FORMER HICO YOUTH AIDS IN RELIEF TO CELIA VICTIMS

Keith Reed, son of Mrs. Bobbie Robertson of Pettus and grandson of Mrs. Edna Mae Roberson of Hico, was deeply concerned when he heard the many stories of the destruction of Hurricane Celia, and decided to do something about it.

Following is a clipping taken from the Pettus newspaper which also appeared in a Corpus Christi paper:

Keith Reed, 18, a 1970 graduate of Pettus High School, has summer work with the H.E.B. Store in Beeville. When Hurricane Celia struck he heard many stories over the news media, and he saw pictures of the terrible destruction that touched his heart. He resolved to do something—and he did.

He began to ask for contributions from his fellow employees, and occasionally when a shopper heard the conversation he would make a donation. He collected a total of \$88.50 and with that he bought canned goods, sugar, bread, and such items. Then he rented a U-Haul, loaded it up, including ice and water, and with a friend, Keith Worley of Tuleta, took it down to the First Baptist Church in Aransas Pass to be distributed wherever needed.

Keith is the step-son of J. O. Robertson, band director of the Pettus school system. When Mr. Robertson was called to verify the story of what his step-son had done, he kindly said, "Let me call Keith. Let him tell you in his own words."

Keith very modestly told what he had done. From the tone of his voice one could easily tell that he felt it was a special privilege for him to be able to do something helpful to alleviate the distress and destruction that befell those in the wake of Hurricane Celia. Pettus is proud of this young man.

Hico Hosts Godley In First Home Game

Social Security

Questions & Answers By JACK CALVERT

QUESTION: About ten years ago I was told that I had earned enough to qualify for a small social security check when I retire. Five years ago my present job brought under social security the first time. How long will it be before this extra coverage under social security will increase amount of my retirement check under social security.

ANSWER: Since your last social security coverage, before you really came under social security, was about ten years ago, additional work will probably increase your monthly benefit.

As is because there are seven years, at least, of zero earnings under social security, and we can drop five years in figuring our monthly benefit. Space does not permit me to go into detail, but I'm sending you one of our pamphlets. After reading this, if you have further questions about individual benefit amount, our representative, he'll be glad to go over it with you.

Many people prefer this type of burial since this is the closest type to Christ's entombment. Others prefer it because of horror of the ground and water in the ground.

The lofty white cross, already familiar in the Erath Gardens of Memory, is to be enhanced by the erection around it of a garden-type mausoleum of 48 crypt capacity.

The mausoleum itself will be of cross shape, the 40-foot tall white cross rising from the center of the plan. Sixteen crypts will be housed in the arms of this cross, at left and right, eight more in the top, and the remainder in the long stock below.

The symbolism thus now will be double—one cross horizontal on the ground (the new building), symbolic of Christ's prostration in the Garden of Gethsemane, the other erect, symbolic of his triumph over death.

Material for the new building, including the very large roofstones, will be Texas' own beautiful "Sunset Red" granite, familiar in the State Capitol at Austin and the many recent buildings of the Capitol Complex—as well as in buildings in other parts of the country. This widely admired and widely used Texas material is quarried from the "granite mountain" near Marble Falls. It will be used in polished form for the most part with panels of it in parts of the new building in rustic form, to provide background for garden plantings.

COUNTY AGENT

Small grain diseases can largely be controlled by planting disease resistant varieties or seed treatment with a chemical fungicide.

The treatment process is simple and cheap and excellent insurance against crop losses from seed-borne diseases.

Application of seed treatment fungicides may be made in homemade treaters or by commercial seed treatment plants. Regardless of the equipment used, it is important to get uniform coverage of the seed with the recommended amount of material.

Improper coverage of the seed or the use of lower rates than those recommended greatly reduce the value of the practice.

Because all seed treatment chemicals are poison, they must be handled with care. No more seed should be treated than will be planted. Treated seed should never be fed to poultry or livestock or mixed with untreated seed which may be fed or sold. Strict compliance with label instructions is a must when handling chemicals.

Fields treated with most defoliants, dessicants, insecticides and some herbicides should not be grazed by livestock.

Agricultural chemicals, commonly used as herbicides, insecticides, defoliants and dessicants are necessary for cotton production, but some of these materials are highly toxic to livestock and animal death can occur when treated fields are grazed.

Besides causing direct death to animals, chemical residues from treated fields may contaminate meat or milk and make them subject to seizure under state and federal regulations.

Hico People View 'Becket' at Scott Theater, Ft. Worth

Hico people who saw "Becket" at the Scott Theater in Fort Worth last weekend brought back nothing but praise for Dwain and Delena Fail, who star in the production. Dwain plays the title role of Thomas Becket, and Delena is his tragic mistress.

