## MURDER CHARGE DISMISSED, JOE VARIN AT HOME

Arrested in Cisco, Taken to Arizona, and after 16 Days Released by Court When No Witnesses Appeared Against Him.

In last week's Round-Up there appeared a story from the Clifton, Ariz. Copper Era, which had to do with the arrest in this city of Joe Varin, who was taken to Arizona on a charge of passing a phony check. Later when arriving in the Arizona city, a charge of murder was preferred against him.

Mr. Varin, who is the proprietor of the Arizona Fountain, located in the Kagle restaurant opposite the Daniels hotel, reached Cisco Tuesday morning. He gave the following account of his experience resulting from the arrest, to a Round-Up man, soon after reaching Cisco.

"I was arrested here by a man whom I thought a legally constituted officer of Greenlee county, Arizona. The charge was only a trivial one, and knowing myself innocent of any crime against the laws of that state, I did not resist the authority of the arresting party, or stand on my right to be extradited.

"Arriving at Clifton, Ariz., I ascertained that the party who arrested me and took me back to Arizona, was a duly constituted officer, but not one clothed with authority of making arrests except in his own precinct. He was a justice of the peace.

**Murder Charge Filed**  
"After arriving in Clifton I was charged by complaint with the murder of a Chinaman, committed some time before I left Clifton.

"When the sheriff saw me in jail he asked why I was there? When I told him I was charged with the murder of the Chinaman, he stated that the party guilty of the crime was then under bond.

"I was kept in jail for sixteen days without a hearing, but all the time the conspirators were at work trying to manufacture evidence against me, as I was told that I was being 'jobbed' to shield the one guilty of the crime. While I was incarcerated, the man who was living in my house was shown a telegram purporting to be from me, in which the bogus telegram alleged I had made a confession, and implicated this person as an accomplice. He was importuned to 'tell all he knew' about the case, and promised immunity. I am informed that the county attorney was the man who carried the bogus telegram and read it to my tenant. As neither my tenant or myself knew anything about the murder, other than that which was common rumor, of course he could not give them any damaging evidence against me, and so informed those seeking to convict me.

"Every charge alleged to be evidence against me was disproven without being confronted with the witnesses, as none appeared against me. During the entire time I remained in jail no evidence was brought against me connecting me with the crime, or any crime.

"The judge of the district court finally ordered me before him, but the state had no witnesses, and both the county attorney and justice of the peace, the latter having acted as arresting officer in my abduction from Cisco, were conspicuous by their absence. The court ordered the town searched for the county attorney to appear for the state, but he could not be found.

"As no man appeared to accuse me not even the states' sworn prosecuting attorney, the court ordered my release with the statement that 'there was no apparent reason for the detention of the defendant, nor so far as the court could determine, there was no reason why he should be there at all.'

**Found Friends in Clifton.**  
"Those who gave me a free ride to the Baby State failed to provide me with return transportation to my home and business. Nor were they kind enough to supply me with the means of subsistence until I could get money from home. However, I found those who were willing to lend a willing hand to an unfortunate; the proprietor of the Clifton Hotel gave

## CADDO PEOPLE TAKE \$200,000 STOCK IN ROAD

Former Wayside Inland Post Office Now a Bustling Little Town of 3000 and Still Growing; Cisco-Caddo Road Needed.

T. C. Seebold of Caddo, was a Sunday visitor to Cisco, coming down to look at the metropolis, to see how Cisco does things, "for you know," said Mr. Seebold, "Caddo is growing so fast that we will be a city before we learn city ways, unless we get some pointers before material prosperity is upon us.

"But we are doing quite well, considering the fact that we are an inland town. Some idea may be obtained of the progress of this place when I tell you it has grown from a wayside inland country post office to quite a busy little trading point.

"In former days the mail was carried from Ranger to Caddo by one measly little team of ponies, and often they traveled light. Now the mail receipts at the Caddo post office has grown in volume to such an extent that it requires two strong teams to transport the mail matter that is received daily at Caddo.

"This will be overcome with the building of the Cisco-Caddo road, which Caddo is strong as horse radish for building. The subscriptions asked for this line has been subscribed. The oil operators taking \$100,000.00 and the citizens of Caddo taking an additional \$100,000. We are related over the reports that your Mr. R. Q. Lee is now devoting his whole time to completing this line, and the news that the contract would be let the first of July for the grading of the first section of the line is gladdening to our people.

"That is all that is needed to make Caddo quite a prominent little city, its railroad transportation. We are handicapped for good highways which would relieve the situation to a certain extent if it were possible to transport our merchandise from Cisco by auto trucks, but Eastland county has fallen behind sister counties in voting bonds for highways, and this temporary relief is denied us. The conditions of the roads have been such that at times the filling stations have been out of gasoline for three or four days at a time and even the grocery stocks have run exceedingly low.

"These conditions will be cured with the building of the Cisco-Caddo road, of course, but it will take some time to build a railroad even with the Cisco pep, and in the meantime something should be done to give the people better public highways.

"Come over to see us just as soon as we get our railroad, and you will be surprised at the progress Caddo is making."

me lodging, and the sheriff supplied me with funds until I could hear from Cisco. I was taken off rather hurriedly and was supplied with only a little money when leaving Cisco. This was spent for necessities while incarcerated in jail.

"Many gave me their sympathy in Clifton, and told me that I was the victim of a 'job'.

Immediately after his return to Cisco, Mr. Varin resumed his place behind his fountain and was busy serving the trade. Fortunately his associate, Mr. Kagle, who conducts the restaurant, kept up his lease, and looked after his business during his absence, otherwise he stated his losses would have been considerable as a result of his deportation. He intimated that civil proceedings would be instituted against those who were interested in taking him back to Arizona.

## RANGER FORCE MAY RUN DOWN AUTO THIEVES

Auto Protective Law Now in Effect; Prescribes Penalty for Removal of Identification Numbers; Must Have Tax Receipt to Sell Car.

