### MAYOR WILLIAMSON OUTLINES CITY IMPROVEMENT PLANS

#### Streets to be Paved and Macadamized and Water Extensions to be Made.

After the re-election of Mayor Williamson on Tuesday of this week a Round-Up reporter called on him and asked about what he had in mind for the improvements for the city during the next year, and especially during the next few months. He stated that Avenue D from the Burton-Lingo Company to the 9th street, inclusive, would be paved with brick on concrete base and that asphalt would be filled in on the brick. This pavement will be over seven blocks, and that the total cost to the city would be \$30,000.00. This work has already been started and more than one block has been paved, the balance waiting on the taking up of the water main, which we will mention further along in this story. In addition to this paving all the side streets will be macadamized, crushed rock consisting of several layers being the material used, the course for the first layer and the nearer the top the finer the rock will be crushed, then on top of this will be asphalt, all being rolled and packed sufficiently to make the

roadbed secure. These streets will be extended to all the public roads leading into Cisco and will cost \$50,000 and all this has been contracted for, hence there is no speculation, but the work is to begin immediately. The money has been provided for and the contracts will be carried out. This will give Cisco something like six or seven miles of real first class streets, and the main business street Avenue D, will be paved. This is Mayor Williamson's program for the streets.

In speaking of the improvements on the water system and the extensions that are to be made the Mayor went over the ground. He is very familiar with the proposition which proves that he has given it considerable study. He stated it something like this: We are now excavating and taking the old main pipes up, and new ten inch pipe will be laid beginning at the standpipe to Avenue E to Fourth street thence to Avenue D. The ten inch pipe will then

go out Avenue D south to Tenth street where a six inch pipe will then be connected and will follow Ave. D to the alley between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets or, out near the residence of R. L. Poe, then west through the alley to Avenue L thence north along Avenue L to the alley between Third and Fourth streets, thence through that alley to Avenue F, thence south with Avenue F to the standpipe where the ten inch pipe began. Between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets on Avenue L, this main will be connected with another standpipe to be erected, which will be about four times the size of the present one. Running east from the main on Avenue D between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, a six inch main will run east through the Liberty Refinery on east across Ave. A near which point it will be connected with another standpipe, which is to be erected. It will be noticed that all mains will be taken up on Avenue D to Avenue L and that a complete circuit will be formed within itself. The improvements on the waterworks with the extensions, the new standpipes and other improvements will be added a new filtering plant. Mayor Williamson stated that the present water supply was just about double that of the supply the city had before the new lake was added. He stated that the great increase in the consumption of water has made it necessary to put in a larger filtering plant and that this move is now under way. He stated that the reason the water is so muddy at present is that the filtering tank now doing this work is inadequate, that it cannot filter the water as fast as the people use it. Mayor Williamson stated that all the expenditures for improving the water system would cost approximately \$100,000.00, and that bonds will be issued to cover this amount. In this connection Mayor Williamson stated that if the revenue received from the waterworks was as good as the months of January and February that the net revenue, that is after all expenses had been paid, would total for the year \$11,000.00, for one year. Mayor Williamson states that the Commissioners who were elected to frame a charter, at the special election, some few weeks ago, had framed the charter and that it was ready to be presented to the City Council, and that after the Council had passed on it that it would then be submitted to the voters for final passage. He stated that it was his opinion that the commission form of government would be a great improvement over the old form.

