## Annual Buff-Wildcat Tilt Unfold Here Friday

Annual clash of Cross Plains and Rising Star football teams unfolded here Friday in Buffalo.

The Buff team has been impressive far this season. They have one win in the Buff-Wildcat tilt, while the Buff team still seeking victory after dropping two and deadlocking in another.

Both teams have both lost in District 8-A. Bisons won in the season opener last week Rising Star 18-0. Cross Plains and Rising Star in football 43 times. Buffs were kept back in 24 times, and Wildcats won 17 times. Two Buffs have been recorded both in 1929 and last year. Buffs beat the Buffs in 1972. Buffs rely heavily on

juniors and sophomores, although there is quality in the few seniors on each team.

Top talent is evident in the Wildcat backfield. Mackey Elliott, 161-pound junior tailback, is a top threat. He is ably assisted by such personnel as Ken Hounsell, 130-pound junior, Tony Rimer, 135-pound senior, and Johnny Hubbard, 150-pound senior.

In the weight the two teams are about evenly matched.

An agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation known in Putnam and Rising Star areas was in the forefront when Patricia (Patty) Hearst was arrested recently in San Francisco, Calif.

He is Special Agent Don Weathermon who lived at Putnam. His grandparents were the late Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Weathermon of Rising Star. Sidney Weathermon, the agent's father, grew up at Rising Star and attended school there.

Agent Weathermon was one of the officers arresting Miss Hearst, and is assigned to the Crime Division of the FBI in San Francisco. Mrs. Sidney Weathermon said that her son reported that he was real happy Miss Hearst and others arrested at that time were taken without firing a shot.

The FBI agent, who attended Murfreesboro, Ark., schools and took a degree from the University of Arkansas, had been working on the Hearst case for 19

months, from the time Miss Hearst was reportedly kidnapped by the Symbionese Liberation Army.

## Long Pass Gives Baird 7-0 Win Over Bisons

A 53-yard pass in the third quarter lifted visiting Baird Bears to a 7-0 non-conference football victory over Cross Plains Buffaloes here last Friday night.

The county seat Bears won the Class A championship of Callahan County with the triumph, and claimed a 20-19 edge over the Bisons in the 42 game of the gridiron series between the two schools. There have been three ties.

Cross Plains dominated play in the first half, actually holding possession of the ball for the first 10 minutes and 55 seconds of the first quarter. Buffs took the opening kick and marched from the Herd's 18 to the Bear 1. Short gainers and accurate passing by Buff Quarterback Greg Turner kept the drive alive in the early stages. The march was aided by a major penalty against Baird, but bogged down at the Bear 13. Buff Sam Koenig attempted a field goal but was short, but a 5-yard infraction and Halfback Ken Huber's three-yard pick up netted a first on the Baird three. Hunter went to the one before a five-yard penalty cost the Bisons. Baird finally held for downs at the 10.

Cross Plains did not again seriously threaten, but short offensive spurts and long punts by Turner kept Baird in poor field position.

Best field position Baird had in the first half was just across midfield on two occasions.

The Bears did better offensively and defensively in the second half. The winning touchdown came on the Bears' second possession in the third quarter. Baird marched 21 yards to the Buff 38, a penalty shoved the ball back into Bear country. On third down Bear

Quarterback Manuel Aguirre found End Garry Jennings behind Buff defenders deep downfield. The speedy Bear end slipped through a lunge by a Buff and sped the final few yards into paydirt during heaviest part of the rain which began to fall in third quarter. Larry Cauthen kicked the point with 4:56 left in the third quarter.

Baird went 33 yards to the Bison 21 just before the fourth quarter began, and about midway of the final canto Bisons held for downs at the 15 after Baird had marched 35 yards after Aguirre had intercepted a Buff pass.

Baird held the edge in net yardage gained, 244 yards, 138 rushing and 106 passing, to the Herd's 44 on the ground and 45 in the air.