On June 18, a new law went into effect in Texas which will lend protection to automobile owners against the stealing of their cars. It was passed by the last Legislature, and is said by those who have made a study of automobile legislation, to be one of the best laws of its kind anywhere in the United States.

Statistics reveals that an average of 342 automobiles are stolen every day in the United States, and about 5 a day disappear in Texas alone. This ever increasing evil is requiring special attention, and it is believed that this new law will assist in reducing the losses of automobiles.

The act deals with the removal of identification numbers on automobiles and prescribes a penalty of not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100 for the use on the highway or the selling or offering for sale of any vehicle from which the engine number has been defaced or obliterated. It provides a method by which the highway commission will assign a new number to the motor from which the numbers have been obliterated from no improper motives. It further penalizes the owner of any car who makes false application for the registration of a car from which the number has been effaced, prescribing a penalty of not less than \$50.00 or more than \$100.00.

Sections 3 and 4 make it unlawful to sell or trade any second hand motor car without then and there having present with the car the Tax Collector's receipt for the license fee for the current year. If the sale is consummated the license fee receipt must be transferred by endorsement and the vendor must execute and deliver to the purchaser formal bills of sale in duplicate executed before a Notary Public, which describe the car fully by license number, seal number, engine number, trade name and model. The penalty for the violation of this portion of the act is a fine up to \$2,000.

**Repair Shops to Keep Record**  
To further assist in tracing stolen automobiles, the act requires every person or firm operating a repair shop or garage, engaged in either repairing, rebuilding, repainting or electrical work in connection with automobiles, to keep open to inspection a well bound book in which must be entered identifying details as to the owner, make of car, motor number, license number, and the repairs or changes made on such car valued at more than \$1.00.

All shops dealing in second hand cars must also keep a register containing the same information, and with special details as to the party claiming to own the car and as to the purchaser. In every instance when a used car is disposed of, one of the bills of sale executed by the seller must be filed by the purchaser with the County Tax Collector as an application for transfer of the license accompanied by a fee of \$1.00.

By preventing the easy and ready sale of second hand cars, the thief will be handicapped for if he cannot dispose of the car he will not want to steal it. He will have to identify himself to the Notary Public before he can execute the bill of sale. If the Notary takes the acknowledgment without requiring a stranger to be identified he is liable on his bond.

There is some talk of establishing a special department in the State Ranger force which can devote its entire time to automobile thefts. The number of cars stolen is increasing rapidly, the car is so easily to escape in, and the United States is the market, so it seems that some special department should have charge of such work that is not hampered by county lines. Every honest automobile owner in the state is interested in this palative measure and we believe the time will come when this special organization will be worked out for tracing stolen automobiles.

## PROSPERITY OF CISCO DEPENDS ON GOOD ROADS

New Railroad is a Public Enterprise But Splendid Highways Brings Prosperity; Road to Breckenridge Would Cost \$100,000.

Mr. F. E. Page is essentially a good road booster. In conversation with a Round-Up man this week he stated that "Cisco's prosperity depends upon the building of good highways. I am not knocking the new Cisco-Caddo railroad, which will mean much to Cisco, but unless there is a highway from this city to Breckenridge or Caddo through the oil field, the benefits expected from the building of the road will be minimized.

"The building of the Cisco-Caddo road will furnish transportation to the terminus, but freighting will not be hauled from Cisco, and many supply houses would establish their depots nearest their work. Likewise they would build homes at the terminus of the new road, and instead of living in Cisco, would remove from this city, but with a good highway leading from here to the oil fields, these people would continue their residence here, and drive to and from their work daily. A good highway will keep these people here, likewise Cisco will continue to be the great supply base of the oil district. Unless the roads are put in condition these people are liable to move to their places of business. Besides good highways would induce others to come here to establish their supply depots. I was talking to a Mr. Randle, purchasing agent for one of the larger oil companies, and he said that the impassable roads was the only reason why his company established their headquarters in Breckenridge instead of Cisco. True Breckenridge was nearer their work, but had there been good roads leading from here to the oil fields the distance would have been inconsequential.

"Truck transportation is now a fixture. Good roads are the arteries of commerce by this means of transporting, much of the light commerce of the country. The towns which build roads will have quite a business in truck transportation. This is practically as good as a railroad—in some respects better, as they are feeders, not sappers of communities from which they go.

"All will admit that bond issues are the most feasible method of building good roads, but the highway to Breckenridge is needed, now, and there is not time enough to put on a bond campaign. The delay in getting the people to vote the bonds will be a costly delay. I have given this matter considerable thought, and have discussed the matter with many business men of the city. This road can be built for \$100,000 and can be maintained for \$1,000 per year, according to the calculations I have made, and I believe the amount can be secured by subscription without waiting for a bond election.

"Cushing and Drumwright is an example of neglected highways. When oil was discovered near Drumwright the base of supply was Cushing. Business was booming, because the base of supply was there. A railroad was built into the oil field, and Cushing failed to grasp the opportunity of holding its business by building a highway into the oil field, and naturally the business left Cushing and established their supply depots at Drumwright, nearer to their work.

"There is nothing wrong against building railroads, but throw safe guards around Cisco by providing a highway for trucks and automobiles, and Cisco will continue to be one of the best towns west of Fort Worth. Beware of the example of Cushing and Drumwright; don't make the fatal mistake that Cushing did, by presuming that the business will remain when the road is built nearer the field of operation, unless there is

## ROSEWELL ADDITION SEVEN (South High School Building) CREWS ARE WORKING ON GAS MAIN, LIGHTS AND SEWER LINES. FIGHT, DRY AND COOL

Only One Injured; Ca Eight Injured, PIES Split Switch.

On the ill fated Oil Field T. & P. Special, which was wrecked on leaving the yards at Ranger last Thursday night, were at least four from this city, C. Bachman and wife en route to Ottawa Kansas; Peter Kahagan, of the Mecca Cafe, en route to Dallas and O. C. Walker. The latter is the only one of the Cisco passengers who was among those reported as injured.