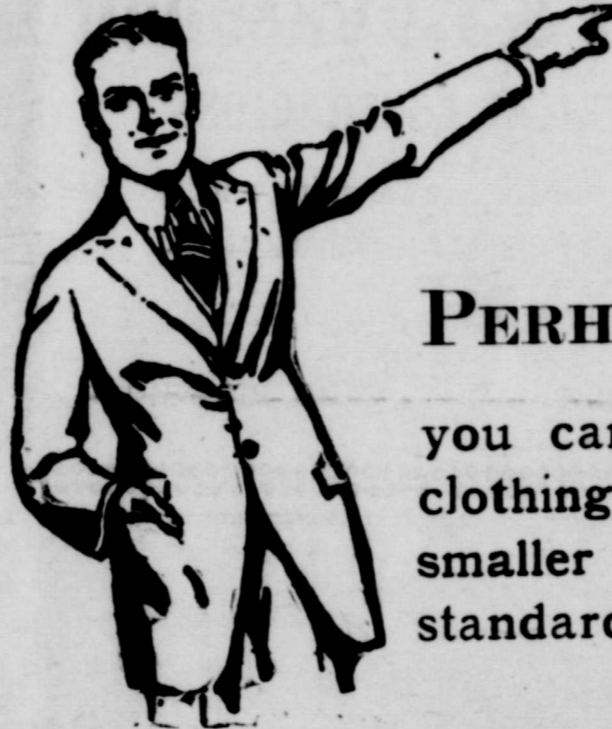

Our boys have brought home from  
abroad some weird and sinuous

"wounded wildcat" and others of  
that ilk. And they dance them when  
the police allow it.

We certainly have all of us excel-  
lent reasons for trusting Mr. Hoover  
opinion in regard to food. And he  
has just informed us why American  
food should be shipped to Germany,  
taking the subject from nine differ-  
ent points of view. One of the most  
practical of these reasons is that

famine breeds anarchy, and anarchy  
is infectious. If hungry Germany re-  
ceived the gospel of Bolshevism, and  
it spread from Germany to France  
and England, it would be more than  
likely to trouble us in the United  
States. Another reason is that Ger-  
many must have food in order to  
get back to production and have the  
wherewithal to pay indemnities. Mr.  
Hoover does not neglect humanitar-  
ian reasons, and he also says that  
we have not been and are not fight-  
ing women and children.

France's stipulation that the Ger-  
man territory lying west of the  
Rhine be ceded to her seems to have  
been turned down by the peace con-  
ference. If so, the decision is a  
wise one. It is not surprising that  
France, embittered for fifty years  
by the cession of Alsace-Lorraine to  
Germany after the war of 1871,  
should now seek a similar advantage.  
But the very fact that the Alsace-  
Lorraine question has been a con-  
stant menace to the peace of Europe  
shows the futility of such a step.  
Race, religion, language and national  
customs from the natural boundar-  
ies of countries. Bismarck himself,  
shrewd diplomat and statesman that  
he was, said at the time of the ces-  
sion of Alsace-Lorraine, "I do not  
like having so many Frenchmen in  
our house against their will." Euro-  
pe will not repeat this mistake.  
Placing any considerable amount of  
German territory under the govern-  
ment of France would be an error  
whose correction would be made  
some day in "blood and iron."

### THE IMMIGRATION BILL.

Among the bills which failed to  
pass in the closing hours of the  
Sixty-Fifth Congress was a bill re-  
stricting immigration for the next 4

years.

The failure to pass this bill was  
an unfortunate circumstance. Im-  
migration into this country has almost  
ceased since the great war began.  
If it is desirable to limit immigration  
the present is the time to do so. It  
will occasion less inconvenience and  
create less feeling than at a period  
when the immigration tide might be  
at full flow. After a war there is  
always a time when manufacturing  
and commerce re-fit themselves to  
the conditions of peace. At such a  
time capital is timid, and it is only  
step by step that established enter-  
prises broaden their scope or new  
advances. Over a million young men  
are now returning from France to  
such conditions as we have just de-  
scribed. We cannot tell whether an  
inrush of immigration from Europe  
might be probable, or what effect it  
might have upon this country. But  
we do know that it is our clear duty  
to protect our young men against  
any bad results which such a possible  
influx of European labor might  
cause. The United States has al-  
ways been known as the "refuge of  
the oppressed of all nations." By re-  
stricting immigration for a time it  
will not abandon its principles. It is  
in the position of a man who has al-

It is to be hoped that when the  
Sixty-Sixth Congress convenes it will  
at once take up the consideration of  
the immigration bill which failed of  
passage or of a similar one. The  
present conditions demand it.

COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES

At a recent meeting of the County Board of Trustees, the Olden school site in district No. 29, and the Pleasant Grove site in district No. 1 were to begin drilling operations within six months.

