County Residents Registering to Vote

With slightly over 30 days remaining to register to vote in the first elections of the year, the number of Hamilton Countians qualifying was about average, according to a spokesman from the Tax Collector's office.

Contrary to some belief, the

deadline for registering is not January 31 as it has been in past years, but 30 days prior to any election throughout the year.

People registering by March 1 will be eligible to vote in the City and School elections, which will be held Saturday, April 1.

Should you fail to register in time for the first elections, you may still qualify to vote in other elections during the year by qualifying at least 30 days prior to said election.

Registration forms are available at the News Review office, and even a little assistance in filling out the forms is available if needed.

Nineteen workers have been named by the chairman to make door-to-door solicitation of the residential section.

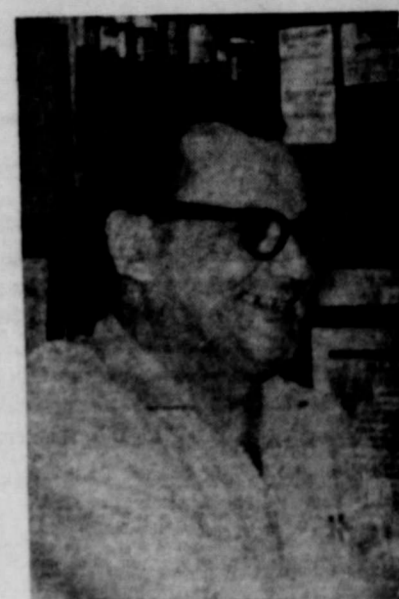

Howard is New Bank Director

At the annual stockholders meeting of First National Bank, held Tuesday afternoon, W. C. (Bill) Howard was named a director of the local institution, according to Floyd Clifton, President.

Howard, who has owned Howard Drug Co. since early in 1951, becomes the seventh director of First National.

A native of DeLeon, Mr. Howard joins Clifton, Ellis Randals, J. B. Woodard, Jack Beeson, Ransom Gallaway and E. D. Brownlee on the board.

A former Hico mayor, Howard is currently serving as City Councilman, is a member of the hospital board, has served as a director in Hico Civic Club, the former Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce, and also served on the stock show committee.

Howard has also been a member of the Governing Board of Howard Payne College, Brownwood.

Ed Pettitt To Coach at Hamilton

Ed Pettitt, who has been associated with the local schools for the past three years, last week was named head football coach at Hamilton.

The Hamilton Board of Education selected Pettitt from a prospective list of more than 15 applicants for the coaching position, which was left vacant by the resignation of Tom Flood, who took an assistant's coaching position at Tarleton State College.

Pettitt, who started his coaching career at Hico three years ago, guided the Tigers to a 7-3 won-lost record his first season, followed in 1970 with an identical record and a second place finish in district warfare, and then last season, took all the marbles with a perfect 10-0 season record before dropping a tight 37-33 decision to Santa Anna in bi-district play.

At Hamilton, he will inherit the nucleus of a team that won one game last year, but which is expected to be much stronger in 1972.

The personable young coach is married to the former Miss Sylvia Sherrard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hershall Sherrard of Hico. They have been residing in Stephenville during his coaching tenure at Hico, but expect to move to Hamilton as soon as he is released from his contract with the local schools.

W. R. Poage Seeks Congressional Seat

Questions & Answers

Question: I have been unable to work for almost a year and a half due to an automobile accident. I thought I was going to be able to return to work. Should I wait to see if I am able to return to work in another 3-4 months before filing for disability.

Answer: No. Back payments can be made for no more than 1 year; you should file an application immediately to avoid any possible loss of benefits.

Question: I will soon be 62 years of age and would like to apply for my social security. My birth is not on record. Can I use my age on my children's records, as it is correct on their records? Please answer this question in the Hico paper.

Answer: Yes, you can use your children's birth records as evidence of your own age since these show parent's ages. Other old documents—almost anything written—can also be used. Try to get 3 papers or records if possible, and likely you will have plenty of record of your age.