Some of those reported fatally injured have since died. The Eastland Chronicle contained the following account of the wreck:

**Sun Company Sends Relief**  
Train Number 12, or better known as the Oil Field Special of the Texas & Pacific was wrecked as it was leaving the depot at Ranger Thursday night. This train passes through Eastland at 10:53 p. m. and carries some combination baggage and express cars, two or three day coaches and picks up three or four sleepers at Ranger. This train was put on a few months ago for the accommodation of the oil field passengers.

The Oil Field Special was proceeding at an estimated speed of fifteen to eighteen miles an hour about one half mile east of the passenger station, when the first combination coach split the switch at the siding just east of the Sun Company's large plant. The sidings here were congested with freight cars. The front of the combination car kept the main line while the rear trucks took the siding. The next two coaches also took the siding and smashed into the adjacent freight cars loaded with lumber. The impact was so heavy that the two coaches were almost totally destroyed.

The foreman of an extra gang who sleeps in a car in a string of boarding equipment was awakened from sleep by the noise and lent assistance. Considerable injured were scattered about in dazed conditions and groans and shrieks were heard everywhere. The extra gang crews were soon upon the spot and lent all possible aid.

a good road to travel to and from the works."

"That something should be done to secure better highways in Eastland county is admitted by all. Eastland is one of the few progressive counties in Texas which have neglected its highways. That this condition is possible is a matter of surprise to all who come here. Something should be done, beyond question, to provide decent highways for Eastland county. The law provides for political sub-divisions of the county voting bonds for road purposes, and it is not necessary to wait for the whole county to join Cisco in this issue. If the rest of the county prefers to remain in the mud is no reason why this progressive community should be content.

In conversation with Secretary Lancaster on the question, he stated that Rockwall county, the smallest in area and not over populous, had recently voted a bond issue for road purposes of \$1,000.00 per voter. Mr. Lancaster said that Rockwall had only 8,000 voters, and their recent bond issue was for \$800,000.

"Another reason why Eastland and especially Cisco, should not delay the matter of building good roads longer is the fact the federal and state aid for road purposes," said Mr. Lancaster, "is becoming less every time a county or community votes a bond issue. The federal aid fund was originally \$21,000,000. This is already greatly reduced, and those counties improving their highways receive a certain proportion of the money available. If we procrastinate too long the fund will be entirely exhausted, and none will remain for Cisco or Eastland county.

"We should get busy before this fund is gone. Lets build roads while the state and federal government is able to help us."

The method of collecting the course of water mains complained on the Malone property, was deferred until the mayor's return.  
A motion prevailed that no vouchers be paid for street paving until the responsibility for the grade on Avenue D, between Fifth and Sixth streets be established. It was the opinion of the body that the responsibility should be established, and if the city was responsible the corrections should be made at the cost of Cisco, but should the fault lie with the contractors they should be forced to remedy the evil. In discussing the matter the alderman stated that the half block "was an eye sore, and an object of ridicule," and favored correcting it now, rather than wait later when it might prove more expensive. However, any changes did not contemplate interference with the continuation of the work in other blocks.

The matter of furnishing rock for the paving contractor came on for adjustment. It was stated that Mr. Filder, who was under bond to furnish rock, for the paving had failed to comply with the terms and Alderman Mayhew stated he was in favor of proceeding to enforce the terms of the contract, also to compel the contractor to put the paving through or get some one who would.

Engineer Filder gave it as his opinion that a two inch rain on Avenue D, in front of the post office, would cause the "water to rise two feet in the curb line houses adjacent." The workmanship on this half block had no friends with the councilmen deliberating.

Mayor Williamson recalled to the council the thorough investigation the administration had made as to the quality of the Universal joint pipe, stating that letters and reports to the detriment of the Universal pipe had been run down, and in some instances had been proven to be forgeries. 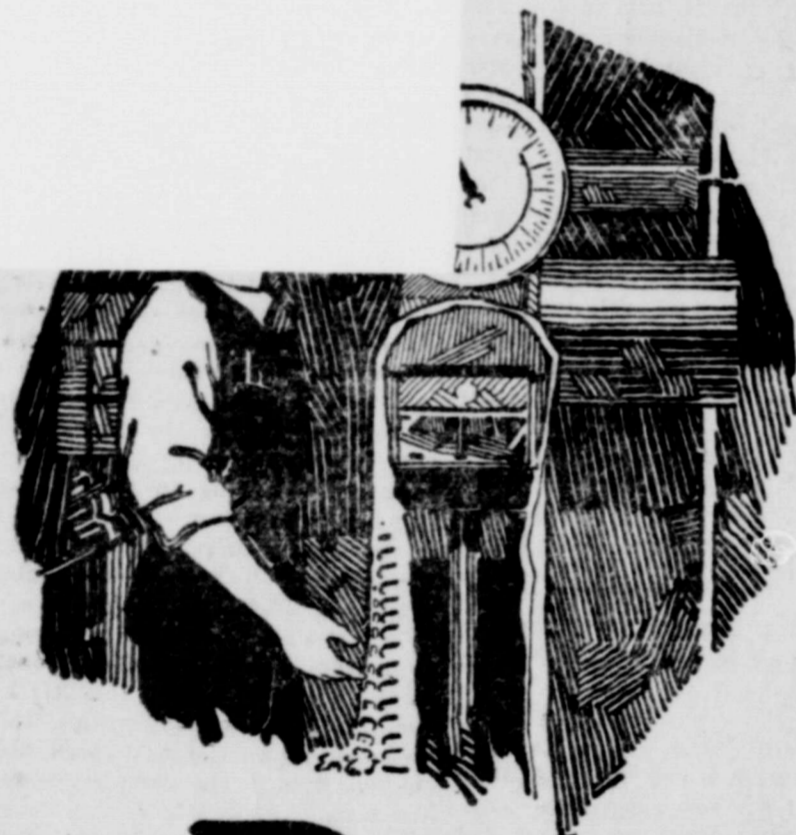