Copies of the State Free Text Book Law have been sent from the office of the county superintendent to each school in the county which comes within jurisdiction of this office. Teachers will please read carefully and follow the instructions contained therein. Blank forms for reports and requisition of text books will be furnished later, but owing to the fact that the printing for the State is done under contract, the department of Education will have to await its turn. If, therefore, forms have not been furnished by the first of April, the necessary information should be furnished to this office without them.

Several of the rural schools have closed their sessions as they began earlier than usual last fall, owing to the shortage in crops.

Mrs. B. L. Blackburn is finishing the term at Lone Star school in district No. 8, Mr. Baskin having resigned to accept more lucrative employment. For the same reason, Mrs. Florence Lanham is completing the term for Mr. E. V. Jobe at the Haskell school in district No. 21.

The scholastic enrollment for the county will be much larger than usual for the 1919-1920 session, owing to the increased population throughout the county. The taxable values of property will also be greatly increased, benefiting the majority of the rural as well as the urban schools.

The well on the Colony school site in district No. 4-A is expected to be brought in this week. People who understand oil indications are counting on a handsome production from this well. District 4A will also be exceedingly fortunate in tax receipts next year, as several of the best wells in the oil belt are located within this district.

Despite the inclement weather and bad roads, the county superintendent has visited sixty-three of the seventy-two rural schools under her supervision. She expects to finish the rounds by visiting the nine remaining schools next week, or as soon as the roads become passable again, and hopes to be able to visit as many as possible the second time during the term.

Mrs. E. S. Pritchard, the county attendance officer, has recorded sixty-five cases of failure to comply with the provisions of the Compulsory Attendance Law, as reported by the various teachers throughout the county. In each instance a warning has been sent, which in most cases has proved effectual; only two have been unavailing, and these were immediately turned over to the county attorney for prosecutions, as the law requires.

Great interest is being manifested in the approaching literary and athletic contests of our annual County Track Meet, which will be held in Eastland on the first Friday and Saturday in April. The preliminary contests and eliminations are receiving much attention in the various districts. The directors of the different events should be commended for the interest and the untiring energy which they have shown in preparing for these events.

A report from the Summer Normal committee of Eastland County will be ready for publication in the near future. It is believed that the Normal will be retained in this county, although an invitation was extended to join the district Summer Normal which will be held in Simmons College at Abilene.—Ulala Howard, County Superintendent.

