

# 100 People Voice Opposition to Hiking Trail Proposal

Approximately 100 people, most from landowners, met here last evening at the school auditorium to organize in opposition to the proposed hiking trail from Walnut Springs.

E. G. Ammons of Stephenville presided at the meeting, with Reichert explaining the opposition plan. These two were elected vice president and president, respectively, of the organization, and Mrs. John Golightly was named secretary.

A suggested list of routes that people might take to actively oppose the trail was passed out to those present. The list contained the following suggestions:

1. Petition the Parks & Wildlife Dept. in opposition to the program.
2. You, as a property owner, should not voluntarily sell any part of your property for the benefit of the trail. Furthermore, you as a property owner, have every right to keep appraisers off your property unless they have a Court Order.
3. Write letters expressing your opposition to trail.
4. Write to James U. Cross, Executive Director, Parks & Wildlife Dept., John H. Reagan Bldg., Austin, expressing your opposition to the trail and request that you be invited to a hearing on the matter.
5. Enjoin Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. by injunctive procedures to prove to the Court that the Hiking and Biking Trail is for a common need and for the public welfare.
6. Make sure that you attend

Public Hearings pertaining to the trail.

WHEREAS, the stealth and secrecy employed by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. in pursuing plans for a hiking, horseback riding trail along the former MKT right-of-way is a case in point—it was not in the best interest of the concept of democratic government, and

WHEREAS, secrecy, in this particular case, has been used to suppress opposition to the trail while at the same time private interests for the trail were kept informed by Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. with regard to plans for the trail.

The resolution adopted at the meeting, and which is being circulated generally for signatures, contained the following:

WHEREAS, the democratic way of government is to keep the people informed, but, regrettably, this is not always the way of the in-

stitutions of government; and

WHEREAS, the stealth and secrecy employed by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. in pursuing plans for a hiking, horseback riding trail along the former MKT right-of-way is a case in point—it was not in the best interest of the concept of democratic government, and

WHEREAS, secrecy, in this particular case, has been used to suppress opposition to the trail while at the same time private interests for the trail were kept informed by Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. with regard to plans for the trail.

The following suggestions were made in the resolution:

Is the creation of a 42-mile-long hiking trail from Walnut Springs to Dublin wise use of the public's tax dollar when it would probably be much cheaper to construct, staff and maintain such a trail in existing park facilities.

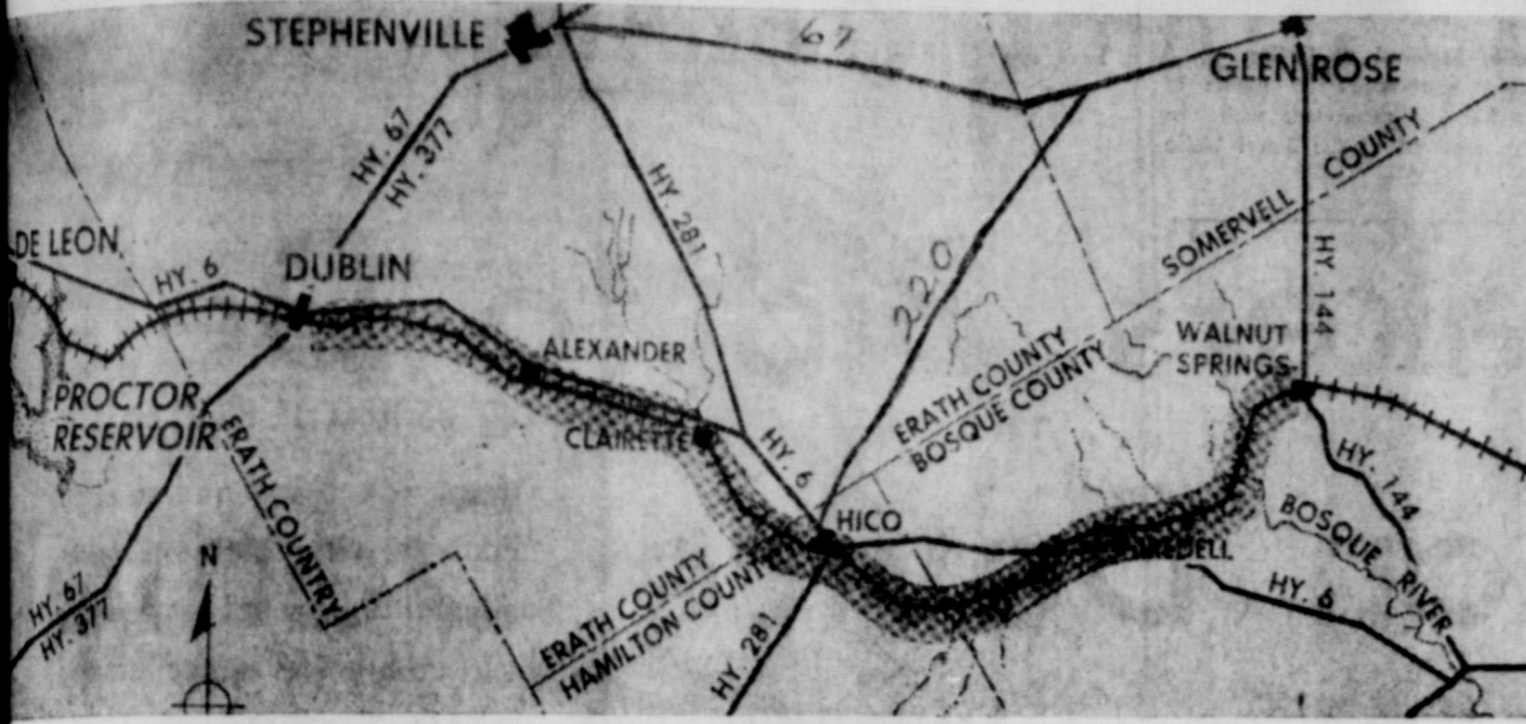
As an alternative, why not cooperate with the Texas Highway Dept. to put hiking, horseback riding trails along rights-of-way of large cities so that city folks could, in a matter of minutes after work or on weekends, conveniently make use of them?

