## Organizational Meeting Held Mon. For EDA Qualification

### Committees Named, More Study Due On Federal Program

Hamilton County, which became eligible to participate in the Economic Development Program early in November, is now taking steps to qualify for actual funding of various projects through the Central Texas Economic Development District, headquartered at Waco.

The district is composed of 12 counties, Bell, Bosque, Coryell, Falls, Freestone, Hamilton, Hill, Lampasas, Limestone, McLennan, Milam and Somervell.

Fifteen County leaders were present at an organizational meeting held Monday night in the District Courtroom, presided over by County Judge H. W. Standifer. Also at the meeting were two representatives from the Waco office, Preston Hays, Director, and Gerald Nafe, Assistant Director.

The two officials outlined the program, and explained various benefits available to member counties, and led in organization of the Hamilton unit.

In an election that followed the discussions, Bob Miller was named chairman of the committee, E. V. Meador vice chairman, and Don Haile secretary.

Also elected were the following sub-committees:

Review: T. D. Craddock, O. L. Davis, J. R. Hayes and John Galindo.

Progress Report: Bill Edgar, Billy G. Wood and Roy Bates.

Evaluation: Tom Joseph, Ellis Randals, Bill Barkley.

Business Development: O. L. Davis, Dub Tate, Bill Doty and Tom Venable.

Public Works: Bob Kinsey, W. R. Hampton, and H. W. Standifer.

When final designation as an EDA approved county is received, governmental units and non-profit development organizations will be eligible for grants and loans for public works and development facilities which provide new jobs and potential new industries will be eligible for low-interest loans and loan guarantees.

Central Texas areas have received about \$7 million dollars of federal assistance from job-creating projects with a total value of over \$12 over the past four years.

Next meeting of the county group will be Monday night, Jan. 17 at 7 o'clock in the District Courtroom. Any interested person is invited to attend the meeting.

## Three Candidates Added to Political List This Week

With the addition of three new candidates—one in Hamilton County, one in Erath County, and one for a district office—politics gained momentum this week.

Filing for a place on the ballot in Hamilton County was Mrs. Pearl B. Williams, who will seek another term as County Tax Assessor-Collector.

The Erath County candidate is A. L. Flowers, who is seeking the post of Sheriff of that

county.

Flowers is well known in Erath County, having served in the Stephenville police department for five years. He currently operates a dairy in southern Erath County.

The district office holder who is seeking election is Byron McClellan of Gatesville, who is asking for his first full term as District Judge. McClellan was appointed to the post he now holds two years ago after former Judge Truman Roberts of Hamilton staged a successful campaign and won nomination to the State Supreme Court.

Prior to his appointment, Judge McClellan had served as District Attorney for nine years.

Mrs. Williams, a longtime holder of the tax post, brings to three the number of candidates in county races affecting Hico voters. Previously announced were Leslie Patterson, Commissioner of Precinct 3, and L. H. (Boots) Young, County Sheriff.

## County Livestock Show This Week

Annual Hamilton County Junior Livestock Show will be held Friday and Saturday, Jan. 14 and 15 at the American Legion Park in Hamilton.

Some \$1400 in premium money has been contributed by businesses and individuals in Hamilton, Hico, Pottsville and other areas of the county, according to Don Haile, Manager of the Hamilton Chamber of Commerce.

Through the January 7 deadline, 197 entries had been received, according to Haile. Entries are from Hico, Hamilton, and Pottsville FFA Chapters, and Hamilton, Pottsville West Point and Hico 4-H Clubs.

The livestock division schedule will begin with goat judging at 10.30 a.m. Friday, followed by sheep judging at 1 p.m. Swine will be judged at 2:30 p.m.

Dairy and poultry judging will take place at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, followed by beef judging at 1 p.m.

The Home Economics Division begins with a style show on Thursday night.

A premium sale for fat lambs, fat barrows, and poultry will be held immediately after judging on Saturday afternoon.

County show officials have extended an invitation to all individuals and businessmen to attend the show and sale and bid on the projects offered for sale.

## Mayor Pursues Entrance Change to Housing Units

Hico Mayor O. L. Davis this week followed up on the discussion at City Council about the safety of the entrance to Site B of Hico Housing Project, located on Highway 220.

In a letter to local Housing Authority Chairman Glenn Ross, Mr. Davis requested that the entrance be enlarged upon for safety reasons. Copies of the letter were sent to HUD Administration, Les Hamilton, Highway Dept. Engineer, Bernell Jernigan, Administrator, and W. R. Hampton, City Street Supt.

Also in the letter, the mayor offered suggestions on how the situation might be alleviated.

Excerpts from the mayor's letter follows:

"Dear Mr. Ross: I wish to call to your attention the driveway entrance approach off Highway 220 into the Housing site property. I feel you are aware of the dangerous hazard the existing entrance could impose due to the immediate drop from the housing property onto the highway is more or less eight to twelve feet very sharp incline.

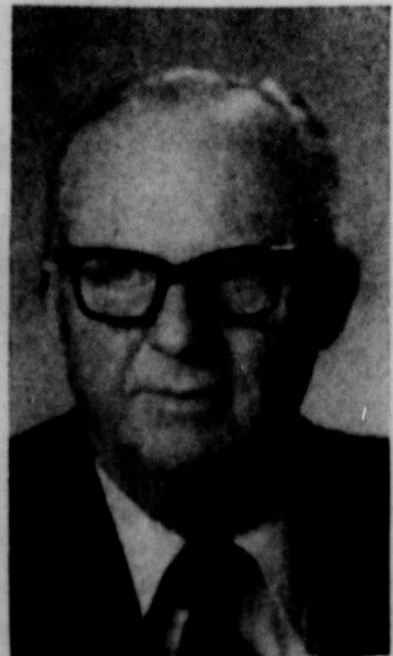
## McClellan Seeks First Full Term

Time periods when the various customer dialed rates are effective will be the same as those for interstate calls. Rates were increased on all person-to-person and station to station calls requiring operator assistance in any way except noted above.

