1,000 Pioneers Due Here At Annual Reunion Friday

A crowd of about 1,000 is expected in Cross Plains Friday for the 31st annual reunion of old settlers of Callahan County. The gathering will again be under the oaks at the City Park. Registration is to begin at

9:30 a.m. and the formal program 30 minutes later. Mrs. Dorothy Boydston Harper of Abilene will lead the group in singing of popular old-time ballads and hymns. Invocation will be offered by the

Rev. W. C. Crawford, Cross Plains Methodist pastor. Welcome address will be made by Rupert Jackson, old settlers president, and Mayor Doyle Burchfield of Cross Plains will respond.

Feature of the morning program will be the presentation of a number of old timers for impromptu remarks. They will be introduced by B. H. Freeland, former president of the old timers association. This part of the program will replace the formal address formerly made by some well-known personality.

Masters of ceremonies throughout the day will be Freeland and James Paul Shanks of Baird and Randall C. Jackson of Abilene.

Basket luncheon will be spread at noon.

The afternoon program will begin at two o'clock and is expected to be completed about 5:30.

Special recognition will be given old timers in 13 separate categories.

There will be no fiddlers contest on this year's program. Instead a special exhibition will be put on by square dancers under direction of E. P. (Pop) Whitaker of Baird.

The reunion will be closed in the late afternoon with the traditional singing of "God Be with Us, 'Til We Meet Again".

Cross Plains Riding Club is sponsoring two events connected with the old settler gathering Friday. A downtown street parade is scheduled at 10 a.m. under supervision of C. M. Garrett, club parade marshal. All area businesses and organizations have been invited to participate in the event which is being revived after a two-year absence.

That night at 8 o'clock, the riding club is sponsoring a play night for junior cowboys and cowgirls. Competition will be divided into two brackets, competitors 12 and under and 13 through 19. There will be no charge for the entertainment which will be held at the club's arena adjoining the city park.

Pioneer Hit Hard By Storm Monday

1966 Amendment Covers Byron Richardson Family

A constitutional amendment voted in 1966 qualifies Mrs. Byron Richardson to a \$10,000 grant from the State of Texas for the loss of her husband, who died of bullet wounds received in line of duty.

State Representative Burke Musgrove checked details in Austin Monday and told the Review by long distance telephone that there is no question but what Mrs. Richardson qualifies in every detail. He pointed out that \$200 per month will also be paid for the three surviving minor children.

Musgrove said that he is having all necessary forms sent to his office and that he will then

forward them to County Attorney James Paul Shanks in Baird. The papers are expected to be filled out and presented at the next meeting of directors of the State Retirement Board in September.

News of the Richardson family qualifying under the new statute was of particular interest to many friends of the slain officer, who was not covered by insurance.

Pioneer Man Faces Charge Of Assault

A charge of assault with intent to murder was filed against Max Thetford, Pioneer community man, in Justice of the Peace B. A. Butler's court Monday at Rising Star after Mrs. Mary Chapman of the same community allegedly was struck in the back of the head with a brick, Butler said Tuesday.

Mrs. Chapman told officers Thetford had stopped by her home to use the telephone and had tried twice to reach a number, but on failing to get through to the number she attempted to do so. It was at that time she was struck by a brick, she said.

Thetford has been arrested and Butler placed his bond at \$5,000.

Mrs. Chapman was ambulatory and at 1:30 a.m. Tuesday her physician advised her to enter a Brownwood hospital for observation.

The event was investigated by Eastland County Sheriff L. E. Sublett and State Highway Patrolman Hilmer Welch of Cross Plains.

Oil And Gas Brought \$4.6 Million To County In 1968

Callahan County oil and gas wells pumped some \$4.6 million into the county's economy last year, according to a study just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Value of production from oil wells was \$4.4 million and from natural gas wells \$202,000, based on the most recent U. S. Bureau of Mines figures compiled by the Association. The county ranked 127th in the state in value of production.

"Output from Callahan County is part of this country's domestic oil supply which is endangered by some of the proposals now before Congress," commented Corbin J. Robertson, association president. "Attempts to destroy percentage depletion provisions of our income tax laws and to nullify present controls over imported oil could discourage further development of Texas oil resources. Eventually oil markets now shared by the county would be given over to foreign pro-

ducers." Last year, the county produced 1.5 million barrels of crude oil and 1.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas.

Of this total, county landowners and others with mineral interests received royalty payments of \$578,000.

The state received \$218,000 in production taxes with crude oil accounting for \$204,000 and natural gas \$14,000. A number of school districts in the county lean heavily on oil production for ad valorem tax support, such as Eula, 61.8 per cent.

Drilling expenditures were an estimated \$2 million. Of the 101 wells drilled in the county, 39 were completed as oil wells and 7 as gas wells, according to Ira Rinehart's Yearbook. The 55 dry holes cost \$1 million. There were 18 wildcats drilled.

The Texas Employment Commission lists 30 workers on oil and gas payrolls, which totaled \$82,000.

Throngs Pay Tribute To Fallen Marshal Sunday

A valiant fight for life ended shortly after noon Saturday for Byron Richardson, Cross Plains city marshal, who was shot down in the early morning hours of July 22.

Death came at Hendrick Memorial Hospital on his 48th birthday, after he had undergone four days before the second of two critical operations in an effort to save his life.

