Council Eyes Bond Election For Future

Water, Sewer Need Study Now Underway

With an eye toward calling a future bond election, Hico City Council members this week engaged the Columbia Securities Corp. to guide them in carrying out a full scale sewer and water improvement program.

Ralph L. Fickes of Dallas, vice-president of the firm, met with the Council and explained many details pertinent to carrying out the planned project, which has been under study for more than a year.

Included in the plans is an approximate \$450,000 sewer expansion, which will include extension of services to areas not presently served by the city, and a complete new disposal plant. Also included in the program is an approximate \$80,000 expansion of the present water facilities.

Last year, Council members hired a Waco engineering firm to detail needs and make suggestions. Fees for both firms are contingent upon approval of a federal grant and also approval of local monies. If the project is not carried neither firm will be paid.

Under the current program, Council members expect approval of an approximate \$337,500.00 grant from the government, which is 75 percent of the projected cost.

The securities firm suggested that the city, in a bond election, ask for approval of approximately \$200,000.00, said bonds to be sold as needed to carry out the expansion and improvement program.

Exact details on such an election will not be available until the securities firm makes a comprehensive study of local finances to determine how the bonds might be financed.

Mr. Fickes said that he should

have necessary details ready for action within 60 days. He also pointed out that federal money would not be available until mid-1975, which gives ample time for additional planning.

A major portion of the three-hour council meeting was spent on discussion of the proposal.

Other discussions centered around the Housing Authority Board and appointment of a new member; a bill for new police communication equipment, submitted by Central Texas Council of Governments; a complaint on a seeping septic tank; and radar equipment for the patrol car. No action was taken on any of the matters.

The Council also set future meetings at 6:30 p.m. on the first Monday of each month. W. R. Hampton told members that the city was a recent recipient of approximately \$6,000.00 in equipment from Community Public Service Co. The equipment came from the old power plant, and included motors, switches, pumps, etc., which can be incorporated into city use.
