## 'Operation Motorcide' On For July 4th Holiday Travelers

Austin—Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents over the long July 4th holiday weekend will claim 48 lives in the Lone Star State.

In addition, Speir said it appears that between 6 p.m. Friday, July 2 and midnight Monday, July 5—the official holiday weekend—these same collisions could result in hundreds, perhaps a thousand or more injuries, and a monetary loss running into the millions of dollars.

### 400 Notices Sent To District Property Owners This Week

Citing the need for additional funds with which to operate during the 1971-72 year, Hico School Trustees authorized a re-evaluation of all property in the district in an effort to raise an additional \$4,000.00 next year.

A tax equalization board, in session most of last week, has sent notices to approximately 400 property owners in the district, giving them an opportunity to meet with the board and discuss the increase or decrease, whichever might be the case.

The equalization board will meet with property owners Thursday and Friday of this week.

Supt. O. C. Cook said Wednesday that the most pressing need for the new school term was enough extra funds to hire another teacher. Average Daily Attendance, guidelines used by the State to determine the number of teachers that a district qualifies for, dropped in the Hico district last year, which resulted in the loss of one teacher.

School plant maintenance was also cited as one of the major reasons for need of more money.

The board used fair market values of \$48, \$64, and \$80 per acre as guidelines for setting rural property values, and assessed land at 25 percent of those figures, or \$12, \$16 and \$20 per acre, depending on type of land and improvements.

They compared these figures with surrounding school districts, who have a minimum per acre valuation of \$25 in one district, \$16.50 in another, and \$12.50 in still another. School officials also pointed out that these districts have higher tax rates than the Hico district, ranging from \$1.50 per \$100 valuation to \$1.90.

The Hico tax rate is \$1.40 per \$100 valuation, and will remain the same.

City property was also reviewed and lowered or raised accordingly, using the 25 percent figure to determine the valuation.

Under the new set-up, Elvis Vinson, regular clerk, transfers to a route carrier position. He will be placed on Route 2, taking the place of Bertice Barnett Jr., who transfers to the shorter Route 1.

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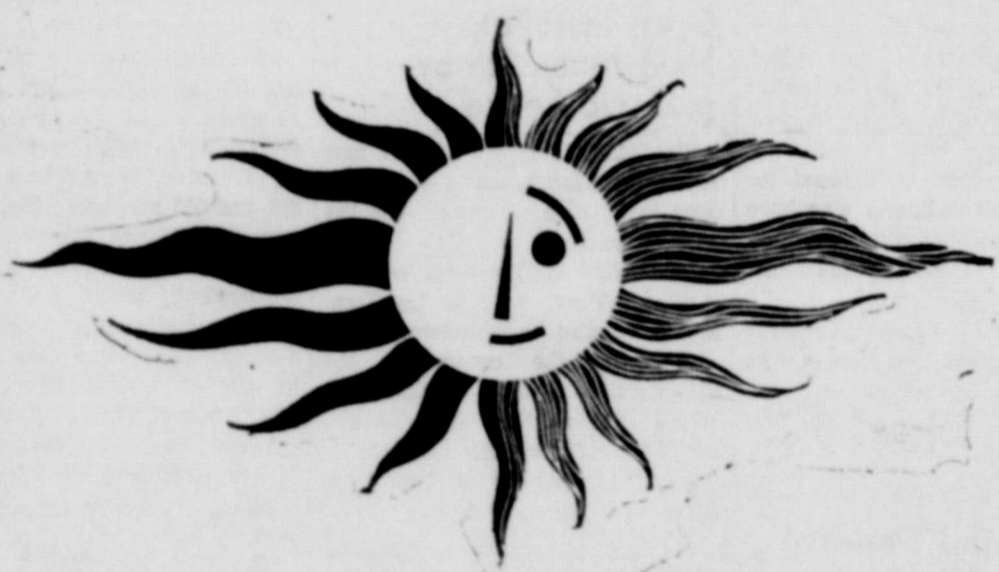