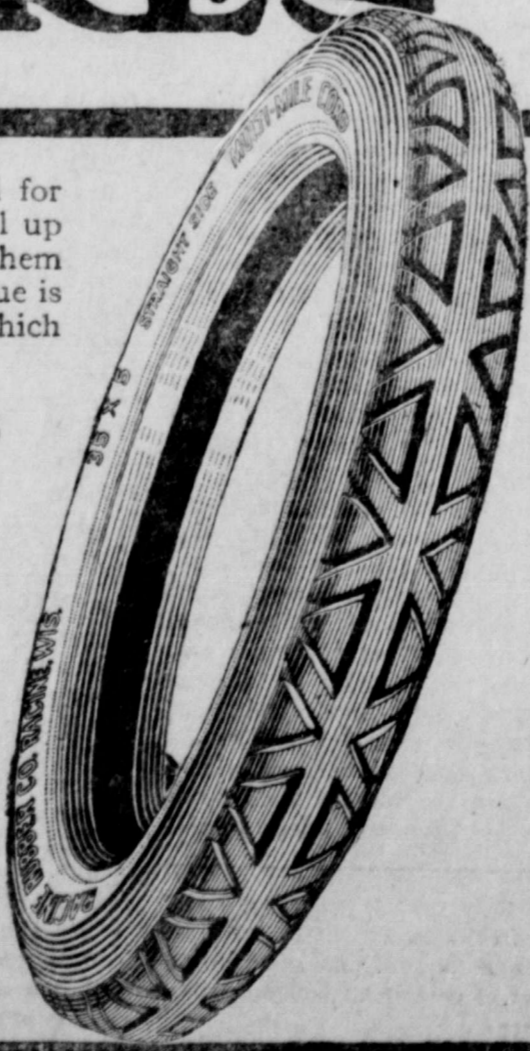

#### WHAT IS CISCO DOING?

What is Cisco doing to make this the best town in middle west Texas? Are you offering inducements for the investment of capital here in public enterprises which will make this town great, by extending a cordial welcome in the shape of building sites, cheaper fuel and facilities for handling their business? Are you building homes to house the people who would come here to make their home, houses which will be rented at a reasonable interest on the investment? Or are you "getting yours while the getting is good?"

If you are not doing the things to induce people to come to Cisco

modern conveniences.

But Cisco will make a town if not prevented by grafting greed, which may result from this abnormal increase in property values. You may slay the fowl that lays the gilded egg, and live long to regret it.

If Cisco would wax large and fat as an important town—one which by nature she is entitled to be, she must do all things to get more people and more enterprises here. Induce capital to come here and establish industrial plants which will give men employment at living wages, and see that living expenses are not kited so high that workers can't live by a decent sum for a rainy day, or spend it in recreation and pleasure should they elect.

Industrial enterprises of every character require an ample water and fuel supply. This can be found in Cisco, but is the rate such that will induce men to come here and establish industrial plants? If not, they will seek other fields, where natural conditions are just as favorable and cheap fuel is guaranteed.

Fort Smith, Arkansas, secured large investments in glass factories in that city with no other inducement than 7 cent gas to run, the plants. These factories give employment to 1,500 men, at high wages. The money is spent in Fort Smith with Fort Smith merchants, landlords, rooming houses and restaurants. Average rentals there for cottages are from \$2.50 to \$5 per room. Furnished apartments slightly in advance of these figures, yet there are no surplus dwellings or apartments in Fort Smith, and Fort Smith is a town of 40,000 people. The greed for graft seems not to prevail.

The glass factories only operate seven months in the year, and when the time comes for their working season, and the glass blowers begin to arrive with their families, all go busy to secure their homes. They are giving these people a welcome, because they are helping to build Fort Smith.

These glass factories are only a small part of the industrial life of that town; there are furniture factories, stove works, wagon factories and many others, employing thousands of men—not children—who receive good wages for their labor and have money for the comforts of life after paying their living expenses.

Men of capital consider all these things when looking for places to

invest their money. First they want land on which to build their plants at a reasonable price; cheap fuel and plenty of water. Second they want reasonable living expenses for their employes, as it will be easier to secure more and better labor where these conditions prevail than in localities where house rent will consume one fourth or one third of the money of their men.

If we reach the goal of that Greater Cisco we have planned, it must be done by outside capital coming here and helping us make this a city. The man who owns a shack worth \$500 for which he charges a monthly rental of \$40 will not do it. He is a hindrance—a clog in the wheel of progress, rather than a booster for Greater Cisco. Yet some of these held up their hands at the recent mass meeting on the Lord's Day and said "they believed in Cisco."

telegraphy, and requested that we send more later if possible. We could not refer him to even six who had not other positions already in view, and may not be able to send any more later. In fact, Mr. P. F. Frenger, Supt. Tel. Union Pacific R. R. came in person to visit our school and wrote us, "We can use all you can send of such high class students as you have sent us heretofore." We are allowed to use every blank form, report, books, etc. used in railroad telegraphy and station work just as this great railroad uses them, as well as all the blanks, record books, rate books and sheets of the Western Union Co. Mr. R. D. Cobb, Aud. St. Louis Southwestern Railway Co., says: "There is a shortage of clerical help, particularly at large freight and ticket stations, and any young man or woman proficient in railroad clerical work, will no doubt, find it easy to obtain employment on the railroads both in Texas and elsewhere, as similar conditions prevail throughout the entire country." Mr. W. J. Williams, Supr. Telegraph of the same road gave us a good recommendation.

There is rubbish and debris in many sections of Cisco that should be cleared away; on one of the principal residence streets of the city—Broadway—there are old shingles and lumber littering the sidewalks on the Methodist church lot, where the wrecker has wrecked, all right, but the debris has never been cleared away. This allusion to rubbish on the streets and alleys has no reference where buildings are being erected or improvements are being put in—the more we have of such, the better, for that means progress, but there is no necessity in allowing a pile of debris to remain on the sidewalk for weeks after the work has been done.

