Parade Kicks Off 85th Old Settlers Reunion

Rain-Delayed Event Viewed By Hundreds of Visitors

Rain, which fell throughout most of the day and delayed the start of activities for more than 30 minutes, failed to dampen spirits, and with more than usual fanfare, the annual Hico Reunion—the 85th—got underway Wednesday afternoon with the traditional parade.

Scheduled to start at 7 p.m., the parade was delayed until 7:30 due to a heavy rainstorm, but despite the inclement weather, people by the hundreds braved the elements to view one of the better parades held in recent years.

The parade proper was preceded by ceremonies honoring ten Hico area men who had served 20 years or more with the U.S. Armed Forces.

The honored retired service personnel, who were presented plaques by the City of Hico, were Col. Robert Bowden, Sgt. Thurman Bowie, Chief Warrant Officer Guy Bulman, Col. Lou Carrington, Chief Petty Officer Geary Cheek, Sgt. W. B. Donley, Sgt. Buford Eason, Sgt. Clyde Grimes, Sgt. Raymond Lawrence, and Sgt. Lonnie Redden.

J. Louis Evans of Stephenville served as master of ceremonies

for the impressive opening day activity. Presenting plaques to the honored men was the Honorable W. R. (Bob) Poage, Congressman, 11th District, from Waco.

Hico Mayor O. L. Davis gave the welcome address.

Mrs. Marilyn Johanson was in charge of the program, and Miss Louise Blair was in charge of the parade, which carried the patriotic theme, "Protectors of America's Promise."

Following these ceremonies, the parade was led by the Fort Wolters Band, who also had a part in opening activities. A color guard and flag-raising detail from Fort Wolters also participated in opening ceremonies.

An important facet of the band's activity is its series of performances in area high schools. Purpose of the school concerts is to promote appreciation of live musical performance, to entertain, and to improve the Army's image in the eyes of the younger generation.

The bandmaster, Chief Warrant Officer Herbert J. Bilhartz, is from San Antonio, and is a graduate of the music department of the University of Texas at Austin.

