James Callahan, County's Namesake, Painted As Controversial State Hero

Editor's Note: Following is a brief history of James H. Callahan in whose honor Callahan County was named. It was penned by Dr. T. R. Havins of Brownwood, formerly of Cross Plains. Dr. Havins is one of the most knowledgeable historians on this part of Texas, and has written several books concerning historic happenings and locations in this area of the state. He now has a new book concerning Belle Plain of Callahan County which will be on sale soon.

Following the lead of John Henry Brown, a member from Galveston, the legislature of Texas decided to honor a member of the tragic Georgia Battalion when, on Feb. 1, 1858, Governor Hardin Runnels signed the measure that created Callahan County.

James H. Callahan was a native of Marion, Ga. He was born there Sept. 14, 1814. Under the guidance of his father he became a mechanic and blacksmith.

Venturesome and fond of outdoor life, he joined the Georgia Battalion in 1835 for service against the Mexican army in the Texas Revolution.

Callahan, along with other Georgia troops, fell prisoner to Mexican forces in the battle of the Coletto. They were sent to Goliad as prisoners of war.

With the order for massacre

of Fannin's troops, Mexican officers selected certain men to be spared. The officers considered Callahan's background as a mechanic and ordered him to be spared.

One of the provisions of the Treaty of Velasco which Santa Anna signed with the Republic of Texas recited that all Texan prisoners should be released. This provision applied to Callahan and he decided to remain in Texas.

He joined the Texas Rangers in 1837 and served almost continuously for 15 years. He was a lieutenant of a ranger force that went to the relief of San Antonio when General Woll invaded Texas and captured many prominent people in the city. Among those captured were the members of the district court.

The Georgia native advanced to the rank of captain in the ranger force, and in 1853 proved his fearless leadership. A band of Apaches and Kickapooes from Mexico invaded Texas in the region of Eagle Pass.

The ranger captain and his men followed them closely and crossed the Rio Grande and entered the Mexican town of Piteras Negras. When the populace turned against the rangers, shots resulted and fires spread throughout the town. Callahan and his men withdrew to the Texas side of the river immediately following outbreak of the fires. Mexican officials blamed the Texans for setting the fires, while Callahan stead-

Clyde L.L. Stars Capture District 28 Championship

An overflow crowd saw Clyde Little League All-Stars win the District 28 Tournament championship here Thursday night.

The westside Callahan County elite, who defeated Cross Plains 15-6 in the area playoff game July 20, will now advance to the sectional tournament in Weatherford. Clyde's opponent was not immediately learned here, but the game is scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 2, at 8 p.m. Winner of that meet will advance to the state tourney.

Clyde began its title quest Wednesday of last week with an 8-4 win over Coleman. Then in the championship contest Thursday defeated Breckenridge 7-1.

Clyde never trailed in either game.

District tourney action began Tuesday of last week as Breckenridge blanked Baird 15-0. Coleman took the consolation title in the first game Thursday by beating Baird 8-0.

Cross Plains also profited from the Little League Tournament. The concession stand at the local park netted \$175, under the direction of Mrs. Tommy B. Conlee, head concessionaire, who was assisted by many local ladies. Those funds are expected to be used for permanent improvements to the local Little League Park.

Donations from game view-

ers, which were put in the "bucket", totaled \$130.56. Expenses of awards to teams and players and electricity will be deducted from that amount and the remainder will be sent to Clyde to help defray traveling costs for the District 28 champs in the sectional meet.

Many local persons helped in various ways during the tournament, which was directed by Harold Garrett of this city. He was assisted by Skeet Walker.

Members of a Cub Scout pack here handled flag raising ceremonies each of the three nights, and Rev. J. Aston Pollard and Freddy Tatom gave invocations. Pender Mitchell and Garrett shared announcing duties.

Serving as chief umpires were J. P. McCord, Randall Rogers, Mike McClure and Larry Bishop. Others involved in calling bases were Edwin Schaefer, Lewis Whitmire, McCord, Freddy Tatom, Dale Bishop, Arnett Bennett, Bobby Johnston, Walker and Gerald Holcomb of Clyde.

Walker headed a group of workers, the nucleus of which was formed by local Little League coaches, who made repairs to the local park and groomed the playing field. One of the team's coaches was heard to say that when he heard that the tournament was to be held in Cross Plains he was skeptical about the playing conditions. After the game he said that he had never played on a better field. Garrett said that the field is now in the best shape it has been in the past several years.

Real good crowds were reported each night, and workmen moved in three additional bleachers to supplement the trio already there. All were full Wednesday and Thursday and many persons were standing or were sitting on cars.

Troy Beggs, 12, Dies In Swimming Accident

Troy Beggs, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Beggs of the Pioneer community, died about 6 p.m. Sunday as the result of an accident while swimming at Lakewood Recreation Center.

Justice of the Peace Benny A. Butler of Rising Star, has indicated that he would rule accidental drowning. He said that evidence of the mishap indicated that the fatality apparently occurred as the result of an underwater collision.

Beggs, a Cross Plains seventh grader, and Kenny Bates, 13, of Cross Plains were said to be diving from the high board at the center's pool when the mishap occurred.

Beggs and Miss Pat Rector, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Rector, Jr. of Pioneer, apparently collided underwater. She came to the surface and

swam to shore. She was pulled from the pool by Jimmy Ruth-erford, life guard, and other swimmers. She was taken after initial treatment at the center to an Eastland hospital. She is reported to have sustained an injured neck, and was still hospitalized Monday afternoon.