They are all false, and here are the reasons: Our body's requirements for protein continue throughout life, so an older person needs the same amount as a young adult of the same body size.

Fat takes longer to digest than carbohydrates or proteins. Because fat coats food when fried, it remains in the stomach for a longer period of time.

Enriched white breads are just as nutritious as whole grain breads. Be sure to watch labels for the word "enriched", as un-enriched white breads have less vitamins

B and iron. One hundred calories, that's the amount both butter and margarine contain. The price is different, but the caloric content is the same.

A slice of bread loses moisture when toasted, making toast lighter in weight than bread. But the number of calories in a slice of bread does not change with toasting.

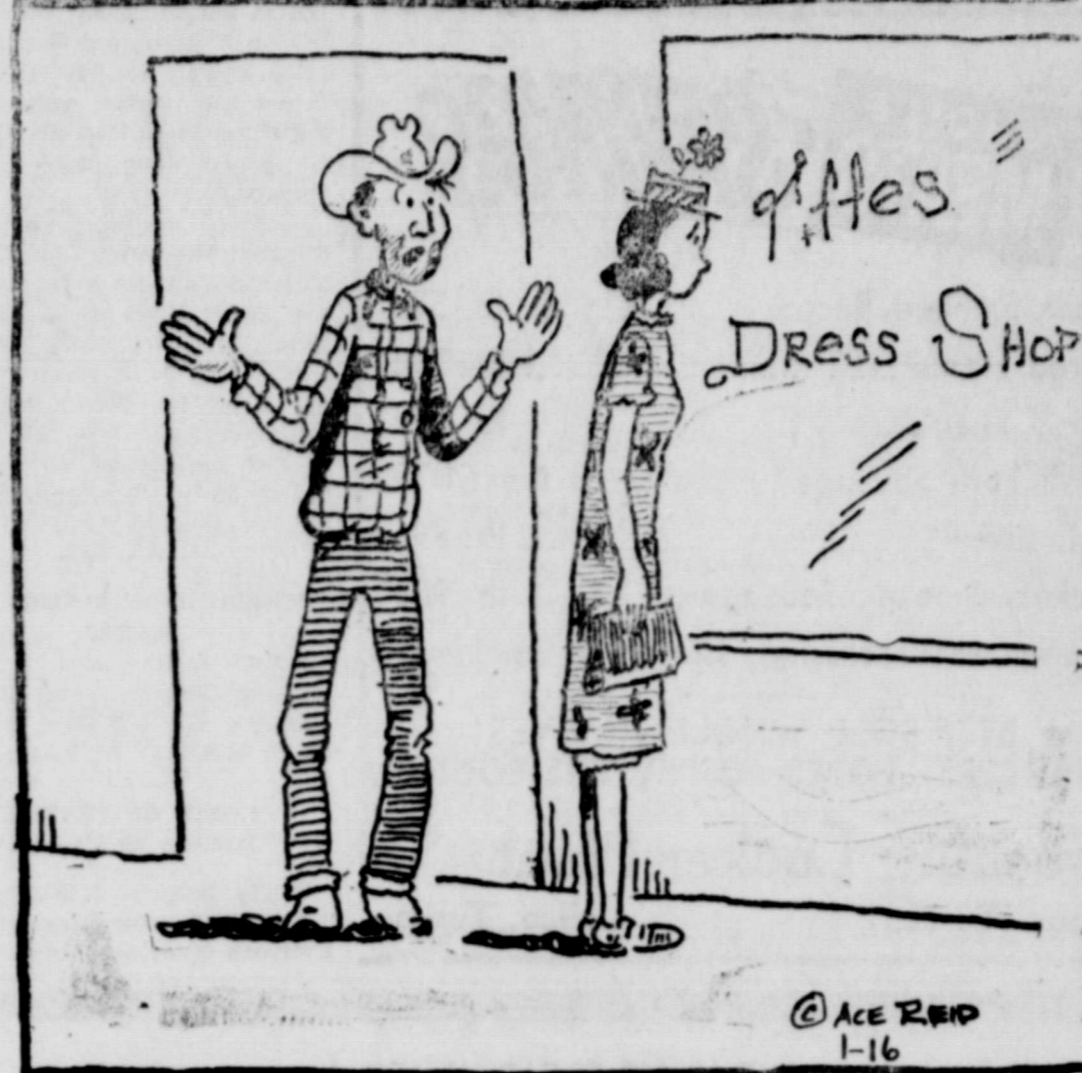

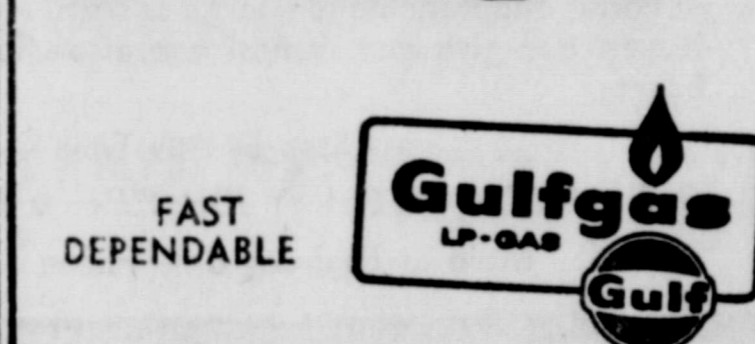