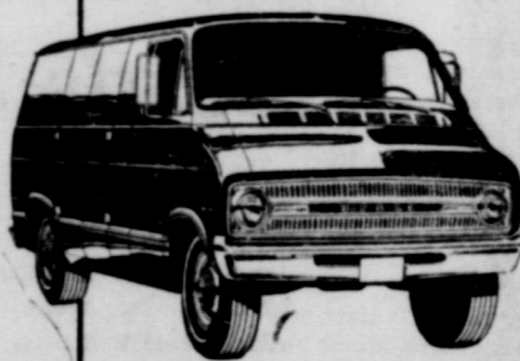

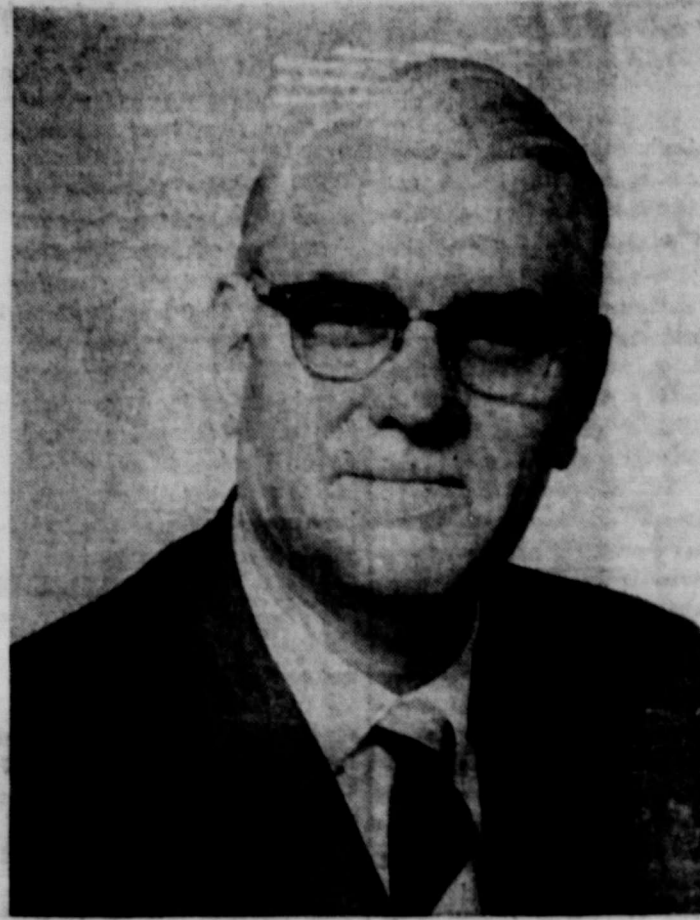

On the Home Range

Americans enjoy the highest level of living that man has known. Our system of mass production and mass distribution is based on an adequate credit system. Business enterprises must use credit in order to obtain the materials and services needed for mass production.

Mass consumption is necessary if mass production is to continue, and consumer credit helps make mass consumption possible. Credit makes it possible for families and individuals to pay over a period of time for items that require a major cash outlay. This creates new markets and maintains mass demand for consumer durables.

What happens as a result of credit? Individuals and families enjoy a higher level of living and the entire economy progresses at a faster rate than would be possible otherwise.

Attitudes toward the use of credit are changing. At one time most families believed in "doing without" until it was possible to pay cash. Now many people believe in acquiring durable goods which have lasting value as needs arise, paying for these goods as they are used.

Shop for credit because credit costs may differ from lender to lender. Find out what the credit charges will be before agreeing to sign a contract. Be sure you understand all the terms in the agreement.

Credit always costs money. How much of your money has been used for credit charges? You would probably be surprised if you knew the total amount.

When buying on credit, you pay an extra charge called interest or finance charge. Although credit lets you use things while paying

for them, you may spend more than you can afford.

How much can you afford? Study your family situation. Are you spending for longtime family happiness and security? Conservative estimates suggest that after home mortgage a family can carry payments of 15 or 20 percent of monthly income after tax deductions. However, families with high housing expenses, several children, large medical expenses or unemployment problems cannot carry even 15 percent.

Figure what you can afford by listing categories of spending and record your expenditures for a period of time. Weigh the amount spent against your income. Is there money left for additional payments? Plan future expenditures based on what you spend now. Allow for unexpected expenses.

Ask yourself these questions when considering the use of credit: Is this item worth the extra cost? Will the item last longer than the payment period? Could I save now to pay cash for future items? What is the difference between the cash price and the credit price? Could I pay less by choosing another form of credit? Could I make a larger down payment without upsetting the family spending plan? Do I pay off debts as quickly as possible? Can I meet this payment plus all other monthly expenses?

Remember, the next time you buy on credit, that you will be paying a finance charge for the use of the money.

Questions & Answers

Question: I am almost 65 and have been receiving disability benefits for several years. Will I be eligible for retirement benefits as well as my disability payments when I become 65?

Answer: You can receive only one payment. If your disability continues to 65, your payments will be converted to retirement benefits and will continue to be paid to you in the same amount.

Question: I applied for social security when I was 65 so I could get my Medicare coverage. I am still working. Will my work after I am 65 be counted in figuring my benefit amount?

Answer: Yes. Any work you do after entitlement to social security benefits will automatically be figured into your benefit each year to see if your monthly check can be increased.