Rex Beggs, 15-year-old brother of Troy, missed his brother and he and friends pulled Troy from the pool. Butler said that information he had obtained indicated that the younger Beggs had been in the water five to 10 minutes before being pulled out.

The life guard and members of the Rising Star Fire Department worked with him some time trying to revive him.

Gospel Meeting Opens At Church Of Christ Monday

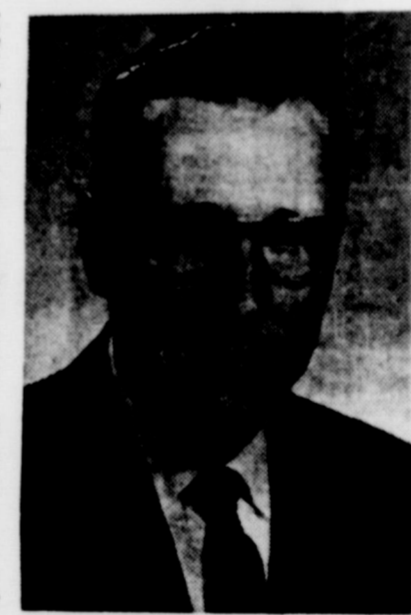
A seven-day gospel meeting will begin at the Church of Christ in Cross Plains Monday.

Texas Hunters Face Split Dove Season

Texas dove hunters with frostbite? Unheard of!

Until this season, Texas dove hunters were more prone to heat prostration or rattlesnake bite.

But recent action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission split the mourning dove season, making a portion of it in September, and the remainder in January when the cold winds blow.

The North Zone, including Callahan and adjoining counties, season will be Sept. 1 through Oct. 14, 1972, and Jan. 6-21, 1973.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists stress the split season is just an experi-

ment to see if the late season will result in additional recreation without unduly increasing the overall harvest of doves. They will keep a close eye on the results to see if late dove hunting in Texas might affect the breeding populations of other states.

Hunters have long been interested in such a season because of the many doves present in Texas during the winter months, according to department officials.

Biologists called for the experimental season this year because they now have the means to evaluate the effects of a split season, whereas in the past sources of the information needed were not available.

HOME HINTS

AND FAMILY FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Doing dishes is far from my favorite chore, and I seriously doubt that it is your favorite task either. So every once in a while we escape to the wilds and eat from paper plates, drink from paper cups, and use plastic utensils. Not to mention the fact that while saving money you would also be helping the ecological trash problem.

If six to eight people eat outdoors with disposable plates, cups, spoons and forks, it will cost them no less than \$1.56. Those same people can eat from the everyday kitchen dishes and wash them in their Kitchenaid or Magic Chef dishwasher from Higginbothams for 5c or

less and up to 7c. This figure includes the cost of heating the water, the electricity for running the machine, the water, and the most expensive detergent. The cost is based on estimated national averages. In most areas the low figure applies.

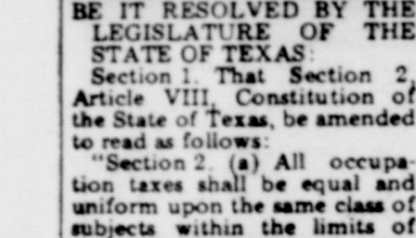

NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 35)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax, but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes, actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools; property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void.

(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the armed services of the United States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency, or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of more than 50 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition. The constitutional amendment allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses, and surviving minor children, and the surviving spouses and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty."

Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the members of the Senate and House of Rep-

representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation. "In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session." The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

Final Date To Prove Wheat Yields Aug. 5

Basic provisions for proven wheat yields are continued under the Agricultural Act of 1970, according to J. C. Earp county executive director for the ASCS office at Baird.

He stated that producers may elect to establish a yield for farm based on actual production rather than use the yield established by the county committee on a judgement basis. The base period for establishing 1973 farm yields is 1969, 1970 and 1971. To prove a yield, a farmer must have produced wheat on the farm in each of these three years and be able to provide reliable proof of production.

The certified acreage plus failed, pastured or hayed wheat acres certified as wheat (including that credited as wheat for substitution purposes) will be used for proven yield purposes, Earp continued.

In order to assure consideration, a producer must file a written request with his ASCS office by not later than Aug. 5, 1972. Production data timely received will be considered before notification of the official 1973 farm wheat yield.

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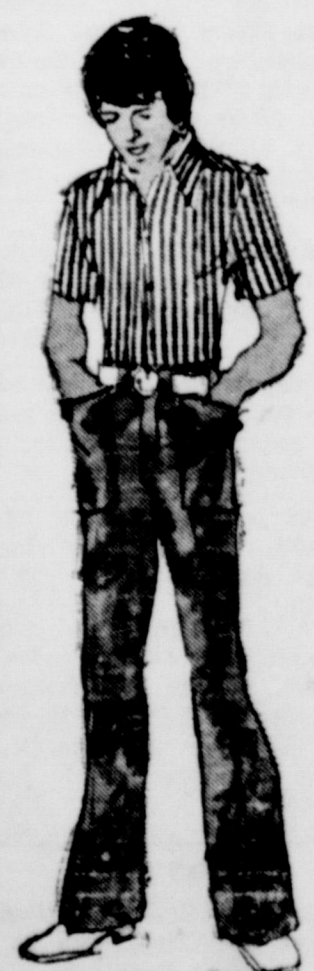
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
