Stock Transfer Places Bank Under New Ownership

Re-organization of the First National Bank of Hico was announced Tuesday after sale of a substantial block of stock owned by Mrs. Odie Petsick, president of the bank the past five years, to Floyd Clifton of Roswell, New Mexico, Ransom Gallaway and Jack Beeson of Spur, and E. D. Brownlee of Brownwood.

The business transaction was effective Wednesday morning.

Clifton was named to head the institution, which passed its 81st anniversary July 11, at a called meeting of stockholders. Clifton, Beeson and Brownlee were elected directors, with Beeson named Chairman of the Board. Ellis Randals and J. B. Woodard will continue as members of the board, and Mrs.

Petsick, Otha Petsick of Gatesville and Edgar Bulloch retired as directors. Bulloch also resigned his posts as vice president and cashier, and plans to devote full time to other business interests.

All employees will remain the same.

The new bank president is a native of West Texas, and has had extensive banking experience at Rotan, Hamlin and Roswell. He was president of F & M National Bank at Hamlin for ten years, and has been executive vice president of First National Bank in Roswell for the past year and a half.

Mr. Clifton and his wife, Beverly, have four sons Rady, a student at North Texas State

University, Bob, student at Texas Tech, and twins Guy and Gary, 17. They are members of the Baptist Church.

Mr. Clifton, 47, served in the Air Force during World War II, and attended Sul Ross State College, Alpine, before entering the banking business at Rotan.

Mr. Gallaway and Mr. Beeson are both associated with Security State Bank at Spur, and Brownlee, formerly of DeLeon, is a director in Southwest State Bank of Brownwood. Beeson is also Chairman of the Board of the Strawn, Texas bank.

Mr. Clifton expressed his desire to have his family move to Hico as soon as housing is available, and said that he intended to take an active inter-

est in community activities, and work for the betterment of Hico and this area.

In a statement Wednesday morning, Mrs. Petsick said "It is with deep regret that I am ending my long association with the bank, but I am confident the best interests of the Hico territory will be promoted by the bank's new highly competent leadership with resulting growth and progress."

Mrs. Petsick will continue to operate her insurance business.

Assets of the bank have risen steadily since Mrs. Petsick took over the presidency after the death of her husband in 1966, standing at an all-time high of \$4,495,905 at the end of the first half of this year.

Rain-Dampened Reunion Is Successful Despite Elements

For the first time in more years than most can remember, the Hico Reunion was almost rained out last week. Very few, if any, residents can remember a time when the celebration was cancelled due to inclement weather, but last Wednesday afternoon, many of the huge crowd of people who gathered here for opening ceremonies of the 85th festivity had visions of the affair perhaps being washed out.

The rains, which started during the preceding weekend, continued right up to and past the 7 p.m. parade time, and it appeared as if much effort might go down the drain due to the heavy precipitation. But at 7:30, the clouds lightened, the crowd increased, and the parade was unreel in traditional fashion.

Preceding the parade, ten local men who had served 20 or more years in the Armed Forces were honored and presented plaques by the City of Hico for their role in upholding the basic beliefs of the U.S. The parade carried a theme, "Protectors of America's Promise," in honor of the ten dedicated military men, who spent a combined total of more than 240 years of active duty in the military.

Following the parade, many hundreds of people made their way to City Park for opening night activities, only to find the facility partly awash from the heavy rainfall. However, even with carnival activities operating only at half pace, the people remained and were entertained by "The Tag-Alongs," a popular band from Dallas.

Thursday appeared to be better, weather-wise, until around 9:30 p.m. when a norther and more rain blew in. People were in attendance by the thousands until the rains started, then quickly headed for home with hopes of a better

day Friday. Tony Douglas and "The Shrimpers" were entertaining that night.

Friday turned out to be the best day and night, with a huge crowd on hand for the Miss Reunion crowning activities.

Saturday, the usual thousands of people came from far and near for the final night of the celebration, arriving early and staying until very late. Joe Paul Nichols and the "Four Pennies" provided entertainment, the people enjoyed their once-a-year visits, and the celebration closed on another successful note.

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

I would urge anyone knowing of any horses in Hamilton County that are not vaccinated for VEE to contact me or a local veterinarian. It is very important that all horses are vaccinated and some have been missed due to absentee ownership and other causes.

There is no charge for vaccination or for any other expenses involved when the vaccination is mandatory. Recent rains will undoubtedly increase the mosquito populations and thus increase the possibilities of the disease spreading.

Recent rains were excellent. That is the first time I have seen a drought broken by one rain, but in much of Hamilton County it was broken. The results of the drought, however, will take longer to heal. The fine rain was too late for most of the grain sorghum crop, but cotton will certainly benefit. Most stock ponds around the county were filled, pastures are recovering rapidly, and I expect that many farmers and ranchers will try for a late hay crop since local hay supplies are depleted.

The possibility of an outbreak of African Swine Fever in the United States is on the mind of every commercial swine producer. This is due to recent outbreaks of the disease in Cuba. The disease has taken its toll in swine producing areas of East and South Africa, and in Southern Europe, and due to modern methods of transportation, is a threat to all swine production areas.

African Swine Fever is a highly contagious disease caused by a very stable virus. The mortality rate is very high and resembles those of Acute Hog Cholera. Field
