County Agent Outlines Brucellosis Test System

Texas livestock producers will be faced with new regulations on brucellosis control following a statewide public hearing in Austin on October 1, reports Callahan County Extension Agent Greg Gerngross of Baird.

The changes are being proposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission so that Texas will be able to move toward a "certified-brucellosis free status" and thereby be able to comply with the standards of other states to which cattle are shipped.

The major changes in the brucellosis testing program are as follows:

1. Testing of all animals two years of age and over at local auction markets rather than those that terminate at slaughter.
2. Maintaining cattle in groups until they are tested and found clean or are quarantined, with testing expense to be paid by the seller.
3. Herds found to have the

disease will be tested until they have two negative tests, not to exceed 120 days apart.

4. Retesting must be done within 60 days.

5. Animals may move from ranch to ranch owned by the same individual within county or similar certified area without testing.

6. Animals moving and changing ownership must be tested.

Numerous other conditions and procedures are also specified in the proposed changes, Gerngross stated.

To get all the details on the new brucellosis program, he encourages producers to come by the County Extension Office at Baird, to review a copy of the proposed regulations. The agent also invites livestock producers to attend the public hearing in Austin on October 1 to obtain further information on the program and to voice any concerns they may have about the proposed changes.



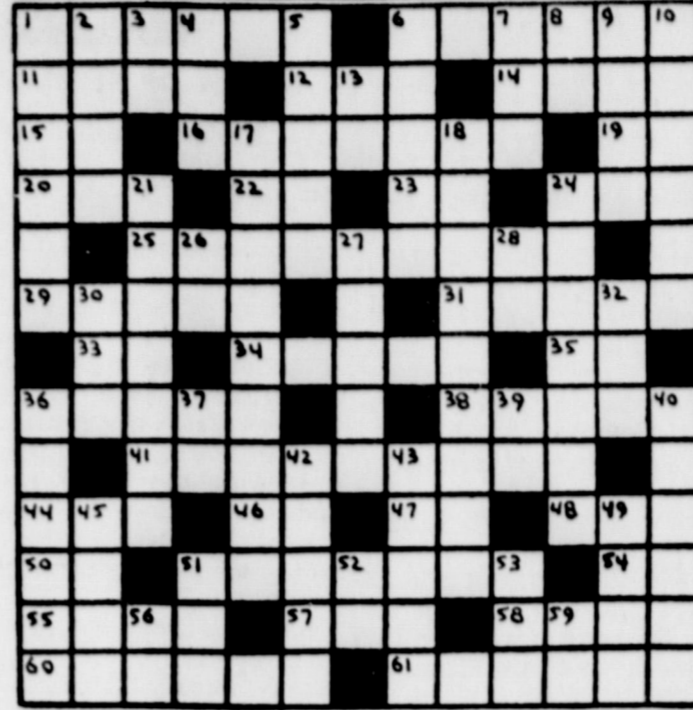

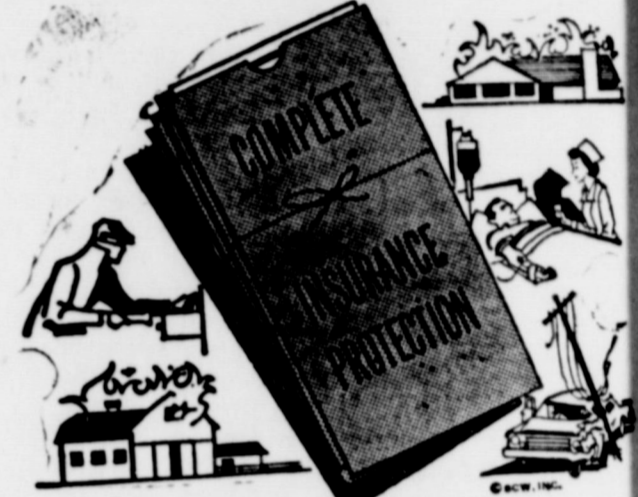

Buffaloes Blank Gorman 38-0 For Second Win

Cross Plains Buffaloes romped past Gorman in a non-conference football game at Gorman last Friday night 38-0. It was the second win of the season for the Herd against one loss.