Then there is an ordinance against letting weeds and grass grow rank over one's premises. There are some lots on the streets of Cisco where the weeds have obscured the shrubbery. But the lovers of the city beautiful are glad to note that these are the exceptions—unfortunately the exceptions are too large. Some are exhibiting a commendable spirit of civic pride in beautifying their premises. Curbs are being extended out from the sidewalks, and these are being filled in and planted to beautiful flowers, which will go a long way toward making Cisco the city beautiful.

It is not the intention to devote the entire editorial space of the Round-Up to calling attention to matters of omission in civic and sanitary affairs, but as a last word it is desired to call attention to the fact this is fly time, and flies breed typhoid. Why not the sanitary officers get busy and compell everybody having fly-breeding dumps on their premises to clean up? Lime and other disinfectants cost less than doctors and medicine.

A bill has been introduced into congress to adopt the "Liberty calendar." This would give 13 months instead of 12, all 28 days each, with New Year's day extra and not counted as a week day. The weeks would each contain only 6 days instead of 7, and Monday would always be the 1st, 8th, 15th and 22nd. If adopted there would be no necessity for printed calendars, as every one would know the day of the month by the day of the week. Why not adopt it?

## Shoor Well Stands 2,000 Feet in Oil

### Shot Tuesday Oil Rose 1500 Feet Over Night

**Drillers Predict Good Producer; Now has 2000 Feet Of Oil; Heavy Bridge of Gumbo Retards Flow of Oil; Workmen Busy.**

What promises, and is confidently expected to be a good producer, was brought in Tuesday evening when the Shoor well, drilled by the Humble Oil & Refining company on the E. Shoor farm, was shot with a light charge of nitro glycerine at 6:39 p. m. This well has an approximate depth of 4,000 feet, and the first shot was only intended as a test, as only 82 quarts of explosives were used. This shot brought a strong flow of gas, with strong indications of oil. During the night the measurements showed that the hole was standing in 1500 feet of oil, and this through an 80 foot bridge of gumbo. This morning reports stated that there was 2000 feet of oil in the well, with the drillers having difficulty in cleaning the hole of gumbo, which is said to accumulate and shuts off not only the oil, but the gas is not able to penetrate the substance which seems to seal the crevices, and it is slow and tedious work to take out this gumbo substance. The capacity of a well is indicated by the rise of the oil, the estimate being one barrel to the foot rise per 2 1/2 hours. This would indicate at least a producer of 500 barrels per day, and the drillers say the Shoor well will undoubtedly prove even better and a good producer is expected. Preparations are being made to give the well another and heavier shot right away, and a larger flow is confidently expected.

This well is located about seven and one half miles south of Cisco, on the E. Shoor farm, and is the first well of such good promise to be brought in.

#### SUN NO. 1 SHOT.

The Sun well, on the C. H. Fee lease, six miles north east of Cisco, was shot on Wednesday of last week, and a strong flow of gas was obtained. The well was shot at a depth of 3,900 feet, but while there was oil, yet not in as large quantities as was expected, after being cleaned out.

However, all hopes of the Fee well have not been abandoned, as it is contemplated to make another shot, and better results are anticipated. For the present work has been temporarily suspended until they are ready to give the well another shot.

### "PROFITEER IS AN ABETTOR OF BOMB THROWER"

**"Labor is Restless by Reason of High Prices; That There is a Crisis Nobody but the Indifferent or the Ignorant Will Deny"**

Rev. J. Frank Norris, of Ft. Worth who is to hold a revival in Cisco, recently delivered a masterful sermon, taking for his theme "The Kinds of Anarchists." Mr. Norris speaks some great truths in this sermon, which is so near the teachings of the Meek and Lowly, and of such rarity in this day when some ministers take their texts from the same place they do their salary, that the Round-Up reproduces the condensed text from Ft. Worth Record.

If this is a sample of the sermons to be heard in Cisco during the Baptist revival, which will be commenced here in August, it is no extravagant prediction to say he will speak to crowded houses:

"That there are two anarchists which the country must be rid of in order to prevent a bloody revolution, namely, the bomb thrower and the profiteer," was the theme of the sermon delivered Sunday night by J. Frank Norris at the First Baptist church. "The former destroys the law and the latter defies it," the minister declared.

The speaker took for his text the lines from Jonah 3:8: "Let them turn everyone from his evil way and from the violence that is in their hands," and also the lines from James 5:6, "You have condemned and killed the just and he does not resist you."

Exonerating labor for any part played in the recent bomb plots that have spread terror throughout the country, the speaker declared that it was a result of high prices and low wages.

"I am an optimist of the optimists. I have large faith in the outcome of the present crisis. We survived the tyranny of 1776, we broke the oppression of 1821, we weathered the storm of the 60's and we will pass through this, the darkest of all clouds, the present industrial crisis. That there is a crisis, yea a revolution on, nobody but the ignorant or the indifferent would deny.

"It is unfair and unjust to accuse labor of any part in the bomb throwing conspiracies. It is true, in the oppression of labor the bomb thrower finds a prolific atmosphere. I speak the truth and lie not, when I say that not only is legitimate labor opposed to the bomb thrower, but is the greatest safeguard against anarchy in this country.

"Intelligent, organized labor is capital's best ally. There should be no conflict between capital and labor. They should understand each other. They should be friends, their interests are one. The hurt of one is the injury of the both. The profit of one is the profit of both. Capital may profit for a while from the oppression of labor and the under paid wage, but in the long run will suffer. Russia's present pitiable plight is a demonstration of how the toiling masses suffer with the overthrow of legitimate capital.

#### Profiteer Bad as Bomb Thrower

The individual bomb thrower who destroys law is not one whit worse than the powerful profiteer who defies law. When it comes to pass that a few men can sit around a mahogany table and fix the price of all that we eat and wear, overriding and defying the law of humanity and the law of God, I care not how respectable, how influential, how respectable the coterie of gentlemen may be they are no more nor less than anarchists and should be dealt with as such. Between these two extremes, the anarchist who destroys the law and the anarchist who defies the law, the great conservative mass of people find their liberty and happiness Continued on Page 8, Second Section

**CLOSE CONTRACT**

W. A. Loving Will Commence Erection of Warehouses and Other Building at Once; Another Industry Added to Greater Cisco.

W. A. Loving last Friday closed the contract with the Keystone Pipe & Supply company for the erection of their supply depot which will be maintained at this place. Mr. Wm. Horwitz representing the Keystone, was here for the purpose of closing the deal.

