Theatre Opening Is Thursday Night

After three months of renovation, Hico Theatre opens tonight, Thursday, for the first run in about three years.

Although some touching up still needs to be done, the "show will go on" come 7 o'clock Thursday.

For the opener, those in charge of the operation have scheduled the popular "Airport" as the first feature, which will be screened Thursday night and again on Saturday. Also included on the opening weekend slate is a midnight show, to start at approximately 10:30 Saturday, with that feature to be "Skulduggery." Friday night will be skipped, due to a conflict with school activities. Both of the opening features are rated general public.

The midnight show will be on

a trial basis, and its future depends on the number of people attending.

Following the opening weekend, the theatre will be open on Friday and Saturday nights, with the exception of those nights when conflicts might occur on Friday, and the theatre will have a Thursday and Saturday schedule.

Committee making arrangements for the opening has set admission prices of 50c for all school children and \$1.00 for adults.

People will recall that the project to reopen the theatre was begun in late November when plans for the endeavor were released. At that time, funds were solicited from the public with which to renovate the premises and make them useable. Roy Bates had

previously purchased the property from D. E. Bulloch, and agreed to lease arrangements with Hico Civic Club, who will manage the theatre.

People were generous in their response to the project, and contributed more than \$1700 to the fund.

Volunteer labor has been used to refurbish the building and equipment, under the direction of Bates.

The remodeling included a new roof, new ceiling, paint throughout, a new stage, equipment repairs, and other minor repairs to make the theatre useable.

Civic Club members will staff and operate the theatre as a public service, donating their time to maintain the sorely-needed recreational facility.

Galveston Rites Held For Mrs. Richard Peek, Former Hico Resident

Mrs. Richard Peek passed away at her home in Galveston Saturday, Feb. 12, after a short illness.

Mrs. Peek was born Mary Jane Golden in Hico, Dec. 31, 1906, youngest of six children of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Golden (deceased). She received her elementary and high school education in the Hico Public Schools, then entered the University of Texas School of Nursing at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston in 1925, where she received her R.N. degree in 1928.

Mrs. Peek was married to Richard H. Peek in Galveston in the fall of 1928, where they have continued to reside.

During World War II, Mrs. Peek served as co-chairman of the Galveston Chapter of the American Red Cross, and in addition to her official duties in this capacity, taught several classes in home nursing.

Funeral services were held Monday, Feb. 14 in the Grace Episcopal Church in Galveston, of which she was a member. The Rev. J. Jerald Johnson officiated and entombment was in Galveston Memorial Park Cemetery, Hitchcock.

Survivors beside her husband are a son, Richard H. Peek Jr., of Houston; a daughter, Mrs. Wm. L. Gideon of Houston; a brother, Jack Golden of Redding, Calif.; three sisters, Mrs. Ruth Ross of Dallas, Mrs. Emma Phillips of Lake Whitney, and Mrs. Esther Schulte of San Angelo; and four grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her oldest brother, Lyle Golden who passed away Dec. 15, 1972 in Dallas.

Independent Candidate Adds Spice to Sheriffs Race in Hamilton Co.

Hamilton County residents will see history in the making in the November general election, when the first contested race for a county office will be held, with an independent candidate seeking an office held by a Democrat.

The race developed this week when John Newt Harvey said that he would be an independent candidate for Sheriff in the November election. He will oppose the winner of the first and second primaries in the Democratic balloting, where three candidates have filed for the post.

To get his name on the November ballot, Harvey must submit a petition to the County bearing signatures of at least five percent of the number of voters who cast ballots in the last general election for the office of Governor. Records show that approximately 2,100 residents voted for Governor in 1968, which means that Har-

vey's petition must bear around 110 signatures.

The petition will be presented to the County Judge following the primary, who in turn must have the Secretary of State certify the petition before Harvey's name can be printed on the November ballot.

