Only for a few moments did she rejoice that she should know the blessings that all believe to be the most sacred that God can give. The young life of Mrs. Clara Dow went out early Tuesday morning when all earth seemed brighter, and happiness seemed to be the crowning of a long and happy life. Nestling beside the face of this beautiful young woman as she lay in a beautiful casket of white, the little form of her first born, the story was soon told what caused the death of this young mother. A life went out, when another came. Just one word of good-bye as she told her husband it was worth the price she was paying, and was ready to go and take their little one with her.

Mrs. Clara Rinehart Dow was born in Cisco 25 years ago last January, living here nearly all of her life, she attended the Cisco High School and was in the graduating class when her parents decided to move to Palestine, she entered the High school there and graduated; it was while attending school she met and loved her young husband, Raymond Dow, after two years of devotion, marriage was solemnized after they had returned to Cisco. Immediately after their marriage they moved to Houston where Mr. Dow was engaged in the railroad business with the S. P. road where he is engaged at this time. Enlisting to serve his country, Mr. Dow was stationed at Houston where he lived with his young bride until he was discharged from service and again resumed his former position. Mrs. Dow was one of the many splendid young women that has been raised in Cisco, her devotion to her parents, and to the church. She early in life united with the Methodist church. She has ever been a faithful member; and many times remarks were made the day of her burial by those who knew her best, that she truly consecrated to duty and possessed all the qualities that loveliness of character to make a happy home and a fond mother. Constantly will she be missed and her memory will ever be sacred in the home she left. All feel that the world has been made better by Clara Dow having lived in it, for she left it better than she found it, her unceasing devotion to the highest and best in life, for her modesty and purity, and her sincerity, and indeed for her every virtue, she was an ideal woman.

When the friends gathered to hear the beautiful words spoken by Rev. Umphrey Lee pastor of the Methodist church of Cisco, all eyes were dimmed, and all hearts throbbled with sympathy for the young husband, and fond parents, and many times it was asked "Why", but no answer came. He doeth all things well, and in this we must believe. The beautiful hymns sung by her school day friends, made the scene touching. "Beautiful Isle of the Sea" one of her favorite hymns gave utterance of "Somewhere" yes, somewhere Clara with her little baby boy sleeps. This makes the Isle more beautiful when others shall follow and rest upon that Isle where Clara stands waiting for them to come. Many of her older friends gathered to pay their last respects and response came from every ton-

gue when the pastor told the beautiful history of her life.

Her remains were laid to rest in the Cisco cemetery Saturday afternoon at four o'clock. Many beautiful flowers covered the mound, and the funeral cortege moved away from where sleeps Clara Rinehart Dow with her first born pressed to her breast.

Mr. G. BOGGS,

Dear father, brothers and sisters:

Will answer your kind appreciated letter that I have just received. The box of candy with it was fine and you may be sure that I feasted to my hearts content. Am sorry that I was not able to send you folks presents and remembrances, I didn't have a chance, will not forget about it though when I start home. I don't know when that will be, but Lord I sure hope it will be soon. You can't tell a thing about when we will get out of here, maybe three months, and then possibly a year. I will try to be patient and endure it with good spirit. Am very glad the firing has ceased, makes it some more pleasant. Have not heard from Brade yet, can't learn where his Division is, maybe he will get to go home soon and at least I hope so. Neither can I hear from or learn any thing of Roy, I don't hardly think his division is in Germany.

We had a nice Christmas, everything considered, I got cigarettes from the Y. M. C. A. and candy at the Red Cross, but you sent me the real Christmas joy. The coin with the eagle on it certainly looked good to me after handling the checks they call money here.

I am on guard until tomorrow at 2:00 p. m.