Work will begin on the warehouse at once, which will be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible. These buildings will be used to store the large stock of supplies which will be carried by the Keystone company here for the demands of their trade. The Keystone Pipe & Supply company have their headquarters at Butler, Penn., but they see in Cisco the ideal point for establishing their base of supply for the great oil district of Texas and some time ago purchased a site for their supply depot. The new buildings will be erected on the company's property just west of the Katy track on the Eastland road.

At least two other companies will soon sign contracts for the building of supply depots in this city. Secretary Lancaster said that the Bovard company is now ready to sign the contract for the erection of their warehouses and is only waiting for the removal of the spur which crosses their building site, before work will be commenced.

Everything points to a greater Cisco and it only remains to remove a few clogs in the wheels of progress before Cisco will come into her own.

Have the county commissioners ever acted in regard to ridding the county of the festive cattle tick? Cisco, Ranger and Eastland would support dairies if dairy cattle could be shipped in, but Eastland county being classed as "ticky" no dairy can be established here until the county is put in the tickless class of counties.

### MILLIONS VOTED FOR TEXAS ROADS

Eastland County Not in List—Federal Aid Going to Counties Who Are Making Better Highways—Bexar Gets \$81,078.

News of bonds approved by the Attorney General are received daily—bonds for building highways in Texas. This list is scanned by men seeking places to invest capital, and naturally counties voting bonds are favored, because men of means know that counties which are building high ways are progressive counties, and the "boogy man" of increased taxation has no terrors for them.

The list of bonds approved, as given out Wednesday covers a period from January 1 to June 1, and the bonds approved amount to forty eight million dollars. Eastland county is not included in the list. Bexar county gets \$81,078 federal aid. Eastland could get federal aid if the people would spend a corresponding amount before the federal fund is exhausted. It is going fast.

Following is the statement sent out from Austin:

"Road bonds to the amount of \$48,000,000 have been voted in Texas between Jan. 1 and June 1 of this year, according to announcement made by the state highway commission. It is estimated that additional bonds aggregating \$20,000,000 will be voted on before next year.

"The commission today granted to Bexar county federal aid of \$81,078 on the east or Sap branch of highway No. 9, between San Antonio and the Wilson county line.

"Hartley county was awarded \$25,495 state aid on highway No. 5, and that highway was further designated from Clarksville, to Bagwell, Blossom, Detroit and Paris.

"Highway No. 39 was more definitely designated in Delta county, from Cooper to Commerce, via Klondike and Horton.

"Highway No. 35 was extended from Freeport to Quintana.

"Stonewall county was granted state aid of \$3,300 for construction of a bridge across the Brazos river on highway No. 18. Baylor county was given \$5,491 state aid on highway No. 30."

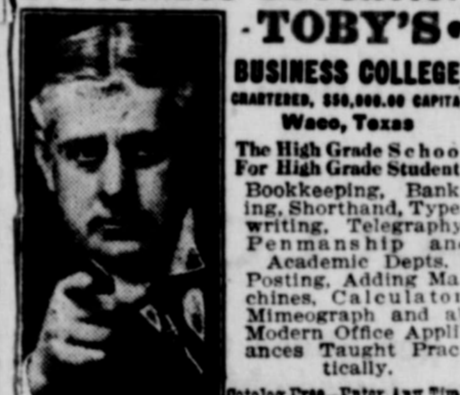

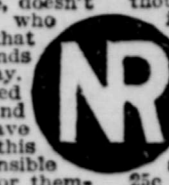

**NORTH CENTRAL TEXAS FIELD IS INCREASING DAILY**

The Humble Oil and Refining company has completed a 1,200 barrel producer in the Colony School district of the Ranger field, on the W. T. Davis tract.

The Sinclair Gulf Oil Company brought in a 1,600 barrel well on the J. E. Barnes tract northwest of Ranger and near the Stephens county line late Wednesday. The total depth of the well is 3,650 feet. It has not been completed, as the drill is only a few feet in the producing formation. While this is not considered a wildcat well, it is not strictly an inside well and affords a little extension to the northwest part of the Ranger pool.

The Gulf Production Company has a 500 barrel well on the Marie Barnes tract adjoining the J. E. Barnes of the Sinclair.

There was another increase in production of the North Central Texas territory for the week, the new high figures running to 198,500 barrels daily average.

In the southern territory the Ranger pool is up more than 60,000 barrels in daily output to 79,500 barrels Stephens county climbed 2,000 barrels daily to 29,000 barrels. While the Desdemona district showed an advance of 2,500 barrels from last week's average of 9,000 barrels.

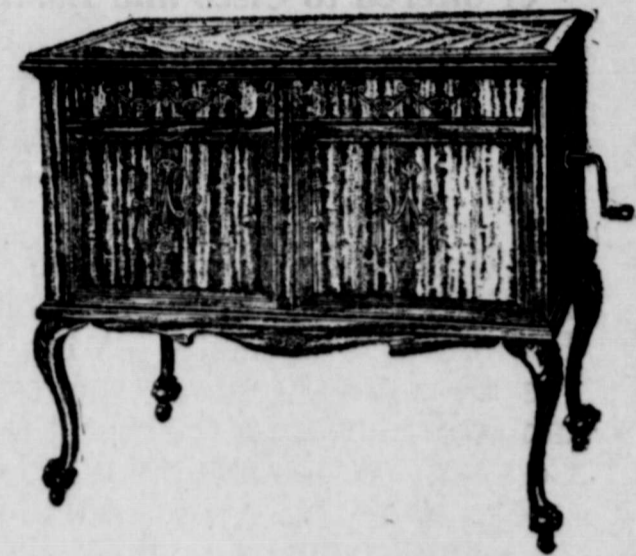

## NEW RAIL PLANS ON SOUND BASIS

Congress Determined to Make Certain Future Growth of Transportation Facilities.