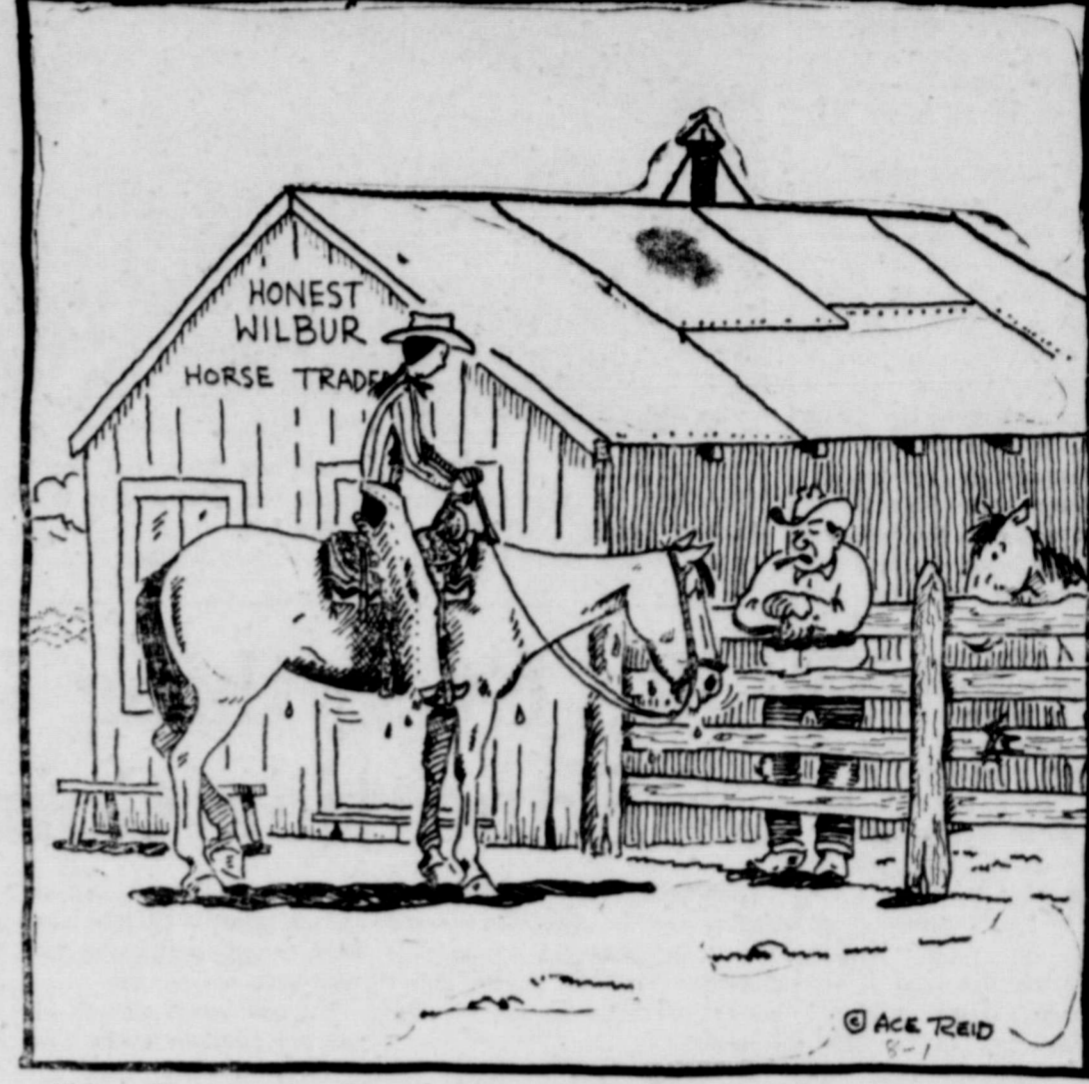

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL MCCUTCHEON

I would like to remind horsemen that it is mandatory that all horses throughout Texas be vaccinated for VEE. If you cannot bring your horses to the veterinarian for some reason, be sure and ask him to come out and administer the shots. All services are free to you.

It will be necessary for horsemen to prove vaccination in order to move horses, so be sure and keep your vaccination certificate.

It is highly important that all horses be immunized in order to check the spread of the disease, to protect your horses, and also to protect the human population from the disease.

Several cases of prussic acid poisoning in cattle grazing Johnson grass and sorghum hybrids have been diagnosed throughout the state in recent weeks.

Johnson grass and sorghum hybrids may contain high levels of deadly poison when under drought stress followed by summer rain showers.