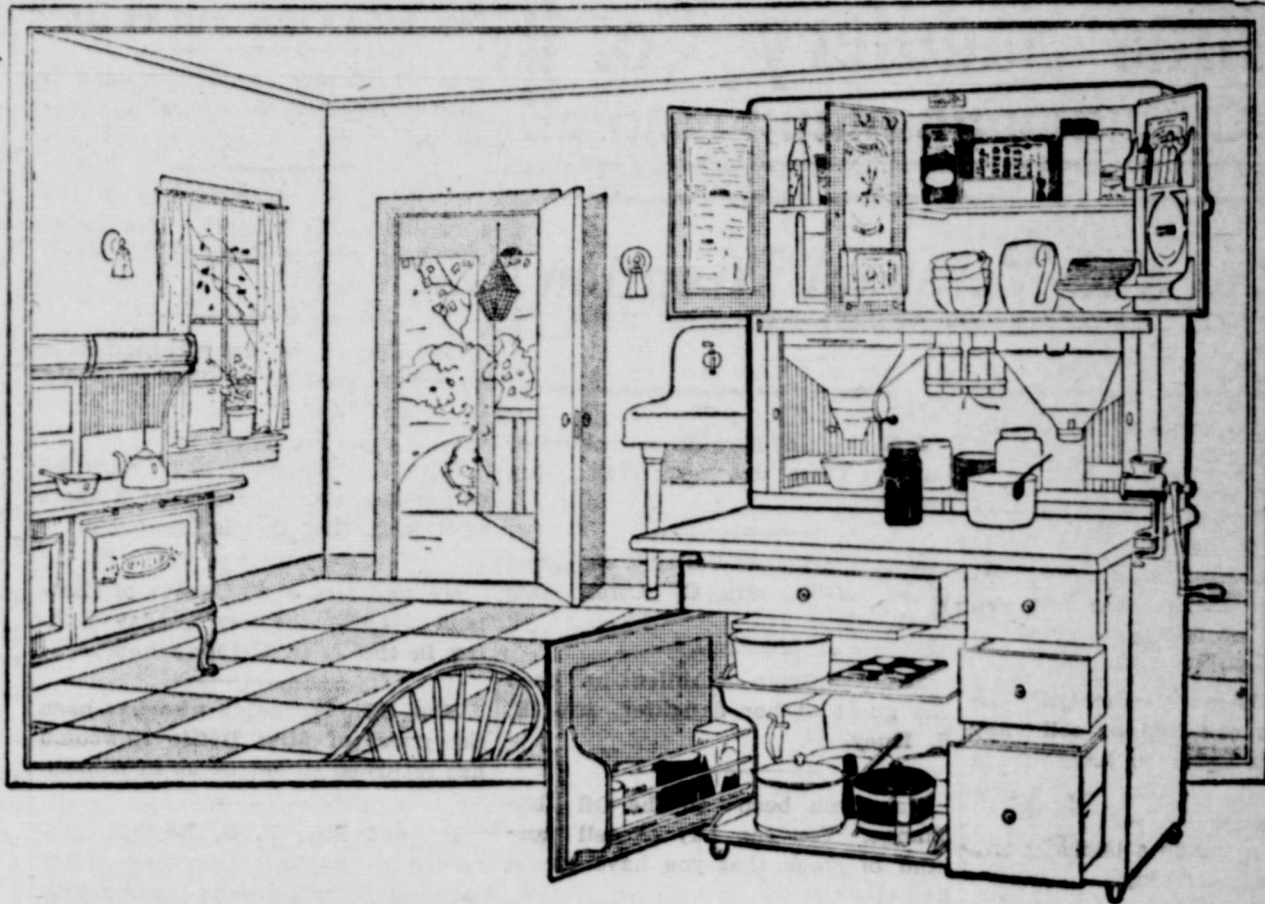

REPORT ON THE OIL WELLS

The Brown well near Nimrod is still looking good with promise of a real gusher. There has been little drilling done since our last report, but the depth was reported too shallow in our last week's paper. The real depth now is over 3,200 feet, with some oil and a showing of gas.

The Prairie well on the Ammerman farm north of Cisco is still shut down.

The Humble well on the Schoor farm is still drilling but making no showing.

The Ray well northeast of Cisco is having more trouble. It is being drilled by the Gulf people.

It is reported that the Fee well, northeast of Cisco is making good progress. This is being drilled by the Sun people.