The Herd bounced back against the Panthers with an improved style of play from the lack-luster performance local fans saw at Wylie the week before.

The contest was not free of Bison mistakes, however, with the most crippling effect being penalties. The Herd drew 115 yards in stepped-off yardage on 11 infractions. The squad also lost a fumble and had a pass intercepted. Bad snaps from center were commonplace on attempted kicks.

Overall, however, it was much improved. Blocking was crisp, a more balanced attack prevailed and defenders were more alert.

Buffaloes wasted little time in starting to disappoint Gorman homecomers. The Herd took the opening kick and marched 72 yards in eight plays for a touchdown. The clincher came on a third and six when Quarterback Roger Crawford hit Greg Turner with a 37-yard pass. Turner was behind Gorman defenders at about the 15. Conversion attempt failed, as did all others following, with 8:28 left in first quarter.

Bisons tallied 18 points in the second stanza. The period's initial score came with only 14 seconds elapsed when Fullback Rick Kirkham hurled a pass to Halfback Randy Hunter, in the clear. The play covered 41 yards.

A few seconds later Kirkham intercepted a Panther pass and rambled 50 yards, but a penalty nullified the counter, and the ensuing drive was stopped.

With 4:25 left in the canto, Hunter ripped off 34 yards to the Panther 15, and on second play Kirkham circled right end for 14 and six more points.

An exchange of aerial interceptions found Buffs on the Gorman 37. Kirkham romped 23 yards to the 14, then Crawford fired a missile to Right End Brad Bowden for the 24-0 lead with four seconds left in the second quarter.

Buffaloes ran the advantage to 30-0 with 6:48 left in the third canto. A personal foul on a punt return by Kirkham moved the oval to the Gorman 32, and eight plays later Crawford circled left end for seven yards and the tally.

A few minutes later, following a fine punt by Hunter and a three-yard penalty against Gorman, Buffs Eddy Wyatt and Kenny Pancake tackled Panther Quarterback Bill Baize in the end zone for a two-point safety.

Following ineffectual thrusts by both teams, but with Gorman gaining ground, Cross Plains began its final touchdown drive from its own 16. Kirkham put the drive in motion with a 57-yard romp to the Panther 24. Halfback Randy Pancake got six, and Hunter countered with five. A loss moved the pigskin back to the 16 from which point Crawford passed to Bowden in the end zone for the final 38-0 score.

Game charts showed Kenny Pancake, Bruce Lawrence and C. B. Hutchins as leading Buff defenders. Randall Franke entered the game after an injury sidelined starter Bill Nickerson, and he did an outstanding job.

Shanks Sodomy Trial Is Rescheduled Again

Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks of Baird will apparently go to trial on the charge of sodomy on Tuesday, Oct. 23, in 167th District Court in Austin.

The trial has been postponed numerous times, and was supposed to be heard last Thursday. However, according to reports reaching here, Shanks did not appear before Judge Thomas Blackwell, and the trial date was postponed to the October 23 date, at which time the Callahan Attorney will supposedly enter a plea.

Shanks and two Austin men were arrested in an Austin park on February 13 by a park ranger and charged with felony sodomy, which carries a potential punishment of 2 to 15 years.

One of Shanks' co-defendants, however did make a plea of "no contest" to the sodomy charge Thursday.

Blackwell found Roberto Caraveo of Austin guilty of the charge and set sentencing for Oct. 4. The Travis County district attorney's office recommended five years probation.

The third defendant in the case, Ronald Burke, of Austin, pleaded guilty Sept. 10. He also was recommended for five years probation, and formal sentencing is set for Thursday, Sept. 27.