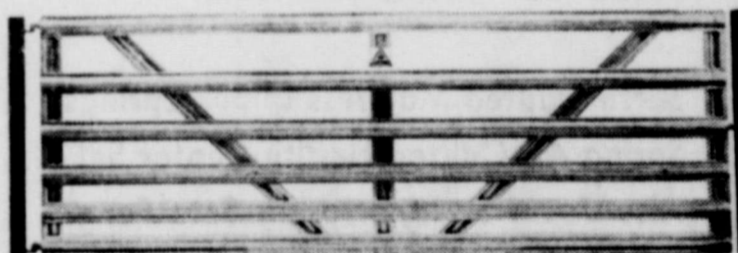

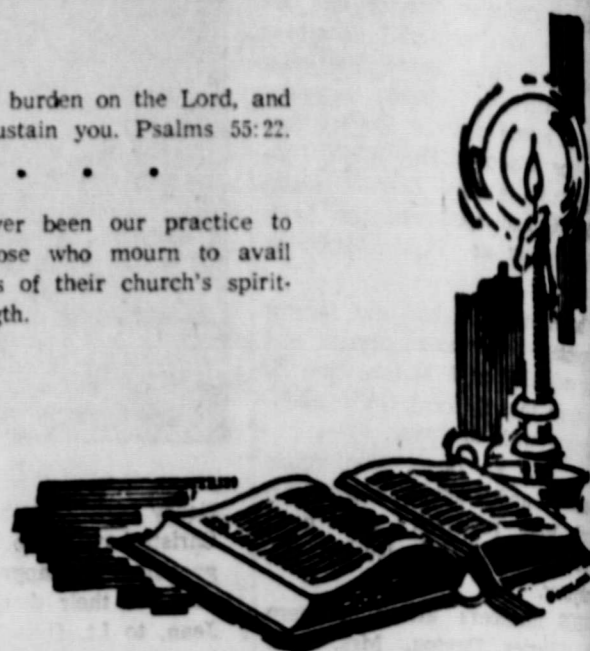

## HICO INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

Dear Patron:

The Board of Trustees of the Hico Schools have barely been able to meet a minimum budget for the past several years. Some expenses, such as maintenance of buildings, etc. can be put off but eventually some of it must be done.

First due to rising costs of operations they see no way of meeting the needs of the school for 1971-72 without some additional local revenue.

Second, the legislature has recently increased minimum requirements in certain school areas and about 20% of this increase must come from local taxes.

Third, due to a slight drop in pupil attendance we are losing the salary paid by the state for one teacher. The Board of Trustees feels that at least a half-time teacher must be secured to uphold our present standards. All of this salary must be paid locally.

Fourth, to meet the needs for kindergarten and special education facilities, a need that other schools in this area are providing, more building space is needed. About \$10,000 will be needed for this. The Board of Trustees would like to be able to do this without asking for another bond election. With cash these facilities can be provided at about half the cost to the taxpayers.

To obtain the needed additional revenue the taxing unit has re-appraised all property in the district: The increase in evaluation recommended by the Board of Equalization will provide only about \$4,000 in new taxes, which is less than 10% increase district-wide. This does not mean that all properties will be raised, only that all property values will be reviewed and raised or lowered according to policy on evaluation set by the Board of Trustees. The tax rate will remain at \$1.40 per \$100 valuation.

After a study of what other schools are doing in this area the Board has decided on the following guidelines for re-evaluation: Rural property will be valued at a minimum of \$12 per acre for prairie land, \$16 per acre for improved pasture land, and \$20 per acre for good crop land, these values being based on 25% of what we consider to be a fair market value of \$48, \$64 and \$80 per acre. Improvements to be considered separately and be added to and become a part of land value. Personal property to be considered separately: All city property to be reviewed and valued at 25% of a fair market value.

Please note that we are using what we consider to be a fair market value, which is much lower than true or actual market value. This policy was developed in an effort to make the tax burden as fair and equitable as possible to all property owners and it is our belief that your property taxes will still be much lower than those of other school districts of this area. Certainly our tax rate is much lower.

Property owners who are affected by this re-evaluation will be notified by the Board of Equalization and given an opportunity to discuss property values with them.