### PLANS AGREE ON PRINCIPLES.

Return of Roads to Owners With Assurance of Adequate Revenues.

Washington.—One of the big problems before the new Congress is getting the railroads back on a peace basis. These 290,000 miles of steel highways were taken over by the Government as an indispensable arm of the national defense; but now that their war service is over, there is a country-wide demand that the Government restore them to their owners to be operated on normal American business standards of efficiency.

But, as has been pointed out by President Wilson as well as by many men in public life who have given this subject years of careful study, it is not enough simply to say to the railroad companies, "Take these railroads and give the country the best transportation service that money and brains can provide."

**Old Laws Obstruct Growth.**  
The President recently said that it would be a serious mistake to return to the old conditions of railroad regulation without reforming the antiquated laws that were obstructing the free development of transportation facilities. The Director General of Railroads has recently made an inspection trip from coast to coast, and he has been telling the people that the time has now come to put the railroads on a sound foundation.

The plans for a better system of national control of railroads are as varied as were the plans for banking and currency reform when Congress received a mandate from the people to provide insurance against financial panics. The public now demands insurance against a breakdown of railroad transportation, and the new Congress is undertaking this work as secondary only to insurance against international warfare. Congress solved the banking problem seven years ago as a non-partisan issue, in which all the people had a common interest, and Congress evidently is tackling the railroad problem with the same spirit.

While the many plans that have been proposed differ in the methods to be adopted in reaching the desired goal, it has been pointed out by Senator Cummins of Iowa, that all these plans have really very much in common—so much so that he is confident that Congress will have little difficulty in framing a bill that will meet with popular approval, and that will take the railroad question out of politics for many years to come.

**Many Plans with One Aim.**  
The Iowa Senator has a commanding position in this Congress because he is the ranking member of the Interstate Commerce Committee of the United States Senate, and it is in this committee that the new railroad bill will take final form. In an address before a national meeting of business men at St. Louis Senator Cummins stated that since the close of the war, fully thirty complete plans for new railroad legislation had been submitted to him by business men, economists, bankers, railroad officials and owners, Government officials, railroad workers and just plain citizens.

The basic principles upon which all of these plans, with one exception, agree are as follows:

1. Private operation is more efficient and more economical than Government operation, and the public interest will therefore be served by a return of the roads to private management.
2. To make certain that new capital will be attracted to the expansion of railroad facilities, there ought to be greater certainty that a fair return will be earned on the investment.
3. The merging of weak and strong roads into large competing systems should be encouraged.

The making of a formula to provide a fair return on railroad capital seems likely to be the phase of the problem most thoroughly debated in Congress. The Director General has been urging that the Government ought to guarantee a certain return and share in any excess earnings. Leading bankers, especially some of the international bankers in Wall street, who have in the past marketed many hundreds of millions of railroad securities, also look favorably on the suggestion of a Government guarantee, which will make it easier to sell new securities, and will also stabilize the market for the old bonds and stocks.

**Government Guarantee Opposed.**  
But the proposal that the Government shall guarantee the interest and dividends on private capital invested in railroads will undoubtedly meet with very vigorous opposition in many quarters. Even railroad executives, who might be supposed to take kindly to the idea of a Government guarantee against failure, have frankly stated that they do not want it, because they believe it is un-American in principle, would tend to lessen efficiency, and would involve the roads in a Government partnership that would inevitably lead to Government ownership.

## CLOSES CONTRACT FOR HILBURN WELL

Oklahoma Parties Getting Ready to Commence Drilling by July 1 on Well Eight Miles South of Cisco On Hilburn Farm.

The X-Ray, published at Rising Star, reports interest to be increased in oil activity in that section. The contract for the drilling on the Hilburn farm is of interest also to Cisco, the location being practically as near Cisco as Rising Star, and if a producer results from the operations soon to commence, Cisco will be largely benefitted.

The X-Ray last week has the following concerning oil activity in that section:

"The contract between H. V. Foster and others of Bartlesville, Okla., which has been in process of making for the past several weeks, between W. C. Hilburn and others has finally been closed and the rig timbers are being hauled out to the Hilburn land seven miles northwest of Rising Star, this week. It is expected that the machinery will be on the ground and the well will be ready to spud in by July 1st.

"The Hagan No. 1, being drilled by The Texas Company one and one-half miles northeast of Rising Star seems to be at a standstill for the present time as no information can be had from the drillers, and the public is totally barred. The opinion of the public varies considerable in estimating the production found in the Hagan well.

"The well will probably be tested with a pump in the very near future, and unless the shallow sand which was struck at a depth of 1236 feet proves profitable the flow of oil will be ceased off and further drilling will be resumed for a deep test at the same location. We have cause to believe that oil has been struck in paying quantities in the Hagan well."

"Last Thursday night I witnessed a most splendid and beautiful occasion of the high school graduation exercises. The esteemed faculty and a great crowd of patrons were made happy at the sight of several hundred young ladies and young gentlemen who received their diplomas. A returned captain from the army made a great address. The young lady graduates, dressed in immaculate white, looked like beings from another world. Our hearts were thrilled as we watched our daughters and our sons enjoy the benefits of a free and efficient educational system.

"But the day before I saw another picture. A large crowd of girls working in foul and hot atmosphere, with poor ventilation, on a small wage of eight or ten dollars a week, round shouldered, sallow faced, tubercular looking and destined to fill premature graves.

"The graduating scene of Thursday night cannot ignore or be indifferent to this factory scene of oppressed girls. The education of a privileged few while the toiling masses are opposed will not only fail to make this a fine country, but will prove its undoing.