A great deal of interest has been taken in the Cathey well near Putnam, but a fishing job is now under way.

It is the report, coming pretty straight to this office that drilling is soon to begin within a mile of Cisco, and that this will be done by a large oil company. The material is now being shipped.

Within a few weeks, if madam rumor has the correct dope, there will be at an early date several rigs being constructed within a few miles of Cisco.

NEW MERCHANT BUYS WARD & SON DRY GOODS DEPT.

J. B. Nine, live wire merchant from Oklahoma, has this week closed a deal with Ward & Son Dry Goods and Groceries, which will make him sole owner of the Dry Goods Department. The terms of the sale were not made public, but it was a cash deal representing several thousand dollars.

The store is to have a new remodeled front and the interior of the building will be completely overhauled.

Mr. Nine is a merchant of some note, realizing Cisco was to be the City in the local oil fields, he wanted to put in a big store here, and it only took him three days to make the necessary arrangements.

The store will have exclusive Ladies ready-to-wear department, Shoe department, Mens furnishings, and Dry Goods, a complete new stock of everything will be carried.

Mr. Nine expects to take charge about the first of March.

G. J. Ward, junior member of Ward & Son, purchased of his father, the remaining interest in the Grocery Department, thus becoming proprietor of the Ward Grocery. Mr. Ward will continue to occupy the same building.

APPROPRIATION FOR CISCO

In the appropriation bill which was recommended by the appropriation committee in Congress last week Cisco was named and it was recommended that \$5,000.00 be given for the purpose of buying a site on which to erect a Federal Building. Ranger was also included in this bill for \$5,000.00 for a Federal building. This will be the first appropriation that Eastland county will have received in its history from the government, if this bill passes, as recommended. This was not the fault of any person, officer or private citizen, but the trouble has been that the revenue received from the postoffices in the county would not justify the expenditure of any sum for buildings. Of course this amount is rather small for which to purchase a site on account of the prices increasing in both Ranger and Cisco. It is thought that the next Congress will appropriate sufficient money to have erected a Federal building.

CAMPAIGN OPENS SUNDAY SIXTEENTH

Methodist to Join Forces in a Great Movement for a Revivified Church.

Sunday, February 16, marks the opening for a remarkable campaign in the history of the church world. On that day the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, will fire its first guns in an organized effort to enlist 2,000 church members in a great league of prayer and 1,000,000 church members as titling stewards for the denomination. The campaign for intercessors and titling stewards, which will last four weeks, has been put on because the denomination has declared for a revivified church to meet the need of reconstruction times.

The campaign is particularly remarkable in as much as it is a movement which will be felt in every city and town and rural district throughout the length and breadth of the Southern and Western States. It is

recognized as a most important part of the Centenary Campaign of the Church—the Campaign which celebrates the year 1919 as the anniversary of one hundred years of Methodist Missions—and pastors and Minute Men will on Sunday, February 16, enlist the co-operation of all loyal church members in every one of the 18,000 churches of the denomination.

During the one hundred years just closing the Methodist have grown from a denomination of a few thousand to more than six millions, and from a contribution of \$700 in the first year of organization to a contribution of \$7,000,000 a year. One of the features of the Centenary will be a financial campaign for \$35,000,000 which will be held April 27 to May 4, and the successful outcome of this campaign will mean that the Southern Methodist alone will raise a sum annually equal to that heretofore raised by Methodists all over the country.

**ASSASSIN WOUNDS
"TIGER" OF FRANCE
BEATEN BY CROWD**

Paris, Feb. 19.—Georges Clemenceau, the French Premier, was struck three times by bullets in an attempt to assassinate him today. One bullet entered the right shoulder and lodged under the left shoulder, missing the spinal cord and the lungs. The other two bullets caused scarcely more than abrasions of the skin on the right arm and the right hand.

In all seven shots were fired at the Premier point blank by the assassin, Emile Cottin, known in anarchist circles as "Milou," who was arrested directly after the shooting. Two bullets passed through the clothing of the Premier.