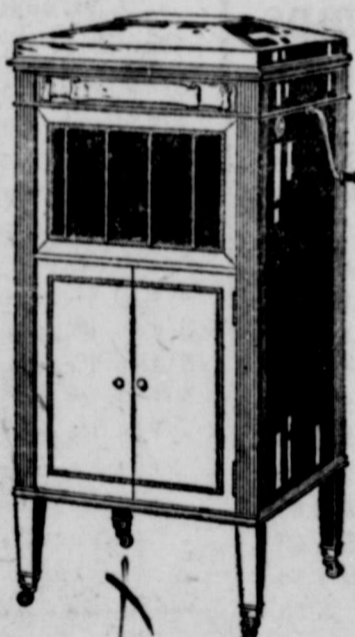

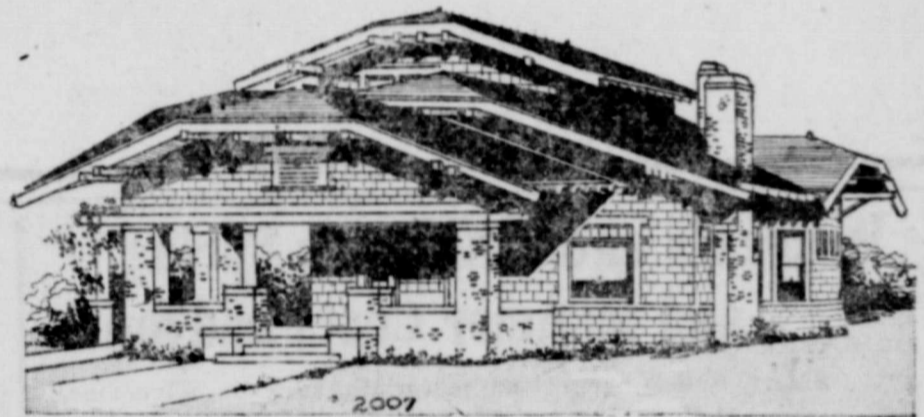

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**NEW REV. TAX BILL**

This paper is just in receipt of a communication from Judge A. S. Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, at Austin, Texas, outlining the provisions of that portion of the new revenue bill imposing taxes on miscellaneous luxuries and semi-luxuries. This portion of the bill affects almost every class of business from the street vendor of candy and soft drinks to the manufacturer of automobiles and motor trucks.

One section of the law places a tax on all persons selling real and imitation jewelry, precious stones, watches, clocks, opera glasses, etc. Sculpture, paintings, statuary, art porcelains and bronzes.

Another section of the law imposes a tax on all manufacturers of the following articles:

Cereal beverages and soft drinks. Mineral Water and table waters when sold in bottles or other closed containers. It also applies to all soft drinks ice cream sodas, etc., prepared and sold at fountains. It applies also to manufacturers of automobiles, automobile trucks, inner tubes, and accessories thereof.

Pianos, organs, graphophones, music boxes and records.

Tennis rackets, skates, fishing rods games and all similar articles commonly known as sporting goods.

Chewing gum, candy, photographic films and plates.

Firearms, shells and cartridges. Hunting, bowies and dirk knives. Portable electric fans, thermos bottles.

Cigarette holders and pipes. Automatic slot-devices vending machines.

Liveries and livery boots and hats. Hunting and shooting garments and riding jackets.

Toilet soaps, toilet articles, patent and proprietary medical preparations. Still another part of the law places

a tax on all sales of certain articles when the selling price exceeds a prescribed amount. This section affects sales of the following articles.

Carpets and rugs.

Picture frames, trunks, traveling bags, suit cases, pocket books, purses, shopping and hand bags.

Umbrellas, parasols and fans. House or smoking coats or jackets.

Men's waistcoats. Women's and Misses' hats bonnets and hoods.

Men's and boy's hats and caps. Men's women's, misses' and boy's boots, pumps and slippers.

Men's and boy's neckties, silk stockings or hose.

Women's and misses' silk stockings or hose.

Men's shirts. Men's women's misses' and boys' pajamas and underwear.

Women's petticoats and waists. Dealers of either of the three of classes of articles are required to make reports at stated times to the Collector of Internal Revenue.

All dealers should furnish the Collector their names and addresses immediately, in order that he may furnish them blanks upon which to make reports. Failure to make the required reports will subject any dealer to penalty.

**FOUR AMENDMENTS**

There will be four constitutional amendments submitted to the people in the special elections called for May 24. There can be no others submitted on that date by the present legislature, because of the limited time for complying with the law's requirements in the matter of advertising.

Governor Hobby has said that he will call the Legislature in special session about June 17 to vitalize the amendments which may be ad-

opted on May 24. The amendments are embraced in the following joint resolutions:

House joint resolution No. 1: To make Texas dry by prohibiting the manufacture, sale, barter, exchange and transportation of intoxicating liquors.

House joint resolution No. 18: Empowering the Legislature to enact laws permitting the State to lend money to heads of families to acquire and improve rural homes for farming and stock raising. It is the Governor's land for the landless platform.

Senate joint resolution No. 7: To permit women to vote in elections

held in Texas. It is the equal suffrage amendment. It imposes the obligation of American citizenship to vote and requires women to otherwise be qualified electors.

Senate joint resolution No. 13: Increasing the salary of the Governor's from \$4,000 to \$10,000 each year. At this time there are several State officials who draw more salary than the chief executive of the State.