**Intoxication of Wealth Bad as Rum**

"National prohibition goes into effect July 1 but a far greater intoxication, and I am afraid more deadly, is the intoxication of wealth, of success of gain, whether it be the small business man, the farmer or the oil magnate. Because of the high prices of the necessities of life, of meat, of butter, of eggs, of shoes, of clothes, of rents and of every thing, labor in the great centers is restless, uncertain, uneasy and dissatisfied. The intoxicated portion of our population is wholly indifferent and as in the days of Noah, they drink, they marry, they give in marriage, they buy, they sell, they dance they roll and reel in bacchanalian riot and revelry. Statesmen, politicians, cabinet officers, parliamentarians, capitalists, authors, editors, preachers in the main are confused and they do not seem to have any solution. Their council is as confused as was the council of Athiopol.

"Threatened strikes sympathetic strikes, universal strikes, which are no more or less than a bloodless revolution, are breaking out on every hand, increasing in volume and yet business men, public officials, statesmen and every element of the population are watching the thing with supine indifference.

"Democracy needs a strong hand,

an unbending leadership one that will eliminate both breed of anarchists. As the night follows day, living wages are going to be obtained by those who earn them. No use to talk about 10 or 25 per cent raise in wages and a 100 per cent increase in the necessities of life. Something is wrong with that administration of affairs that will allow the farmer to be robbed of the price of the cotton the first year of the war and then be bankrupted on the price of cotton at the close of the war when the demand for cotton products is greater than ever before. The cotton farmer is tired and his patience has long since been exhausted at being the slaves of a gang of Wall Street gamblers, or English spinners and at the same time seeing his government playing the part of the imbecile in the presence of both oppressors.

"The most glaring evidence of the public's indifference to wage conditions is the miserly wage that our public school teachers receive. We are so busy with making money that in the great city of Fort Worth there were only 265 votes cast in the recent trustee election. The minimum wage of our grade school teachers is \$60 per month and the maximum is \$100 and the average is \$85. And this for nine calendar months. Tell me how is a teacher to be even decent on a \$60 or \$85 salary and be on 65 cents a pound. And yet the future welfare of the children of our country depends upon the efficiency of our public school teachers."

sible assistance. The Sun Oil company sent over a relief squad, loaded the injured into their thirty auto trucks and took them to several improvised general hospitals in the city where their wounds and injuries were given attention.

Hospitals were improvised when doctor's offices were crowded. The Elks' club was turned into an emergency station where injured were taken after their wounds had been

dressed. The McCleskey hotel became a dressing station and guests gave up their beds that the wreck victims might have them.

The Ranger hospital in the Young addition was filled to capacity and more cots were sent from the store of Jones, Cox and Company. Rooms at the Conrad and Phoenix hotels on Main street were made into wards.

An auction store on Main street was fitted with cots and became a dressing station.

Dr. R. C. Ferguson of Dallas, a passenger in one of the forward Pull-

mans on the ill-fated train, was injured and immediately went to the help of the less fortunate. Clad only in his night clothes, trousers and shoes he worked from the time of the wreck until four o'clock this morning.

Dr. Carl Wilson's office, in the McCleskey hotel became an operating center with Drs. Ferguson, Dr. C. O. Terrell and Dr. H. C. Bowden busy caring for those who were brought in on stretchers, in automobiles and on cots.

Corridors of the hotel were filled with the pungent odor of chloroform as the anaesthetic mercifully relieved the sufferings of the maimed and the doctors worked on, with quiet efficiency. As soon as a patient could be taken from the operating table a place was found for him in the rooms surrendered by the guests of the hotel, eager to do what they could to help.

Though the wreck occurred on the main line traffic was not delayed seriously, as the long switch on the Sun Oil company's property was thrown open and passage of trains was made possible. The wrecker was called out and reported on the road and would arrive in a few hours to clean up the wreck, which will require about four hours, according to local officials.

### CITY COUNCIL PASSES UPON MANY MATTERS

right, but want to get in correspondence with the city administrations of Dallas and Tulsa, the two towns named by President Morris, and would ask the Round-Up to give them the same publicity" (In this connection the Round-Up desires to say that the space will be given freely to any publicity in this matter that has for its object the good of Cisco, and will be glad to publish the results from this correspondence.)

Continuing Mayor Williamson stated: "One thousand feet of this pipe has now been down over a year without a leak and the pipe is backed by the guarantee of the company making it."

The street commissioner and mayor were authorized to proceed with the laying of the water mains as speedily as possible, and in what localities they deemed most expedient.

The commission of sewer and sanitation and mayor were authorized to continue putting down the sewer mains.

#### Must Cut The Weeds.

Upon motion of Alderman Mayhew the chief of police was instructed to notify all parties to cut the weeds on their vacant lots, and parkings in front of the property, as well as clean up their premises. Mr. Mayhew stated this action was necessary for the health of the city.

The motion of Alderman Mayhew requiring awnings to be removed from the fronts of all business houses was not pressed, and died for want of a second, upon the suggestion of the mayor that the matter was a little premature.

#### Scavenger Wants More Pay

The city scavenger, Gus Bauman, appeared before the council and notified the body that he could not do the work at his present salary of \$100 per month any longer than June 30, and demanded the same be increased to \$150. The matter was laid on the table.

#### Paving Again in Lime Light

The matter of street paving again came up for discussion, especially the high center of the half block mentioned above. All favored correcting the defect in the best manner possible, but as Engineer Fielder

was not present, it was agreed that the matter would have to be left to an engineer. All favored continuing Avenue D. paving regardless of what action might be taken on the half block in question, which would be adjusted in the best manner possible, which would be worked out by the mayor and street commissioner, who were so instructed. Mayor Williamson stated that he would have to rely upon the advice of some competent engineer, but was not pleased with the attitude of Engineer Fielder, who had recently been appointed city engineer.

The supplying of rock for the crusher for paving was also reviewed and upon motion of Alderman Mayhew the bond and contract given the city to furnish rock for paving was ordered turned over to the city attorney for action.

If having been ascertained that 30 days was required for the time between calling and holding an election to vote on the new charter the time was reset, and a new election ordered to be held for that purpose on

July 28th. J. H. McDonald was appointed manager. The council then adjourned to reconvene upon call of the mayor.

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