Dwain's portrayal of the manly and heroic Becket is done with simple dignity, genuine sincerity, and admirable restraint. Becket's deep compassion for the conquered and ill-used Saxons, his inspiring devotion to his country, his sympathetic understanding of the ruthless and impulsive Henry II, and his valiant submission to his fate—all of these qualities will long be remembered by those who watch the unfolding of the character of the martyred Archbishop of Canterbury.

No less admirable is Delena's portrayal of the talented Gwendolyn. Personal integrity and complete devotion to Becket are her chief traits. She sings a tragic old ballad with tenderness and simplicity that charms her audience in the house, as well as the impulsive King Henry on the stage.

"We are all so proud of Dwain and Delena," said Mrs. W. B. Hill, Hico High School Drama Club sponsor and formerly Dwain's English teacher.

Dwain was a charter member of Hico's drama club and had a part in its first production, "Arsenic and Old Lace" in the fall of 1964. From then until his graduation from high school he worked in some capacity with almost every play presented by the club. He was stage manager for "Heritage of Wimpole Street" when that play won first place at the UIL State Meet in 1966.

While he was at Cisco Junior College, his friends at Hico High School followed his acting career with enthusiasm. "We especially loved his interpretation of Lancelot in "Camelot," a former schoolmate said.

When Delena became Mrs. Dwain Fail, she was unofficially adopted by members of the Hico Drama Club, who consider her a warm and generous friend.

"When the club has a play in rehearsal," said Mrs. Hill, "we know we can depend upon Dwain and Delena to help us with make-up and to offer us valuable suggestions on acting and stage technique."

On the Home Range

Mrs. W. L. Gardner, Blue Ridge H.D. Club, and Mrs. Jewell Baughn, South Hico H.D. Club, represented Hamilton County at the 44th State Texas Home Demonstration Association meeting held last week in Galveston at Moody Convention Center.

During the two-day meeting they heard guest speakers, attended workshops in Family Life, 4-H, Health, Citizenship, Cultural Arts and Recreation, and Safety, plus electing new officers for the coming year.

Spices, that have sparkled the flavor of foods for centuries, have outgrown ye old spice shelf as greater interest has developed in them.

Aromatic seeds from around the world have invaded the spice shelf. Poppy, caraway, sesame, anise and fennel, five aromatic seeds, are called baking seeds because they add flavor plus a crunchy texture to breads, cakes and cookies.

Spices provide numerous ways to vary the taste of foods and so contribute to the food budget.

Buttered snap beans take on a new flavor when showered with toasted sesame seeds.

Baked potatoes make a tasty side dish when seasoned with toasted poppy seeds. Scrape the pulp from the potatoes, season and add butter and a little hot milk plus toasted poppy seeds. Put back into the shell and brown in the oven.

Apple pie becomes a second-helping tempter when fennel seed is sprinkled over the sliced apples before sealing with the top crust.

Color can change a drab and dull meal into one that is bright and appetizing, as well as more nutritious. Color is the key for selecting foods with different nutritional values. So an easy way to serve balanced meals is to prepare vegetables of various colors.

Dark green or deep yellow vegetables, that contain Vitamin A, add color to meals plus nutritional value. Such vegetables should be included at mealtime at least every other day.

Beets also brighten colorless and monotonous meals. In selecting beets, look for those that are firm and round with a slender tap root, a rich deep color and a generally smooth surface. If the beets are bunched, their freshness may be determined by the condition of the tops.

Fruits not only add nutritional value and color to meals but contrasting texture as well. Fresh figs and papayas are now available at good buys. Figs are highly perishable and must be fully ripe to be of good quality.

Papayas of moderate size, at least bigger than a large pear, are tasty meal additions. Very large papayas may not have as much flavor as the smaller ones.