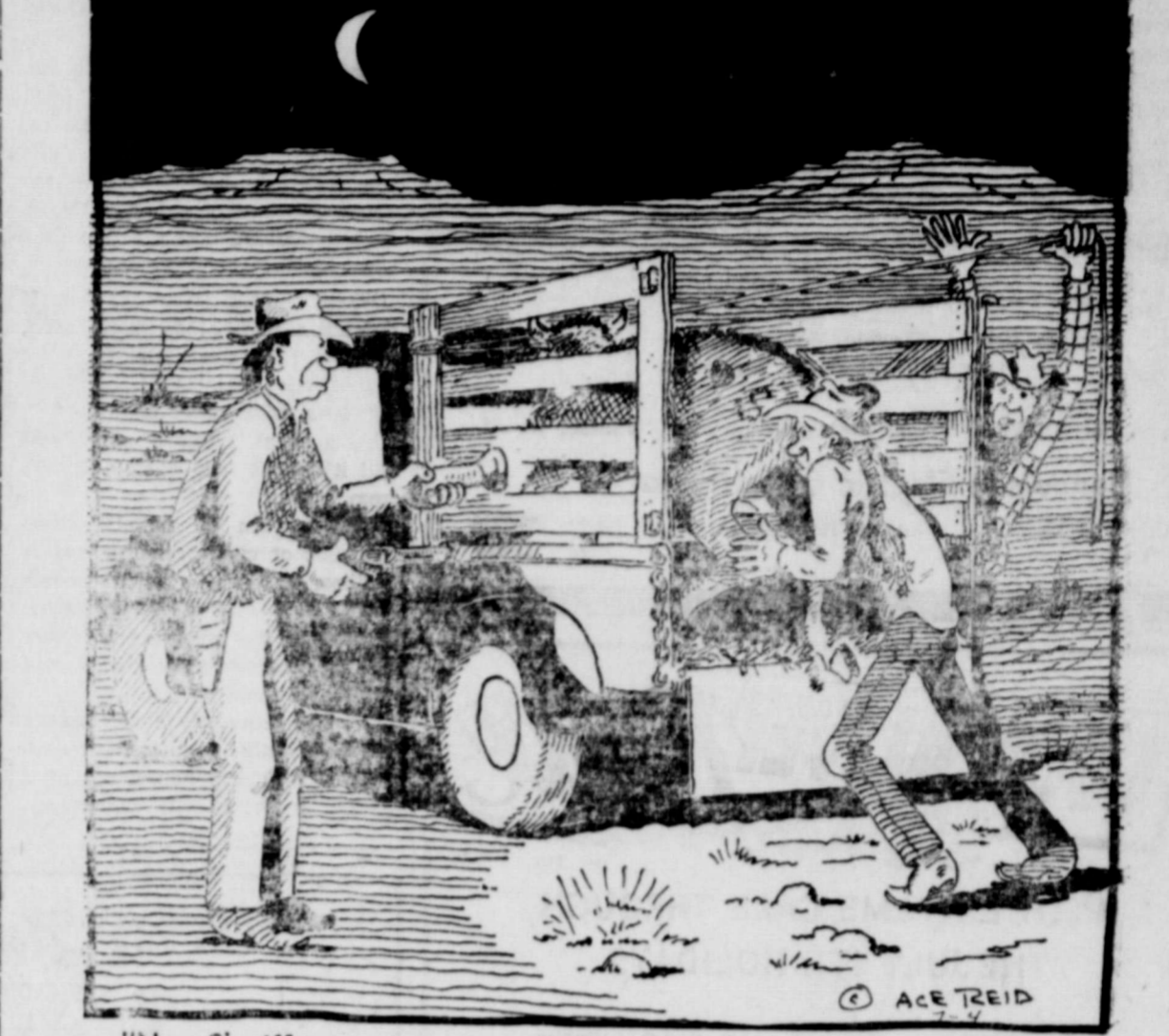

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

With the drouth causing livestock producers to take a hard look at expenses, some may consider using urea as a protein source as a means of lowering costs. This nitrogenous compound can be converted to protein in the presence of sufficient carbohydrates by bacterial action in the rumen. Urea may be used effectively but some things should be understood.