## Baird Man Pens Brief History Of Cottonwood Springs, 1870-1900

Note: The following was authored by E. P. Whitaker of Baird, long-time resident of Callahan County who has researched history in community of Cottonwood Springs. He graciously allowed the Review to publish his writing which

is E. P. (Pop) Whitaker of Baird, Texas.

Following is a brief history of Cottonwood Springs from 1870 to 1900 as told to me by Aunt Frances Gilliland, Bob Norrell, and B. C.

Cottonwood Springs started as the first store in 1870 on a grassy meadow about 60 feet tall on the west side of a spring-fed creek that flows through the meadow, with water four to five feet deep, located on the west side of Turkey Creek.

to put their wood ashes in to make lye soap, or to rehusk corn for hominy: The first store carried only staple groceries which they thought may have been hauled from some Army fort. Fresh meat was plentiful with buffalo, deer, quail, rabbit, and wild turkey, hence name Turkey Creek. About 1875 they built a new store out of lumber and hauled the lumber from Waco by ox team which took four and a half to five weeks to make the round trip.

In about 1878 they applied for a post-office, but they had a Cottonwood Springs registered, so they had to drop the "Springs", but it was after 1880 before they got the post-office.

The first school was built of logs and the seats were split log seats and located on the same grounds as the present school building which is now a community center owned by the Cottonwood Ladies Club, that has sponsored a monthly musical since November, 1940.

In the early 90's, the town split and formed two political parties, the Populace and Democrat. The Populace built a new school on the east side of town, and named it Populace Cotton-

wood. They had two schools, the Populace and Democrat. In the early 90's, the Populace elected a Sheriff and a County Judge of Callahan County, which was established in 1877, and in the late 90's the town went back to one school—the Democrat with a six-teacher school. At one time, Cottonwood had the biggest school and the largest town in Callahan County.

The first gin was a one-stand affair over a coffeepot-size engine and press built downstairs. A farmer would drive his picked bale of cotton to the gin and with a pitchfork would pitch the cotton upon the upstairs floor, and another man with a pitchfork would feed it into the stand where the saws would separate the lint from the seed.

The seed would then flow through a chute into a bin upstairs. The farmer would then drive around the bin and trip a trap door to dump the seed back into his wagon to take home for cowfeed and to replant. The lint would roll out on the floor to be picked up again with a pitchfork and fed into the press that was built downstairs and as the press would fill, the men would get in the press and tromp the lint

down. When all the lint was tromped in the press, they would go down and hook a mule to a pole fastened to 'his screw press and the mule would go around and around and screw it up to press the bale. They ginned two bales a day. By the late 90's, they had two modern gins that would gin more than a hundred bales each per day.

In 1880 when the Texas and Pacific Railroad came through Putnam, and with the short distance to haul freight, Cottonwood went on a building boom from one store in 1870, to 37 business houses plus two schools, a college, and four churches in the late 90's, and had developed into a very large and popular trade center in a thirty-mile radius.

The bank was located where the late Norman Coffey's store now stands. The two-story hotel was just west of the bank.

The wagon factory and blacksmith shop was located just south of the present postoffice building. It was owned by a man and his boy and they built two wagons per year. The college was built about where the Baptist Church now stands. The rest of the business houses were south of the present store all

the way to the cemetery. They had a grist mill, a flour mill, a wagonyard, and a wholesale buggy merchant. This merchant would order a carload of buggies, then take a team to Putnam and trail them to Cottonwood. Then on Monday morning, he would hook a team to a buggy and trail one or two more and start out across the country and would not come back until he sold them. They had a lumberyard, and about 1879 or 1880, a man and his boy opened up a brick plant about one mile northwest of town and began molding bricks by hand, but the brick clay was of poor quality. There was too much sand in the clay, and when it was melted, they had glass streaks where the sand melted. Also, the quantity was insufficient for buildings. After making several thousand, they ran out of clay, so they used most of the bricks out in the cemetery where you can still find a few. Most of them are gone—crumbled, broken, and carried away.

