Mrs. Jimmie Morrison, supervisor of nurses at Hico City Hospital, became president of the Texas League of Vocational Nurses at the 14th annual convention held in San Angelo Friday and Saturday of last week. She succeeds Mrs. Ora Nell Cavin of Brady as head of the 1,500-member group.

Mrs. Morrison, who was appointed to the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners by Gov. John Connally last year, is a charter member of TLVN. She served as trustee for six years, and as chairman of the board two years. She has been secretary, reporter, parliamentarian, and twice president of her local group, the Tri-County League, which is the largest component society in the state with 122 members. The league is composed of Hamilton, Erath and

Bosque counties. Employed by the Hico hospital since its opening in 1947, she has taught every LVN class here.

Forster, who is Administrator of the Bexar County Hospital District in San Antonio; and Dr. J. F. ## Student Trainee in Hamilton County With Soil Conservation

James R. Lee of Hamilton is serving as a student trainee with the Soil Conservation Service this summer, according to Bomer E. Harris, work unit conservationist. ## Alan Solsbery Enlists in New Navy Program

Alan Larry Solsbery, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin E. Solsbery of Hico, launched his career in the U.S. Navy shortly after receiving his diploma from Hico High School.

He enlisted under the new CACHE Program which enables high school seniors and graduates who wish to delay reporting for active duty to enlist in the U.S. Naval Reserve for four months prior to going to active duty in the regular Navy. During his 120-day delay period, a senior can stay in school and earn his high school diploma, or a high school graduate can stay on his civilian job which gives his employer adequate notice of termination.

During the delay these young men will be able to earn time in service, thus more pay when reporting for active duty.

The local Navy Recruiting Station in Waco has full information on this new program. Chief Radarmen Glenn Williams, U.S. Navy Recruiter, also visits Hico on the first and third Wednesday of each month from 10:30 to 11 in the morning.