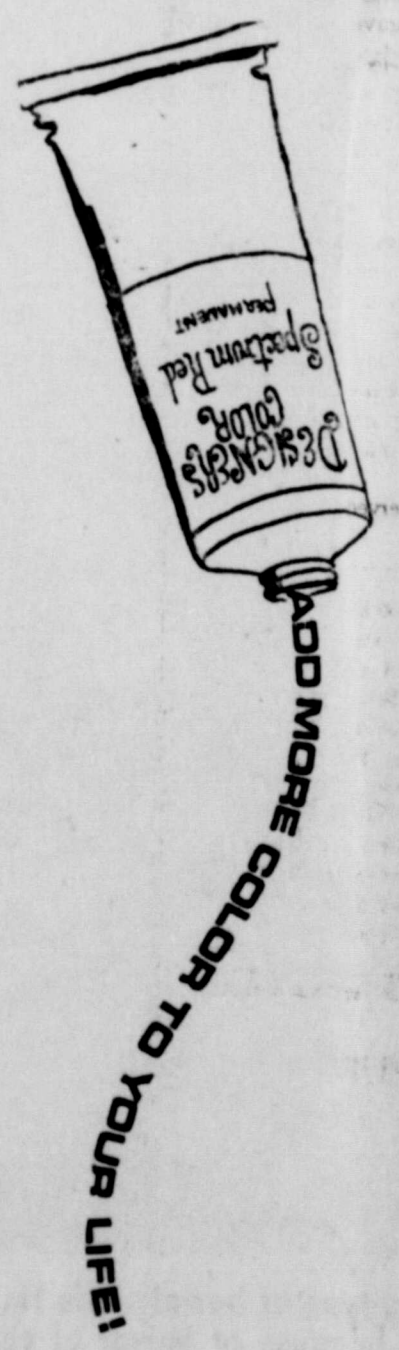

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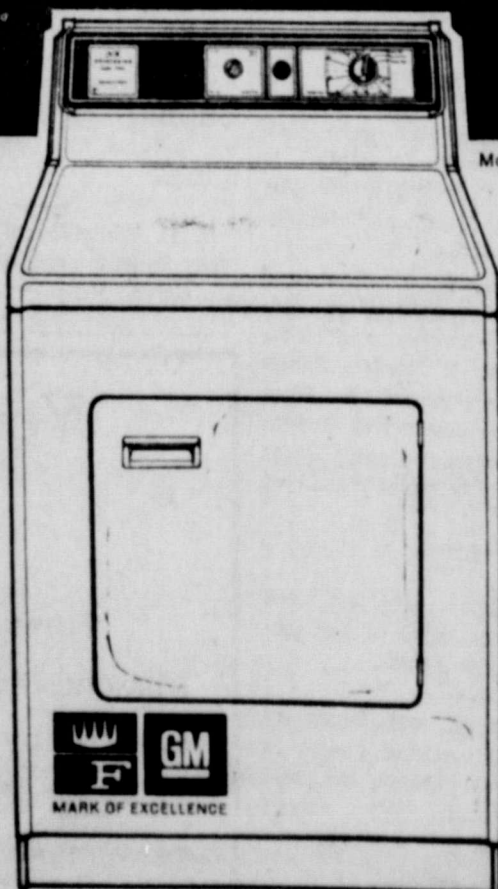

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C.—The idea of a "Revenue Sharing Plan" between the Federal Government and the States is gaining momentum.

While the President has vetoed several over-spending measures passed by Congress, it is inconsistent for the Administration to press for two big spending programs. One is already in the mill, namely the costly Welfare Program and the other, Tax Revenue Sharing, is being released for action.

Serious flaws are obvious in any revenue sharing plan. The main flaw is that the Federal Government has no revenue to share in the first place. With deficits running into the billions and with a public debt of \$380 billion, how is it that we can piously say we can share anything with local governments.

The second glaring flaw is the lack of any proposal to phase out any programs while phasing in unlimited sharing with the States. At this point it appears that it will be just another layer of programs piled onto the thousands which already exist. There is no indication of any link with this plan to the concept of a balanced budget. Revenues collected by Washington would automatically be returned to the States and localities no matter how astronomical the Federal deficit may be. If such a plan should be adopted, at the very least there should be included a provision that no revenue sharing would be available unless Congress first balanced the budget. Such a requirement might have the effect of stopping a lot of dreamed up Federal programs and to eliminate old ones which have blatantly failed.

Many Federal programs now require certain matching funds from the States or local governments. A good question is, what happens if local governments were to use their tax sharing money to match Federal grants under old programs. There is no question that the Federal Treasury could be bled white with its own money.

Another glaring defect is that

local officials, not having the responsibility of imposing taxes for the money they spend, could easily be less prudent in their spending. There should be no division of responsibility as between the authority which impose taxes and the authority which spends the money.

There is no question that local governments, from city to the State level, are having a difficult time in finding sources of tax revenues. The National Governors' Conference has been on record since 1965 in support of the principle that the Federal Government share a portion of its tax revenue with the States. During the Governors' Conference just closed they reaffirmed their stand to "employ every means available toward the immediate and favorable enactment of revenue sharing." States and local taxing bodies are limited in most instances in the amount of tax they can impose and in the case of the State of Texas, we are on a pay-as-you-go basis, but the Federal Government can continue to turn the crank and add to its debt, the interest on which is now approximately \$17 billion.

The problems in meeting the needs and demands of our time are not going to be solved by trying to pass the buck from one level of government to another. Problems will not be solved by greater centralization of taxing power in Washington.

A better answer is provided in H.R. 10580. This has been a subject of previous releases but in essence it simply provides that no taxes be collected by the Federal Government for education and welfare and that the sources of revenue for this purpose be reserved for the States. In turn, the States would levy, collect and administer these programs out of the taxes which the Federal Government does not collect in the first place.

(Note: The Bill referred to above H.R. 10580, was introduced by Congressman Omar Burleson on April 28, 1969. It remains on the active list of pending measures until the beginning of the next Congress in 1971).
