



Getting it together may be the secret for grain sorghum planting in the next few years. Results from agricultural experiment stations indicate work will probably be intensified toward a grain sorghum which will grow well in rows as narrow as ten inches. Soil fertility scientist Dr. Lawrence Morrill at the Oklahoma Experiment Station says major vield increases are possible with a hybrid developed for the narrow row. Requirements of such a hybrid would be a different leaf angle and toleration for a high plant population. In experiments with current varieties of sorghum, the extremely narrow (10 inch) rows showed consistently better yield with 40,000 plants per acre than with 80-thousand. The highest vields recorded in the test plots with non-irrigated sorghum involved planting 30inch rows with 80,000 plants per acre and 120 pounds of applied nitrogen. Tests on irrigated sorghums are underway.