An energy source must be fed with the urea. Mixtures containing urea should be thoroughly mixed with molasses and ground grain and the grain to urea ratio may be no less than eight pounds grain to one pound urea.

Also, cattle should be allowed an adjustment period when they are started on urea to allow for bacterial changes in the rumen. For instance, if four pounds of urea containing supplement is to be fed daily, then two pounds daily for the first week would be desirable, and beginning the four pound ration at the beginning of the second week.

Toxic symptoms may show up when feeds containing urea are fed to starved livestock or fed to animals too rapidly. Urea is safe

and effective when fed properly.

With the continued dry weather, I am getting more calls about trees, shrubs and lawns. Most of these are directly attributable to the drouth.

Some of the first trees to show drouth stress are weeping willows, sycamores, fruit trees, and other shallow rooted, water loving types.

Newly planted trees and shrubs face their most critical time in plant growth during the first summer. They have trouble getting established because of their reduced root system.

Instead of giving the plants frequent light waterings, give them a thorough soaking to a depth of eight to 12 inches. The soil should be allowed to become dry in the upper two inches before watering again. A mulch over the root area will also help conserve moisture.

When a plant wants nitrogen, it doesn't care if the source is a compost pile, steer manure, or a granulated commercial fertilizer out of a crisp clean bag.

To a plant, nitrogen is nitrogen and it doesn't care where it comes from.

The question of organic versus inorganic or commercial sources of fertilizer nutrients is raised periodically. It is now of interest again because of the organic food "fad" and the concern about pollution of waters with nitrate.

Despite claims, these fads do not have a scientific basis in the chemical and biological happenings of a system involving soils and plants.

Nitrogen is an essential constituent of all living cells—plant and animal. Plants obtain their nitrogen almost entirely from ammonium or nitrate forms, both inorganic. The organic fertilizers must be broken down to the identical inorganic forms of ammonium and nitrate before the plants can utilize them.

Plants cannot tell the difference between nitrate from inorganic fertilizers and nitrate derived from compost, manure, or any other natural source.

Pollution danger from one source is no more or less than from the other source providing the same amount of plant nutrients are applied per acre.

Figure the costs of fertilizer on the basis of plant nutrients and the job to be done and use the one that is most economical.

## On the Home Range

Yogurt, after being dismissed for years as a health food, is becoming more and more popular. While consumption of some dairy products is declining, the yogurt market is growing and shows prospects for continued growth.

Yogurt is a thick, smooth-textured cultured milk product prepared with a mixed culture of lactic bacteria. It is usually made with fresh partially skimmed milk that has been enriched by that addition of nonfat dry milk.

The nutritive value of yogurt is the same as in milk—high in protein and calcium. Plain, unflavored yogurt is a cousin to sour cream but has only one-third the calories. One cup plain yogurt contains only 160 calories, fruit yogurt of 2.5 percent fat has about 250 calories per eight ounce cup. Yogurt should be stored at a

temperature of 40 degrees, and should be consumed within three or four days. If it is stored for longer periods, the acidity may continue to increase to produce a sharper flavored product. If entire contents of the yogurt container are not eaten at once, remove the portion to be eaten then cover the container and return it to the refrigerator.

Freezing yogurt is not recommended. The freezing and thawing affects the texture adversely.

When cooking with yogurt, stir or fold it into the other ingredients. The custard-like texture of the yogurt will be broken down by any vigorous beating, so treat it gently. Yogurt also thins out during cooking.

Yogurt can be eaten from the carton or spooned over fruit for a dessert.

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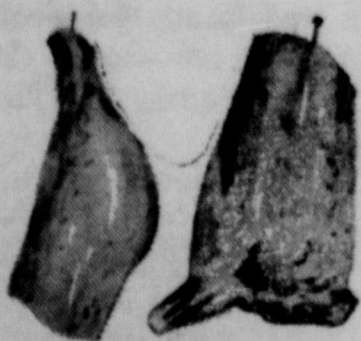