A veteran of seven years in law enforcement, Harvey served as deputy sheriff in Hamilton County until Wednesday, Feb. 16, when he was relieved of those duties. His tenure in that capacity spanned one and a half years. Prior to serving as deputy, Harvey was City Marshal at Hamilton for four and a half years, and was with the Woodway Police Dept., near Waco, for one year. He also was nightwatchman at Hico for a few months.

The three Democratic candidates for Sheriff are incumbent L. F. (Boots) Young, Joseph E. Stenstrom, and Leonard Winkler, Jr.

Hamilton Teams Cop Tourney Titles

Hamilton Junior High basketball teams, both boys and girls, capped titles in the annual Hico Junior

Tournament, held Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The Iredell girls and Hico boys were runnersup in the tourney, and Dublin captured both the consolation titles.

In Thursday night action, featuring four games, Hamilton girls defeated Dublin 35-17; Hamilton boys won from Dublin 29-27; Hico boys downed Iredell 41-35; and the Iredell fens bopped Hico 37-7.

In Friday night action, Hamilton girls continued their winning ways by downing Morgan Mill 33-22; the Hamilton boys took Morgan Mill 45-24; and the Dublin girls eliminated Hico 28-22 in the consolation bracket.

In the boys consolation game, which kicked off Saturday night action, Dublin downed Iredell 34-16 to win that title.

The girls championship game saw Hamilton trimming Iredell 26-21, and the Hamilton boys stopping Hico 32-25.

Championship, runnerup and consolation teams were presented trophies.

Hico Native Retires From State Post

General Carl L. Phinney of Dallas, Chairman of the State Securities Board, this week announced the retirement of Securities Commissioner Truman G. Holladay, to be effective April 1.

"Although the Securities Board, by a unanimous vote of confidence, offered to retain Mr. Holladay as Securities Commissioner as long as he desired to remain with the agency," General Phinney stated in announcing Holladay's retirement "his long and successful tenure with the State and the fact that he recently had his 65th birthday were controlling factors in his decision."

Mr. Holladay's 36-year career with the State began with the State Treasurer in 1936. After ten years he resigned his position as Chief Clerk (the Deputy State Treasurer) to become Assistant State Auditor for another decade. The remaining sixteen years he has been involved in regulating securities.

"Mr. Holladay has not announced his plans for the future," General Phinney said, "other than at least two months will be spent in

relaxation. I do know," Phinney added, "that some six months ago he declined to pursue an opportunity for a position as Vice President of the New York Stock Exchange offered him by a representative of that organization."

"During Mr. Holladay's tenure with the Board, securities registrations have increased from \$165 million in 1957 to \$1.3 billion in 1971," General Phinney stated, "and if business continues at the rate experienced in the first five months of the current year, registrations should exceed the banner year established in 1969 of \$1.6 billion."

Mr. Holladay is a native of Hico and has many relatives still residing here. He is a frequent visitor here.

Both elections will be held Saturday, April 1.

Through Wednesday morning, no candidates had filed for any of

the six posts to be filled, with the exception of County School Trustees, where V. H. Jenkins of Precinct 3 had filed, as had Lagree West, at-large candidate.

In the city election, terms of Mayor O. L. Davis, and Aldermen W. C. Howard, Ray Keller and Roy Bates expire.

In school balloting, terms of Dr. B. C. Dayton and Derel Fillingim expire.

Another deadline on March 2 is that for registering to vote in the afore-mentioned elections. Residents must register prior to any election during the year to be eligible to vote.

Wisdom Gym Dedication Scheduled Saturday, Fed. 26

Stephenville (Spl.)—The greatest galaxy of stars ever to shine on the campus of Tarleton State College is expected in Stephenville Feb. 26 when formal dedication of Wisdom Gymnasium will be held on the TSC campus.

The gymnasium, in Tarleton's new Men's Health and Physical Education Building, will be dedicated to W. J. Wisdom who coached at Tarleton from 1920 until 1943.