The shooting took place at 3:55 o'clock this morning as the Premier was leaving his house in the Rue Franklin to go to the War Office.

The assassin was an ordinary looking man, dressed as a workman. Five shots were fired, of which one took effect in the Premier's shoulder, the assassin was arrested.

Policeman Goursat, who was also wounded in the right eye, although not seriously, by one of the assassin's shots, told a representative of the Associated Press that Premier Clemenceau rushed up to the assassin and grappled with him.

At about 11 o'clock this morning however, it was officially announced that M. Clemenceau was not seriously wounded.

Professors Laubri, Gosset and Cuisier examined the wound in Premier Clemenceau's shoulder. According to their diagnosis the Premier was struck in the posterior of the right shoulder blade. The bullet penetrated without a visceral lesion. The doctors reported general and local conditions perfect.

First reports of the incidents of the shooting were contradictory, especially as to whether the Premier was inside or outside of his automobile when the shots were fired. It seems to have been established, however, that M. Clemenceau was already in his automobile. It had started and was turning a corner in the Rue Franklin into the Rue Del Essert when a man jumped toward the door of the automobile and fired several times. One of the bullets penetrated the interior of the car and struck the Premier in the right shoulder. His chauffeur also was slightly wounded.

It was learned at the City Hall that the assailant of Premier Clemenceau was a man named Emile Cottin, 25 years old and born at Creil. The man said his home was in the Mon-

trouze quarter of Paris. The police however, do not believe the papers he possesses belong to him and are inclined to think him a Russian.

He is fair with long, light hair and is tall of stature.

One of the witnesses of the shooting, Henry Moulin, a barber's assistant, told the Associated Press representative that when he heard the first shot fired he believed it was the Americans firing in the air, "as they are in the habit of doing," he said Moulin rushed out of his shop when he saw what was happening, crying, "They have assassinated Clemenceau!" He closed with the Premier's assailant, Moulin added, and the man threw away his revolver and held up his hands.

Waiters from a nearby restaurant joined in holding the assassin, whom the police had some difficulty in getting from them, and before the police secured the assassin he was beaten by the crowd. One of the men in the crowd seemed to wish to help the Premier's assailant, and the crowd beat him badly.

According to Policeman Goursat, the assassin entirely emptied his weapon. All the windows of the Premier's automobile were smashed by the bullets.

When the first shot was fired, Premier Clemenceau immediately tried to open the door of his car.

It was while he was attempting to do this that he was struck. He was able to go on foot to his own house where shortly before noon, the Associated Press was informed he was sitting up in an armchair, smoking and laughing with his staff of assistants.

The only sign of trouble from the wound, it was stated was a slightly increased temperature.

Policeman Goursat gave his description of the shooting to the Associated Press representative in the City Hall, where the arrested man was brought.

An enormous crowd, which observed a respectful silence, assembled near M. Clemenceau's residence after the occurrence. Within a half hour, President Poincare arrived. He was quickly followed by various members of the cabinet, high officials of the Government and representatives of the Army and Navy as well as of the diplomatic corps, including William Graves Sharp, the American Ambassador.

