A trimmed-down Hico Tiger track team competed in the annual Tarleton Relays last Saturday at Stephenville, and garnered enough points to finish in a respectable spot in the Class A and B division.

The track team was handicapped by several members participating in judging contests at Houston. Squad members participating at Stephenville were Lawrence Blum, Jan Christian, Ed LeFevre, Galen Lindsey, Jerry Lowery, Walter Lucas, Buddy Mayfield, Danny Polk and Loyd Roberson.

Only member to qualify for the finals Saturday afternoon was Lindsey, who turned in the fastest time in the 100-yard dash in the preliminaries. Lindsey also qualified for the finals in the 220-yard dash.

In his afternoon performances, Lindsey trackster posted times of 10.6 to finish third in the 100, and 23.4 in the 220 to finish second.

Monday Council Meeting Routine

In a routine meeting Monday night, City Council members spent most of the session discussing various projects currently underway or those that are expected to start soon.

Main discussion centered around drilling and equipping a new city water well to be located in the eastern part of town. Councilman Wayne Rutledge motioned, and Alvin Casey seconded, that the project be started as soon as possible.

Darrel Allison of Dublin met with the City Dads and outlined a proposed State Park plan for this area.

The Council also noted that ex-

penses for the month of February, excluding salaries, were \$1,139.11; that the 25c bridge fee on water bills would expire in May; the J.P. report was given and it was noted that over \$400 in fines had been paid in February.

The governing body was also informed that a city-owned lot on former railroad right-of-way had been sold, and construction started on a new home there.

Other discussions centered around truck parking, City Park, housing units, the proposed office building next to City Hall, and street cleaning.

Southern Methodist University ofensive coordinator Ray Utley will be featured speaker at the annual Athletic Banquet, slated Tuesday evening, March 14 at 7 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

The banquet honors all high school athletes, and is sponsored by Hico Civic Club. One of the highlights of the fete is presentation of the Mickey Maguire Award.

Tickets for the banquet were placed on sale Wednesday, with only a limited number being available to the public. They may be purchased from Civic Club members.

A native of Cabot, Arkansas, Coach Utley joined the SMU staff in 1967 from Pine Bluff, Ark. He was the offensive coach in 1968 when the Mustangs posted an 8-3 record and defeated Oklahoma 28-27 in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl.

In high school, Coach Utley was a four-sport letterman, captain and outstanding athlete at Cabot. He played college ball at Ouachita State in Arkansas, where he was a three-sport letterman, captaining the football and basketball teams.

Coach Utley has been very active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and attends many summer services which involves outstanding personalities and athletes throughout the U.S.

Utley is also in charge of off-season program at SMU, which he calls "The Winning Edge." This is the period when every SMU athlete gets a chance to understand the type of man Coach Utley really is. Every graduating athlete say they know they are a much better person for having known this coach.

He demands that a person have pride, self respect, and self discipline. Few people are able to command as much respect as Coach Utley, and always be fair with themselves and the ones they are teaching.

The speaker comes to Hico highly recommended by both his fellow coaches and former athletes.

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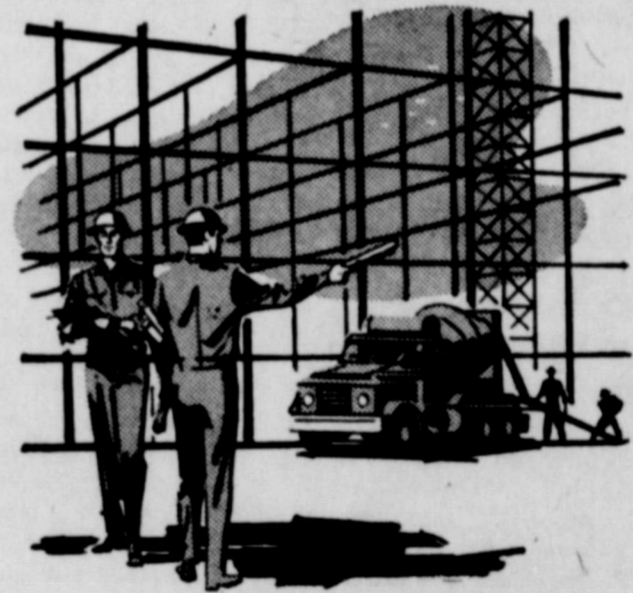

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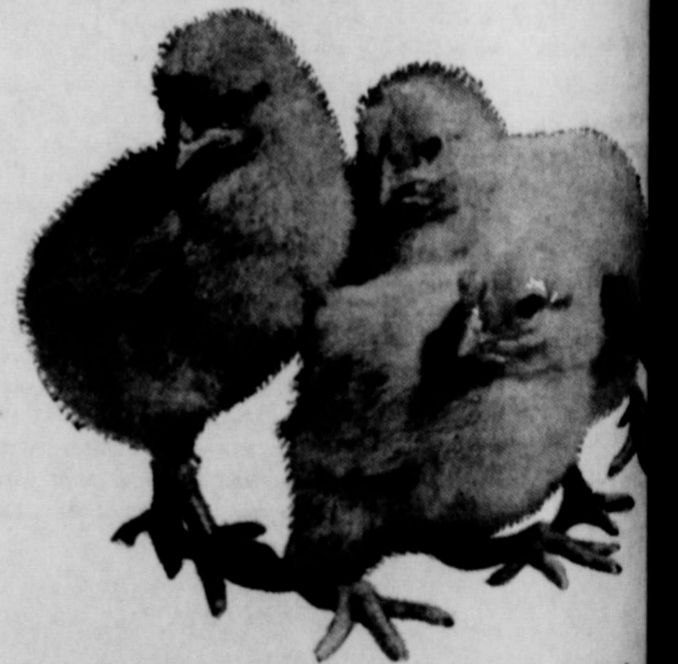

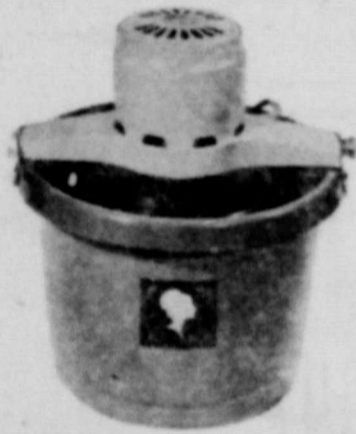

He also remarked that vaccines made from human blood are more effective, as human beings may be allergic to animal serums. Asked if it were possible for a white man given transfusions of negro blood to develop sickle cell anemia, a virulent blood disease which attacks blacks, Dr. Dayton's answer was "definitely no."

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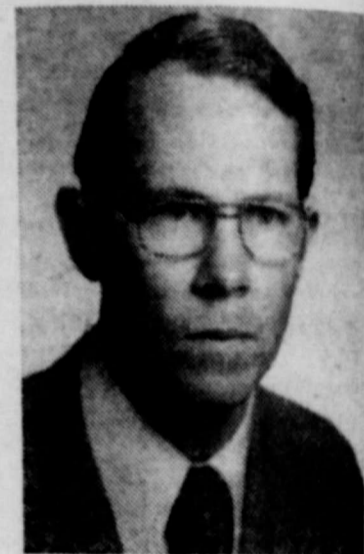