The resolution continued: It appears that "local interests" who own the "Goobar Special", 25-miles of railroad from Dublin to Gorman, stand to gain more from the trail than anyone else. Who are these "local" interests?

Another question asked was: Did the Parks & Wildlife Commission buy the proposition of the trail on the basis of the "Feasibility Study"

rather than presenting the full picture, was biased and deceptive in its presentation? A "feasibility" study can be designed for, and is a well-known tool to, support any proposition for which it is desired. Was the Parks and Wildlife Commission misled by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's "feasibility" study?

Mr. Reichert said that plans were being formulated for charter buses to carry a large delegation of landowners and other interested people to a hearing on the trail, when and if such a hearing is held.

# 'Sissy' Farenthold?

Frances Tarton "Sissy" Farenthold, born October 2, 1926 in Corpus Christi, Texas, comes from a family long active in Texas public affairs. Her father, Dudley Tarton, was a prominent lawyer in South Texas. Her grandfather, B. D. Tarton, was a distinguished jurist who served in the Texas Legislature from 1881 to 1886 and was later appointed to the Commission of Appeals by reform Governor James Hogg. The elder Tarton also taught at the University of Texas Law School, where the Law Library is named for him.

Nicknamed "Sissy" by a brother, Frances Farenthold was educated in public and parochial schools in Corpus Christi. She later received a

Bachelor of Arts degree from Vasar College at the age of 19, and went on to study law at the University of Texas, where she received her Doctor of Jurisprudence degree in 1949.

In 1950, Sissy Tarton married George Farenthold, a Belgian by birth. Farenthold became an American citizen in 1940 and served in the U.S. Air Force during World War II, finishing his military career as a Captain and being awarded the Bronze Star. Currently, he is in the steel business with the Crispin Company of Houston. The Farentholds have four children, Dudley Tarton, 20, George Junior, 19, Emilie, 17, and James Dougherty, 16. A fifth son, Vincent, died in 1959.

### First I had my children...

"For the first 12 years I had my children," she says, "I stayed home and was nothing but a mother. Some of the Women's Lib people don't want to think of me this way, but it's the truth."

Sissy Farenthold is more than a mother, though. She practiced law with her father before she was married and again off and on until her father's death. Her husband George remembers how grieved she was after Vincent's death, and he encouraged her to pursue civic interests as an outlet for her energies. So, she turned to the problems her neighbors faced in Corpus Christi and became an officer of the Cor-

# 'Missy' Speaks on Today's Issues

## Agriculture

"I am deeply disturbed by the declining economic position of Texas' family farmers.

"When a man and his family cannot live on his land and make a decent living, something is very wrong with our society. Due to big government and big businesses that control our state government, the farmer and rancher have suffered along with other Texans who must foot the tax bill for big government."

The United States is now losing 123 farms a day. This includes many Texas farmers.

To help small farmers and ranchers, Mrs. Farenthold has suggested that the government stop raising the sales tax, maintain agricultural exemptions and never consider extending the sales tax to food and services. If new revenues are needed, she advocates passage of a corporate profits tax to balance taxes between consumers and business.

"We must institute a study of agri-business conglomerates to see how much control these urban corporations have over Texas agriculture. If a need is shown for controls, then such controls should be undertaken for the protection of the small farmer and rancher."

Mrs. Farenthold has proposed a program of rural economic development to stop the drain of rural population to our over-crowded cities. She has also worked to correct the inequities of the ad valorem tax system and the institution of a land use management program for Texas as recommended by state farm and ranch organizations and other friends of agriculture.