They had two general stores, two drug stores, and by 1895 Cottonwood had four doctors, two hardware stores, two blacksmith shops, two barber shops, four grocery stores, one dry-

good store, one chili joint, millinery shop, one shoeshop, two saloons, three newspapers at different times—The periodical, the Fax, and The Callahan News.

There was a swimming and baptizing hole where the spring-fed water overflowed into the creek that ran through the meadow. On Sundays the people would go down in this grassy and shady meadow and picnic and visit while the kids waded in the crystal clear four-to-six inch water. Sometimes there would be some excitement Aunt Frances said she heard her mama tell about two young ladies that came down once in awhile and the brazen hussies would sit down on the creek bank and pull off their shoes and even their stockings, then pull their dresses up above the ankles and wade in the water with their naked ankles showing before everybody, in public. She said some of the mothers would grab their little boys and throw their aprons over their faces and lead them around the bend of the creek or back up in town.

From 1880 to 1895 Cottonwood had its shootouts. A man named Meyers shot Gabe Starr,

J. Moss shot Jule Haggler and Wash Boen. A merchant named Franks and his friend named Jones were engaged in a shootout. It was at night and the shooting was a case of mistaken identity, and both were buried in the same grave. There are two legends about the double grave. One was that the ground was too hard and they didn't want to dig two graves. The other legend was that the merchant lived a few hours. After he saw his mistake, he requested his friend be buried with him. A man named Vaughn stabbed Jim Champion to death, and when they went out to arrest him, Vaughn committed suicide by shooting himself. Searf Daniels killed a man named Thompson with a wagon breast yoke. There were other killings after 1900.

To the best of my knowledge, I have never tried to relate this bit of nostalgia word-for-word as told to me by these three darling people who have gone on before. If you have found it interesting and enjoyed it, I'm glad. Thank You.

Before Harlingen, he worked out of Balmorhea, Cross Plains and Victoria.

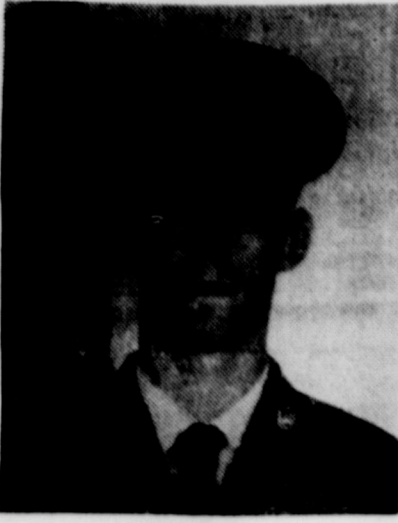
He has been with the DPS more than 16 years.

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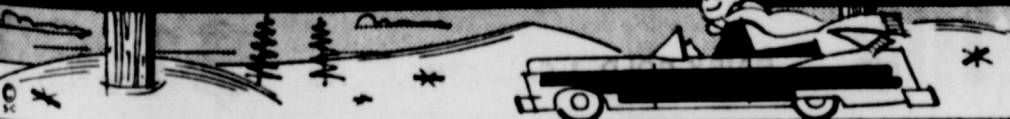
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## TEXAS TALK



By Glenn Winfrey

Getting it together may be the secret for grain sorghum planting in the next few years. Results from agricultural experiment stations indicate work will probably be intensified toward a grain sorghum which will grow well in rows as narrow as ten inches. Soil fertility scientist Dr. Lawrence Morrill at the Oklahoma Experiment Station says major yield increases are possible with a hybrid developed for the narrow row. Requirements of such a hybrid would be a different leaf angle and toleration for a high plant population. In experiments with current varieties of sorghum, the extremely narrow (10 inch) rows showed consistently better yield with 40,000 plants per acre than with 80-thousand. The highest yields recorded in the test plots with non-irrigated sorghum involved planting 30-inch rows with 80,000 plants per acre and 120 pounds of applied nitrogen. Tests on irrigated sorghums are underway.