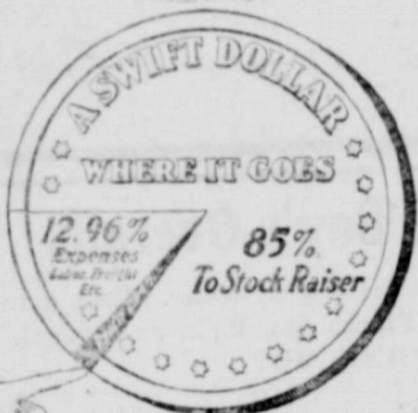

### PAINT AS AN ASSET.

Bankers Say They Lend More Money on Property When Buildings Are Well Painted.

#### AN INDICATION OF THRIFT.

One Concern Advances 25 Per Cent. More if Repainting is Done Every Five Years.

Does it pay to paint carefully farm buildings? Does it add to the selling value of a farm when buildings are properly kept up and regularly painted? A careful inquiry of a number of leading bankers in the Mississippi valley, including such states as Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Missouri, reveals the fact that in nearly every case the bankers did not hesitate to say that they would lend all the way from 5 to 50 per cent. more on land where farm buildings were well painted and kept in good condition.

Some of these bankers make interesting comment. A Michigan concern says that, while not especially prepared to advise definitely in response to this inquiry, the officers would loan more money on farms where buildings were painted than where they were not so treated. This bank also finds that where houses, barns and fences are well taken care of the farm is a profitable proposition, and bankers in general consider the farmer a good client.

A Minnesota banker says that he is much more willing to loan money where the buildings are well painted. In his particular case he believes that he would loan 20 per cent. more than if the buildings were not properly taken care of. A farmer who will keep his buildings painted takes a much deeper interest in his work than one who does not. Another Minnesota bank says that well painted buildings have resulted in securing from this bank sometimes as high as 25 per cent. more money than where the buildings are not painted.

All this being true, it is perfectly evident that it is a good business proposition to keep the farm buildings well painted. They not only look better and are more pleasing to the owner, but the farm would sell to better advantage, the loan value of the property would be greatly increased and the buildings themselves would last much longer and need less repair.

#### PAINT AND ILLITERACY.

Curious Fact Comes to Light That Localities Least Using Books, Avoid Paint Also.

Washington, D. C.—A curious fact has been brought to light by the Educational Bureau and the Bureau of Industrial Research here. It is that in the states where illiteracy is most prevalent paint is least used. The paint referred to is the common or barn variety, of course, for the backwoods countries have no need for the finer pigments or facial adornments. It is true, though, that in the sections of all states where white illiteracy is highest painted homes are rare and unpainted outbuildings and barns are practically unknown.

### QUESTIONNAIRE

ANSWERS WHICH WILL SOLVE PERPLEXING PROBLEMS OF THIS RECONSTRUCTION ERA.

Query.—The government has launched an educational campaign to encourage building in order to put more men to work. Would not a similar movement to show how the old structures can be best and most economically repaired and made good as new also help?

Answer.—It is learned that such a plan is in effect and is linked directly with the Washington propaganda.

Industry must be turned back from works of war to the ways of peace. Employment must be found, in the meanwhile, for those whose occupation has been interrupted. There is no real surplus of labor in the United States, and there is a shortage, which would be acute if normal conditions were already restored, and one step towards restoring them will come with resumption of repair work.

Government restrictions, imposed by the necessities of the war program, have for many months past retarded or altogether prevented construction, improvement and repairs. These restrictions are now off, and there is scarcely a town, a city, a factory, a dwelling or a farm that does not reveal a crying need for prompt attention.

That is not logical. No matter what it costs to repair, the cost is less than the cost of neglect. No matter what the cost of paint, the wind and the weather will collect a higher bill in deterioration and decay.

Query.—What do you think of paint as an investment, aside from the appearance it lends? Does it really PAY to paint a house regularly, say, every three or four years?

Answer.—Good paint properly applied when needed is the main thing in making a house last long and well. A house worth \$2,500 can be painted at a cost of about \$125. In 60 years that house will need about 15 paintings, the total cost of which will be \$1,875. Left without paint, such a house would fall into complete ruin in 30 years. So taking 60 years as a basis for our figures we find that with paint a home will last that time in good condition and will cost, plus paint, \$4,375. Without paint the house would have to be rebuilt at the end of 30 years and would be ready for another complete renovation when the sixtieth year arrived. Cost, without paint, \$5,000 for a home ready to fall to pieces. Does regular painting pay? As the old Dutch adage says:

#### "PAINT PAYS FOR ITSELF."

Query.—I have a quantity of old paint on hand. Can I use it for the first coat in repainting my barn?