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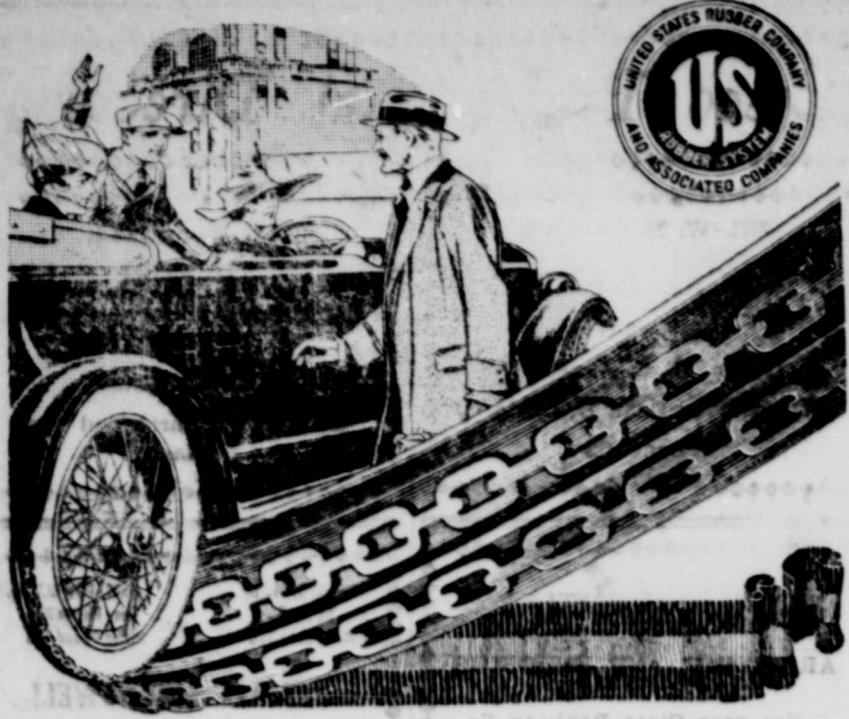

The Texas Co.'s No. 1 Brooks, six miles east of Breckenridge is fishing at 3185 feet; No. 1 Chaney, five mile south of Breckenridge is fishing at 3190 feet; No. B-1 Parks southeast of Breckenridge is shut down at 3-150 feet; No. 1 Sikes is setting a 4 inch casing at 3280 feet; No. 1 J. Black four miles northwest of Caddo is at the top of the lime at 3240 feet and is shut down; No. 1 Billingley three miles southeast of Breckenridge is setting 5 3-8 casings at 3150 feet; No. 2 Parks is drilling at 3390 feet in the black lime No. 1 Havins block 6 T. & P. Ry. survey, is at the top of the black lime at 3320 feet; No. 1 Pierce west of Breckenridge is drilling at 3250 ft. Manhattan Oil Co.'s No. 1 Moon is shut down at 3415 feet. Sinclair Gulf Oil Co.'s No. 1 Ledbetter block 6 T. & P. Ry. survey is shut down at 3430 feet. Gulf Production Co.'s No. 1 Winston block 4 T. & P. Ry. survey is shut down at 3280 feet; No. 1 White southeast of Breckenridge is producing some oil at 3395 feet, capacity not determined; No. 2 Davis four miles south of Breckenridge is drilling at 3225 feet.

RANGER DISTRICT

Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Roper, between the Emma Terrell well of the same company and the T. W. Connelley of the Magnolia Petroleum Co., was completed this week at a depth of 3442 feet, and good for 6-500 barrels a day. It is four miles due north of Olden.

The well has been at the top of the sand for some time, while storage could be arranged. It is said that the well flowed wild for some time before it could be connected up.

The Roper well extends the proven area but very little west, as it is only half a mile west of a direct line between the Emma Terrell tract and the T. W. Conelle, where the two best wells of the field have been producing for several weeks.

It is reported that the one-sixth royalty in the Roper tract has been selling as high as \$6000 an acre. There are 340 acres, in the tract. Two years ago the owner of the land was trying to sell out for \$30 an acre to leave the country.

Salt water has made its appearance in a number of the small producing wells in the town of Ranger, though it has not yet affected any of the better wells in the main part of the producing field.

The salt water comes from what is known as the "Walker sand" at about 3200 feet, filtering into the producing sand from above. It is not calculated to interfere with the total production of the field, as the town lots wells are small producers, making 10 to 50 barrels a day.

Salt water has also been working havoc with the Parrack well of the States Oil Corp., six miles north of Eastland. It is not known just where the water is coming from in this well, as it did not make its appearance until the well was drilled to 3700 feet. The driller of the well stated that the water is from above the producing sand.

It has been rumored for some time that many of the Ranger wells are showing salt water but a careful study of the condition of each well in the field shows that so far the water is confined principally to the wells in the town of Ranger.

The Westheimer Oil Co.'s No. 2 D. McClesky is good for 1200 barrels a day at 3445 feet in the proven area west of Ranger.