Friends thronged Higginbotham Funeral Home far beyond capacity at the funeral service Sunday afternoon. Scores unable to get inside to the auditorium or even stand in the halls, waited with bared heads on the outside. Final rites were conducted by the Rev. E. V. Brooks, pastor of the First Baptist Church, assisted by the Rev. Roger Butler of Kenedy City, former local minister, and the Rev. W. C. Crawford, pastor of the First United Methodist Church here. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Held in county jail at Baird in lieu of \$25,000 bond is Curtis Sreman Godae, 26, who is charged with shooting Richardson twice, after the officer had given him a warning citation for driving without a Texas operator's license. One of the bullets from a .22 caliber rifle hit him in the elbow inflicting only superficial damage. The other, though, struck him in the abdomen and shattered, penetrating the liver, spleen and pancreas. Two attempts at surgery to repair this damage failed and the officer died 31 days later.

Goade, who had lived in Cross Plains about one month, was arrested, along with his wife, who is out on bond, shortly after the shooting.

Goade was charged with "assault with intent to murder with malice aforethought". According to District Attorney Ed Paynter of Abilene, change of the charge to murder will probably not occur until the case goes before a grand jury. Paynter said that he had talked with Judge Raleigh Brown and the grand jury date would probably be set for the week of Aug. 25.

Paynter said Goade's wife, charged with the same crime, might not be brought in.

Born Aug. 1, 1921, in Wayland in Stephens County, Richardson had lived in Cross Plains and Baird for 11 years. He moved here from Midland. He married Louise Coppinger

June 10, 1942, in Odessa. He was a member of the Cross Plains First Baptist Church and was a 32nd degree Mason.

Richardson completed two years of college and attended a special school of law and government at Texas A&M. He served with the First Cavalry for 42 months in World War II, including service in the South Pacific.

After World War II, Richardson worked 15 years with various governmental agencies. He then became Callahan County deputy sheriff.

In 1962 Richardson was elected county judge and served four years in that office. He had served only a short while as Cross Plains city marshal when fatally wounded, but according to Mayor Doyle Burchfield was doing "an outstanding job".

Survivors include his wife; four daughters, Mrs. Byrene Ferguson of Coleman, Charlou, Lurene and Sharene, all of the home; five brothers, Lloyd of Cross Plains, Fred of Midland and Arlon and Newburn, both of Odessa, and Tom of Palestine; two sisters, Mrs. Aifton Head of Wayland and Mrs. Maurine Donham of Ozona; two granddaughters.

Pallbearers were Duke Mitchell, B. D. (Bye) Montgomery, Billy Charles McMillan, Howard Cox and H. D. Welch, all of Cross Plains; James Paul Shanks of Baird, Jerry Mathews of Eastland and Sid Merchant of Abilene. Honorary pallbearers included Cross Plains City Council and all law officers of this section of Texas.

Cross Plains Drillers became the most successful team in post-season tournament play in history of this city's teenage baseball program last week in District 1 Texas Junior Teenage Tournament at Brownwood. Drillers posted two victories and absorbed two losses en route to the runner-up title. The unit was awarded a second place trophy for its efforts. Manager Johnny Pancake praised his squad last week end, saying that he was proud of the team not only for the effort and cooperation given during the tournament, but also during the season. "They're a good bunch of boys," he emphasized.

Both victories were over the Brownwood National League champion team, and both losses were to Brownwood American League representative. Clyde and Eastland also had representatives at the meet.

Cross Plains won its first teenage playoff game in history Thursday night by besting Brownwood Nationals 7-4. Drillers opened action with two runs and held a 2-1 margin until the fourth inning when five more locals crossed the plate. Robert Lewis went the distance on the mound, striking out 10 batters. Cross Plains backed Lewis with a good hitting attack.

Friday night Brownwood Americans battered the Drillers 21-7 in five innings. Cross Plains

nabbed a 7-0 lead after two at bats, but the hosts scored nine runs in the bottom of the second. Locals tallied on three doubles and six walks. Starter Wayne Bishop, picked up from Cross Plains Rebels, took the loss in one and two-thirds innings. Joe Hudson, secured from runner-up unit Goldthwaite, worked two and one-third frames, and Donald Pope pitched the final two-thirds inning.

Saturday morning Cross Plains earned a berth in finals that night by whipping the Nationals again 10-7. Drillers grabbed an early lead, but Brownwood cut the margin to 10-7 in the sixth with four runs. Winner was Bishop in four and one-third frames. Hudson came on for an out, and Lewis pitched one and one-third innings.

Brownwood's Americans eliminated Cross Plains 10-2 in finals Saturday, and earned trip to the state tourney at Conroe. Hosts pushed across nine runs in the home half of the first. Drillers limited the Americans to just one more run, but the damage was done. Locals tallied a pair of runs in the fourth when Donnie Dillard doubled home Lewis and Hudson, who had both singled. Lewis was the loser in five and two-thirds innings. Bishop worked the final one-third frame.

Drillers won the Inter-Cities Junior Teenage Baseball title with a 13-1 record. It was the Drillers' first outright crown, although the same unit shared the diadem two years ago.

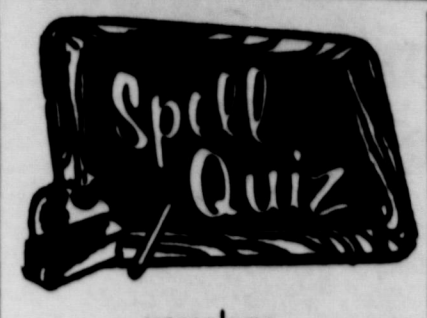
Geyer got two of Chiefs' five hits, a double and single. McMillan, Larry Bishop and Don Wilson all singled.