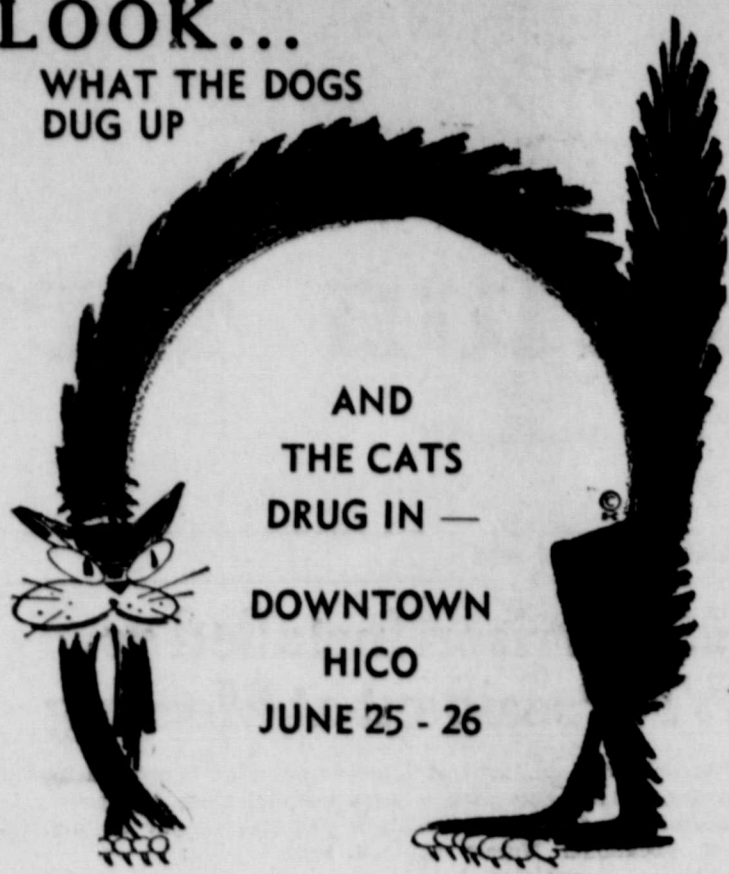

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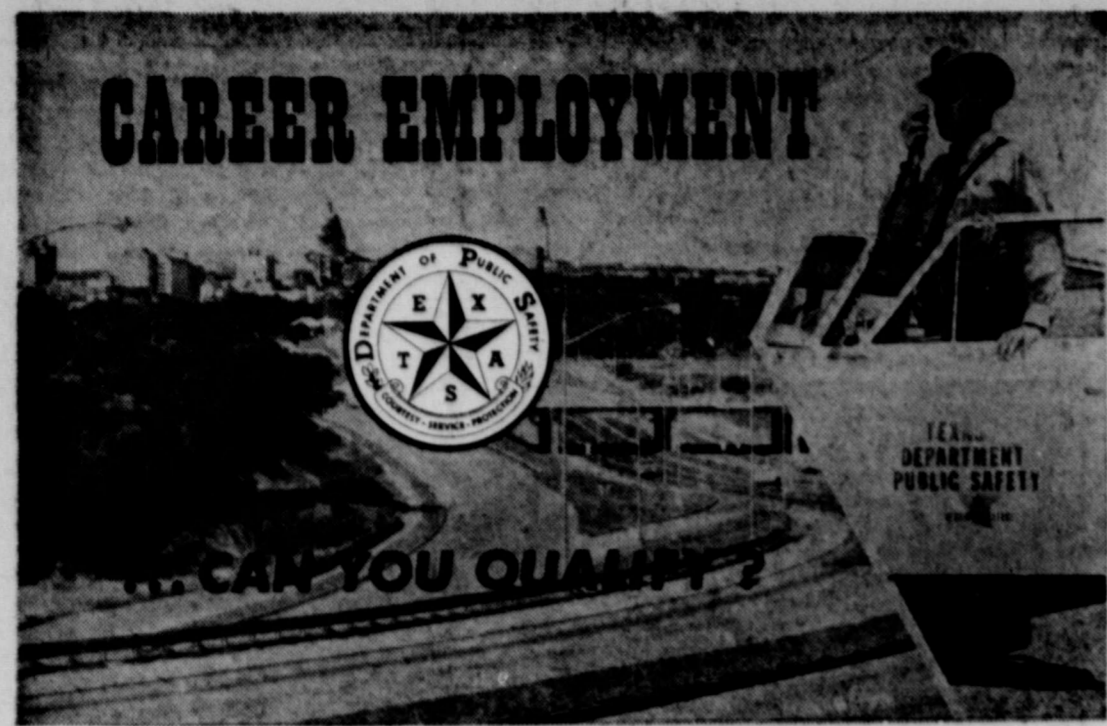

### So You Want to Own a Dairy—Here's What it Costs

For generations farmers have been thought of as agriculturists, rather than industrialists; as workers, perhaps, more than entrepreneurs. Yet year after year the cost of being a farmer goes up.

The price of an acre of land has risen from \$50 to \$100-\$150 per acre. Good perhaps for the established farmer, but it makes it all but impossible for the youngster who didn't inherit his land to start a farm from scratch.

A dairy farmer today with a herd of 50 cows will have as much as \$15,000 invested in stock alone. If he has the average 300 acre farm, that means another \$35,000 investment.

Equip this farm with the most modern milking equipment, complete with pipeline, bulk tank, etc. and here you have another \$20,000 outlay.

An average dairy farmer's buildings are valued at about \$20,000—and they require constant maintenance.

Add it up: it totals a whopping \$90,000. This is not the biggest, nor the smallest dairy farm—but a good high-type average.

So the dairy barn, hay sheds, and contented cows you see when passing a dairy farm are more than a scene. They are an expensive, high producing food factory with all the problems of labor, financing, retooling and taxes that big business has.

In fact, it took about \$5 in capital assets to produce \$1 worth of goods on a dairy farm in 1963. This is more than double the dollar sales ratio that the steel industry requires.

As an independent businessman, the farmer is more subject than most any other business to both the vicissitude of nature and the fluctuation of the economic situation.

The individual farmer has little control over the market price of his product. The dairy farmer has the constant responsibility of keeping animals in tip-top health if his production is going to make him a profit.

No segment of the American economy is more vital to all of our well being than the American farmer. Each farmer today provides food for 27 city dwellers.

### Entrance Examinations For Highway Patrol to Resume July 14 & 15

Stephenville (Spl.)—Sgt. A. A. Eggen, Texas Highway Patrol Supervisor for Comanche, Erath, Hamilton, Hood, Johnson and Somervell counties, announced this week that entrance examinations for prospective DPS Patrolmen Trainees will resume July 14-15.

"At the present time there are approximately 70 vacancies in the DPS Field Services, and the training school to fill these vacancies will start August 31," Sergeant Eggen said.

"This is an opportunity for qualified young men between the ages of 21 and 35 to become members of a group of dedicated career police officers. While in training at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, they will receive \$375.00 per month. After completing the 16 week training school, the trainees become Commissioned Officers. Under the biennial appropriation bill, salaries will range from \$453.00 up to \$484.00 per month, depending on the service assignment," Eggen added.

Applications and full information can be obtained by contacting the nearest DPS office. July 6 is the deadline for filing applications for the examination to be conducted July 14 and July 15.