Answer.—On no account should old paint which has become fat be used for priming either old or new work. Old paint in that condition is best used on a fence, brickwork or tinwork. If you value your barn sufficiently to paint it, do it the justice of a good job.

#### U. S. Invents Anti-Rust "Dope."

Incident to the war, the government has faced the problem that has so long proved baffling to commercial concerns of protecting iron and steel from rust. In an attempt to solve this federal specialists have perfected various forms of protective coatings. In this connection it may be pertinent to ask whether commercial uses will not be found also for the so-called "dopes" which the government has invented to be applied to airplane wings and which are possessed of valuable weather-resisting and fireproof qualities.

#### EFFECT OF COLOR UPON THE DURABILITY OF PAINT.

Property owners who may have under consideration the painting of dwellings and other structures should remember that more durable results are obtained when tinted paints are used. Permanent coloring materials which have been ground by machine into a high grade white paint base have the effect of preventing "chalking" and "checking," two defects which are often observed when white paints are used.

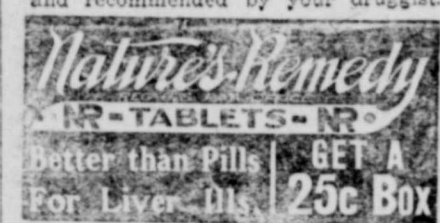

**COUNTIES IN TEXAS AGAINST CATTLE TICK**

The Live Stock Sanitary Commission reports that in accordance with Section 9, Chapter 69, General laws passed by the 35th Legislature, at its regular session, the Commission immediately after March 1 made and certified to the Governor a list of all counties and parts of counties in tick eradication zone No. 1 that had not been freed from ticks and released from quarantine and that the Governor issued his supplemental proclamation No. 17 proclaiming a quarantine in and around such counties and parts of counties, to be in effect on and after April 1, 1919. The counties so quarantined are:

Anderson, Bell, Bowie, Burnet, Camp, Cass, Cherokee, Comanche, Coryell, Delta, Denton, Eastland, Falls, Fannin, Franklin, Freestone, Gregg, Hamilton, Henderson, Hill, Hopkins, Lamar, Lampasas, Leon, Limestone, Llano, Marion, Milam, Mills, Morris, Navarro, Red River, Rains, Robertson, Rusk, San Saba, Smith, Somervell, Shelby, Titus, Van Zandt, Wise, Wood; also parts of the following counties: Jack, Johnson, Hood, Parker, McCulloch and Tarrant.

W. A. Wallace Chairman of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission says that active tick eradication will be taken up in the quarantined territory above described, and will be conducted with law and with the rules and regulations of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission as contained in the Governor's proclamation, and that all owners of live stock should familiarize themselves therewith, in order that they may effectively co-operate with the inspection of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission in ridding their county of the fever tick.

Under the provisions of the law, all cattle, horses, mules and asses immediately become quarantined on April 1 in all counties and parts of counties mentioned in the Governor's proclamation and the owner or caretaker of such live stock cannot lawfully move them or allow them to be moved until his premises have been released from quarantine, except in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission.

**HOW CLEOPATRA'S NEEDLE WAS SAVED**

New Process Invented to Preserve Surface of Monolith in Central Park.

**HIROGLYPHS OBLITERATED.**

Rigors of Western Climate Used Khedive's Gift to Disintegrate. Painting Ancient Obelisk With Special Preparation Stayed Decay—Ruined Portals Restored.

New Yorkers awoke one morning to find in their breakfast headlines the news that a zealous park employee had discovered signs of disintegration on the surface of the city's most treasured antique—Cleopatra's Needle. Photographs revealed that the monolith was peeling, large pieces of sandstone having fallen from the tall shaft, varying with them part of the prized hieroglyphs.