"Rather than running every state program from Austin we should work to return political power to local communities — especially rural programs. And we need more of them. We must promote research to aid rural areas and develop rural housing and health services or watch the decline of rural areas in Texas continue. This must not happen.

"I propose programs returning political power to local communities and areas instead of running everything from agencies in Austin.

"Texas needs to promote research to help rural areas, make sure that there is ample health services in rural areas and provide for better rural schools through a fairer tax system.

"As Governor I will continue to fight against over control of rural business as I did when I voted against the trailer brake bill."

## The Environment

"I believe that the Governor should be a lobbyist in the Legislature for environmental responsibility. Every major state building project should require an environmental impact statement detailing the effect of that project on the ecology of the area."

Mrs. Farenthold has co-authored every major piece of environmental legislation offered during her tenure in the House of Representatives and has been an active and outspoken advocate of environmental protection.

She has suggested the creation of a state Environmental Protection Agency to coordinate and consolidate authority over environmental disputes and has urged development of carefully balanced land and water use programs for the state of Texas.

## Jobs for Texans

"There should be no welfare if the society and the economy function properly. The causes of poverty are many, but one thing remains clear: there should be a job for any Texan who is willing to work. As Governor, I would lobby actively with the federal government to promote job opportunities in Texas and to provide an economic situation conducive to full employment of the manpower resources of the country.

"In Texas, I will work toward increased efficiency in the Employment Commission, more information programs on available jobs and job training, strengthen the jobs for veterans programs, and improve the social and governmental services (schools, for example) to provide an attractive climate for new industry."

"Texans have a right to know where the two candidates stand. Yet, my opponent refuses an open, honest debate on the vital issues."

## Taxes

Frances Farenthold has proposed a reduction in the state sales tax and reform in franchise and state property taxes.

"Average working people pay too much of the tax bill in Texas. I am in favor of a tax on big business — a corporation profits tax. Big business should start paying its fair share of taxes in this state. A tax on the profits of big business would allow us to cut the franchise tax that is unfair to small businessmen, and it would allow a reduction on the state sales tax that straps average working people. Forty-six other states already tax the profits of big business. It's time Texas made them pay their share."

## Governmental Reform

"Reform consists of honest men and women serving in office; of people who do not enrich themselves while holding public office by merging the public with private interest; of people who... do not use offices of trust as collateral nor conceal their business enterprises through the use of partnerships."

Frances Farenthold filed a complete financial disclosure for both herself and her husband, including her federal income tax return. Her opponent has refused to do either and has steadfastly ignored demands from the public for a true statement of his worth and the source of his income.

This is the core of any reform in state government: honest men and women not bound more tightly to their business interests than to the interests of the people. The most important way that the governor's office can bring reform to state government is through the caliber of the appointments he or she makes. The governor makes over 1,100 appointments during a two-year term and Frances Farenthold has publicly committed herself to a program of "no political appointments."

In the legislative process, Mrs. Farenthold suggests a reform of House and Senate rules including a one-term speakership in the house and removal of the Lt. Governor from the actual legislative process (he is supposed to be the executive officer of the legislative body). These measures would help curb the kind of power politics that resulted in the Sharpstown banking scandal.

"We really need to open up the entire legislative process and appoint more consumer-oriented people to the state boards. A stronger "open-meetings" law and stricter control on the activities of lobbyists would help us rid the state of the kind of corruption we've seen exposed these past few years. The state should really require complete financial statements from all lobbyists and their partners in business — including, if necessary, a daily disclosure of their dealings involving members of the Legislature."

## Insurance Rates

In the past three years, Texans have been saddled with more than a 25% increase in the cost of automobile insurance, and the insurance companies are petitioning at this moment for another raise in the rates.

"Auto insurance rates have gone out of control. I will freeze the rates and appoint a blue-ribbon committee of public-minded citizens to find out just why these rates have skyrocketed to the point where the average wage-earner cannot afford needed auto insurance.

"The present rate-setting agency, the Texas Insurance Board, is dominated by insurance industry lobbyists. No wonder the rates continue to rise.

"I want to see consumer-oriented representatives of the people appointed to the Texas Insurance Board."

## Public Utilities

"All of us are hit monthly by a big bill for electricity, gas, and telephone service. In many instances, this bill is much higher than it should be because the average consumer has little or no protection from the giant utility corporations that monopolize these vital services. A public utilities commission with members interested ONLY in helping the people is one thing I would immediately push for Texas."