Cunningham et al.'s No. 2 Riddle is dry at 3670 feet.

The Gulf Production Co.'s No. 1 The Gulf Production Co.'s No. 1 E. W. Allen is shut down at 660 ft. The same company's No. 1 Collett will give a shot at 3245, after having drilled to 3500 feet.

Barnsdale Oil Co.'s No. 1 Brown, southwest of Cisco, is shut down at 3132 feet.

Plains Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Haynes is making about 10 barrels a day at 3280 feet after a 20-quart dose of nitro. It is located in the north end of the town of Ranger.

States Oil Corp.'s No. 1 Parrack, six miles north of Eastland is in the black lime at 3700 feet making salt water and no oil.

The Texas Co.'s No. 3 Duffer, north west of Ranger, is a gas well at 3-480, completed. The N. 4. Duffer was completed in January for 1000 barrels a day, initial.

B. B. Walker's No. 1 Fee in Ranger is shut down with a small showing of oil at 3150 feet.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 2 O. P. England is a 250 barrel well after a shot at 3420 feet with 80 quarts.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 1 Gholson is showing oil at 3398 feet, east of Ranger.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 1 Galloway, four miles south of Ranger, is cleaning after an 80-qt. shot at 3270 feet.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 3 J.H. McClesky, west of Ranger

is completed for 50 barrels at 3270 feet, after a shot of nitro. No. 4 on the same tract is good for 50 barrels at 3400 feet. The No. 1 W. E. McClesky is making 150 barrels at 3160 feet.

Prairie Oil and Gas Co.'s No. 1 Wood is making 500 barrels a day at 3460 feet and is completed.

Magnolia Pet. Co.'s No. 1 Allen, in the Jno. Foster survey, in the southern part of the county, is shut down in the black lime at 3485 feet.

Connelley & Guilerres No. 1 Eppler just north of the development in Comanche Co., has a bad hole at 2-825 feet, and is shut down with a fishing job. It is showing oil and visitors are not allowed at the well.

Magnolia Pet. Co.'s No. 1 E. S. Davis is making 1,000,000 feet of gas and a spray of oil estimated at 25 barrels a day at 2975 feet, and is drilling.

Cosden Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Holcomb, east of Eastland, will be treated with nitro at several depths in the effort to loosen up a producing sand. The well was drilled to over 3800 feet.

BRECKENRIDGE DISTRICT

Mid-Kansas Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 W. E. Carey two miles southwest of Caddo is making 350 barrels of oil a day and no salt water, after the 5 3-16 casing was well set. Two weeks ago when this well was agitated it began making 3500 barrels a day, 25 per cent of which was salt water. The well is believed to be good now for 300 to 350 barrels a day natural. MID-Kansas Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Yates is now making about 150 barrels a day.

Mid-Kansas Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Jackson in block 6 T. & P. Ry survey is plugging off water at 4055 feet. The same company's No. 1 Knott is making 150 barrels a day. The Texas Co.'s No. 1 Stoker, south west of Breckenridge is making 1-800 barrels a day at 3180 feet. The well has been producing for several weeks and got the top of the lime at 3160 feet.

The Texas Co.'s No. 1 Thomas, 4 miles south of Breckenridge is ready to drill in at 3175 feet, having completed the erection of tankage. Mid-Kansas Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Jennings, six miles northeast of Ranger in Stephens county is making about 12 million feet of gas and a small show of oil at 3440 feet. The well is in the extreme southeast corner of Stephens county, and if it gets production will go far towards connecting up the producing areas of Eastland and Stephens counties. This well has been reported erroneously in other publications as making 2000 barrels of oil.

The Texas Co.'s No. 1 Keithley has been plugged back from 3550 to 3-400 feet, and is still waiting for cement to set. Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Corbett in section 12 S. P. Ry. survey is shut down at 3550 feet; No. 1 Dempsey near Eastland county line is fishing at 3500 feet.

Lone Star Gas Co.'s No. 1 Cassell six miles south of Breckenridge is fishing at 3820 feet.
