cowan split the uprights with his placement kick, but an over-anxious Buff was off-sides which shoved the ball back five yards. Again Cowan's toe put the hoghide far enough, but just missed to the left.

Wildcats Control

Visiting Wildcats controlled offensive play during initial portion of the first half with the exception of a late goalward thrust by the Buffaloes.

Rising Star penetrated to the Herd's 38 on first possession, and went to the 21 on second try. First effort was killed by and 11-yard loss occasioned by Buffs Vern Webb and Leslie Cowan, and the latter stopped the second with a fumble recovery.

Wildcat Mike Rhodes gave his team new life with a bobble snatch at the Herd's 38, and Rising Star drove to the six before Buff defenses held late in the first quarter.

The second quarter saw Buffaloes gradually move from shadow of own goal posts. An exchange of punts put the Thundering Herd in possession on its 48, and first Buff threat began. It opened with a 16-yard pass from Jones to McMillan. Fortune then gained 25 yards on four carries, and Jones got a first on the nine with a two-yarder. The drive was shortened three plays later with a lost fumble.

Wildcats Threaten

After a brief Herd offensive flurry beginning second half, Rising Star marched 44 yards to the Bison 18 late in the third quarter. A penalty and long loss ended the drive. A punt put the Herd on its own one.

Two first downs and a fine 56-yard punt by Buff Joe Dodds put Wildcats into a hole on the 10. Ineffective tries by both teams used the major portion of the fourth quarter until Rising Star gained the offense on the Herd's 27. A bad pass from center on fourth down forced Dodds to attempt a run, but he was cut short of a first after a seven-yard pickup.

That Rising Star spurt was thwarted at the Buff 18. Then Cross Plains began its touch-down blitzkrieg.

The win was the second consecutive for the Herd over Rising Star, and the twenty-second in 36 meetings of the two units.

Dalton Hughes, 185-pound senior who wore number 44, was the big offensive gun for the Wildcats. He rolled up 78

net yards on 39 carries while doing at both fullback and quarterback positions.

Fortune, tailback, shouldered ground game load for Cross Plains. He netted 79 yards in 26 runs.

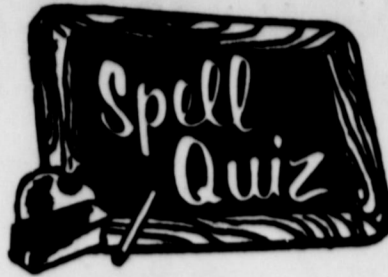