Texas is one of the few states in the nation which does not have a commission to regulate the rates and practices of utility companies. Rural Texas is often subject to sub-standard

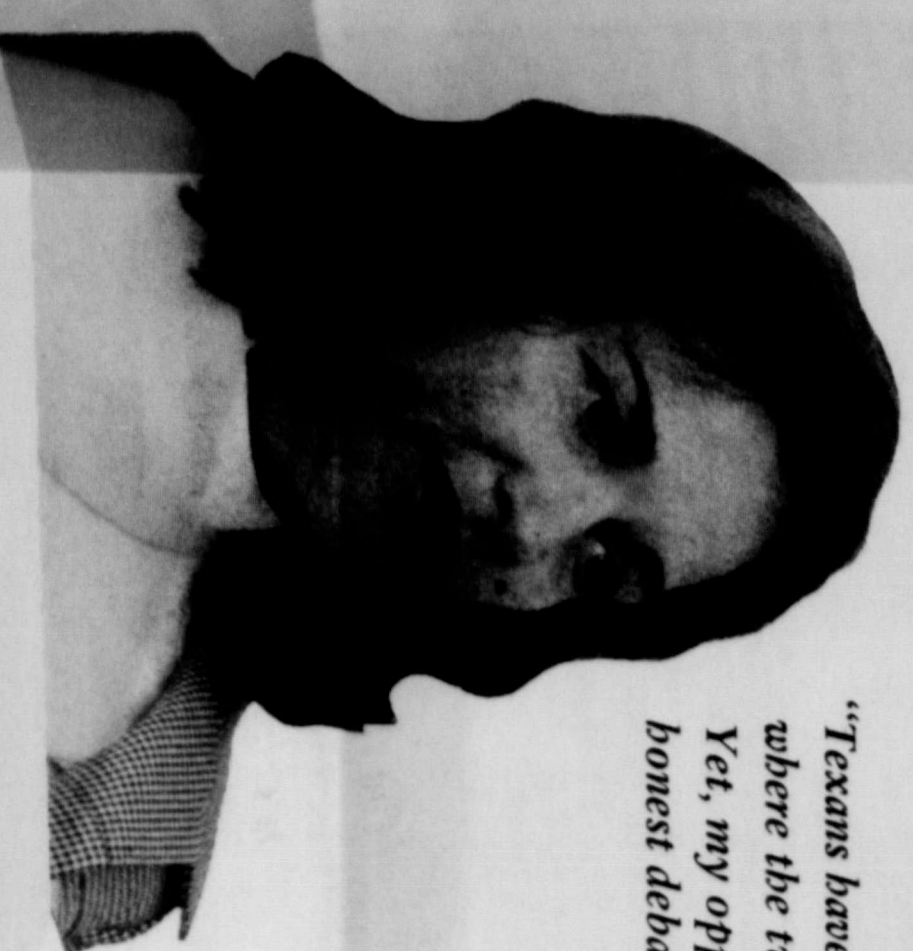
service and rising rates without any real recourse. A public utilities commission could act as an intermediary between the people and the corporate utility giants. I favor territorial integrity for rural electric cooperatives to preserve their tradition of sound service.

## Crime and Drugs

"Texas needs desperately to update its judicial system and law enforcement agencies. In addition, we must find some way to aid rural and small community police forces with state funds for equipment and training. We need to provide better working conditions and better pay for our policemen and incentive programs to enable them to continue their education."

Texas needs a new criminal code that will give us reasonable and enforceable laws — and help to clear up the backlog of cases that have snarled our courts and denied swift justice to many. Drug laws must be rewritten to get at the hard-drug pusher — not the college student who tries a marijuana cigarette. We need effective

drug education programs in the schools — not just for students, but for parents as well.

"Above all, our law enforcement agencies should strive for professionalism. Our state has no coordinated action against organized crime — how can we expect to curb it without a systematic attack by highly trained professionals?"

## A People's Lobbyist

"The people of this state need a representative in any grievance against a state agency. The bureaucracy has grown so large that the individual citizen is almost helpless when confronted with the maze of state agencies. A state ombudsman's office, with investigatory powers, could act as a people's lobbyist with the state government and work towards finding and correcting abuses of public power."

## Public Schools

"Texas must solve the public school financing problem. Average homeowners and small land-owners pay more than their share. We need tax equalization to make sure that big businesses pay their part of the expense of education."

Federal courts have ordered major changes in the present system of financing public schools. Frances Farenthold suggests that the financing of public school education be made a function of the state government without centralizing all of the allocation decisions. Local control must be maintained.

"We must equalize up to comply with the federal ruling. All of our schools must be as good as the very best of them — the rural schools can't be left out in the cold when we go to improve our school system."

Mrs. Farenthold also suggests state programs for the intellectually gifted, kindergarten and pre-school programs for parents and adults, experimental or "lighthouse" programs, and special programs for special learning situations.

"This is an area where we cannot afford to cut corners. The children of Texas need and deserve the best possible education that money can buy."