A large number of former Wisdom athletes from throughout the Southwest have already indicated they will attend the reception honoring Wisdom, and the formal dedication of the gymnasium at half-time of the Tarleton-Howard Payne College Lone Star Conference basketball game.

Returning to the Tarleton campus will be members of the teams

that won 18 Texas State Junior College championships in football, basketball and baseball during Wisdom's 23-year tenure, and former Plowboys of the 1930 decade who established a world's record of 86 consecutive wins in basketball.

Listed among Coach Wisdom's athletes are many men who went on to play major college basketball or football, two men who served as head basketball coach at the University of Texas, a former head basketball coach at UT Arlington, a Texas high school football "coach of the year," the head basketball coach at Lamar Tech, the winningest coach in Texas college basketball, the coach of the world's champion Wayland Flying Queens, a man recently inducted into the Iowa High School Coach's Sports Hall of Fame, Texas A&M's "most

valuable" basketball player two consecutive years, and three-fifths of the University of Texas basketball team that played in the NCAA western regional tournament in San Francisco's Cow Palace in 1939.

Coach Wisdom recalls a basketball game in the late 1920's between the Longhorns and Aggies when eight of the ten players on the floor were former Plowboys, and a 1928 college tournament in Oklahoma City where 12 players of the players listed on the various rosters were his "boys."

The reception honoring Coach and Mrs. Wisdom, their children, and Wisdom's former athletes will be held in the Tarleton Center from 4 until 5:20 p.m. preceding the Feb. 26 ball game and gymnasium dedication.

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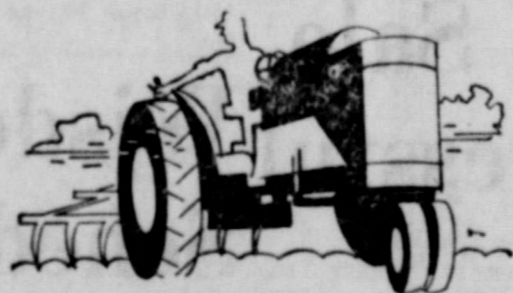
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Fairy Community News

Third Grade Class Makes Tour of Barnett Dairy Farm

For the past four weeks dairy farming has been the subject of interest in the third grade. Stories of "old fashioned" dairies were compared with the new modern operations that we have today. Needless to say there has been many changes.

Mr. and Mrs. Danny Barnett invited the class to visit their very modern dairy farm located just south of Hico.

Last Tuesday a very enthusiastic class left school to make the tour. Mr. and Mrs. Barnett met the class as they got out of the bus and took them into the room where two large milk tanks are. They explained that the milk in the tank is kept very cold, about 34 degrees, until it is picked up by a milk truck each day. Each tank holds about 600 gallons. Also while in this room the students were shown how the equipment is thoroughly cleaned after each milking.

While the class was observing the large tanks, the milk truck came and took the stored milk into his truck through a long hose. He also took a small sample of milk from each tank to be tested.

While getting the cows ready in the holding pen, the children visited the large hay barn where the cows are fed.

One of the most exciting things was actually feeding the baby calves. Each child held a big bottle of milk with a large nipple, while the baby calves nursed the milk from the bottle.

The students went very quietly (so they wouldn't make the cows nervous) inside the milking barn to watch the cows being milked. Everything seemed to work automatically. Buttons were pushed, doors opened, cows walked in, doors closed, the feed fell into the right place, and immediately the cow's udders were washed with a disinfectant solution and the milk-

ing machines were put in place. The long glass tubes leading to the milk tank were filled with the white milk. It took about 5 minutes to milk each cow.

When the students went outside again they saw the large building where feed is stored. Each child was given an opportunity to ask questions as they observed what they saw.

At the close of the visit Mrs. Barnett served the class refreshments made from dairy products, homemade ice cream and cookies.