London's twin sister of Cleopatra's Needle was reported as resting comfortably and enduringly on the banks of the Thames, and the rival port wondered whether a preparation would be found to stay the attacks of their harsher climate.

Such a preparation was soon forthcoming. A new paint combination as a preservative for stone was invented

**THE OBELISK.**

The Obelisk was presented to the City of New York by the Khedive of Egypt, Lieutenant Commander Goringe, U. S. N., after a three years' effort, obtained possession of it and moved it to its present position, at an expense of nearly \$100,000. It was finally swung into position at noon, January 22, 1881.



The height of this monument, from base to tip, is 69 feet, 2 inches. The measurement of the base, square through its axis, is 7 feet, 8 1/2 inches. The entire weight of the monolith is 219 1/2 tons.

Since it was quarried near the torrid zone, it has traversed the entire length of Egypt, most of that of the Mediterranean Sea and the width of the Atlantic Ocean—a distance of 6,400 miles—proving itself a first-rate material for one whose age has exceeded thirty-five centuries. In the course of its existence it has seen Pharaoh and his host going to their destruction in the Red Sea; Shishak marching to the conquest of Jerusalem; Cambyses despoiling the land; Herodotus, Plato and other Greek students engaged in pursuit of Egyptian lore; Alexander the Great on his victorious expedition through the land of Goshen; six and a half centuries of Roman sovereignty and Christian struggle at Alexandria; all the long line of Moslem rulers since Caliph Omar; and now, leaving all these stands looking upon the million dwellers in this metropolis whose site was unknown to the Eastern world at a time when the Obelisk had been in existence for two thousand years.

by Dr. William Kueckro, chemist of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Many years previous coating with paraffin had been tried, but the application had not entirely accomplished its purpose. The new painting process, however, proved a success. Disintegration was halted and the damaged parts restored. A New York obelisk breathed easily again.

**PAINT PROTECTION AND ITS ECONOMY.**

The preservation of structural materials, which may be obtained through the application of paint, constitutes a most vital means of furthering the conservation of our natural resources. It is, moreover, the most economical method of sustaining the appearance and general upkeep of any community.

A structure coated with sheets of India rubber would not be as well protected from decay as a structure coated with a good oil paint. This is due to the fact that a sheet of rubber is so durable or as waterproof as a dried film of paint. The latter material when applied dries to a continuous elastic film containing finely suspended particles of metallic wear pigments. A square foot of a film upon a wooden surface costs less than a penny, yet it will beautifully protect a dollar's worth of surface for many years. This is a low maintenance.

Dwellings, barns, outbuildings, posts, fences, stock enclosures, structures, windmills and implements, whether of wood, iron or steel, should be preserved, through the use of paint, from rapid decay. A good oil paint may be used successfully for all such purposes. Colored oil paint will be found the most serviceable coloring matter in the paint and will last from two to three years to the life of the coating.

2795 feet; No. 1 Snodgrass is making 25 million feet of gas at 2615 feet. RANGER-CISCO WELL MAKING GOOD SHOWING In conversation with J. J. Patterson, president of the Ranger-Cisco Oil Co., now drilling a well near Ranger, he stated that the well was 3455 feet deep, that the drill was still in the sand and that he believed the well was making a good showing. He stated further that if no better sand was found than that already passed through that if given a shot the well would produce anywhere between 500 and 1,000 barrels. He stated that it might be a number of days before the driller would be through this sand as the progress was very slow. He believes that when this sand has been drilled through that a good well will be brought in, and that the well will not have to be shot.

A TRIUMPH OF CONSISTENCY Amid the discussion of war indemnities the voice of the German apologist is uplifted. We are told that the ghastly catalogue of Germany's crimes was the fault of the kaiser and his immediate entourage. Had the talk of the German people been given a voice they would have forbidden the whole program of atrocity. Two years ago the same apologist was informing us that this was not a war of democracy against despotism, because the German form of government was as representative as that of any republic. It was, to quote one of the most loquacious of Germany's defenders, "a magnificent experiment in applied socialism."