Either the wilted or fast growing stage of the plant can be dangerous. Problems usually arise when hungry animals are suddenly placed in these pastures.

Prussic acid is swift. Death can occur within five minutes after grazing affected plants, and almost

always within 12 hours.

This will very likely be a problem in Hamilton County after rain has fallen. I hope you heed this warning and avoid death loss due to prussic acid poisoning.

Some of the old-timers tell me that they have seen worse droughts in Hamilton County than the present one. I haven't seen a worse drought; I have seen longer droughts but nothing quite this extreme.

When some of the old native trees that have been here for years start dying from drought you have to think that the drought is quite extreme. Also the crop situation is about as bad as I can ever remember.

Cattle are going to the markets in increasingly larger numbers and calves are being sold earlier and at lighter weights. Feeding is becoming widespread in an effort to maintain foundation livestock.

I would encourage producers to take all measures necessary to protect and hold foundation livestock if possible to help recover from the drought conditions when the weather improves. I would remind producers that the ASCS County Committee no longer requires a financial statement in applying for feed grain or hay purchasing assistance for foundation livestock. Applicants still have to meet eligibility requirements, basically that they are undergoing an undue financial hardship due to drought.

Joyce Sommerfeld informs me that in the past two weeks the ASCS office has received 150-175 applications for hay and feed grain purchase assistance and she expects quite a few more applicants.

Tommie McCollum at the local FHA office says that requests for emergency loans has been slow, but requests for loans for water supplies are on the increase with three requests Monday.

I would urge farmers and ranchers who are suffering from the drought to check into all the possibilities of drought relief. I will be happy to discuss the possibilities to you as will any of the other USDA agencies.

Like Everything Else, Cost Of Education Going Up, Up

Stephenville (Spl.)—Students attending Tarleton State College and other state supported colleges and universities will be paying higher tuition fees beginning with the fall semester.

Registration fees for resident students will be \$4 per semester credit hour or a minimum of \$50.

Clarification of the tuition rates, established at the last session of the Texas legislature, was made by officials of Tarleton.

Under the new schedule, the fee rate for a resident student calls for a minimum tuition of \$50 regardless of whether the student enrolls for one semester credit hour or 12 semester credit hours.

Beginning with the 13 credit load tuition will be assessed at the flat rate of \$4 per semester hour. This fee is in addition to a student service fee and a building use fee. These vary in accordance with the total number of semester credit hours for which the student enrolls.

As an example, Registrar John Whiting cited the resident student enrolled for 15 credit hours. He would pay tuition of \$60 (\$4 per hour) plus a \$30 student service fee, \$4 library building use fee, \$16 building use fee and \$1 identification card for a total of \$111 plus any laboratory fees. Also, for new

students a \$10 general breakage requirement fee is charged along with \$2.50 campus parking fee for those who park on campus.

The out-of-state student will pay \$40 per semester credit hour. For a 15-hour load he would pay \$600 tuition, \$20 building use fees plus other fees. However, returning non-resident students who were enrolled in Tarleton State before the spring semester of 1971 may continue at the same tuition rate that was in effect at the time of his original enrollment subject to the following conditions: (a) he receives a degree at the degree level, i.e., that the bachelors or masters, toward which he is working during the Spring Semester of 1971, or (b) he voluntarily withdraws or the college involuntarily withdraws the student for disciplinary reasons or for failing to meet the academic standards of the institution, or (c) the termination of the Spring Semester of 1975.

Whiting also pointed out that non-resident students enrolled during the Spring Semester of 1971, in a specific degree program cannot switch degree programs and remain eligible for the old tuition rate.

Alien students would paid \$210 for 15 semester credit hours. Minimum tuition for a foreign student

taking one through 14 hours credit will be \$200. After 15 semester credit hours, the cost is \$14 per additional semester credit hour.

Summer sessions call for a \$25 minimum for no more than six semester credit hours to resident students. Fees for seven hours credit will be \$28. Each additional one semester credit hour will be assessed at \$4 extra. Summer tuition for non-resident students is the same as regular semesters—\$40 per semester credit hour.