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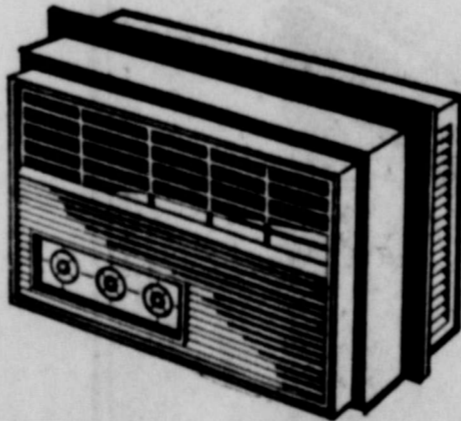

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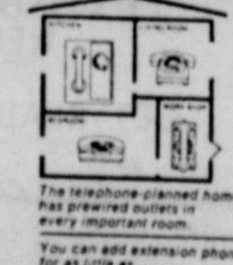

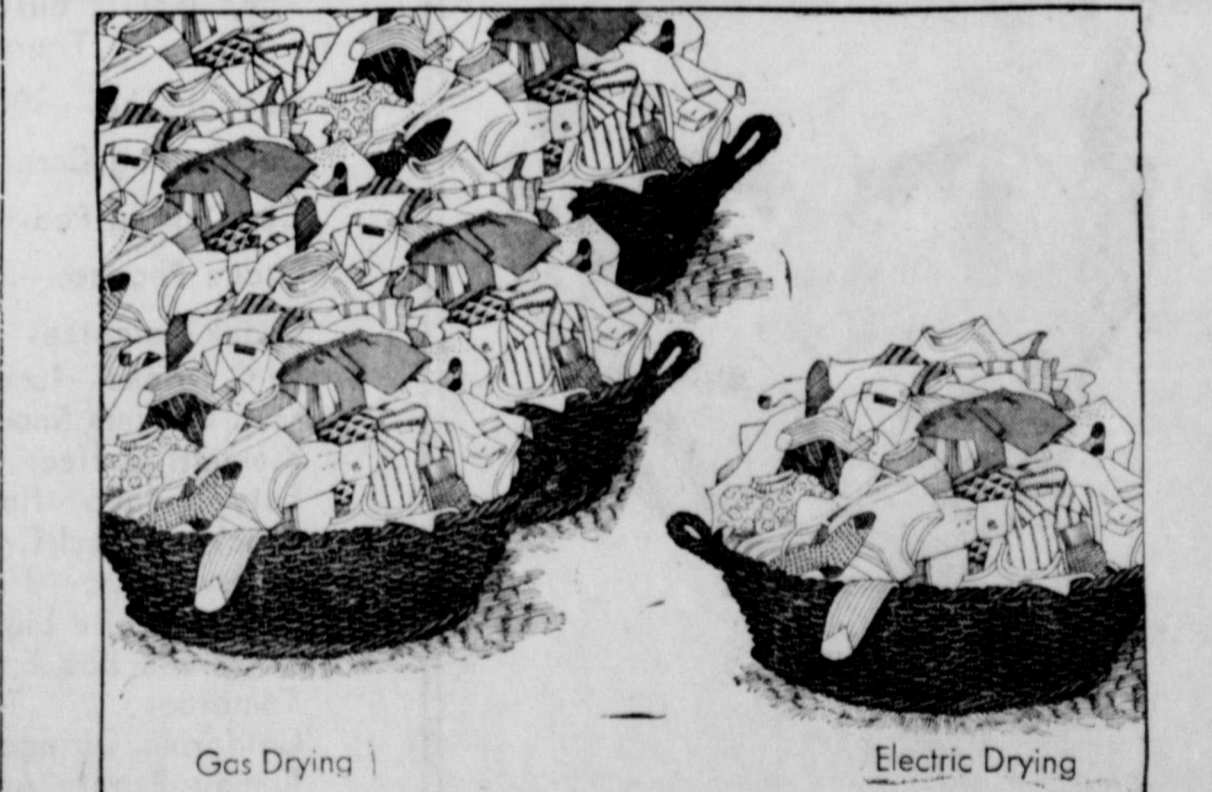
